"How Does Your Garden Grow"

Some will say we have no changing seasons in our Southland. They say they miss the colors of Fall, the whiteness of Winter, and the burgeoning growth of Spring. These are the good folk who should be here now. We don't have much snow on the Ranch, but, other than that, I find our seasons well defined.

Throughout the past two months, the clusters of red berries on the native holly and pyracantha surely mark the Holiday Season . . . and now the bloom of the acacias shows that Winter is passing, and soon we shall have Spring. Camellias in bloom are better to me than crocus in the snow, and the abundant bloom of azaleas pleases me more than masses of green leaves on a lot of trees that were bare all winter. So it goes throughout the year. Each season strikingly different to those who are aware of our California native plants, and to those trees and shrubs that have become well adapted to this environment.

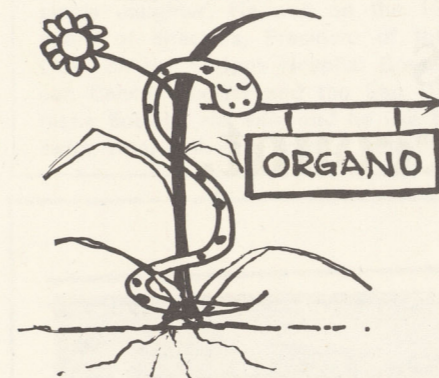
Unfortunately, seasonal changes are not all marked by beauty. Each change of season can be noted by the advent of weeds, mildews, and varieties of insects. At this time of year, let us

first concern ourselves with mildews and such, which are usually referred to as "plant diseases".

Common mildew such as appears on roses is easily controlled and most garden columns are filled with instructions as to how this can be accomplished. A lesser known fungus is the one that attacks camellia and azalea blooms. This is commonly called "azalea flower-blight fungus". It manifests itself by destroying the flower itself. The flowers turn a mottled brown at the petal base. Gradually the entire flower turns brown and then drops to the ground. At this time, the spore is deposited into the soil. During the early days of summer, when the air warms and there is still a lot of moisture in the ground, this spore develops into an ugly brown mushroom. At the end of the mushroom phase, the spore is scattered and some is deposited on the plant itself when it re-infects the flower the following season. Control of this fungus is not too difficult. Simply use a spray containing Captan, Phaltan, and one of the Mercury compounds — and spray now, and again a month or so later. Be sure to spray the ground thoroughly. One or two sprayings in the Fall will also be helpful. Combining this type of fungicide with Malathion will control scale insects that are often attacking the growth buds of camellias. A light application of soil sulphur to the ground under the plants will also help control the fungus, and in addition will keep the soil acid. Be sure to follow directions with the sulphur. Use about one tablespoonful to a large plant, or — at the rate of 1 lb. to 20 sq. ft.

Another indicator of the season's change is the rapid development of new growth. Now we know for sure that Spring is here — and we also know for sure that now is the time to feed. New growth indicates root activity has begun — and, only when the roots are growing can they absorb the nutrients required by the plant. It is my belief that feeding when the plant is dormant is wasteful, if not injurious to the plant. So, now that growth has started, feed lightly and frequently and maintain the soil moisture at all times.

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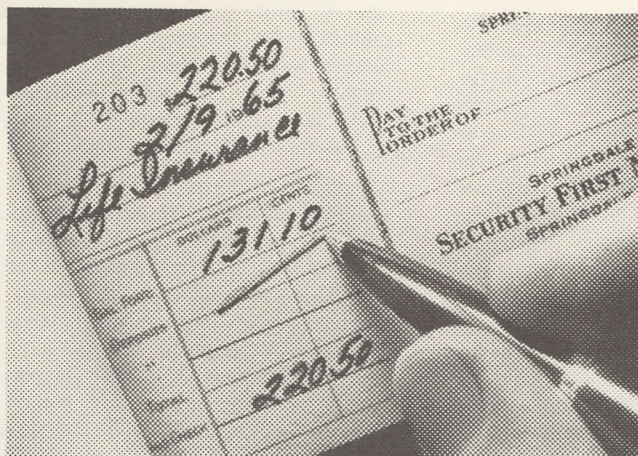
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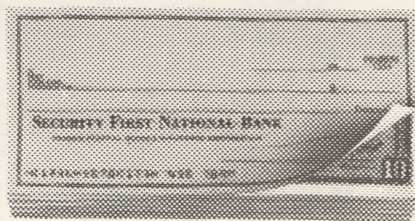
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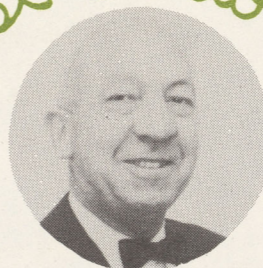


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Guest Editorial

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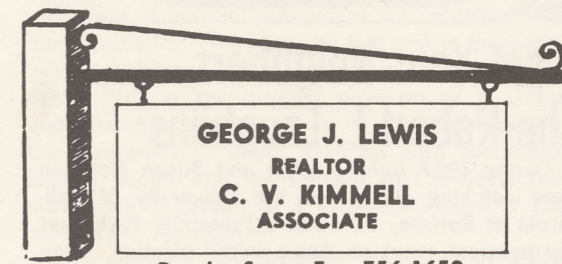
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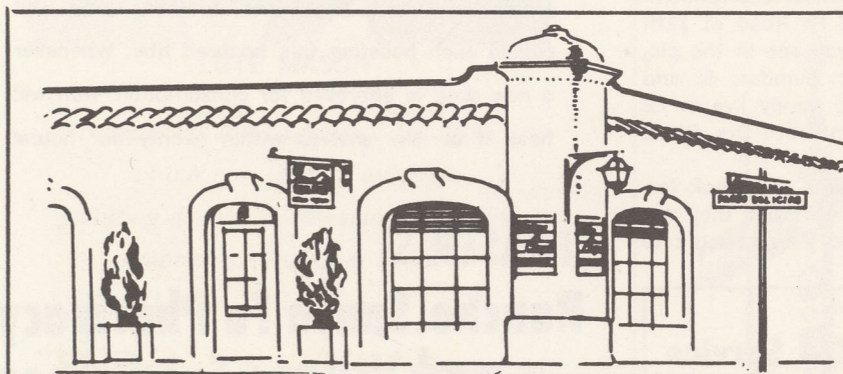

Bob and Susan are tennis buffs, and look forward to playing a great deal now that they are living on the Ranch. We all bid you welcome to the nicest Village in the world!

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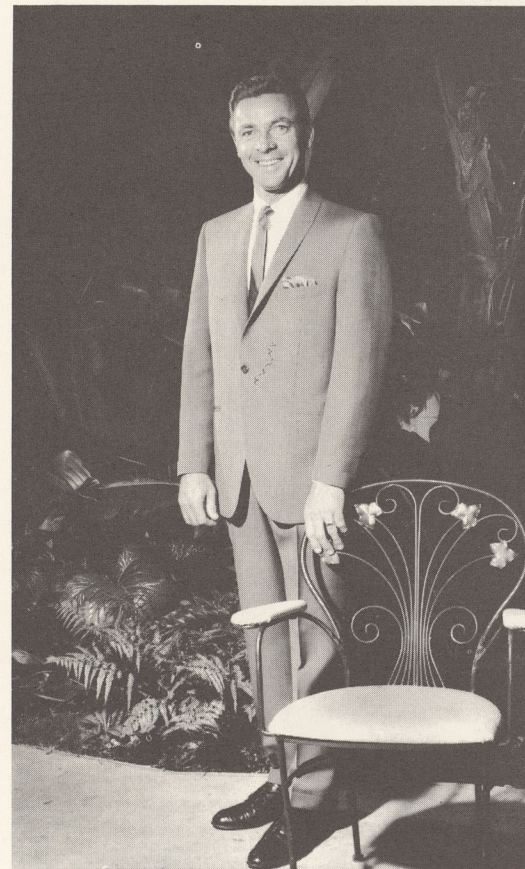


Fashion Flair . . . For Men!

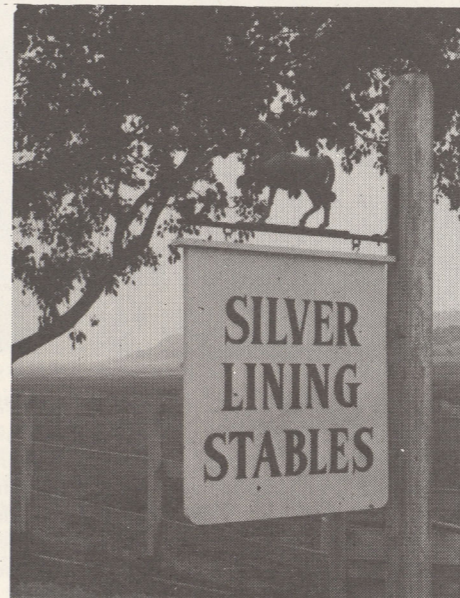

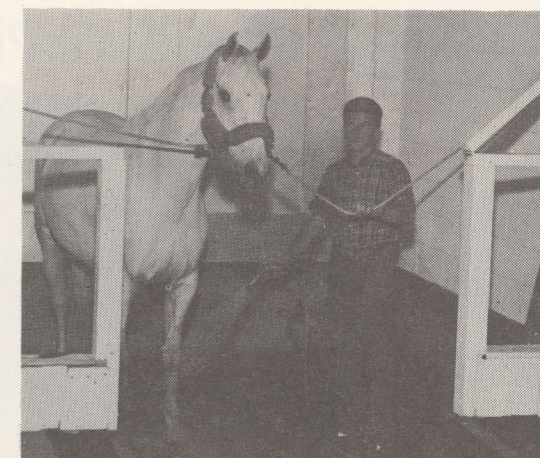

Know Rancho Santa FeHorses!

The two activities in Rancho Santa Fe that embrace the greatest land area are golf and horses. Most of us know the confines of the golf course, but few have ridden the almost 100 miles of dedicated or well-defined trails** that take one into little-known parts of the Ranch or up some of our surrounding canyons. In addition to the trails there are numerous training stables, breeding farms and private corrals that boast of from one to fifty or more horses. Not a day goes by that doesn't see a winning colt foaled, a Ranch resident win a trophy or a "blue", or a group of riders heading out for a trail ride.

RIDING CLUB STABLES

The original stable in the area which has been generally available to Ranch residents is the one leased from the Rancho Riding Club by Bob and Louise Rice. It is called the "Riding Club Stables" and is immediately across the barranca from the Rancho Riding Club ring where many horse shows and clinics are staged. The Rices board and train saddle-bred, western, jumpers and hunters, and pleasure horses. You have not seen Rancho Santa Fe until you watch Louise putting our youngsters through their elementary horsemanship paces. When they come home with a ribbon (because they haven't fallen off) that is the beginning of their horse show career. The next step, of course, is to buy a safe "old dobbin" from Bob (or any of the other fine stables we have) and then graduate every year or two until you are paying, not \$100, but \$1000 for a horse.

ACACIA FARMS

If one wants to get into the hunter or jumper business, one might motor to north of the reservoir where Ed Walz has leased his Acacia Farms to Jarvis Esenwein. Jarvis mixes business with pleasure, and is the reason why more teenagers aren't listening to Beatle records! When Jarv takes her hunters and jumpers to a show the van is half-loaded with young adults who would rather be grooming a horse with Jarv than sipping a coke in a coffee house. Jarvis boards, trains and gives lessons. You recognize her gang at shows by the long red night-shirts the girls wear. (What do the boys wear?)

RANCHITO PASATIEMPO

Gordon T. Campbell's Ranchito Pasatiempo, managed by Gerry Clevenger, is one of the most interesting spreads to most of us. It is just below the Village Center on the road to Del Mar. Gerry tells us that since he and Ann have so many children, they want Ranchito Pasatiempo to be one where people may come and bring the family. A play yard has been built in the shade. In addition a new hay barn, machinery shed, and much new

planting has been added. Cynthia Campbell (no relation) is the trainer, and specializes in hunters and jumpers. The famous quarterhorse stud "Hobby Horse" is stabled here.

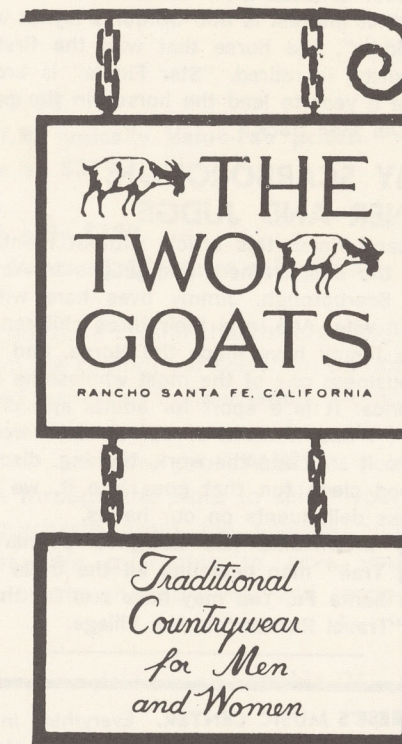
SILVER LINING STABLES

A new operation on La Noria is Betty Kern Miller's "Silver Lining Stables". J. J. Smith, famous throughout the East, has been brought in to be the trainer. The stable boasts of seven beautiful grey hunters that are among the best in the West. Television fans are astonished to see Tab Hunter working out under J. J.'s supervision. Tab trains and rides amateur, and can be seen at most shows.

GROVE KNOLL STABLES

In the days when the Riding Club was getting on its feet, Grove Mosely was always on hand to lend a tractor or two, or three strong backs (he lent mine once). Grove operates Grove Knoll Stables, and specializes in breeding and boarding American saddlebred horses. His famous stud "Larkwood" is known all over the country.

So much for what we might call **Pleasure Horses**. One of the reasons there seems to be so much activity in hunters and jumpers is because a good hunter or jumper is most always a thoroughbred. Oftimes a horse can't stand the terrific pounding of the turf, and will break down at the track. These horses, if they are reasonably sound, have excellent conformation and good jumping ability. Jumpers, however, (as differentiated from hunters) may be any kind of horse — even mules have been entered in national competition. Rancho Santa Fe houses some of the best thoroughbred stables in the country. (Continued on next page)



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VISTA HERMOSA STABLES

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hansen's "Vista Hermosa Stables" houses the famous "Crazy Kid", winner of the world's record for six furlongs. The ranch formerly belonged to John Rice who worked hard on Riding Club boards in years past. John sold it to George Brent who still stables with the Hansens. Gabor Renne is trainer at Vista Hermosa, and a real interesting man to talk with. (He'll also sell you a horse for \$30,000.)

J. B. SHAMEL RANCH

At the juncture of El Mirador and Las Colinas is a reproduction of Kentucky pastures. J. B. Shamel has over 20 acres where he pastures his brood mares and foals. Some of them are sired by "Pistol Bar" — others by "Chitagong" owned by former Ranchoite, Walter Cluer. J. B. also uses this place to rest up his race horses, both thoroughbreds and quarterhorses.

H. C. MORTON RANCH

The H. C. Morton Ranch has over fifty thoroughbreds, a good many of them sired by "Talking Prince", Caliente Champion three years in a row. Most of the Morton horses are raced at Caliente. Billy Hamill is the trainer. Billy rode as a jockey for the Ann Biddle stables, and has raced in Egypt, Lebanon, France, England and almost any place you can mention.

OSUNA VALLEY RANCH

Next door to the Morton spread is Jenny Collins' "Osuna Valley Ranch". Some thirty or forty horses are bred, foaled or layed up here. The Collins' horses also race at Caliente.

ROBERT GORDON RANCH

Of further interest is Bob Gordon's layout where "Star Fiddle", the horse that won the first Del Mar Futurity, is retired. "Star Fiddle" is brought out once a year to lead the horses in the parade at the Del Mar track.

JIMMY SCARBOROUGH, TRAINER AND JUDGE

We can't finish this article without mentioning one of the best trainers and judges in America, Jimmy Scarborough. Jimmy lives here with his beautiful wife, Ann, and their three children. People like Jimmy have made the Horse, and Horse Show business one of the most wholesome sports in America. It is a sport for adults and children alike . . . and if more of our children were exposed to it . . . and the work, training, discipline, and good clean fun that goes into it, we would have less delinquents on our hands.

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Expanded Spring Thoroughbred Meeting at Caliente Include Friday Racing

AGUA CALIENTE—Plans for an expanded spring thoroughbred meeting at Caliente to include Friday racing over a period of nine weeks commencing March 12 were announced today by the track's executive director, John S. Alessio.

Programs will be offered Friday, Saturday and Sunday for nine consecutive weekends, winding up May 9, and the popular "5-10" form of wagering will be a feature of each card. There will be 12 races daily, and first post time will be at noon.

This marks the first time Caliente has diverted from its normal year-round practice of just Saturday and Sunday racing since 1963 when it also had Friday activity during the interlude between the closing of Santa Anita and the opening of Hollywood Park.

"In deciding to provide these extra days," Alessio said, "we took into consideration that there is no other spring racing in Southern California. Equally important is the fact that our stable area now is filled nearly to capacity, and our horsemen will welcome the opportunity to run for additional purses."

The purse pattern will follow closely that of 1963, and approximately \$60,000 will be distributed weekly. The minimum will be \$1500, and within the nine weeks three stakes will be presented, the Baja California Handicap and the Ensenada Plate, both \$5000 added fixtures, and the \$7500 added Caliente Derby.

It is anticipated the augmented slate will prove particularly beneficial to two-year-olds, of which more than 100 now are schooling in preparation for their debuts. The first race of 1965 for the baby runners is set for Saturday, February 13.

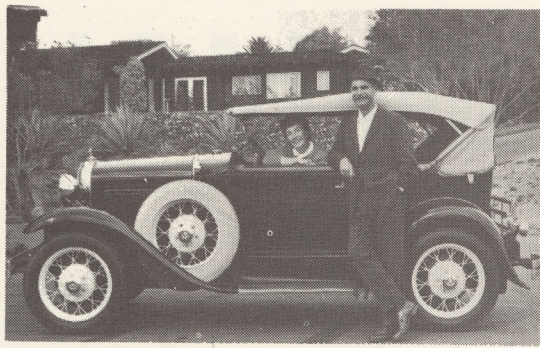

If this brings back memories, mist to your eyes and a yearning for bygone days, just whistle. It will be the Morton's pleasure to take you for a ride in father's model A!

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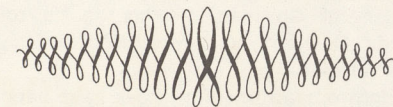

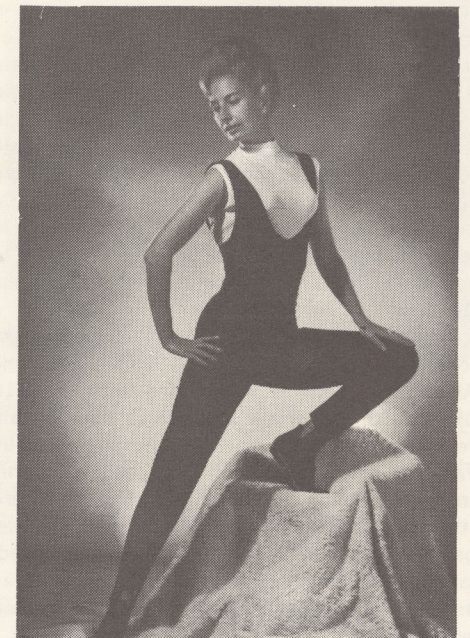

Rip Copeland . . . Insurance

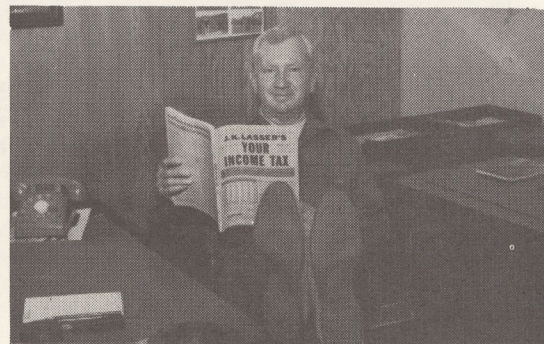

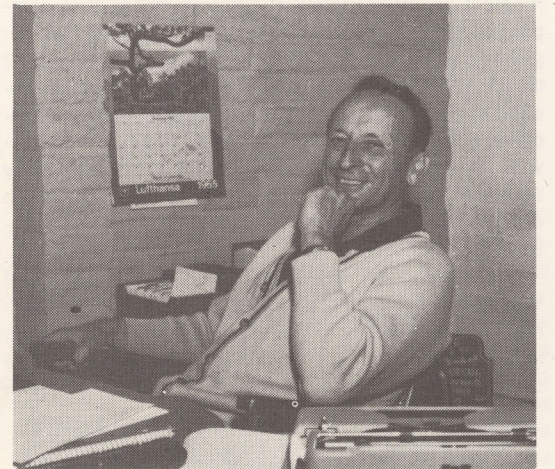

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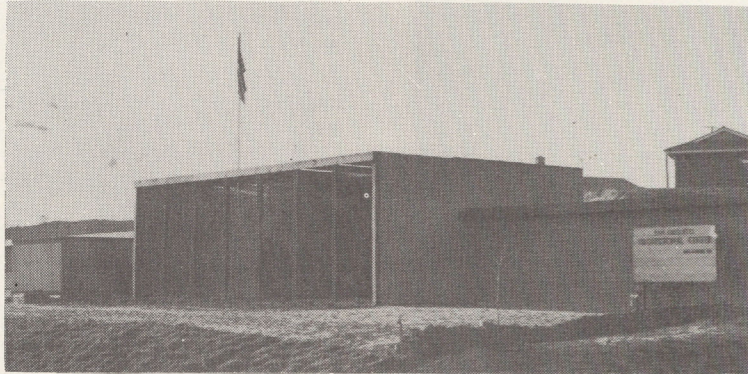

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Ranchoite Dr. Jack Novak Opens San Dieguito Professional Center in Solana Beach



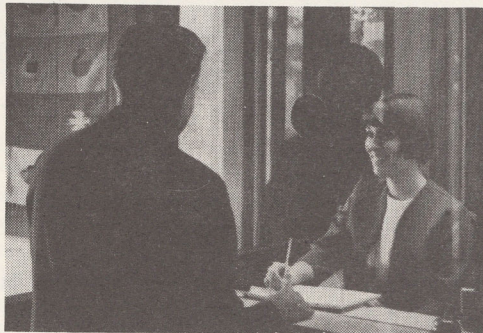

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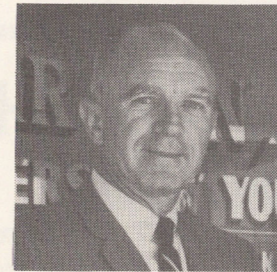

"The ideal investment would have four characteristics: First, it would be completely safe from loss; second, it would be liquid, that is, readily convertible into cash; third, it would return a high rate of interest; fourth, its return would keep pace with cost-of-living increases. No type of investment has all these characteristics. In general, the greater the safety and liquidity of an investment, the smaller the likelihood that it will furnish a large income or will keep pace with the cost of living. For example, a Government E bond is as secure as the U. S. Government, and it can be turned into a predetermined amount of cash after the purchaser has held it for 60 days. But it pays a relatively low rate of interest (less than 4 per cent compound interest, the exact rate depending upon the length of time which the purchaser holds the bond) and it does not keep pace with the cost of living."

The paragraph quoted above is contained in a publication issued by an agency of the U. S. Government itself. This work, entitled "Planning for the Later Years", was prepared in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare for the guidance of people looking ahead to their years of retirement and is currently in great demand at the Government Printing Office.

The experienced investor recognizes the fact that there is no completely safe investment. It is the inexperienced who spends much time seeking the unattainable—time that could better be spent in analyzing his real needs and the degree of risk that can reasonably be accepted in fulfilling those needs.

Money that is used for investment should, of course, represent surplus savings or income not needed for essentials. Investments in securities (stocks and bonds) provide a greater degree of liquidity than do those in real estate, mortgages, business partnerships, and the like. Also, the investor in securities can purchase small sums at convenient intervals.

Investment is not a field for impulse shopping. The individual who needs income should consider only those securities that may be expected to provide suitable dividends or interest to suit his needs. Furthermore, he should endeavor to ascertain that this income will be paid regularly and dependably so long as he needs it.

The investor whose primary goal is capital appreciation must generally accept low current income from securities that show promise of eventually selling at prices higher than those at which they can presently be bought.

No one stock or bond can simultaneously offer minimum risk, attractive income and good potential for growth. It will be the aim of this column to assist the thoughtful investor in deciding which of these factors is of greater importance to him and how to select securities with potentials that match his objectives.

Rotary Review

On February 23rd, Rotary around the world celebrates its sixtieth anniversary. It now has 11,800 clubs in 127 countries, with some 560,000 members. Rancho Rotary will give special recognition to the event and also to its own sixth anniversary a month later.

Speakers for January included a vice-president of Non-Linear Systems, C. W. Lee, giving his perceptions in regard to doing business in Europe. He is in charge of foreign sales. William Cravens, executive assistant to the San Diego Board of Supervisors, whose principal attention is devoted to the North County, gave some rather frank comments about the problems of planning and zoning, in his talk January 11th. Many communities fight against planning, because it limits them, but as soon as they are in trouble they run to the county for help. He commended that in Rancho Santa Fe, we have what we are proud of today because somebody years ago had the courage to lay down a definite plan for the community's development. The troubles leading to the release of the head of the Planning Department of the county recently, were described as largely a question of deterioration of effective working relationship and understanding with the public. Dave Hillyer, known to many Ranchoites as in town and Reg Clotfelder seized the opportunity to have him speak at Rotary. This was a most interesting presentation. Hillyer has lived for several years in South America, particularly in Brazil and Chile, residing in Santiago where he owns and publishes the only English language newspaper in Chile. While he loves Chile particularly, all South America to him presents a discouraging picture of government instability and uncertainty, with economic overtones that seem to represent a way of life. When will stability be achieved? He thinks perhaps never. In spite of all this, his viewpoint is cautiously optimistic.

Behind the formidable title "Individual Income and Estate Planning" presented by Charles Thomas of Arthur Young and Company, lay a lot of fascinating possibilities for controlling our destiny tax-wise, that aroused a high level of interest. So much so, that Jack Lee is thinking of having him out for a Shearson Hammill sponsored evening meeting, with a general invitation to the public to participate.

The night of February 15 is Ladies Night and Rotarians and their ladies will be seen out in force at the Garden Room of the Inn, for an evening of cocktails, dinner and entertainment.

The meeting was called to order by President Teitsworth.

VISITORS: Mr. and Mrs. Henry F. Hansen appeared before the Board for a discussion concerning their recent application to keep fifty (50) horses and get on their property at Lots 5 and 6, Block 36, Rambla de las Flores. The request was deferred pending further negotiations with the Secretary.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING:

It was moved, seconded, and carried unanimously, that the minutes of the previous meeting, and of the special meeting of December 23, 1964, be approved.

MASTER PLAN FOR MAJOR HIGHWAYS:

Director Teagle, Chairman of the Highway Committee, reported that his Committee is still discussing with the staff of the County Road Commissioner the location preferred routes for prime arterials affecting Rancho Santa Fe. Recommendations of his Committee will be presented at the next Board meeting.

GROSS RECEIPTS:

The Secretary presented the Statement of Gross Receipts for the month of December 1964.

DIRECTORS' REPORTS:

Director Harris, Chairman of the Finance Committee, presented to the Board a suggested policy entitled "Conditions Under Which Playing Privilege Fees may be Refunded". It was moved, seconded, and carried unanimously, that the following policy, as amended, be approved:

Playing privilege fees are payable on an annual basis in advance. As a matter of convenience to the members the current arrangement permits payment of one-half the amount on July 1 and the remainder January 1, covering the fiscal year July 1—June 30. While it is not generally the policy to enforce payment for the second half where the individual withdraws and declines such payment, failure to do so by the Association in any case is not an admission of any absence of right to do so.

Playing fees are not refundable except (1) in case of death or total permanent disability, (2) in unusual situations beyond the control of the

individual which, in the judgement of the Board, warrant special consideration, or (3) where a member has paid for the full year in advance and wishes to withdraw at the end of the first half year.

The amount of refund in the case of (1) above is the unexpired portion of the fee remaining at the end of the month in which death or total disability occurs. In cases covered by (2) the amount of refund is not to exceed the unexpired portion of the fee remaining at the end of the quarter in which the event occurs upon which the refund is based.

Where the member has paid for the full year in advance refund of the second half is made at his request, if such is made by or before the end of the first half. This practice is followed to maintain consistency with the policy outlined in paragraph "1" above and will apply only so long as that policy remains in effect.

It was moved, seconded, and carried unanimously, that Mr. L. B. McLaughlin be appointed as a member of the Finance Committee.

Director Hill, Vice Chairman of the Park and Recreation Board, reported on the recent meeting of this Board.

Director Larson, Vice Chairman of the Golf Course Committee, reported on the recent committee meeting. The Board acted on the following recommendations of the Golf Committee:

1. Appointed Mr. J. W. Stockton to the Committee; 2. Approved the bidders' list, specifications and plans of the engineering study on the golf course automatic sprinkler system, subject to review by the Finance Committee.

SECRETARY'S REPORT:

Golf Professional. Mr. James Boyle's services as Golf Professional will terminate on January 15, 1965. It was moved, seconded, and carried unanimously, that Mr. Bob Utz be appointed temporary manager of the Golf Shop with a Management bonus during the interim period until selection of a new Golf Professional of \$100 per month for Mr. Utz and \$50 per month for Mr. Robert Tunstall.

Subdivision Policy. The Secretary requested that the Board adopt a policy pertaining to time limitations on Association approval of subdivisions. The matter was referred to Dir. Thieme.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: The Board went into Executive Session at 11:55 A.M.

Public Nuisance. The Secretary reported on a motorcycle raceway under construction at Lot 1, Block 6, Rancho Santa Fe. The Board determined that this activity constitutes a nuisance and should be abated. It was moved, seconded, and carried unanimously, that the Association counsel, the law firm of J. A. Donnelley, be authorized to take appropriate legal steps to abate the construction and operation of a motorcycle raceway on covenanted property within Rancho Santa Fe as constituting a public nuisance.

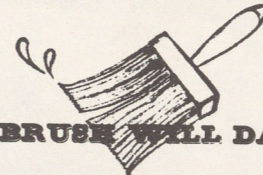

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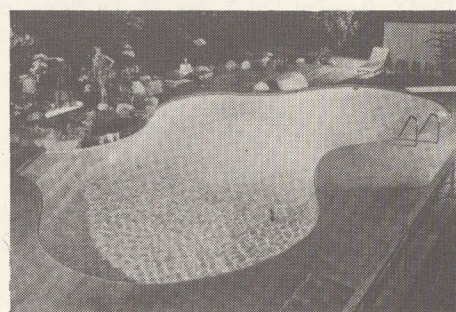

The Sand Trap

By BOB UTZ

First, we must have a sand wedge, in order to perform this shot properly. Not a nine iron or a pitching wedge—they just do not have a big enough flange on the sole. The tendency is always to go too deep into the sand and you usually come up empty.

The next step is to open the stance so your body is slightly facing the hole. Position the ball forward off the left instep. Be sure that the face of the club is toed out or open. The wrists must be cocked very rapidly, using your arms and shoulders to complete your back swing. Do not transfer your weight, keep the hips as stationary as possible. The club head should make contact with the sand about an inch behind the ball, exploding the ball out of the trap. Always make sure you follow through, finishing with the hands high.

Ground Club in a Sand Trap

A's ball comes to rest in a sand trap. He selects his club, enters the trap, properly takes his stance, does not sole the club and plays the ball out of the trap. In so doing, his club catches sand on the back stroke. B contends A has incurred a penalty by allowing the club to touch the sand on the back stroke. Who is correct?

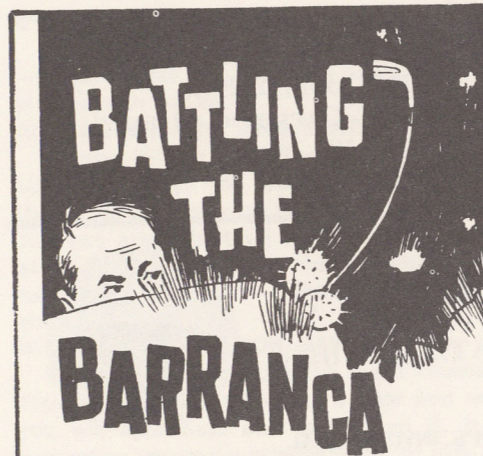
B is correct. A incurs a penalty of loss of hole in match play, or two strokes in medal play under Rule 33—1.

Double Defeat for Rancho Teams

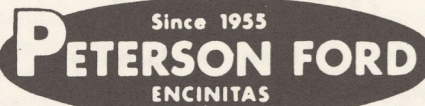

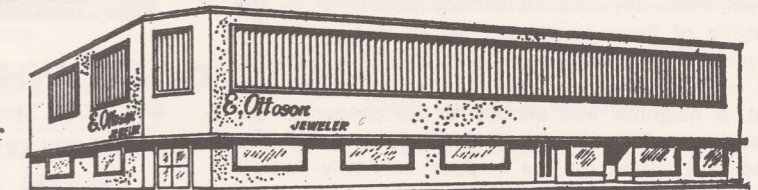
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Report of Beautification Committee Of The Garden Club

Mr. Bob Warner, Superintendent of Rancho Santa Fe Maintenance and Criscencio Marquez, newly appointed custodian of Association Park areas, at the Post Office discussing with approval, the appearance of the planting of colorful shrubs and trees and the new winter rye lawn which the Garden Club has presented to the Village as one of their major beautification projects of this winter.

The Beautification Committee would like all residents of Rancho Santa Fe to reserve the night of Tuesday, March 30, for a Pot Luck Dinner at the Garden Club, which will be preceded by a no-host social hour at 5:30 p.m. The featured speaker of the evening will be Mrs. Hal Baldwin, who for the past 17 years has been vice-president of Los Angeles Beautiful.

Comments of Mr. J. E. Green, member in charge of Conservation for the Beautification Committee, who has had 30 years experience in Natural History:

The Rancho Santa Fe Protective Covenant, Par. 5, Section 5, pertains to trapping: "The setting of traps, except for gophers, squirrels or small rodents, shall be subject to reasonable regulations to be made by the Board of Directors."

Recently it was reported to Mr. Hubert Larson, members of the Rancho Association Board, that at the request of a property owner, steel traps had been set by the Fish and Wild Service of the Federal Government to catch coyotes. The resident was asked by the trapper to sign an authorization permitting him to enter the resident's property and set traps. The property owner complied in a spirit of civic-mindedness, however, it came as a surprise to the owner to learn that his signature released the trapper and the Government from any and all liability pertaining to the setting of these traps, and did in fact, make the owner solely responsible. Warning signs were posted at either end of the trail where the traps were set, a neighbor was alerted to the danger of the traps set within several feet of his property line and was asked by the trapper to notify him if any disturbance was noted at the trap settings.

Mr. Larson brought to the attention of this property owner the following facts: (1) the Covenant violation; (2) the owner's liability; (3) the dangers of set steel traps to small children, dogs, road runners, etc. On learning of these facts, the owner was most happy to rescind his permission for setting the traps.

Mr. Larson has subsequently contacted the trapper and he has removed all traps.

It might be pointed out that in this writer's opinion, the Government trapper had neglected to explain to the owner the fact that any qualified and experienced trapper should assume the responsibility of his actions in setting traps and that they should be checked by him at least twice daily. He further points out that no animal should suffer the cruelty of steel traps and considers that box traps are the only humane way to trap animals, particularly in an area where there are small children and dogs who obviously cannot read warning signs.

The above incident should be a reminder to all of us that we are most fortunate to live in a community under a protective covenant where action can, and is, taken constantly to protect us and our natural surroundings. Most residents in our area find the wildlife both interesting and entertaining. Rancho Santa Fe is unique in this respect. Let's try to keep it this way.

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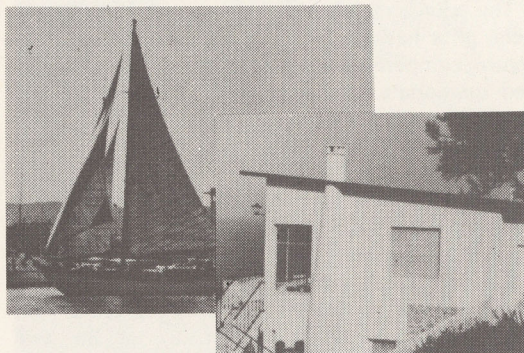
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Foreign Travel

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Letters From Abroad

The following is a letter from Evelyn Grimm, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Grimm of Rancho Santa Fe. Evelyn has just returned from a fall semester in the University of the Seven Seas, and a three-and-one-half month voyage around the world!

Dear Mom and Daddy:

As I write this, I realize that in three weeks, this wonderful experience will be over. The time flies too rapidly, and it will be a while before the knowledge and experience I have gained from visiting the countries and meeting the people, will sink in.

Various ports of call we have been to are Lisbon, Barcelona, Naples (Rome), Piraeus (Athens) Beirut, Port Said, Suez, Bombay, Colombo, Kuala Lumpur, Manila, Hong Kong, Taipei (Formosa), Yokohama and Honolulu.

Among the highlights of the trip include meeting Madame Chiang-Kai-Shek in Taipei, the beautiful reception for us by the Deputy Prime Minister of Malaysia, and for that matter, receptions by high up government officials in almost every country.

In Hong Kong, the U.S.S. Ranger welcomed us, along with the British fleet. There were 4000 men on the Ranger — all extremely happy to see Americans!

I have found the people in these countries to be on the whole friendly, helpful and interested in the University of the Seven Seas. I think personal impressions are the most important thing when visiting a foreign country. While traveling, one learns more about other countries and their people, than he ever dreamed possible. Each student plays the role of an ambassador to his country.

I will always remember the beautiful beaches of Ceylon and Hawaii, seeing the Pope at the Vatican in Rome, the jewels Ceylon is famous for, shopping in Lisbon and Barcelona, and most of all, the friends I have made all over the world, during the trip.

Great news again for mom! We ran into another storm the other night — it was worse than the one out of Beirut — no one slept all night which explains the fact why everyone was half dead the next morning. The ship rocked so violently, people were thrown from their beds; their belongings were tossed around the rooms and left them in complete shambles. At breakfast, all the food and plates kept falling off the tables — it was rather an unusual and different sight. The poor waiters! The waves were so high, they reached above B. deck portholes!

We spent our three days in Taiwan on field trips, in freezing weather. Of all things, we had practically no free time — had so many receptions (one of which was a Chinese opera where we met Madame Chiang Kai Shek). Her short speech was the most inspiring one I have ever heard—about Communism and other things.

I have kept a record of my travels, and can supplement that record with pictures of people and places. Also have kept a record of my purchases, and my favorite hotels, cafes, restaurants and nightclubs. It would be impossible to even attempt writing a complete summary of the trip. There is a lot I've omitted, but in less than three weeks, I will tell you everything — it has been an experience I'll never forget.

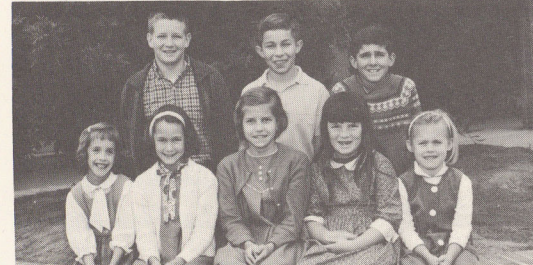

We are also making our own books from scratch. Each person has to make his own cover, story and pictures. It will be an interesting project but it will take a lot of work to finish.

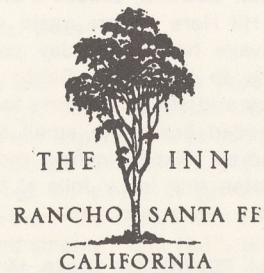

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Gourmet Steals

If you have a really good eye for color and composition . . . and you like to apply your talents to the presentation of good fare . . . and you have a swinging talent for stirring up appetizing savours on your own . . . you can just be Mr. John Crosby!

But if you're not, let me say a few things about this most interesting British gentleman and his wonderfully pleasant wife, Jean, who, with their two sons and two daughters, have lately come to the Ranch. Probably you already know them. Jean and John can be seen daily ('cept Monday) at the Country Squire Tea Room where they are doing rather famously with the time-honoured luncheon cuisine—adding, ever so quietly, a few unfamiliar twists which are mighty, mighty promising!

Jean has a solidly fine background in the art of cooking; her parents for many years had an Inn at Lancashire, England. She knows every intricacy of turning out such British favorites as Melton Mowbray pie, banbury tarts, Cornish pastries, Dundee cake, etc. Her trifle is now more faithfully English than the Squire trifle of yore, and if you have any doubt about its enthusiastic acceptance, just order a dish of it and see for yourself!

John's love of food is probably more on an artistic level than gastronomic, for here's a man who's out to frame everything that ever sees a plate or a dish. In fact he's made a life-time career — so far, thirty-five years — of dolly-ing up foods and things for Home Section publications. Right now he is Foreman (on 6 months' leave) for the Los Angeles Times' award-winning Home Section, and for the TV Guide. Imagine! I, for one, won't be quite so surprised the next time I catch a glimpse of John arranging a salad with a camera slung over one shoulder.

In chatting with the Crosbys (over a slice of Angel Pie) I could see that they are most interested in pleasing the palates of those on the Ranch, and are open to new ideas and suggestions for extending their facilities and talents. What about buffet suppers or a buffet supper one night a week? Could be fun, I think . . . could even become a classic.

Speaking of classics I got Jean to give me her recipe for Crabs Legs in wine, breaking it down to six generous servings. Using the French Coquille shells for serving, the crab is prepared very quickly and simply on top of the stove in the following manner:

- 1/2 lb. butter
- 1 cup flour
- 2 cups warm milk
- 2 cups warm chicken broth
- 2 lbs. canned or frozen King Crab Legs
- pinch cayenne pepper
- choice of seasonings to taste
- Sweet sauterne wine

Making a roux with the butter and flour, add the liquids gradually so that no lumping occurs, then the wine and seasonings, and lastly add the crab. Correct seasonings after the crab has been combined with the sauce. Keep hot in your bain marie until time for serving in the shells.

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San Dieguito Family Service Association MRS. COLLEY FERNEDING

In July of 1958, a Steering Committee for the proposed San Dieguito Family Service met in the Little Theatre at the Del Mar Fairgrounds. More and more people became interested and by September of that year the San Dieguito Family Service was formed. Mrs. Lawrence D. Townsend of Encinitas was the first chairman and eventually President. Rancho Santa Fe was represented by Edwin Jeffries.

A membership drive was held and it was announced during National Family Week in April of 1959 that the office would open in Solana Beach with a professional case worker available two days a week.

It was brought to the attention of the community that families in the United States had increased nearly 35 per cent since 1940 and were continuing to increase at a rapid rate. "The need for strong family life never has been greater in our history" said the President and she continued: "The Family Service Association in San Diego County has launched increased activity to make the agency's case-work program available to a greater number of families, expanded its family counseling services and decentralized the services to put them closer to the families that need them. In many instances the families were unable to pay the full cost of counseling. Mr. Nevin Wiley, Executive Director of the San Diego Association arranged for the case workers to come to our area, a generous doctor furnished free office space and volunteers acted as receptionists and answered the telephone.

Shortly after this, The Country Friends very generously began its many contributions to this worthy cause. Mrs. Arthur C. Hill of Rancho Santa Fe, a member of Country Friends, was a loyal board member of Family Service for many years.

In 1963, the office was moved to its current address: 2155 Newcastle Street, Cardiff, California and in 1964 application was made for this agency to become a member of the United Community Services. After careful study, it was admitted.

The professional case workers were Mrs. Alberta Nicklas and Mrs. Tom Smit. Currently serving in this capacity is Mrs. Doris Rickel.

The present members of the Board of Directors from Rancho Santa Fe are: Reverend Roland Anderson, Mrs. Robert Mannion, Mrs. Sherwood Gordon, Mrs. Colley Ferneding and Mrs. Edward Havens. Mrs. Havens, a past president of the Country Friends, is President elect. The Associate Members include many residents of the Ranch.

On February 2nd, the Annual Meeting of the San Dieguito Family Service was held at the Torrey Pines Inn. Dr. Ernest Witte, Chairman of the School of Social Work, San Diego State College, was the principal speaker.

Retiring President Bert Shamsky commended the original Steering Committee and the subsequent board members for the progress that has been made in the use of this service.

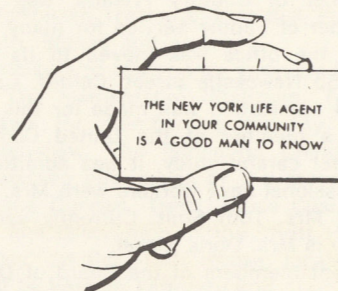

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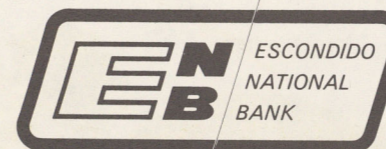
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
