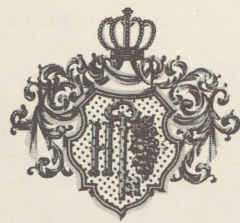

my first opera together—Carmen with Calve and the next day on my bureau was a photograph of Calve from a mother who knew it would please a little girl.

May I have a prayer for the present day mothers: "We thank Thee for those who today will teach us—for those to whom we go for advice and for those on whose wisdom and experience we will draw—to help us to do our work and to solve our problems. To mothers who every day give us strength and friendship and love . . . which gives glory and happiness to our lives."

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Mrs. William P. Remington was born in Burlington, Vermont and was educated on the Green Mountain State up thru the University of Vermont. She met and married Reverend Remington, an Episcopal minister and graduate of The Virginia Seminary in Alexandria, Virginia. Their first church was in Philadelphia and later he became Pastor of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Minneapolis. During World War I he served as chaplain of the Mayo Unit. Reverend Remington was later elevated to Bishop of South Dakota . . . Bishop of Eastern Oregon . . . and then Suffragan Bishop for the Diocese of Pennsylvania. Upon retirement in the early 1950's, the Remingtons came to Rancho Santa Fe and were very much a part of the Village activities until the Bishop's death last year. 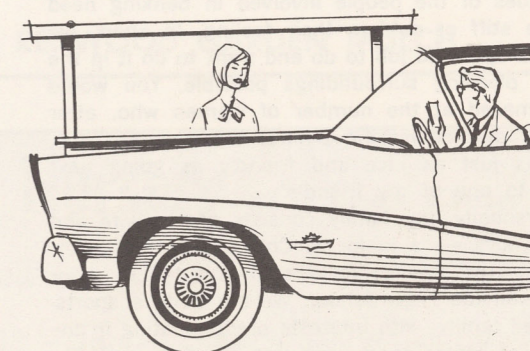

D ear Mrs. Giffin:

A very pleasant note awaited me on my return to the bank this morning — your offer to do a story on us here at Escondido National Bank. I hope that the following information may be of a nature you will find useful for putting the story together.

I am a native Minnesotan from a town with the unlikely name of Sleepy Eye. (Incidentally, my father had a string of four small country newspapers in that area.) Education was at the University of Minnesota, where I was graduated with a degree of Bachelor of Science in aeronautical engineering and a side major in meteorology. I worked with United Aircraft, Pratt & Whitney Division, for several years and all during World War II. Assignments carried me into most of the California aircraft manufacturers for projects of a developmental nature during that period. In the postwar era, we settled in the Rocky Mountain area in the vicinity of Denver, Colorado. By chance meeting with the owner of the bank in Golden, Colorado, we switched our activity from the aircraft industry to banking. This switch, of course, meant additional schooling at the Graduate School of Banking at the University of Wisconsin. In the years which followed, I was fortunate in being able to put the first small bank in the country on computer accounting through the facilities of a larger correspondent bank. I think that my engineering background had left me with an analytical approach to some of bankings problems so that I was probably more ready than most bankers to see the gains to be made from the utilization of computer services.

During my presidency of the Poudre Valley National Bank of Fort Collins, Colorado, we organized a residential area bank and instituted there for the first time in the country, so far as we know, the idea of sit-down banking. The facilities at Escondido National Bank are simply an extension of this theory that neither the facilities nor the attitudes of the people involved in banking need to be stiff or cold in their feeling. In short, we have a specified job to do and want to do it in the most pleasing surroundings possible. You would be amazed at the number of women who, after using our facilities, have made the remark, "Why, this is just as nice and friendly as going next door to one of my friend's".

Personally, my family consists of my wife and three boys — a junior at Colorado State University, a freshman at Palomar J. C., and a junior at Escondido High School. We are quite a sports-minded family, with interests predominating in the areas of winter sports and water sports.

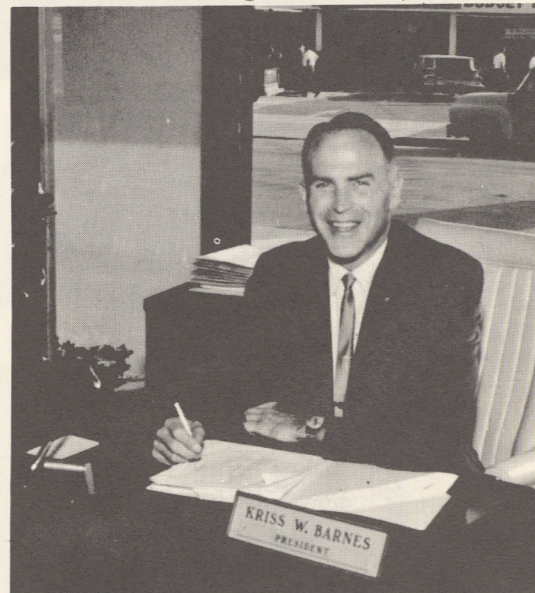
As you might expect, I have had my share and then some of civic activities, having served as director and president of Chambers of Commerce in the cities of our prior residence and having been involved in practically every type of charitable drive. In conjunction with two other men, who were musicians, I organized a symphony orchestra association in Golden, Colorado, and have participated very actively in the churches we have attended.

Talking about oneself seems rather dull and uninteresting. If you have questions in areas I have not touched, I would be more than happy to fill in the gaps for you. It is certainly very kind of you to do this story about us.

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TERMS

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"How Does Your Garden Grow?"

One thing about gardening — it creates brotherhood! Your problems are the same problems, faced by fellow gardeners in the community. When your plants have aphids, theirs have aphids—when snails invade, you're not alone. Of course there are those who shirk their responsibility and then it seems your garden is an oasis for all the hungry hordes.

This year, probably because of the late and heavy rains, the snail problem is very much in mind. To those of you from the east who have not previously faced this scourge we say "courage". Sometimes you fail to see the creatures themselves, but you begin to notice holes appearing in your large-leafed plants. Sometimes

new bedding plants disappear over night. These are evidence of marauding snail and unless you do something about it, soon your garden may disappear.

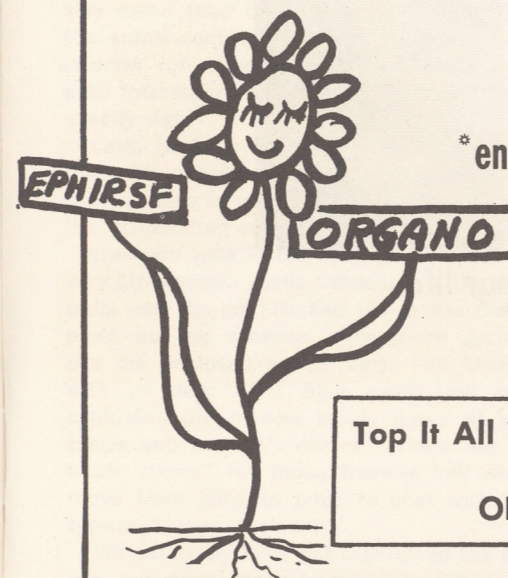
Snail control is relatively easy. Just water everything thoroughly, then broadcast snail poison pellets throughout the infested areas. Be careful though — most snail poisons contain arsenic. If you use too much in an area, the arsenic will contaminate the soil resulting in damage or death to the plant. This arsenic is also lethal to children and pets, so do be careful where you store the unused material.

Several manufacturers now market a spray material for snail control. This is not as convenient to apply but has a secondary benefit in that it kills many of the insects, such as aphids and mealy-bugs, that join in the general destruction of your plants. Another obvious advantage to this means of control is that there is less danger to children or pets.

Not all of your garden troubles at this time of year can be attributed to snails and insects. Many plants show the wear and tear of the long winter just passed. For example, Gardenias and hibiscus usually look their worst at this time. Camellias, too, seem to look ragged and forlorn prior to their new growth cycle. A very helpful treatment now is to give these plants a liberal application of a form of iron called "Iron Chelate". This provides a favorable soil condition for the ailing plants so they can absorb and utilize the nutrients in plant foods.

Soon your plants turn green and vigorous and you will be assured of fine blooms throughout the coming season.

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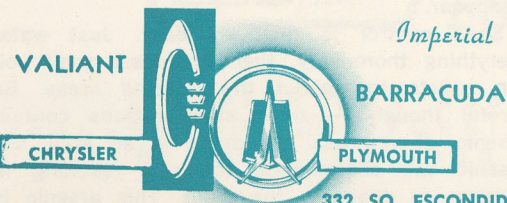
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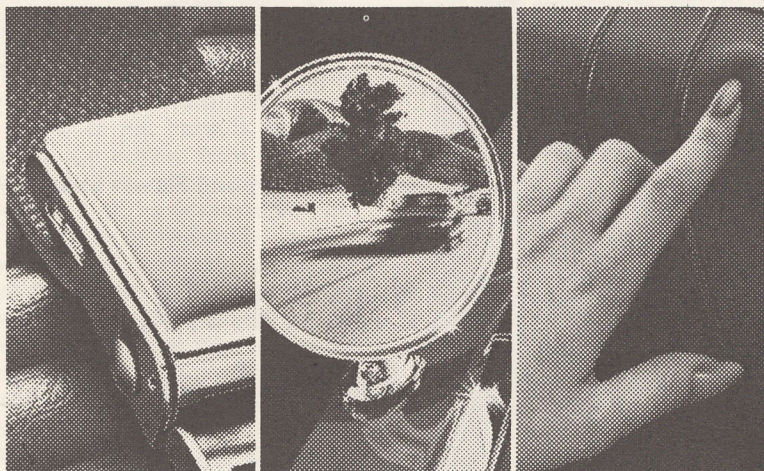

LESSON THREE

The Hunter Safety Program

Too many people buy the youngster his first rifle with their eyes on the price tag instead of the sights, weight of gun, length of barrel and type of action. Successful shooting cannot be accomplished with crude sights, lightweight short barrels on cheap guns.

Class A, Match .22 cal. target rifles weigh 9 lbs. or more, have micrometer adjustable or telescopic sights, specially designed stocks, 27 or 28-inch barrels, sling straps and highly adjustable triggers.

Class B rifles are similar to A, but are lighter, less expensive, have shorter barrels, and are used for other than Match shooting.

Class C rifles are lower priced than B, lighter weight, shorter barrels, and carry a crudely adjustable peep sight in the rear with a blade front sight. This type is inexpensive and satisfactory as a first gun for novices.

Bolt action is preferred by most competition shooters, and a requirement on our local Junior Club Range. The reasons are its simplicity in design, fewer working parts, greater strength, permits of one-piece stock design, and its safety factor.

A youngster's first shotgun should be small of gauge and single shot with hinge-action. Semi-automatics and self-loaders are for older, experienced hunters... and, in the hands of a novice they only lead to carelessness and inaccuracy... and some times to serious accidents. An excellent first hunting gun is the Savage over and under .22--.410.

For the serious target shooter a Class A or B rifle is a "must". It is very difficult to make Expert with a Class C rifle, and practically impossible to make Distinguished Expert.

Next in importance to the rifle is the sling, padded shooting jacket, shooting glove, spotting scope and cartridge block.

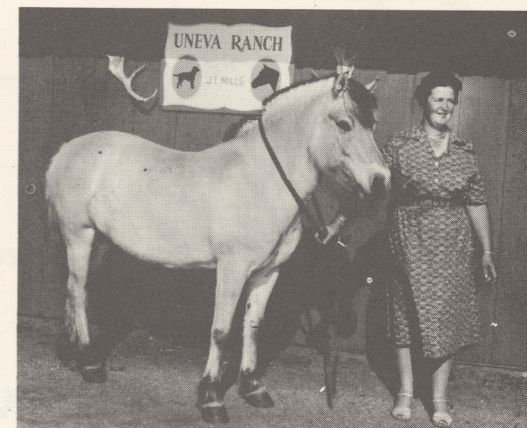
FEATURING MRS. JOSEPHINE T. MILLS

Rancho Santa Fe boasts of the great and near-great—of musicians, presidents, authors, scientists and plain down-to-earth people. MRS. JOSEPHINE T. MILLS is one of the foregoing, but, because of her varied background you will have to categorize her yourself. "Dodo", as she is known to everyone, is a product of Colorado Springs where her father, Charles L. Tutt, co-founded the Broadmoor Hotel. Her brother, Wm. T. Tutt of now president of that fine establishment. Her accomplishments, especially in the field of horse and dog training, are many as evidenced by the over 300 trophies displayed in her new home on Via De Santa Fe. Dodo is that quiet type person who has to be drawn out about her many achievements—the photographs, citations, ribbons and scrapbooks in her tastefully decorated home give her away—even before one gets to know her.



Garrison Forest School in Maryland is the scene of her early education where she excelled in everything including riding and studies (she was head of the student body). After leaving school she continued in riding and eventually taught all types of horsemanship including dressage, western, side-saddle, three-day events and even drove trotters. She worked with race horses at Pimlico, Laurel, Bowie and Havre de Grace—we saw at least three ribbons where she had won races in Colorado.

Hunt enthusiasts will be thrilled when they meet Dodo as she has hunted for years with the Carrolton Hounds, the Hartford Hunt Club, the Green-spring Valley Hunt Club over the Maryland Hunt Club Cup course, the Warrenton, Va. Hunt Club and others.



While in Colorado Dodo ran the Broadmoor Hotel Stables (a 200-horse stable which she designed and built). At these stables she taught in the neighborhood of 1000 students per month in all kinds of riding from jumping to overnight trail riding. On commission from the hotel she went to Bergen, Norway and purchased eighteen Norwegian fjords, a short, stocky horse that is versatile as a combination trail horse, general riding or open jumping. Dodo brought one to Rancho Santa Fe and invites horse fanciers to see it.

It's hard to tell whether horses or dogs are Dodo's first love. She was in charge of the New England Dog Training Club in Boston where she ran a dog obedience school for all types dogs including those used for guard duty. She has a U.D.T. degree from the American Kennel Club and is a licensed professional handler (which allows her to show any breed of dog in any A.K.C. dog show). She has three Labrador retrievers here, one of which is the first Labrador to win a U.D.T. degree and also the first to win a championship.

In addition to sports being a lifetime hobby and pursuit Dodo has found time to organize and run the Colorado Springs Red Cross Motor Corps during World War II, was president of the Colorado Springs Junior League, and holds membership in the Colonial Dames and the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Dodo's reason for coming to Rancho Santa Fe was to recuperate from a serious accident. During recuperation she wanted a place to train her dogs and horses and possibly take a hand, professionally or otherwise, in training for other people. It is people like Mrs. Dodo Mills who make Rancho Santa Fe. We welcome her and sincerely hope she likes us well enough to remain here permanently.

The meeting was adjourned by the president.

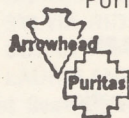
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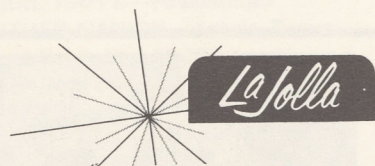

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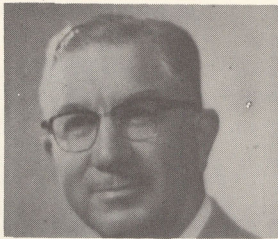
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ROTARY REVIEW

Clem Nevitt, superintendent of Electric Transmission for San Diego Gas and Electric told us the story of the nuclear power plant his firm is building on the coast below San Onofre. Rev. "Rit" Anderson gave a stirring Easter Message. Roger Woolley presented Mayor Curran of San Diego as the final speaker of the month. This, plus our growth to 45 members, plus an award from Rotary International for the local club's strong support of Rotary Foundation, is a capsule story of Rancho Santa Fe Rotary's month.

The meeting for the week of April 19th was cancelled so that local Rotarians could participate in the District Conference in San Diego. I'd like to use the rest of my little column to talk about this, and particularly about our speaker.

Jim Turpin is known to some local residents. We knew him and his family briefly when he was beginning his practice of medicine in Coronado. He had a gleam in his eye then, and one felt that his wasn't to be the ordinary career of an average American physician. With some limited funds patiently raised mainly by his own efforts, he landed one day with his wife and children in the Yaumati Typhoon Shelter of Kowloon and with two Hong Kong junks and his own skill and enthusiasm

gave birth to "Project Concern". Many of us have at one time or another sailed through the fleet of thousands of sampans which are the only home of tens of thousands of Chinese refugees—we're glad to see it and glad to get out of it. But for Dr. Jim Turpin and his family it is home and it is a well staffed going operation. Now he was asked to do the same thing in the remote districts of Viet Nam and this was the principal focus of his talk. Establishing hospitals, training native medical officers, bringing medical assistance, where up to now, the local sorcerer has been the chief reliance of the people, spells progress in the battle for men's minds. He says we only hear the worst from the news sources but we are making real progress in bringing order out of chaos.

Our American effort to stem communism by military methods and by administration assistance were praised and he urges that we don't listen to those who say we should get out of Viet Nam. The South Vietnamese want to preserve their country, they don't want communism, but they desperately need help in the way of education, nutrition, health and the beginnings of a modern pattern of economic growth, as well as military aid if they are to survive.

A personal observation: Jim Turpin has really grown up since we last saw him, and Project Concern deserves our full support.

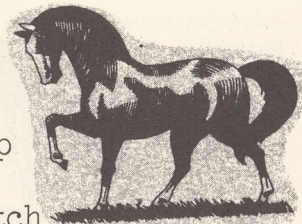

Gala Host, who was named "Horse of the Meet" at Caliente during the second half of 1964, wrapped up the tracks's 1965 renewal of its \$7500 added Derby Saturday by outlasting favored Little Man in a stretch duel. Shipped in from Golden Gate Fields for the stake, Gala Host came off the torrid early pace of Greek Island, then went on to decision Little Man by half a length. The tiring Green Island held on for the show. A throng of 21,382 turned out for the occasion which highlighted Caliente's Annual "Biggest Kentucky Derby Party West of Louisville". During the afternoon, the fans sipped on mint juleps served in official souvenir glasses which they retained as mementos, wagered on the Kentucky Derby at full track odds, and then watched the Churchill Downs Classic on television sets strategically placed about the plant. Saturday, Derby Day, the "5-10" pool grossed \$112,256, and two persons with five winners got \$34,939.60; while 160 picked up consolations of \$145.40. In the Sunday action, the pool reached \$103,536 and five selectors had perfect cards worth \$12,990.20 apiece. The consolation of \$60.60 went to 354 patrons.

Pool Pointers

The residential pool is here to stay! No longer a "unique luxury", but a functioning entertainment and recreational part of your landscape.

What is now required is understanding . . . learning to live with and care for your pool. Your questions are invited.

Q. How often should I test my pool water?

A. Testing pH and amount of chlorine twice a week should be sufficient in residential pools as a rule. However, it is a good policy to test any time after heavy usage or when the water looks cloudy or different than usual.

Q. My child is an expert swimmer, why shouldn't he swim alone?

A. Experience has no teaching in panic! A cramp can come at anytime to anyone at any age. Assistance is the only insurance against an unnecessary fatal accident.

Q. How can my pool be getting algae when the water looks "Crystal clear"?

A. Algae is a plant! The two things necessary for it to grow are soil and bacteria. Bacteria will thrive in clear water unless it contains an agent (Chlorine) that will kill it. Soil is always available in the air around you, and on every leaf or foreign matter that enters the area, including the human body.

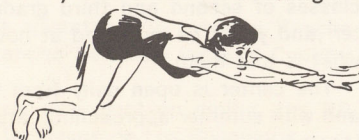

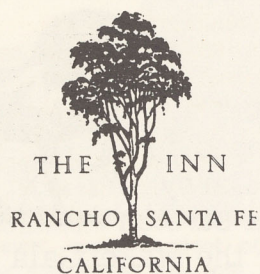

Interesting Sidelights From The San Diego Gas & Electric Co.

By CARL WELTI

SAN DIEGO, May 6—The San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station is fast becoming a major attraction on the Southern California tourist trail.

There is no age barrier in curiosity, and old folks, young folks, and in-between folks come to the station's Information Center to see how the mighty atom will be harnessed and put to work.

They come singly, by twos and threes and by the bus loads.

The nuclear generating station is being constructed for San Diego Gas & Electric and Southern California Edison Companies on the ocean side of Highway 101 about five miles south of San Clemente.

When it starts operation in 1967, the station will generate up to 450,000 kilowatts of electricity—enough for a city of more than half a million persons.

With interest already at a high pitch, nearly 16,000 persons have visited the station's Nuclear Information Center since it was opened seven weeks ago on a bluff overlooking the construction site.

Visitors include members of school science classes, service clubs, social clubs, engineering and scientific societies and passing motorists.

They average more than 300 a day. On the week ends the number surges to between 400 and 500 on Saturdays and to some 800 on Sundays.

Visitors have come from 40 states stretching from Massachusetts to Hawaii and from Argentina, Canada, Denmark, England, Finland, Germany, Japan, Panama, Peru, South Africa, Sweden, and Turkey.

"They are curious when they arrive and overwhelmed when they leave," say attendants at the Information Center. "They just can't quite believe it all."

Visitors watch a moving picture on nuclear energy, operate exhibits that demonstrate and explain how the atom has been converted to peaceful use and then go out on a balcony to watch construction work on the reactor containment sphere, the turbine pedestals and the water intake and discharge lines.

For some, that is enough. For others, it raises a lot of questions: How large is the site? What is the pier for that goes out into the ocean? How are they going to get the reactor into the steel ball? Are you going to build a water desalinization plant?

The attendants are there to give the answers.

Visitors normally spend 30 to 40 minutes at the center.

"By the time they are ready to leave, most have a much better understanding of what nuclear energy is all about," attendants say.

"That goes for the youngsters, too. We have had classes of second and third graders visit the center, and you'd be surprised at how well they grasp what is told them."

The center is open daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and with summer approaching, attendants are bracing for an increase of visitors from all directions.

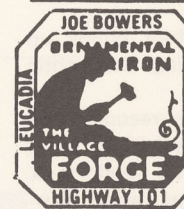

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Know Your Septic Tank

Many Rancho Santa Fe residents are forced to depend upon individual waste disposal systems because public sewers are not available. These systems consist of a septic tank draining into either a leaching field or one or more cesspools.

Good septic tank maintenance in many cases prevents troubles in the rest of the system. A septic tank is a water tight, two compartment concrete structure buried in the ground. Most installed on the Ranch are concrete Hygi-Sept pre-fabricated by M. C. Nottingham Co. The size is determined by the expected sewage discharge. The Health Department requires at least a one thousand gallon tank which is adequate for the average home.

A septic tank serves three distinct functions.

1. Separating of settleable and floating material.

2. Storage and digestion of these separated materials.

3. Bioseptic treatment which produces sludge, a floating mat of scum on the surface, plus a reasonably clear liquid which filters into the underground disposal without clogging the soil pores.

When either of the following conditions occurs it is time to pump out your septic tank.

1. When the bottom of the scum mat reaches to within three inches to the bottom of the pipe going into the tank.

2. When the sludge on the bottom builds up to one foot below the pipe entering the septic tank.

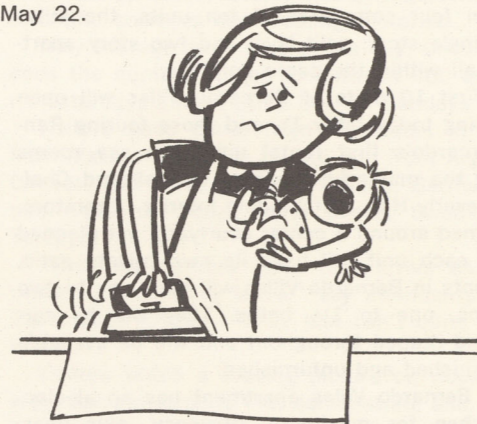
The U.S. Public Health Service recommends pumping every three and one-half years or more depending upon the systems' use. The septic tank bacterial action automatically begins when sewage enters the tank. The U.S. Public Health Service estimates that approximately 1,200 so-called starters or treatment aids are now on the market. None of these are approved, endorsed or disapproved by them. This agency does suggest that you pump the tank and be sure. Our company has tried several chemicals and to date have found none upon which we can depend.

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NOTE!

The first important step toward elimination of unsightly power poles throughout Rancho Santa Fe was taken Friday, April 2, 1965, when the Board of Directors adopted a resolution requiring that on all new construction of homes the utilities be undergrounded from the building site to the property line.

This same restriction has been in effect on Tracts 2089 and 2129 surrounding the Golf Course since the adoption of the Covenant in 1928. This most recent action of the Board of Directors extends this same restriction to the remaining Covenanted areas of Rancho Santa Fe.

Similar actions have been taken, or are under

consideration, by the majority of the communities in San Diego County. A great part of the beauty and charm of the new country club developments in San Diego County is due to their foresight in undergrounding all utilities at the time that the subdivision is being developed.

The Board of Directors of the Rancho Santa Fe Association is looking forward to the time when the continual reduction in costs for undergrounding existing facilities and the increase in community sentiment toward eliminating this detraction from the natural beauty of the landscape will reach a balance. When this level is reached, through coordinated public action power poles can be eliminated from Rancho Santa Fe.

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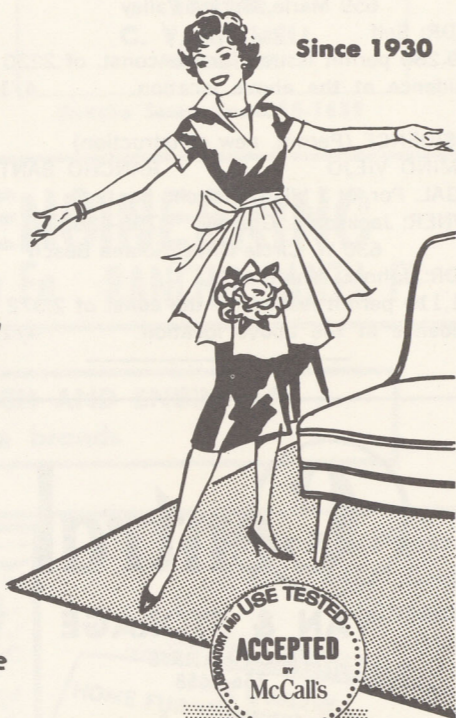
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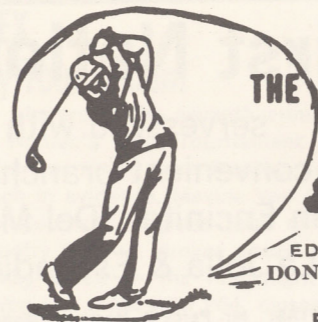

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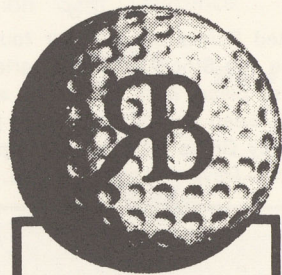
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FAIRSEX County Tournament

Listen well, everyone, to a recipe that is not only good, it is downright lyrical and I think Edythe Coffin is a real doll to let me have it! It's a party favorite of hers and she does it with her usual fine and experienced touch, never stinting on the quality of ingredients—a secret that is no secret at all to anyone with culinary know-how. Best of all it is a complete and delicious main course with only one dish to wash up—two with the saffron rice accompaniment. And you must have the saffron rice! Speaking of saffron, did you know that it is the world's most expensive spice, since seventy-five thousand crocus blossoms are required to produce one pound of saffron powder? Instructive people bore me, so now the recipe for

CHICKEN AU VIN (Mrs. Frank Coffin)

- 4 med. chicken breasts, cooked
- 1/2 small clove garlic, mashed with
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 can (10 1/2 ounce) cream of mushroom soup, undiluted
- 1/2 cup cream
- 1/2 cup Sauterne
- 1/2 cup grated sharp cheese
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/2 cup slivered, toasted almonds

Simmer chicken until tender. Remove skin and bones and leave meat in large pieces. Mix garlic, soup, and cream in heavy pan; heat to boiling. Remove from heat and gently stir in Sauterne, sharp cheese, and mayonnaise. Add chicken and turn into casserole. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Sprinkle casserole mixture with the Parmesan and almonds; bake 5 minutes longer. Serve with saffron rice.

EGGPLANT SUPREME

(Also Mrs. Coffin)

A quick and easy casserole which I am serving this very night to two Andover, Mass., guests. The cheese will be Black Diamond Cheddar, of course... to me, unthinkable without it!

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 med. eggplant
- 1 lb. can Spanish rice
- 1 lb. 13 ounce can tomatoes
- 2-ounce can mushrooms, drained
- 1 cup grated Cheddar cheese.

Brown beef and onions over medium heat. Drain drippings. Peel and dice eggplant. Cook in boiling salted water until tender. Drain. Mix ground beef, eggplant, Spanish rice, tomatoes and mushrooms. Pour into greased 1 1/2 quart casserole. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 350 one hour, or until golden brown.

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Sturnus Vulgaris Vulgaris

I wonder if the reader can identify the bearer of this name? This member of the animal kingdom is described quite aptly. If you haven't guessed by now to whom this name belongs I'll give you another clue. It is a bird having extremely vulgar habits. This bird habituates the Eastern United States in large flocks and is an import from Europe. By now of course you know that *Sturnus vulgaris vulgaris* is the scientific name of the Starling. It may come as a surprise to some, that this bird is an ever increasing resident of Rancho Santa Fe. Last spring at least four pairs were observed nesting near the 12th and 13th fairways of the golf course. This spring the number has doubled. I have not checked out other areas of the ranch, but would not be surprised to find them establishing themselves elsewhere.

For those wishing to identify these birds, looking for the following characteristics might help. The male in spring has a yellow bill. Their flight is faster and more direct than a Blackbird. When flying the wings appear brown contrasting the black bodies. The Starling nests in used Woodpecker cavities on dark crevices either in trees or buildings. The nest site of a Starling is easily identified by the droppings deposited at the opening of the cavity and on the ground beneath it. The nestlings are noisy enough to be heard at a distance of sixty yards or more. Nesting sites are at a premium, therefore one of the secondary disadvantages to these birds is the evictions of some native birds from their normal nesting areas.

It might be well to note the census of the Starling population in this area from year to year in case it is necessary to take steps to reduce the numbers.

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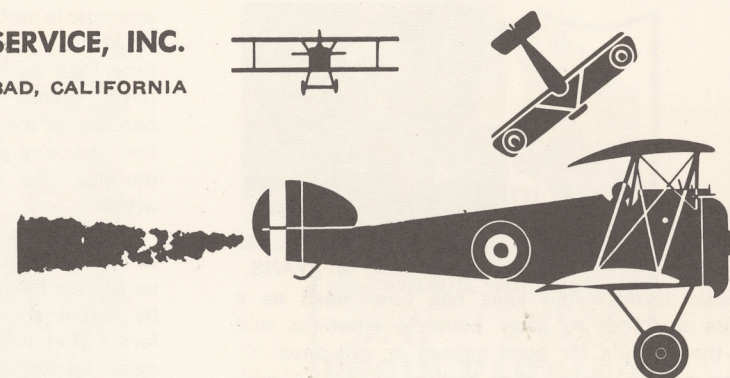
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Dear Neighbors:

This gives rise to a thoughtful parental question: "Is this the example of strange thinking we permissively set before our children to emulate?"

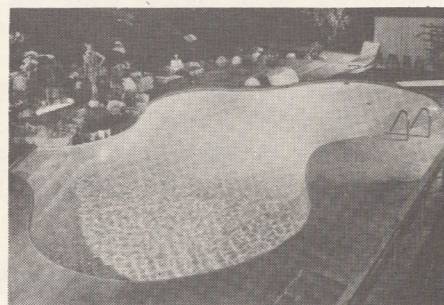

A group of over 90 interested people from Rancho Santa Fe and other parts of the county, assembled at the Garden Club on Tuesday evening, March 30, for the Beautification Committee's Buffet Dinner, at which Mrs. Virginia Baldwin, vice-president of Los Angeles Beautiful, was the guest speaker.

Mrs. Baldwin spoke of her last visit to Rancho Santa Fe in April, 1958 during which she addressed a special meeting called for the general membership of the Garden Club when Beautification was undertaken as a continuing project of the Club. She commended the members of the Committee for the vast improvements which have been made since 1958 in plantings of local civic property and especially commented on our highly successful clean-up campaign, describing it as the best she had ever seen throughout the country. She pointed out that the only other concerted effort at roadside clean-up which she knew of was in Phoenix, Arizona. The clean-up in Phoenix is conducted on a bi-annual basis instead of monthly as in Rancho Santa Fe. 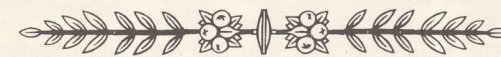

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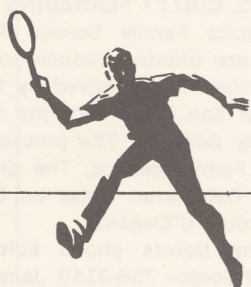
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Robert Parlin Joins Staff of Choice Travel

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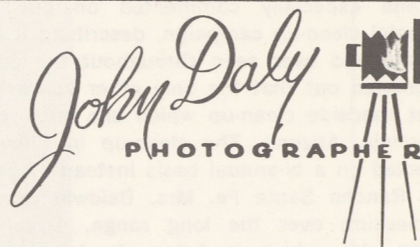


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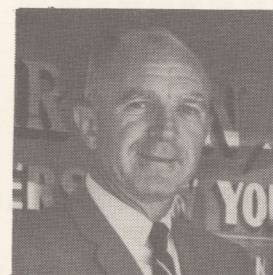
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Ticker Type

The underlying reason why most people buy a particular stock is that they think the price of the stock will go up. In most instances, this expectation is fulfilled if the purchaser retains ownership of the stock over a period of several years. The easily predictable population growth and normal expansion of markets assure electric utility companies, for example, of an increasing volume of business and improved earnings over a long period of time. This usually results in a rise in utility stocks. Throughout the present century, the general pattern of our economy has been one of a gradual diminution of the purchasing power of the dollar and a gradual increase in the price of common stocks as represented by their averages.

Among the many stocks that have advanced in price in recent years, a fair number of those which have done so more rapidly than the rest, have been considered as growth stocks. In a sense, the investor who seeks better than average capital appreciation in the stock market, is endeavoring to identify and acquire growth stocks.

Since it is not even possible to arrive at a definition of growth stocks that will not stir an argument somewhere, it is not surprising that we find no universally recommended approach to the selection of growth stocks.

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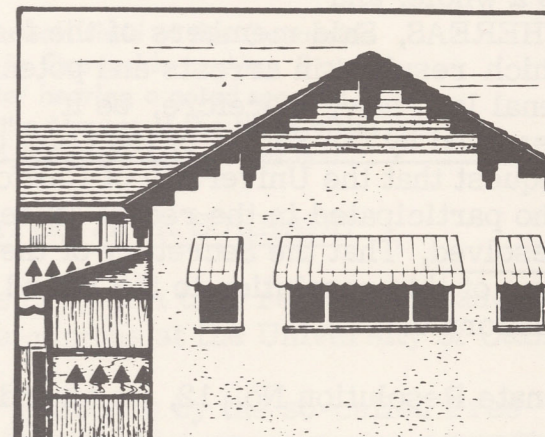
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IN MEMORIAM

I know that, as Almighty God is my witness, if the parents of this state are made aware of what is really going on at our University, they will rise up and support me in my fight to rid our great University of the people who have allowed such a situation to come about.

Let it be clearly understood that this is not a political problem in any way. This is a sociological problem that must be faced without regard to political party, race, creed or color. I believe that any parents made aware of the facts will support me with all their energy. I ask you to do so!

I ask your complete and energetic support as laid out by the persons supplying you with this statement. An old American Town Meeting and a signed endorsement of my two (2) resolutions are needed.

Let it be known that I have in my possession the tape recording used to make this exact copy*, and it was also present during the time of the original recording by the law enforcement officers.

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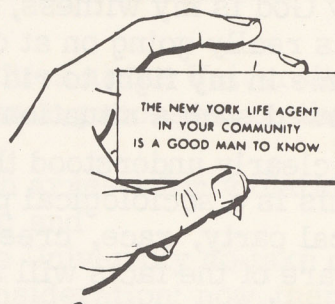
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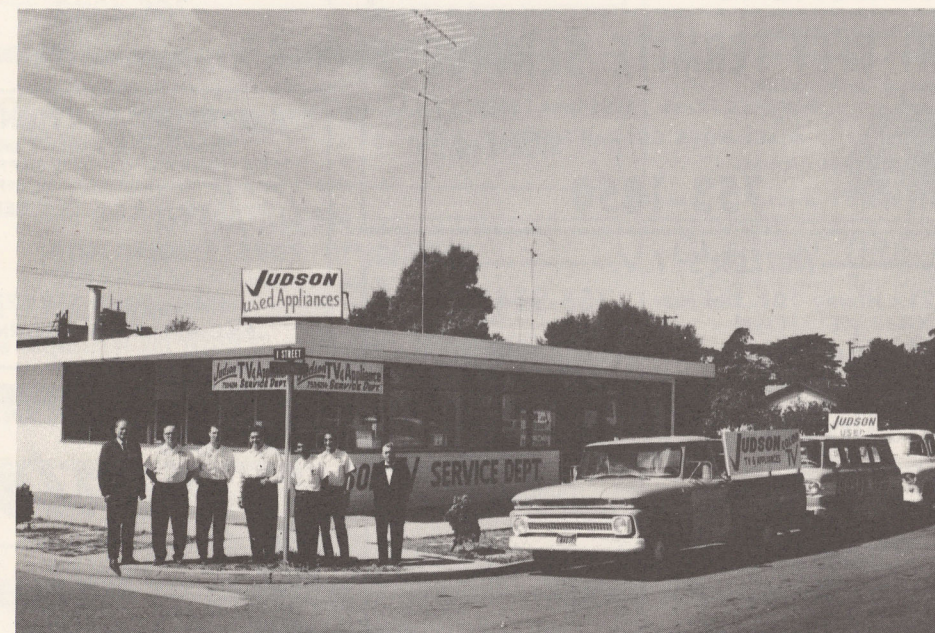
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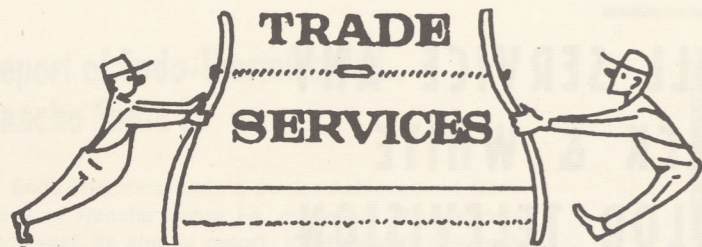
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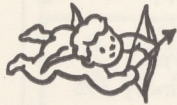
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**Louella Liverwurst . . .**

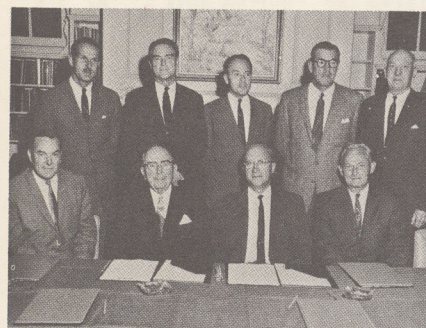
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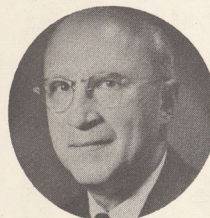

Not Shown: Arthur R. Lindburg.

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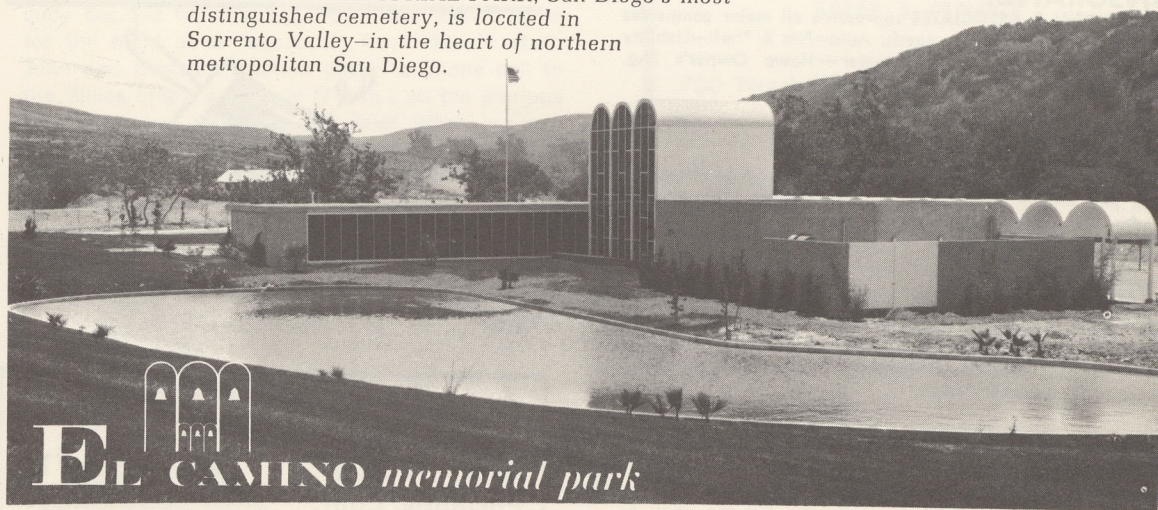

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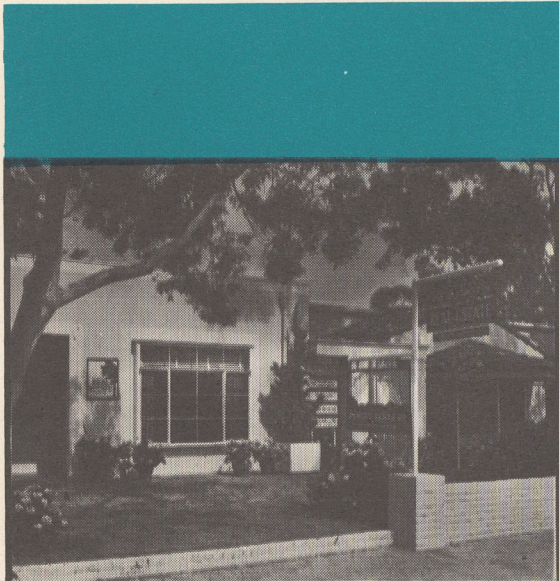


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
