SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EXPOSITION

DEL MAR — This year's Southern California Exposition will extend a hand across the Mexican border June 26-July 7 during its 12-day run.

"Both the fair and San Diego have a Mexican heritage, and we felt we should, as a forerunner to the 20th anniversary next year, make this our theme this year," O'Connor explained.

The theme will be reflected in many displays, particularly those in mammoth exhibit Hall, and in the Expo's own exhibit that W. B. Zimmerly, design chief, will create.

Zimmerly already has started on the "Saludos Amigos" exhibit—which will feature a gigantic sombrero 26 feet in diameter and a crown 12 feet high.

"There will be 15 animated 'Mexican couples' dancing around the hat band, and 20 or more styrafoam representations of Mexican folk art bordering the sombrero," Zimmerly said.

Overall the circular display will measure 42 feet across, Assisting Zimmerly are Sid Branchflower of Encinitas, and Ed Bernish, of Solana Beach.

The "Saludos Amigos" exhibit follows a tradition begun in 1963 by the late Jack Carr, Zimmerly's predecessor.

Carr conceived the idea of a theme exhibit built and sponsored by the San Diego County Fair. His first was a fantasy called "Moonlanding."

The past two theme exhibits, "Golden Slippers" in 1966 and "Our Golden Heritage" last year, have been Zimmerly's creations, although he did help Carr with the 1964 and 1965 displays.

Costumes for the 3-foot-high Mexican dancing figures will be made by Mrs. Carr, Jack's widow. She has made the costumes for figures in the previous five theme displays.

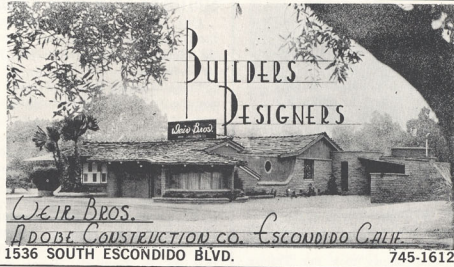

e. Such continuance can only apply to previously existing circumstances. Any changes in previous conditions, e.g., request for additional animals, request for additional facilities, etc., will require a new application.

A healthy sprinkling of celebrities featured early signups for the First Annual San Diego County Boys Club Golf Tournament to be held at the new Lomas Santa Fe championship golf course on Skyline Drive, Solana Beach, April 6-7. More than 400 entries are expected.

Hollywoodites Robert Young and Jack Kelly were early arrivals in the field for the two-day tournament. Entry fee is \$10, with all proceeds going to the Boys Club Building program through the cooperation of Theodore Gildred Jr. and the Lomas Santa Fe organization.

The hosts have also given the initial parcel of land for construction of a south branch building of Boys Club near Earl Warren Junior High School in Solana Beach. Formal approval for building is expected to be granted by the County Planning Commission later this month.

The idea of the golf tournament was conceived by Lomas Santa Fe's chief executives — Ted Gildred and Al Kern — who have been active supporters and collaborators in the Boys Club program. Working in connection with them and Charley Rizzo, newly-appointed golf professional at the 6700-yard championship course is a Boys Club committee composed of Rancho Santa Fe's H. William Freck, chairman; Norman Durkin, Solana Beach; Alanson D. Prentiss, Rancho Santa Fe; Philip J. Boyer, Encinitas; E. Donald Frick, Rancho Santa Fe; Raymond Grist, Rancho Santa Fe; and W. Doug Hall, director of the San Diego Boys Club.

Permanent trophies will be engraved with winners of low net, low gross and Calloway divisions. Smaller carry-home trophies will also be awarded winners, runner-ups and others; additional prizes will be given for "nearest-to-pin", and consolation brackets.

Saturday, April 6 will be Men's Day, with tee-off starting at 7 a.m. Sunday will be open for both men's, women's and mixed

foursomes. Should more than 500 contestants enter, an additional two days will be added for further competition.

Jack Bennett, Associate Executive of the Y will be directing the program assisted by trained college counselors and High School assistant counselors.

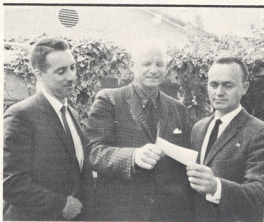

Cost for the twenty sessions is only \$15.00 which covers insurance and learpship.

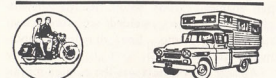

SUZI & IRA SPECTOR

I suppose it all began the day I lugged half a twelve foot long balsa life raft up several flights of stairs to my girlfriend Suzi's apartment. She was understandably overwhelmed by the gift, and was at a loss to turn the raw material into the decorative rocking horse I visualized . . . A few months later when she moved out to marry me, the next tenant inherited half a life raft.

For the next two years the same type of thing kept happening while we pursued our respective careers. She was a free lance illustrator, I was an industrial engineer with American Airlines in New York. I would get an inspiration for dimensional creativity, and bring the idea home for Suzi to construct. It always ended the same way the life raft idea did. Suzi doesn't think in three dimensions, and she had no idea how to build or construct anything. After living in New York for two years, and the arrival of our son Bruce, we decided to leave the city, which neither of us liked, and came to San Diego.

After my brief stint at Convair, we embarked upon a husband and wife art business, with Suzi doing the art work, and my handling the business contacts and liaison between clients and Suzi. For the next year and a half we discovered after hard work and good intentions, that there is little market in San Diego for free lance commercial art. Because this aspect of the art business promised so little future, we jumped at the chance to follow up a lead we got through an architect to do department store murals.

The first architect I called on with Suzi's portfolio was the very large and successful firm of Welton Becket in Los Angeles. Her work impressed the designers who saw it, and we were subsequently called in to bid on a graphics job for the May Company department stores. The "graphics" turned out to be sand castings, with which we were only vaguely familiar, but we assured the designer that we were able to produce castings with ease and facility. Actually we had no idea how to make sand castings, having only ever seen one before in our lives. Undaunted, I phoned Charley Faust, a very fine painter, sculptor and our city's zoo designer, and he kindly explained the technique over the telephone. After three phone calls and numerous attempts, we had a few samples we dared show them. I had the occasion to see these samples a few years later, and still do not understand how we ever got the job.

In the midst of our sandcasting experiments we discovered to our dismay that Suzi did not find the medium conducive to her talents. She hates to get dirty and really finds dimensional art foreign to her way of thinking. I wasn't about to let that opportunity go by though; and so with brainless optimism I took over the experiments and finished them off.

Thus, by a strange quirk of circumstances, the very first art work I ever did was a

\$6000 commission for the May Company. Four murals 24 feet long and six feet high and each weighed five thousands pounds. My career was almost aborted when at the final design meeting the president of the May Company asked where he might look at some of my other murals. A Welton Becket man quickly saved the day with a few well chosen words.

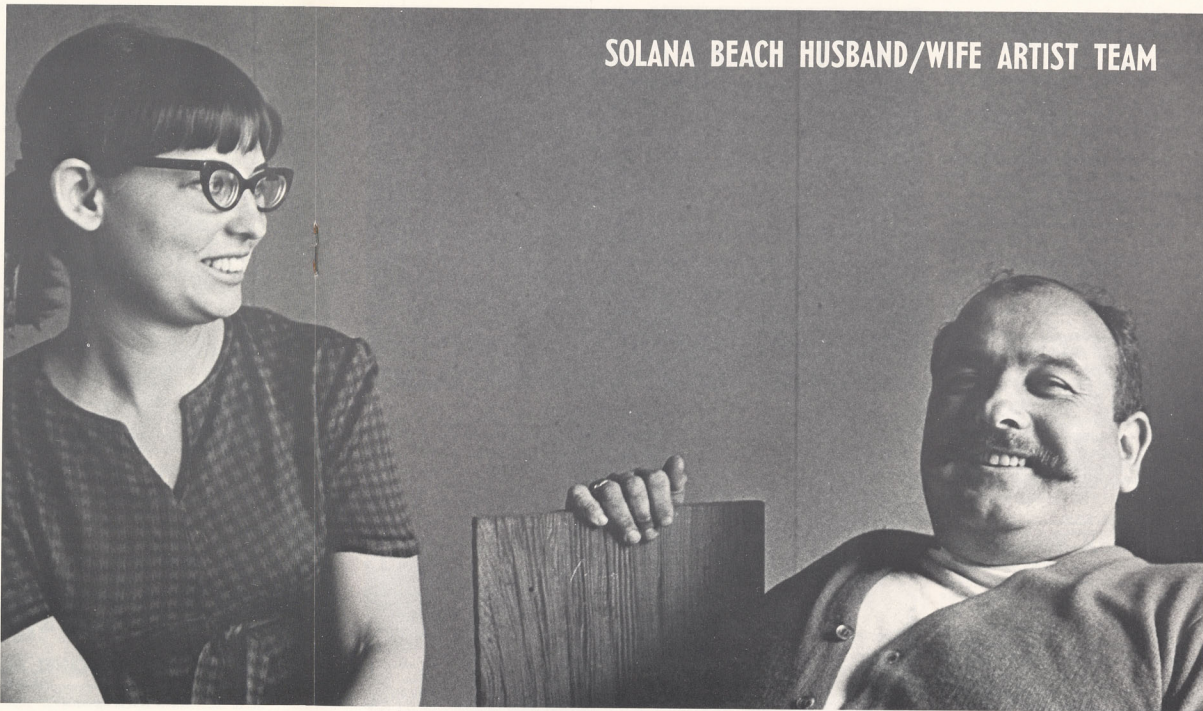
By background, training, temperament, and native talent, I don't belong anywhere near the art field. As a young boy in school I was not encouraged to do art work because of my notorious sloppiness with pen and ink. I was also discouraged by the good work of a friend and fellow classmate whom the teachers praised for his outstanding artistic talent. He moved away in the fourth grade and I didn't see him again for twenty-two years, until we met on the street in New York in front of the theater he was currently playing. Amazingly the well known actor Alan Arkin does not remember the schoolboy artistic talent I so admired.

In my entire school career, I have had but one art class, and that was in technical drawing. At New York University I majored in Industrial Engineering and my whole aesthetic experience was an occasional visit to a museum for the sake of curiosity. In fact, my wife was unsure she wanted to marry me because of the possible conflict in our way of life.

Suzi's background involved a lifetime of artistic interest and early proficiency at drawing and painting. She has had art lessons from the age of eight and majored in advertising design at the Philadelphia College of Art. When we met she was working as an art director at McCann-Erickson in New York, the world's largest advertising agency. She has done advertising illustration, magazine covers, decorative lettering, fabric design, illustrated a children's book and taught art classes.

With these comparative backgrounds, how do I come off posing as a sculptor, artist, interior designer, etc.?

Some creative people communicate a social commentary in their work. We don't suffer this anguish. Our work is done for a sense of unique beauty and decoration. We want people to feel good with our things. Suzi is an intuitive artist, born with beauty in her hands and mind. She visualizes how a line will look on paper before she draws it. Drawing to her is like walking. For me it's different. While I can visualize something beforehand, getting to the end result is a struggle. It's not problem when clay, plaster, sand or any other plastic type medium is the project. I shape and reshape until the end result is satisfying. However, when it comes to putting something on paper, I am lost. We've worked out a system that compliments our strong areas and avoids our weaknesses. What one can do the other can't, and vice versa, which is very fortunate, and covers all bases. Many times each of us bring in and out of a project several times from beginning to end.

We make all sorts of dimensional art and sculpture mostly related to architecture. This sort of activity has taken us all over the country. We've done work in the contemporary Los Angeles and Detroit airports, the University of California at La Jolla, numerous banks in Nevada and California, the exotic gambling casinos of Las Vegas and Lake Tahoe, department stores, supermarkets, restaurants, apartment houses, residences, and military bases. We work in many mediums, including sand casting, copper enamel, carved wood, leaded stained glass, cast plastics, welded sculpture, clay, stichery, painting, line drawing, paper mache, and mosaics.

Among our projects was the painted mural we did for the Los Angeles airport. We worked with Bob Brown, the late Walt Disney's son-in-law, who was at that time with a design firm in Los Angeles. The mural that Bob wanted us to execute was 40 feet long and 4 feet high. It was a very complex thing, depicting a stylized version of different Roman type buildings. Suzi was pregnant at the time, and it was 112 degrees outside, but we finished the mural in 4

hours, and were paid \$1000. Bob's boss, who had to approve it, was speechless. He said he never knew anyone to work that fast. What he didn't know was that we had worked out a system, using chalk and a paint roller. Suzi would chalk in the area of one color that she wanted. I followed behind her with a small paint roller, and filled in the area. When I was about two-thirds through, she was already back at the beginning, chalking in another color. When we had done this with the four colors that we were using, she came along and did the line work with her brush, and I followed with a sponge and "stippled" in the texture. We both finished at the same time. Suzi bills herself as the fastestbrush in the west.

To acquire the first big job we ever had in San Diego, I cornered the owner of the Valley Ho restaurant when it was under construction, and showed him Suzi's portfolio, leaning on the fender of a car in a driving drizzle. This job involved Suzi's painted murals, and her menu design.

One of our largest single commissions was for a building fascia (this means an edging

frieze or ornament) for the science library at the University of California at La Jolla. It is only ten inches high and four inches thick, but it runs 800 feet around the building. The really difficult part in this job was the installation; 65 feet in the air on a rolling scaffold. Three laborers who were assisting quit because the job was so precarious. It was during this installation that our daughter Toni was born. Luckily, Suzi doesn't get involved with scaffold work.

Our next large assignment was a 65 foot sand cast mural for a bank in San Diego. About three weeks after it was installed we got a call from the architect saying that the mural seams were turning black. It turned out the black substance was mold, which had grown on the damp putty I used to grout the joints. The mold formed because the construction people covered the mural with plastic to protect it until the building was complete.

My career as a sculptor began when a landscape architect called me in on a sculpture idea he had for the entry he was designing at a residence in Corona del Mar. I sug-

gested a welded abstract copper sculpture about seven feet high, and received a commission to build it. This, of course, meant I had to learn to weld, so I bought myself a set of welding equipment, and persuaded an old alcoholic welder who lived in a shack behind my studio to be an instructor. In exchange for all the beer he could drink he taught me the finer points of welding while I constructed the sculpture. The clients were delighted with the results, and I profited again from a "learning and earning situation." We are never daunted by a new challenge and often accept a job involving a new technique, and learn how to do it as we complete the job. Suzi is often appalled by my audacity, but we always seem to work out the technical problems.

Another job that Suzi and I collaborated on was for the thirteen year old granddaughter of one of America's most famous songwriters. We made her a pair of welded steel headboards, large flower shapes painted in bright psychedelic colors. The client was very pleased, and the decorator who commissioned them was inspired to call them psychedelic pop-o-dillies.

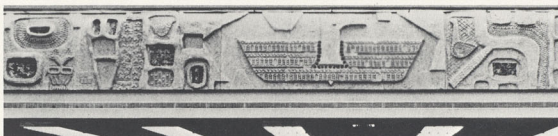
In the Allied Gardens library we did some outdoor children's fairy tale sand castings that had marbles cast into them. Unfortunately kids constantly filched the marbles as fast as they could be replaced. One day the librarian left some marbles in a dish in front of the castings, suggesting in an accompanying note that the children take these marbles and leave the ones in the castings. The next day the marbles in the castings, the marbles in the dish, the dish, and the note were all gone.

Our work has been subject to vandalism on several other occasions, and it is always a consideration when we are planning the use of materials in any project. In public buildings we always bolt and secure our work to walls and floors.

I recently completed a 12 foot by 6 foot leaded stained glass window for a liquor store in San Diego. While I had done minor experiments with stained glass and was aware of the technique involved, I had never done leaded glass before. The preparation of a full sized sketch, careful numbering and cutting involves a great deal of effort and time (not to mention the four stitches required in a finger where I severed an artery in the early learning stages of glasscutting.) The final results were extremely gratifying, however, and we look forward to more adventures in stained glass.

My favorite creation is a 9 foot concrete stucco sculpture named "Sammy." Sammy was created for an accountant and his wife who specified an abstract sculpture, which is unusual because it has been my experience that most people over 40 do not react well to abstract art. I showed our client a clay model of what I had in mind which he accepted and she claimed to like too, although she had secret reservations. After 7 weeks on this effort, I truly felt that this was the high point of my creativity. A 6 legged and 6 armed creature, the embodiment of warmth and fun, I called him Sammy because he reminded me of all the Sams I ever knew. I never knew a bad guy named Sam. At last it was done, and we hoisted all 1600 pounds of it by crane into a trailer. The husband was home when we installed it, and was quite delighted. Unfortunately, his wife had a very different reaction. She found it overpowering and threatening, and insisted we remove it. The husband suggested donating it to a non-profit organization, and after several abortive trips forth and back, Sammy found happiness at Kairos, at the Wishing Well Hotel.

We are fortunate that our work is not repetitive. Things are never boring and there is always a challenge. Right now we are doing a large project for two department stores in Denver, carving a door for a Psychiatrist office building; two doors for the officers club in Camp Pendleton, designing and fabricating the interior of a restaurant and a liquor store, and acting as consultant for the sand casting of the walls of a church — each panel to be 32 feet high and 14 feet long. Suzi has been complaining lately that the yard work isn't getting done.

No antique shop on Madison Avenue is more elegant than The Country Friends Shop in Rancho Santa Fe, which supplies the major source of income to The Country Friends for assistance to thirty charitable organizations throughout the country. This bright and many-windowed shop, staffed entirely by volunteers, is a favorite browsing-place for shoppers seeking the rare, the lovely, the unusual.

Merchandise comes from estates or individuals, and may be donated or placed on consignment. In either case, an appraisal is made by a committee. If it is a donation, a statement of the selling price is given to the donor for income-tax purposes.

Through these portals have passed an ancient Persian strong box, a 16th Century Persian brocade, a set of hand-cut casters with silver fittings, a Jenny Lind bed, a \$1500 French harpsichord. Usually you will find Oriental pieces — an ivory carving, a set of tables, a rug, a carved desk and chair. If your heart's desire is a two-foot tall bronze figure of a horse from the famed castle at San Simeon, hurry to The Shop. Perhaps you are looking for a coach horn or a copper milk can, a cherry cupboard or a Boston rocker? And always there is a plentiful supply of china, crystal, silver, bric-a-brac.

Twice a year, in May and November, a 25% discount sale is held. Many customers do their graduation or Christmas shopping at these sales. The Shop is open six days a week, from 10-4.

It is anticipated that this will be the most successful year in The Shop's history. As Mrs. C. Temple Murphy, president of The Country Friends, reported at a recent membership luncheon, "The four months from October, 1966, through January, 1967, produced a net income of \$3,060. The same period this year showed a profit of \$6,651, or a gain of over 100%. So far in our current fiscal year, which began in June, the total net income is \$10,577, so that with still four months to go we can substantially exceed the figure of \$12,600 for last year." "POEMS SOUTHWEST" EDITED BY A. WILBUR STEVENS, SON OF RANCHOITO

The Prescott College Press, Prescott, Arizona, has announced the release of its latest publication, "POEMS SOUTHWEST," edited by A. Wilbur Stevens, Chairman of the College's Center for Language and Literary Studies. The volume marks a significant addition to the literature of the American Southwest.

Thirty poets and fifty-nine previously unpublished works are presented in this anthology of contemporary Southwest poets. The anthology amounts to a poetic statement about a place and a time, creatively conceived by an exciting group of minds. Selection of the contents was made from manuscripts submitted from all parts of the United States and abroad, but especially from Arizona, Old and New Mexico, Southern California, Colorado, Nevada, and Oklahoma.

Editor Stevens comments in his preface: "In years past, I have written about the problems of regionalism. Possibly, the vantage point of a new and vastly challenging young institution such as Prescott College, situated within its own new time and own new space (although both are old as God),

evokes a cult of problems born of 'region.' Sooner or later, and then sharply, one is aware of cactus, desert, canyons; that alienation and graphic loneliness which characterize the long earthward plunge into an essential moment in time . . . Region is, after all, region. Place must have its end. To be amazed, to wonder, to be a part of, to know, to surrender — these are elements of awareness and experience which go beyond desert plants, Pacific fogs, Midwest oaks, bayous, and the hum of a summer drinking place near Washington Square. The poet has business to transact. His business is to evoke the presence of a reality which he perceives and which goes beyond taking itself seriously simply for the sake of itself." This is the spirit in which "POEMS SOUTHWEST" was compiled.

A. Wilbur Stevens, poet and critic, has for many years edited and published the literary magazine "Interim." He has taught, lectured extensively, and given readings of his own poetry at colleges and universities in the United States and abroad. An Easterner by birth, he has an undiminished interest in the imaginative writing of the American West.

TROUT UNLIMITED

Twenty enthusiastic members and friends of Trout Unlimited met at the Rancho Santa Fe Inn on Sunday afternoon, March 3rd. Trout Unlimited is a national non-profit organization which promotes a comprehensive program for the conservation and preservation of trout and trout waters. There are 36 chapters in 17 states including California. The purpose of this meeting was to organize a chapter of T.U. in San Diego county.

The meeting was moderated by Mr. Andre Puyans, a director of the national board and a past President of the San Francisco Bay Area chapter. He was ably assisted by Richard May, Secty.-Treas. of the S. F. Bay Area chapter. Mr. Puyans explained the purposes of Trout Unlimited and was followed by Mr. May who narrated a presentation of color slides of the Hat Creek project now in progress in California.

The object of the Hat Creek project is to restore three and one half miles of the stream as a habitat for wild trout. To accomplish this large population of suckers, black heads and other coarse fish will be removed. Then barriers will be built so that the coarse fish can not re-enter either from up stream or down stream. The stream will then be stocked between the barriers with wild trout of varying sizes. It is expected

that this area of Hot Creek will eventually provide excellent trout fishing comparable to the famous Madison River in Montana. If and when this experiment should prove successful this experience will make it possible to restore other streams both in California and many other states.

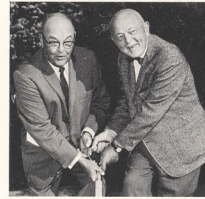
This is just one example of what has been done by Trout Unlimited to project, conserve and improve fishing for wild trout and steelhead in California and elsewhere.

Mr. Puyans and Mr. May moderated an interesting question and answer period.

To further strengthen and implement other projects more new members of T.U. are very necessary. A nominating committee to present proposed directors is now active with Mr. C. C. Mickle of Solana Beach as chairman. These nominees will be presented for election at a meeting of T.U. members, the date of which will be announced soon. Mr. John Hewitson biologist and teacher, of Encinitas is now working on by-laws to be presented to the members for approval and then sent to T.U. national headquarters for their approval.

THE STORY OF THE RANCHO SANTA FE LIBRARY



From Bookmobile to its own beautiful library building in four years is the unique record achieved by the Rancho Santa Fe Library Guild on February 1st 1968 when the new library opened. Perhaps this could have happened only in Rancho Santa Fe which has been traditionally distinguished by its strong sense of Civic pride and responsibility.

The lack of a library in lovely Rancho Santa Fe stirred its loyal citizenry to action. A first step was taken by the Book Club whose efforts brought the County Bookmobile to the Ranch, two afternoons a month. Admittedly this was only a token library, affording students no opportunity to browse among books nor access to reference books necessary to their studies.

Seeking more adequate library accommodations, the only space found acceptable to the County Library System's standard was the Ewing property. The rental fee was considerably in excess of the County's budget for a population as small as Rancho Santa Fe. The late Mrs. Alice Ewing, from her generous heart and civic spirit, persuaded her agents to lower the rent from \$300.00 a month to \$175.00, which was still \$25.00 more than the County budget stipulated.

At this juncture the Rancho Santa Fe Library Guild was formed, its purpose to aid in meeting the needs of the Rancho Santa Fe Library and to supplement what the County Library System is unable to provide. The first organizational meeting was held December 13, 1963. A Board and a President, Mrs. William L. Weddell, was elected. With high hopes, no assets, and an obligation to pay \$900.00 over a three-year period as the Library Guild's share of the rent, the Library doors opened February 1, 1964.

The energies of Fire Chief James Fox, spearheaded the Rotary Club's project of painting and reconditioning the new quarters, giving the Ranch an attractive and cheerful background for its first library.

The initial financing of the Library Guild came through 210 voluntary donations for charter memberships ranging from \$5.00 to \$100.00.

By-Laws were drawn gratis by William Schofield, who is both a Charter and a Trustee member, and through his efforts the new Guild became a non-profit corporation acquiring State and Federal tax exemption on July 18, 1964. Mr. Schofield and his

associate Mr. John Thomas have continued to give the Guild their legal guidance.

To give the community a personal stake in the Library, an administrative regulation was worked out with Supervisor Cozens the County Board of Supervisors permitting the Guild to purchase and accept books as gifts. These remain the sole property of the Guild upon which the County has no right of claim or call. They have become the nucleus of a fine, permanent collection for Rancho Santa Fe.

Guild volunteer assistance in the Library was also approved by the Board of Supervisors. Rancho Santa Fe is the only branch of the San Diego County Library System to be granted these privileges.

Methods of financing the rapidly expanding organization were developed:

1. *Annual Membership Dues.* Have shown an increasing response each year.

2. *Annual Book Fair.* This has become progressively successful. Over 5,000 books of outstanding quality are donated by the community each year, making the Book Fair famous and attracting collectors, educators, and book dealers from all over this state and Arizona.

3. *Memorials.* Donation places the name of the one to be remembered on a beautiful permanent scroll which hangs in the Library — designed and painted by Mrs. Harrie Taylor.

The Annual Audit has been a gratis contribution from L. B. McLaughlin, Vice President of Arthur Young & Company. Besides giving this civic service, Mr. McLaughlin is always available for his invaluable advice on keeping Guild account books strictly correct.

Two factors impelled the Library Guild to consider building its own library. A raise in rent was imminent; and it was evident that to maintain the dynamic growth and impetus of interest, larger quarters were necessary to enable the library to grow and to improve its service to the community.

Long-time school board president, Doctor Neil Randol, and Rancho Santa Fe Elementary School Board members Mr. David Burger and Mr. John C. Abels with the principal, Mr. Roger Rowe, were acutely aware of the students' need for an adequate library. By unanimous agreement they made available to the Library Guild one-third of an acre, for the sum of \$1.00. This building

site for a library was ideally located, contiguous to the Rancho Santa Fe School and the Post Office.

Such unparalleled cooperation and his own conviction that a library would be an ever increasing benefit to Rancho Santa Fe, persuaded Mr. Arthur R. Lindburg to assume the chairmanship of the Building Fund for the Library Guild. His friend, Mr. E. J. Evans joined Mr. Lindburg as co-chairman. The swift effectiveness of their campaign is unique in the annals of fund raising. It achieved front page coverage in newspapers.

Fifteen personal friends, who are dedicated citizens of Rancho Santa Fe, contributed \$75,000.00 . . . their only request was complete anonymity.

With this robust beginning the Building Fund campaign was made community wide. By its immediate success the Library was assured, and the community demonstrated its confidence that the Guild would create a library in which Rancho Santa Fe would take pride.

Mr. E. J. Evans accepted chairmanship of the Building Committee. Feeling keenly his responsibility for the Library, Mr. Evans has labored diligently to bring the building to final successful completion.

Ground-breaking ceremonies, well attended by enthusiastic County and Library officials, were held February 23, 1967.

The building, designed by Harold Abrams, A.I.A., whose numerous buildings of Spanish architecture have contributed to the charm of Rancho Santa Fe, began to rise.

Mrs. Arthur R. Lindburg, Vice-President and Chairman of the Decorating Committee, persuaded John Thiele, A.I.D. of La Jolla, to design the interior decor. They have achieved a gracious and harmonious unity throughout the Library that radiates a warm and inviting atmosphere.

A major contribution was given to the Children's wing of the Library by Mrs. Philip Davis of Beverly Hills in memory of her parents, Blanche and Hilliard G. Lyle, who were former Ranch residents. Mrs. Kenneth Holland, Board member of the Library Guild, is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lyle.

The furnishings of the handsome Guild Room were given in memory of the late George Davis Bailey by Mrs. Bailey, Mr. Bailey's family and his many friends all over the world.

The Library opened on its fourth birthday — February 1, 1968. Already it is beginning to fulfill its promise to the Community and to the many people whose contributions of monies and effort made it possible.

Three afternoons a week classes from the school come to the Library. Seeing the children finding their books on the shelves, working at the tables under the guidance of their children's librarian, Mrs. Cornelia Manning, there is a deep sense of satisfaction.

Knowing this is what it was all about.
