Directors Report

The appointment of Messrs. John Bancroft, Stanford Tompkins and John Cook to serve as the nominating committee for the election of directors of the Rancho Santa Fe Association to be held in June, was unanimous.

President William Weddell and William Smart, secretary, were authorized to sign the covenant acceptance of Peter A. and Luella McDonald of portion of lot 4, block 36 and of Jane Sohn of portion of lot 1, block 47.

Secretary Smart was authorized to negotiate the best deal possible for the removal of the "old caddy house" on the golf course.

The following subdivision applications were approved: Ward A. Miller of portion of lot 4, block 30; Bill Bramble and R. Nordstrom of portion of lots 1 and 3, block 37 (this carried the filing of an easement agreement in favor of the Association with the county granting 5' easement along each property line to be set aside for sewer and-or water lines; Kenneth, LeRoy and Donald Fraser of lots 4, 5, and 6, block 34. (This also carried an easement clause for 5' for sewer and-or water.

Because April 15 was Good Friday, the Directors changed the special meeting for Association members, set for that date, to May 6, 7:30 p.m. The Garden Club will be the setting.

Secretary Smart presented gross revenue of the month of March, 1960 as follows:

Golf Course: Greens fees, \$6,907.50; playing privileges, \$4,658; electric carts, \$1,754.30; lockers, \$2.50. Total, \$13,322.30 a gain of \$52.10 over last year.

Golf shop: Hand carts \$199.50; electric carts, \$458.40; cleaning and storage, \$434.50; merchandise, \$4,433.20. Total \$5,525.70, a gain of \$1,192.01.

Restaurant and bar: Total, \$7,958.91, a gain over last year of \$464.32.

The total revenue for March was \$26,806.91, a gain of \$1,708.43.

When the Directors met April 15, the following business was

transacted:

Association Attorney Howard Clayton reported to the Board on the current legal status of "Tudor Associates vs. The Association."

The suit, which has been in litigation over a long period, refers back more than 2 years to the cancellation in January, 1958, of the Tudor Golf Cart contract.

The next Court hearing on the case, scheduled for Monday, April 18th, was discussed. No official Board action was required at this time, as there has been no judgment signed by the court against the Association.

The Board discussed various methods for providing maximum benefits to all Association Members in connection with the Golf Course.

Counsel was authorized to secure tax rulings in the event Association Members are provided a lower rate than non-Association members for advanced playing privileges and daily fees on the Golf Course.

Approval was given to Jessie W. Powers for 'Keeping of Animals,' 2 horses, portion of Lot 6, Block 33, facilities having been approved by the Art Jury.

President Weddell and secretary Smart were authorized to sign the Covenant acceptance of Margaret M. Bushard and Kathryn T. Knight, lot 22, map 3058, Loma Verdes Acres.

John and Elizabeth W. Truog were given time extension on petition to increase number of building sites on portion lot 2, block 7.

The subdivision application of J. Van Benschoten, portion of lot 3, block 22, was approved, with granting of easement for sewer and-or water lines. Vice president Dewey abstained from voting.

Messrs. John Cook and John Bancroft, addressed the board on problems of the nominating committee.

Secretary Smart presented the financial statement for March, 1960.

Dear Mr. Weddell:

This will acknowledge receipt of your notice of the special general meeting of the Association members on April 15, 1960, to consider a revision of the By-laws to require the regular meetings of the Rancho Santa Fe Board of Directors to be opened to the public.

I assume that the present Board of Directors is satisfied with the By-laws as it now stands and find it most workable. Therefore, I would like to support their position.

If some matter affecting my interests or desires was to come before the Board for discussion and consideration, I would, in some instances, desire to be present and have the opportunity

of presenting the thing myself — or seeing that it was fully presented and considered. As I now understand it, I would have the opportunity of doing this by asking for an appointment at one of the regular Board Meetings. It seems to me that is sufficient. Surely the Board of Directors can conduct the business of the Association, and discuss the pros and cons of various situations with a great deal more frankness if they can do it in private, until they at least arrive at a tentative conclusion.

Change Questioned

If the By-laws were changed to throw the Board Meeting open, like an alderman's meeting, I would expect that the majority of those taking advantage of it would do so, just to keep things stirred up without any particularly constructive reason.

For a city council, politically elected, and receiving compensation, there might be some justification in subjecting the members to this kind of annoyance, and in turn give them opportunities to make politically flavored speeches. In the case of the Board of Directors of the Association, where its members are contributing their efforts and their talents for the good of the whole, I think it's an imposition,

and this could ultimately result in determining the more qualified people from offering their services. This could result in the lowering of the caliber of the Board of Directors and possibly result in an element that would want to change or chop up Rancho Santa Fe for the benefit of profit, and not for the continuing stability and high character of the area.

Appreciative

Being unable to be present at the meeting on the 15th, is there any way in which I can be furnished an opportunity for absentee voting? When people were trying to break or alter the covenant before, property owners were given this opportunity.

I have been very appreciative of the unselfish interest and the real contributions that this Board of Directors and the previous ones have contributed to the Association, which has kept Rancho Santa Fe much as it was when Mrs. Biggers and I were first attracted to it, and I should like to support the present Board of Directors and the covenant in any way I can.

The twenty-fourth annual garden tour will be conducted by St. James By-the-Sea Episcopal Church, La Jolla, Saturday, April 30.

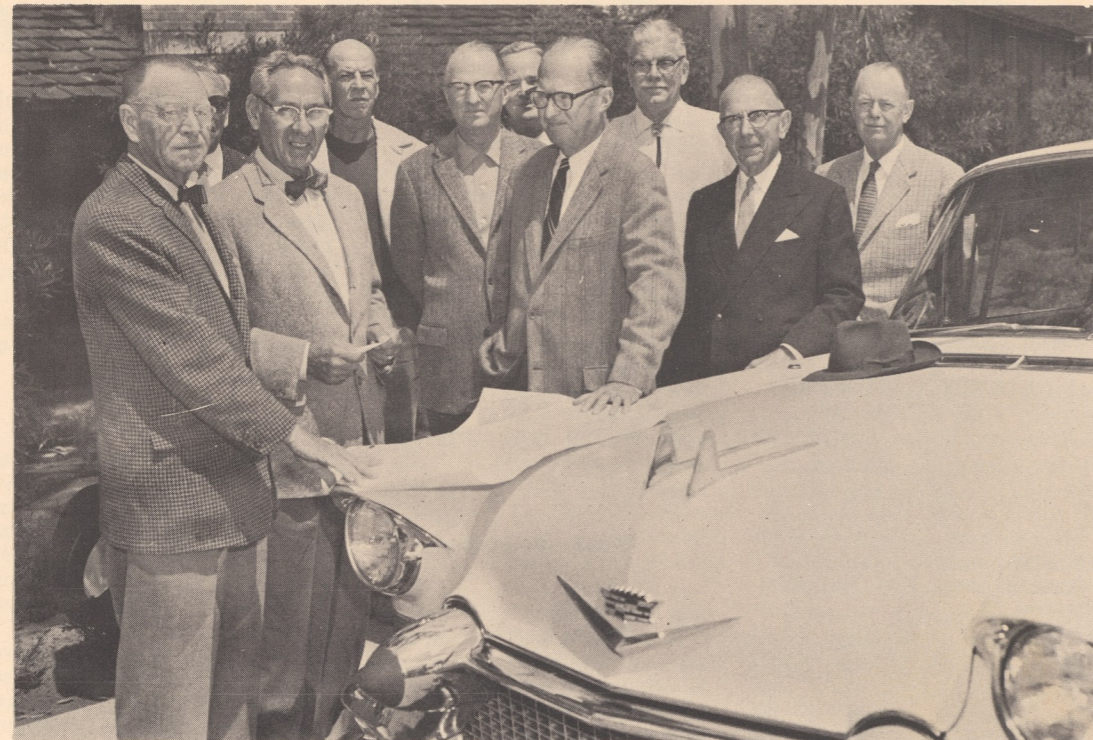

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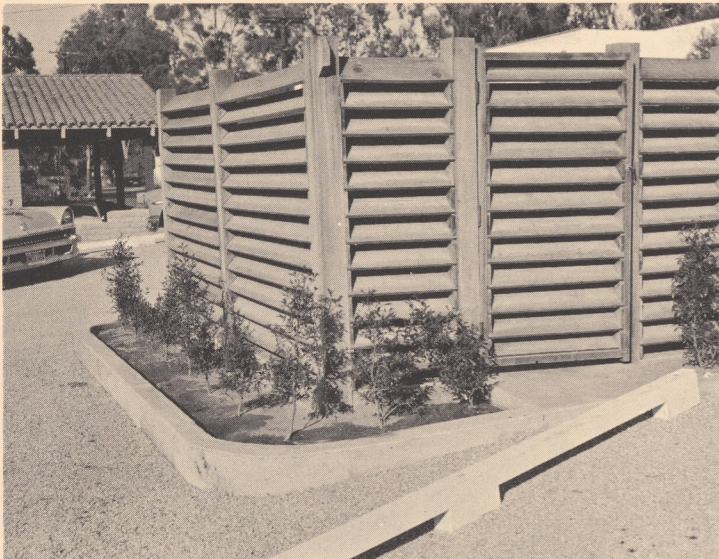

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TRAIL ROUNDUP

Riders of Rancho Club Enjoy Daily Excursions

Rancho Santa Fe has a very special attraction for horse lovers whether coming from the east, where many areas of country riding are to be found, or from other sections where trails have disappeared under the push of progress.

Although most Ranch residents enjoy the sight of a rider and his horse, many of them know nothing of the Riding Club and its activities. This is a private club, formed in 1945 "to foster, advance, and encourage the ownership, the training, and the love of horses."

The members of this club have picnic rides, moonlight rides and gymkhanas for fun. And there are two fine shows a year — one handled entirely by the Junior Riding Club and the other a National Horse Show to which riders from as far away as Los Angeles and Arizona bring their horses.

The Riding Club owns almost ten acres of land on which are located barns, corrals, practice ring, show ring, and picnic grounds.

The serious horse activity in Rancho Santa Fe has increased tremendously since Mr. and Mrs. Robert A. Rice took over the stables to manage and train, four years ago. Those in every age group, from the "Thursday ladies" to the first grade beginners, who have felt the influence of Bob and Louise Rice's knowledge and enthusiasm are grateful to them for their unflagging interest.

Besides maintaining the stable, the Riding Club, through its trails committee, check existing trails and report to the association when repairs are needed. These trails give the rider endless hours of pleasure, as he can ride in and out of the lovely areas of the Ranch which can be seen no other way.

Some of these trails are easements dedicated by property owners for use as riding trails to preserve riding facilities on the Ranch.

Most of us have seen other country areas which have been built up until the name country no longer applies, and where trail riding is only a memory.

Fortunately, in Rancho Santa Fe, trail riding will always be possible to the extent that we have dedicated trails. If anyone reading this column has wanted to

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Vaccine for Polio Urged Now

Five years ago this week the Salk polio vaccine was pronounced "safe, effective and potent," according to Art Hunt, chairman of the San Diego Chapter of The National Foundation which is supported by the March of Dimes. "We of the San Diego Chapter remember this event with great pride," Hunt said. "It meant that fifteen years of effort was rewarded with success — an effective preventive of paralytic polio."

Children had priority when the vaccine was in short supply; now it is available for adults as well. Paralytic polio now strikes older people and usually is severe when it does.

Three properly spaced shots of vaccine are 90 per cent effective against paralytic polio. The second shot is due four to six weeks after the first; the third, seven to twelve months after the second. A fourth or booster shot is often recommended by physicians.

With the approach of warm weather, the polio incidence rate tends to rise throughout the United States. Chapter chairman, Hunt, strongly stressed the importance of everyone completing the full series of shots, or at least starting their polio vaccine program. Hunt urged everyone to see their family physician or participate in one of the lot-cost vaccine clinics.

'Bill, Emma' Move Colorful Coffee Corner

Mr. and Mrs. William J. Aperance, better known to their clientele as "Bill and Emma," have moved their Coffee Corner, situated at the southwest corner of Granada and Paseo Delicias, to the southeast corner of the same streets. The couple met and married in Rancho Santa Fe in 1946, just after the war, and have been in business "hosting" round table sessions in their friendly establishment ever since.

Bill is often called the Rancho's ambassador of goodwill, for both he and Emma like to have their customers enjoy not only their food, but the atmosphere of good neighborliness which they seek to create.

The new location of the Coffee Corner has much more room — there is space for parties of 40 or 50, and dining both indoors and outside. With the Rancho's weather being of the year-round sunshine brand, the outdoor set-up is most welcome. And a drinking well is set up especially for children.

Mrs. William Weddell, chairman of the committee, is particularly pleased with the plants which Mrs. Gifford Ewing, the authority in such matters, has chosen. Canary island pines were selected to achieve harmony between the native plants and the palms which line Paseo Delicias. There are a number of choice California toys, which were the last available on this year's market. There is also victory pyracantha, and grevillea. Drifts of juniper pfitzeri and prostrate carissa face down the front of the area.

The second planting is the triangular turn-around at Minosa and Linea del Cielo. Here there is saturation planting of several varieties of junipers which mass as soft greens.

The next objective of the Beautification Committee, planning with the school board, is to plant the strip in front of the new school. This is 35 feet deep and 350 feet long. The school has promised water pipe and manpower for maintenance, and the

Garden Club will supply the plants.

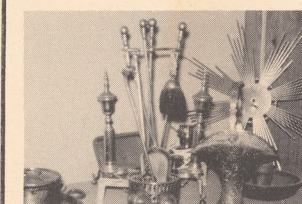

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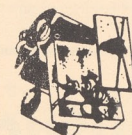

TREACLE and INK

Two significant books of poetry by foreign poets have been added to the shelves of the central library.

POEMS by Boris Pasternak (The University of Michigan Press, 1959, 194 pages, \$3.95) is an excellent translation by Eugene M. Kayden of the best poems of the Nobel Prize-winning author of DOCTOR ZHIVAGO.

Eighteen poems from the novel and several written since the publication of DOCTOR ZHIVAGO including the unpublished poem "The Passing Storm," make this a collection that is representative of the whole scope and span of Pasternak's work.

In a preface of the book of poems the translator, a distinguished man of letters himself, quotes from a letter written in English by Pasternak. The Russian author talks of poetry and poets.

He wishes that poets are few but hastily adds: "The matter of their scarcity does not interest me much — but that one poet should be true and great, expressing supremely and inimitably the life of his age. Art is not simply a description of life, but a setting forth of the uniqueness of being."

Later in the letter he continues: "Art is for me a manifestation and a symptom; it must show that we stand in the

presence of new all-encompassing values, in the presence of the great." Pasternak's requirements for a poet are very high and as Kayden suggests: "the Poet's way is the way of insight, love, and revelation as the art of profoundest seeing, the way of the Eternal."

Of a different spirit is JOHN BETJEMAN'S COLLECTED POEMS (Houghton Mifflin Co., 1959, 280 pp., \$4.) a book which includes the poetry of the contemporary Oxford poet from 1932 to the present.

Betjeman who is known in the United States by readers of THE NEW YORKER and HARPER'S BAZAAR was presented with Great Britain's William Foyle Poetry Prize in 1955 and 1959.

His work is immediately arresting. He writes in a style that is both facile and light, although his themes are frequently bitter, heavy and mocking.

There is not the epic-like perspective about his poetry, that the reader finds with Pasternak; there is no religious vision apparent. The poems seem almost too commercial and yet in retrospect they just miss the condemnation of being "clever."

Betjeman is different; he is humorous, perverse and has his eyes directed at the rather narrow confines of the "suburbs" (as is pointed out by the dis-

tinguished Earl of Birkenhead in a short introduction).

His lyrics are depressive at times, quite often ineffectively

satiric and yet they are strangely appealing.

It will remain to be seen what the future holds for this poet.

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
