ANNUAL MEETING JUNE 6

Reports to Membership Show Association Year Successful

Reports presented at the annual membership meeting of the Rancho Santa Fe Association, held June 6, summarize another year of successful operations, characterized more than ever by harmony and teamwork among all segments of the community.

This was the gist of comments by retiring President Ward A. Miller who presided at this year's traditional gathering in the Meetin' House at the Inn. **Richardson Memorial Park**

Present status of the George Richardson Memorial Park project was outlined. Funds are in the hands of Mrs. Nancy Walker and Mrs. Anne Richardson as trustees, and Mrs. Richardson has asked that the presidents of the Association, the Garden Club and the Art Jury together with chairman of the re-activated parks and recreation committee act in an advisory capacity.

The Little League is already using a portion of the park for its ball games, under the leadership of Dr. Neil J. Randol and William Pfennig. **Sewage Problem Solved**

Another accomplishment of the year has been solution of the problem of sewage disposal from the golf course area. A new

sewer line has been installed at a total cost of \$11,727.89. Property owners in the area who now share in the use of this facility contributed \$4500.00 toward the cost, leaving a balance of \$7227.89 as the Association's outlay.

Other non-recurring expenses which added to the value of Association property were for blacktop in the golf course area for \$3872.42 and remodeling of the golf shop for \$14,836.43.

Mangore Report Expenses
The Mangore Corporation was engaged by the Association at a cost of \$12,822.42. Of this, a total of \$3872.42 was paid out during this fiscal year.

Total non-recurring expenses for the year were therefore \$25,936.74. Cash on hand as of May 1 was \$14,937.72; U. S. Treasury notes totalled \$39,887.60; total liabilities and deferred income amounted to \$32,535.45.

This year the Association's assessment rate was reduced from 65 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation to 50 cents.

Gavel Presented
President Miller was given an engraved gavel by Vice President Neil J. Randol as a token of appreciation and gratitude for his valued services.

BOARD MEETS JUNE 6

Directors Express Thanks To Outgoing President Miller

Ward A. Miller, outgoing president of the Rancho Santa Fe Association, and outgoing Directors Ray Grisct and Arthur G. Thorne were given a note of thanks and appreciation by board members at their final full meeting of the year on June 6.

Another highlight of this meeting was the appointment of William Weddell as chairman, and of Dr. Herbert Willy Meyer as co-chairman of the Citizens' Committee for Mangore Studies. These appointments were unanimously approved.

Approvals Given

Approval was given by the board to the application of Mrs. Anne Richardson for modification of restrictions on a lot near

the civic center to permit two house sites.

Approval was also given to an amended application for subdivision by John Cave Rule of property between Via de Santa Fe and Via de la Valle.

Board action was deferred on the application of Paul Algert for subdivision of property between Via de la Valle and Las Colinas.

Other business transacted at the June 6 meeting included approval of the employment of the firm of Everts & Esenoff to make an audit of the 1957-58 fiscal year. They will undertake this important work for the sixth consecutive year.

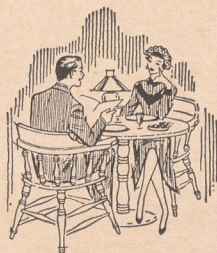

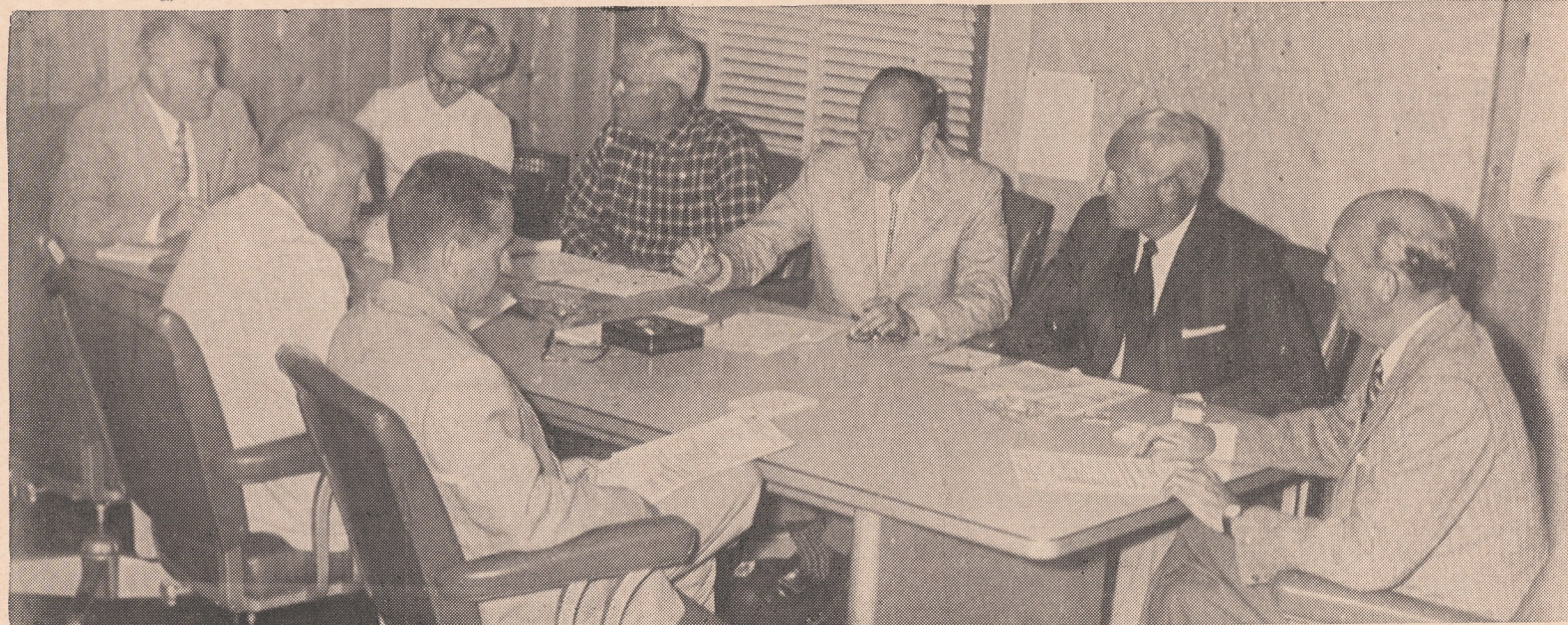

W. Weddell Vice President; New Board Members Seated

Harry W. Booth Jr. was seated June 20 as the Rancho Santa Fe Association's twenty-second president. He succeeds Ward A. Miller whose term on the board of directors expired this month.

Elected vice president of the Association at this annual "organization meeting" was William Weddell, newly seated board member.

Seated with him for the first time at this meeting, following their election by the Association's membership on June 9 were new Directors J. Widman Bertsch and David B. Dewey Jr.

Mr. Booth has served during the past year as a director of the Association, and has been active in other civic work. He served as a member of the golf course committee and as director liaison member of the Mangore studies sub-committee on highways.

Born in El Eegundo, California, Mr. Booth attended Stanford University. He has lived in Rancho Santa Fe for the past six years. Mr. and Mrs. Booth have two girls and a boy.

Mr. Weddell has been active in Association affairs for some time. During the past year he has served as co-chairman of the Citizens' Committee for Mangore Studies under the late George Richardson.

At the June 6 meeting of the board of directors, Mr. Weddell was named chairman of this committee, but his resignation

was accepted by the new board following his election to the vice presidency.

A member of the Association since 1952, Mr. Weddell was born and educated in Chicago. Now retired, he is a former vice president of Leo Burnett Co., Inc., a nationally known advertising and public relations firm of Chicago.

Mr. Bertsch has served as alternate on the Association's Art Jury, and his resignation from this post was also accepted by the board at this meeting on his assumption of new duties as a director.

The board's third new member, David B. Dewey Jr., has been active as a Rancho Santa Fe district fire commissioner.

The board deferred action at its June 20 meeting, pending further study, on the matter of replacements for Mr. Weddell on the Citizens' Committee for Mangore Studies and for Mr. Bertsch as Art Jury alternate.

W. A. Smart was reappointed as secretary of the Association, to serve as secretary-manager for the ensuing year.

The tentative date of August 8 was announced for the Association's annual budget hearing at the Meetin' House.

Approvals were granted to four applications or requests during the balance of the June 20 board meeting, and two more were denied.

Burning Ordinance For Protection of Ranch Residents

Burning of trash or dried vegetation is permitted within the Rancho Santa Fe district only before 10 a.m. and after 4 p.m., by ordinance of the district fire commission.

Strict observation of this rule, and cooperation in obtaining a burning permit for any burning other than in an approved incinerator, are imperative for the security of life and property on the Ranch, said Chester A. Root, chairman of the district fire commission, this week.

The next few months of dry weather greatly increase the danger of fire, he warned.

Eight Ranch youngsters were graduated June 4 from a Junior First Aid course conducted at the fire station. Graduates completed 15 hours of instruction and passed an examination. All are junior fire marshals of the district.

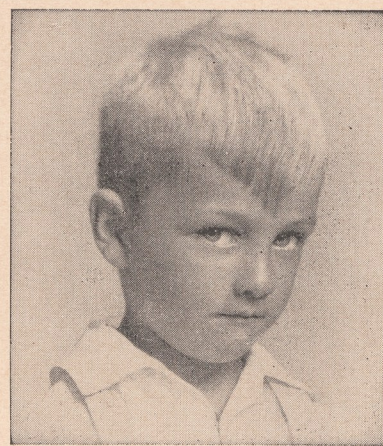
The restaurant and bar yielded a total of \$7244.14.

The Association tennis courts, adjacent to the golf club-house and restaurant, have become the scene of increasing activity ever since the close of school.

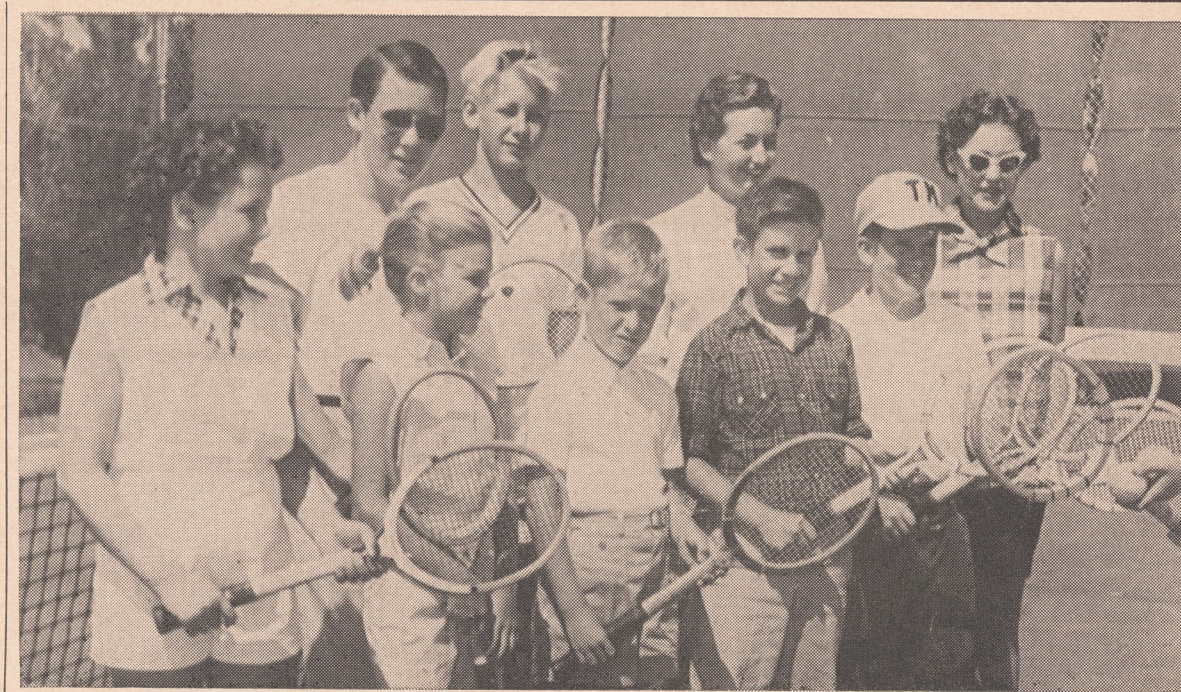

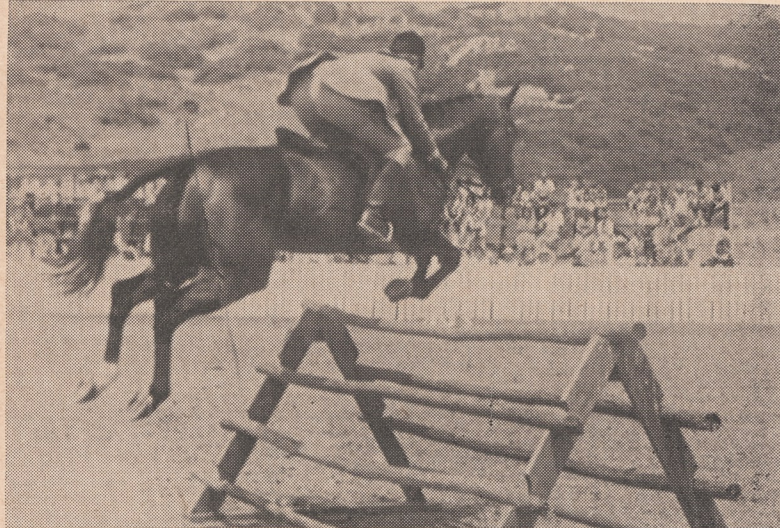

Linda Randall gained two "legs" on the John S. Robertson

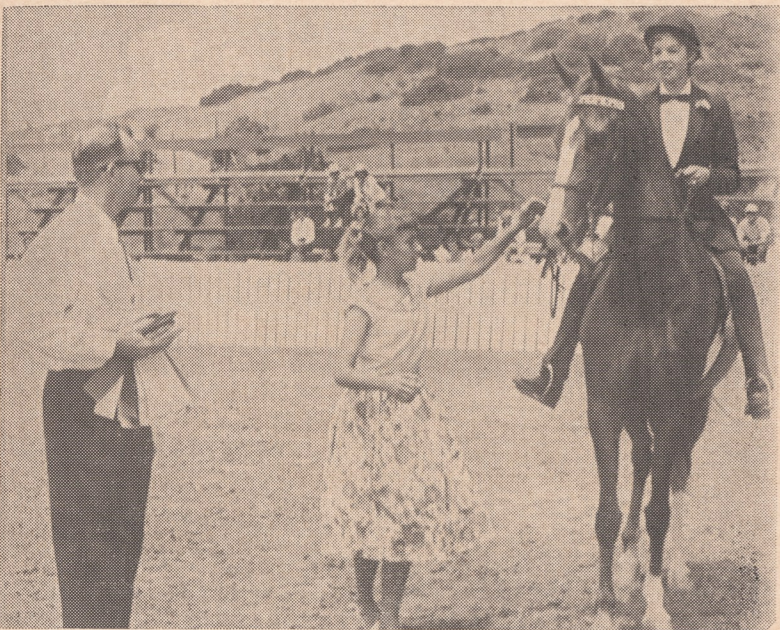
Perpetual Trophy by winning it for the second time this year. In 1957, this traditional cup was won by Charles Chapin.

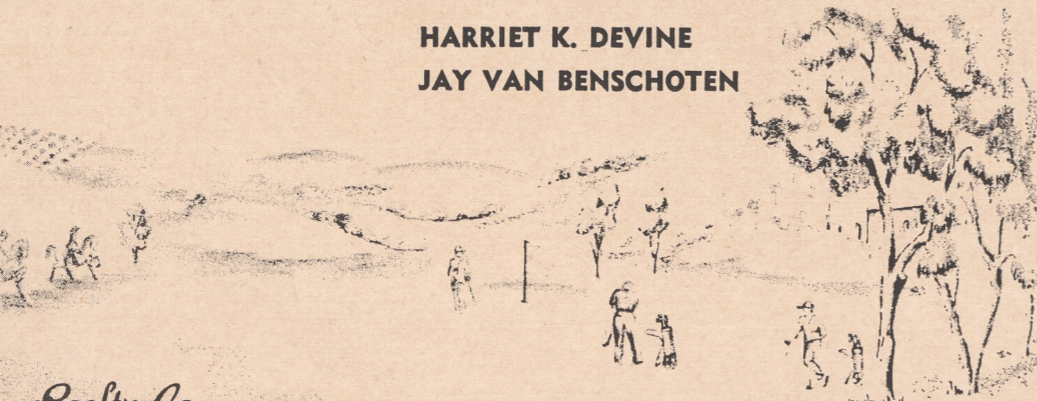

Land Auction Set for July 14 By SF Irrigation District

Tax deeded properties appraised at \$323,000 will be sold at auction July 14 by directors of the Santa Fe Irrigation District.

Sealed bids on nine parcels totaling 160 acres will be opened at 10 a.m. in the district office. Oral bids will be received the same day after the sealed proposals are opened.

Directors of the district said all of the land parcels are in the Rancho Santa Fe area. Purchase terms call for a down payment of 35 per cent with the balance to be paid in three annual installments at 6 per cent interest on the unpaid balance.

was scheduled for completion during June. It will increase the flow to blocks 16, 17 and 27, according to D. M. Bakewell, secretary-manager of the district.

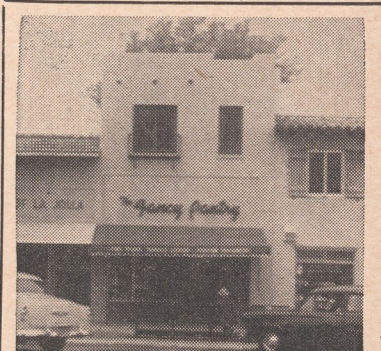

ART JURY MEETS JUNE 13

Sixteen Approvals Granted In Busy Day-Long Session

Facing a long agenda at its regular monthly meeting on June 13, the Art Jury approved 15 final applications and one preliminary, and gave consideration to six more requests.
