RANCHO SANTA FE WILL HOLD HORSE SHOW ON JULY 19

R. B. Mann in Charge of Plans for Event; 50 Ani- mals Are Entered.

Members of the colony of horse lovers at Rancho Santa Fe, under the leadership of R. B. Mann, are combining efforts to make their first horse show an event both interesting and unique. Interest in the show, which is to take place at the stables of R. B. Mann, July 19, at 2 p. m., has been steadily growing.

The committee in charge of preparations consists of R. B. Mann, chairman; Mrs. Ynez Ward Loomis, Mrs. Glenn A. Moore, Miss Mary Jo Bishop, Miss Mildred Pease, Miss Lillian J. Rice, R. B. Claggett and A. W. Gilbert. Miss Pease will act as official hostess and will be on duty throughout the show in the reception room.

JUDGES SELECTED

Judges for the show will be Mrs. T. L. Carothers, Glen W. Tomlinson and L. L. Fox. Mr. Fox will be special judge of the calf roping events and the stock and draft horse classes. He has had years of experience in managing his stock ranch in Santa Barbara county. Besides the ribbons to be awarded to the winners, other entrants will receive fitting souvenirs.

Mrs. A. W. Gilbert is contributing a handsome silver trophy for the children's class, in which considerable competition is promised since a great deal of talent has been shown in the preliminary training. Dave Willoughby, who is conducting a riding academy at the rancho, has been grooming his pupils carefully for their appearance. New entrants in the children's class are Eleanor and Virginia Crabtree, daughters of Dr. and Mrs. E. H. Crabtree, who are summering at Del Mar.

The local organization of Girl Scouts will have for sale to guests, souvenir programs put up in convenient form for mailing. A small charge will be made for auto parking, proceeds of which will be divided between the Girl Scouts and the Boy Scouts. Admission will be free. Boy Scouts will be on hand to direct traffic and seat guests. A stand will be erected with ample seating capacity for the many guests who are expected to attend. Dr. Thomas F. Davis will be in charge of first aid.

50 HORSES ENTERED

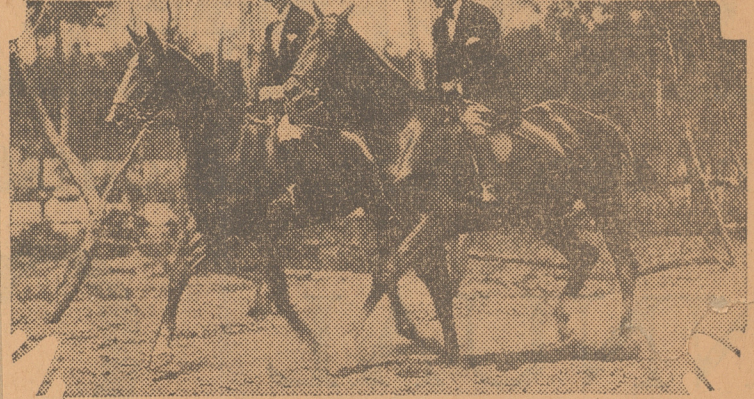
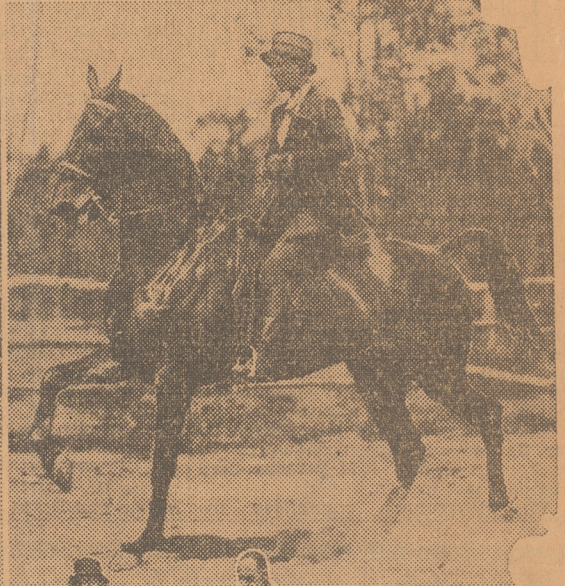
Fifty horses have been entered for the show, many of these having been shown to good advantage in National association horse shows. Events include five-gaited horses, three-gaited horses, jumpers, hunters, horses in both single and double harness, stock and draft horses, calf roping, and a special class for family pets not eligible in other events. These will be called the "Happy Family class."

Steers and calves for the roping events will be furnished by the famous Pickford-Fairbanks ranch. Dave Willoughby, known throughout the western circuit as entertainer and trainer of trick horses, will give exhibitions of fancy riding between regular events.

Visitors will have no difficulty in finding the grounds, since markers will be placed for their guidance. Following the horse show a special dinner will be served at La Morada hotel, reservations for which must be made prior to the event.

RANCHO HORSE SHOW SUNDAY

Unprecedented interest has been shown throughout the district in the first annual horse show and rodeo which will take place next Sunday afternoon at Rancho Santa Fe.

An elaborate program will be presented during the afternoon, some fifty horses owned by Rancheros being scheduled to take part.

The events will take place at the stables and arena of the Ellis Bishop home at Rancho Santa Fe. The entire affair will be under the direct supervision of R. B. Mann who will have the assistance of Dave Willoughby, Rancho Santa Fe riding master.

So great has been the interest shown in the rodeo and horse show that a crowd of equestrians from

Los Angeles, Pasadena, La Jolla, San Diego and Coronado is expected to be on hand Sunday afternoon.

The program will begin at two o'clock and will continue until late in the afternoon.

There will be no admission charge made. Members of the girl and boy scout troops of Rancho Santa Fe have been granted the privilege of handling the parking for which they will make a nominal charge.

A number of very fine horses will be put through their paces for the spectators. Mr. Willoughby promises some rodeo stunts of an extraordinary nature.

In fact, the entire show will be unusually interesting, judging from present indications.

Range cattle which will be used in the rodeo stunts will be furnished by the famous Douglas Fairbanks ranch, located near Rancho Santa Fe.

Special accommodations will be provided for the audience Sunday afternoon.
