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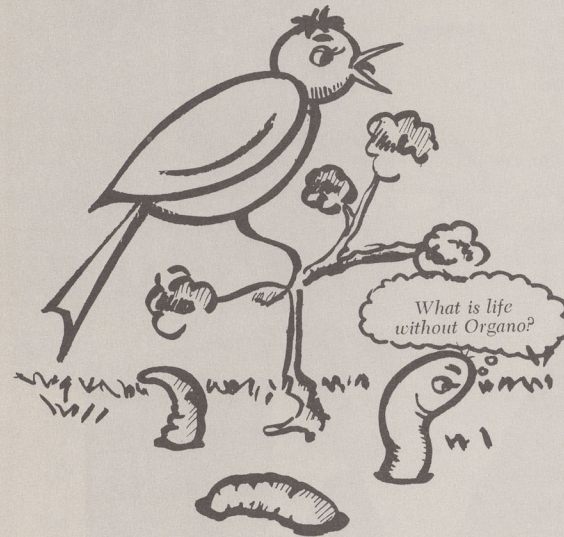
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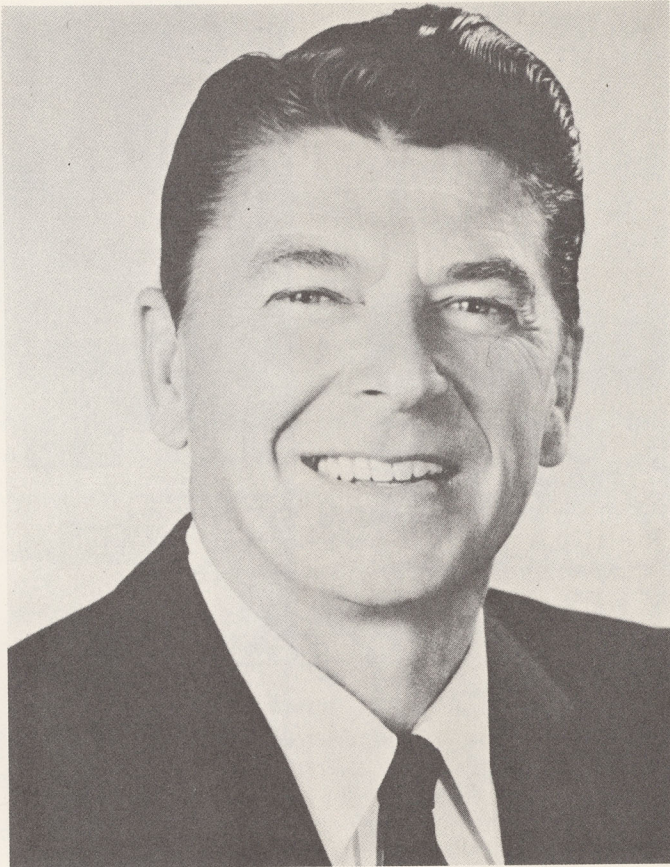

"The Case for Blacktop Pathways For Golf Carts"

The march of progress is the march of research. The up to date and popular product of today can easily be the obsolete product of tomorrow. Therefore, our golf course must be kept up-to-date. It is the heart that supports and maintains the value of our homes . . . without it real estate values would drop instantly. That is the reason that builders of huge home projects in suburban areas first put in a golf course and then build the homes around it. Always, we must be competitive in this attraction.

The use of golf carts has come to stay. President Eisenhower is an example of the reason millions of golfers are playing at advanced ages. This increased interest would not have been possible without the use of golf carts.

Wisely, we are installing a sprinkling system. But, its use is tantamount to a nice shower every time it is used. Evidently, there is considerable adobe soil beneath our turf that prevents proper drainage. It seems most likely that the use of

golf carts must be prohibited more often than in the past because of soft wet spots in unexpected places. The cart wheels slip and chew up the grass and soil.

Why don't we take the next step to modernize our golf course by installing black top pathways at the sides of our fairways? A trip to Palm Springs will convince any golfer of the value of this element of modernity. Examine the installation at Thunderbird Club. A golf ball almost always rolls off the hard black top but when it doesn't, they simply put it on the grass and play. Then one can use a golf cart every day in the year.

Why not make this installation while we are going through the ordeal of installing the sprinkling system. Why go through it twice? Recovery will be simultaneous.

Let's face the facts even though they have a way of being stubborn when the yardage for the golf courses was originally established, caddie were available and at low cost. Such is not the case now.

Doctors seem to be in accord that walking is the most beneficial exercise that any one can take, even for one who has a heart ailment. Even at risk of provoking an argument, I think most doctors would agree that when one pulls a golf cart with all of the necessary clubs, that it is an extra strain, even though negligible, that professional golfers do not have because they always have caddies.

Even though, one does not walk up and down the hills for four or five miles on our course, he will get moderate walking from the blacktop cart pathway to his ball.

Will Durant said, "We do not want a thing because we have found reasons for it; we find reasons for it because we want it. We even elaborate philosophies and theologies to clock our desires."

Those opposed to the idea may say, "But, it will slow up the play." I would ask them "More than if all players walked as the professionals do?" Then the question will be asked, "But, what about the cost?" It will cost more not to do it than if we do. Besides, the longer we wait the more it will cost.

Benefits will accrue to the "Golf cart pullers" as well as the "Golf cart riders," because it is easy to pull a cart on a hard blacktop surface.

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Dear Ranchoite:

The Santa Fe Irrigation District, since 1923, has served water from Lake Hodges which consists of natural run-off. Since the formation of the San Diego County Water Authority, the District has also from time to time received Colorado River water through one of the San Diego County Water Authority Aqueducts. In recent years, because of the light rains, there has been little or no water in Lake Hodges, and therefore, almost all of the District's water has been delivered from the Aqueduct.

However, our water contract with the City of San Diego, which is the supplier of our water, states that we must accept and use water from Lake Hodges as long as it is available. The heavy rains in late 1965 and early 1966 placed about 3400 acre feet of water in the Lake and the City is now delivering water to us solely from Lake Hodges and will probably continue to do so until that supply has been exhausted. Thereafter, deliveries from the Second Aqueduct will be resumed at which time the quality of the water will be improved.

We can assure you that although there is a great deal of turbidity in Lake Hodges which discharges water into the line and discolors the water, the water which we are serving at present is potable and safe to use. Six water samples from different areas throughout the District are taken each month by the District, and three by the County Health Department. Each of these is sent to a laboratory for analysis, and they have uniformly been approved.

We ask your indulgence and hope that the quality of the water will be improved in the very near future.

Mr. and Mrs. Claude A. Welles of Rancho Santa Fe are building their "dream house" on Avenida Maravillas. Claude, as he is affectionately known to his many cohorts, claims that after seventy-eight years of living, he and Ines are at last achieving the perfect home! In Claude's own words, "the layout, construction, and selective use of modern household technology" is just exactly right! Months of planning, selection and deliberation with architects, designers, contractors and sites finally resolved into a "Monterrey Ranch" style residence designed by John A. Foster II with construction by La Paz Homes, Inc. of Rancho Santa Fe.

Thirteen years ago Mr. and Mrs. Welles retired from the Business World and moved from their home at Evanston, Illinois to Rancho Santa Fe. They built their first home on Mimulus Road and quickly became enthusiasts for this area of Southern California. The Korean War found Mr. Welles commandeered as the Chief of Cost & Price in the Chicago Quartermaster Department from which position he managed to retire and move finally to Rancho Santa Fe.

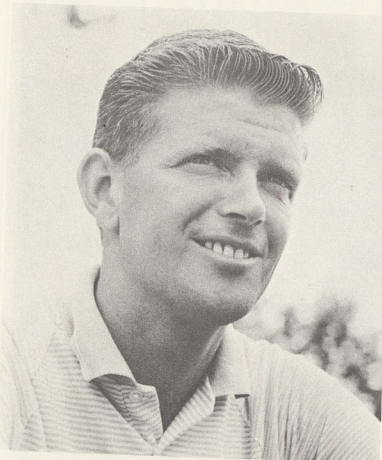

Larry Mowry Appointed Head Professional at Whispering Palms Golf and Country Club

Larry Mowry, personable 29 year old San Diego Touring professional, today was appointed head professional of the Whispering Palms Golf & Country Club in Rancho Santa Fe in an announcement made by Denis Waitley, Club Manager.

Mowry is well known in the San Diego area where he started his professional career as assistant pro at the Bonita Golf Club in 1959. He started on the P.G.A. Professional circuit in late '61 and has enjoyed increasing success since, earning over \$60,000 official and unofficial to date.

Larry has been playing especially well in the last eight months having been in the big money at the Texas Open, the Azalea Open, and the Almaden Open. He's also been in the top 20 in over 50 percent of the 115 major tournaments in which he has competed.

Under his agreement with the new 36 hole private club, Mowry will have full charge of the golf operation including teaching, membership activities and pro shop operations. He also stated he will participate in a limited number of high calibre P.G.A. tournaments throughout the year.

Mowry's 1966 tournament commitments include the Texas Open (April 29—May 1), the U.S. Open in June, The P.G.A. in August, plus his already guaranteed berths in the Carling World Championship in England and the Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas, both later this year.

When asked why he was cutting down on what many people considered to be one of the most promising Touring Professional careers to accept the responsibility of a head club pro, Mowry paralleled his situation with that of his close friend, Paul Harney.

"Paul has a fine head pro job" he said, "yet Paul gets to ten or twelve big ones every year and manages to either win or come pretty close."

"I've always been watching for the 'right' opportunity that would allow me to become associated with a fine private club and settle down, yet still have the chance to take a crack at the top tournaments. Whispering Palms is a beautiful place, the location in Rancho Santa Fe is truly ideal and it's a fun and challenging golf course. The present and future plans show me that Whispering Palms is going to be one of the outstanding private residential and resort golf complexes in the entire country and I'm happy for the chance to be a part of its exciting growth," Mowry added.



Larry feels the new North County Private residential and resort golfing complex holds promise of being one of the really outstanding concepts in the United States.

"The location in Rancho Santa Fe is of course, already established as one of America's most exclusive and gracious communities. Add to this the terrific climate and its closeness (especially with the July freeway opening) to San Diego and Los Angeles, plus the tremendously high standard of aesthetics set by the developer, Richard Cavanaugh, and you have something very, very desirable."

Mowry especially praised the golf course itself. "The present 18 at Whispering Palms has a lot going for it. The primarily level terrain isn't a firing physical marathon for the people, but the big, beautiful and carefully contoured greens, pin placement, sand traps and wind conditions make it a course that is absolutely no snap, especially to the low handicap golfers. People who play real well, including the long hitting pros better be absolutely perfect on tee shot placement or the birdies will be few and far between. But because it is a fairly level course with little serious rough or water trouble at present, the high handicap players who make up the majority of golfers still have a great time on the course."

"I've looked at the plans for the second 18 and when this is completed by the end of the year, it will give us two full courses, one of 6,400 yards and a real test of golf at over 7,000 yards."

"I'm also very excited about the new clubhouse at Whispering Palms," Mowry added, "I've been all over the county at some of the finest clubs anywhere and all I can say is wait til you see it."

Officials of the Cavanaugh Development Co. stated that final structural engineering approvals were being done and within the next few weeks the completed plans would be filed with the San Diego County Building Department and construction to start following County approval, traditionally about 45-60 days from filing of plans. That would mean start of construction in June with a completion date late this year.

The Collection of Art Treasures at the George Bailey Home is a joy to behold!

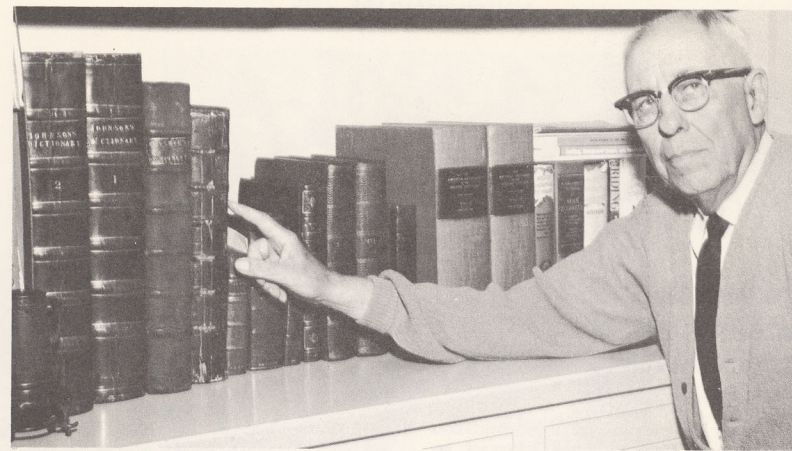
One of the highlights of the recent Rancho Santa Fe Home and Garden Tour was the collection of art treasures at the George Bailey home on La Glorieta. This particular screen pictured here was bought in Bangkok, and was represented as probably four hundred years old and made in one of the countries of Indo China, marked in the period of Ayathaya. It is lightly carved teakwood, but one side is liberally overlaid with oriental figures in mother of pearl, jade or ivory. The Baileys obtained it on their last visit to Bangkok when they were looking for a large coromandel. They searched all through the Orient, Japan, Taipei, Hong Kong, Macau, but when they saw this in Bangkok, they stopped looking! This particular screen completely met their wishes. It passed customs as antique and as not being Chinese.

It fits beautifully into the Bailey home with its Japanese paintings and scrolls. It blends particularly well with the Chinese porcelain vases, made in the Kang H'si period of about 1660 when the Chinese art in the manufacture of

porcelains was at its highest. At the opposite side of the Bailey dining room (at the kitchen door) is a Japanese screen put together in this country from antique scroll paintings brought in by Mr. Bailey. Mr. and Mrs. Bailey have only been married a few years but Mrs. Bailey has joined enthusiastically in the acquisition of some oriental pieces, particularly the beautiful bronze head of Buddha which is displayed with subdued lighting as you enter their home.

Mr. Bailey lived in Detroit for 45 years while Mrs. Bailey was a long time resident of Los Angeles, but both have agreed that Rancho Santa Fe is the place for them. Many Ranchoites were fortunate enough to see many of the Bailey treasures during the recent house and garden tour, when Mr. Bailey had many of his old English Dictionaries on display as well as his varied assortment of owls.

Right now he is devoting his time with a committee to increase the number of Century Club memberships for the Boy Scouts in the area.

Sparks added that all of the contestants had made valuable contributions to his thinking on what decorating features Rancho Bernardo may employ in future models.

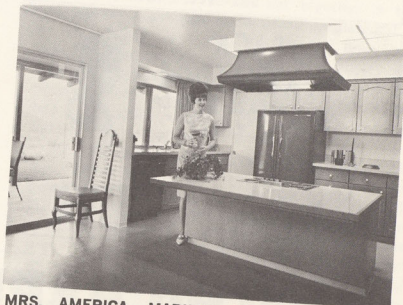

Mrs. Florence Allen Remington, 89, of Mimosa Road, Rancho Santa Fe, widow of the Rt. Rev. William P. Remington, died recently in Scripps Hospital. Bishop Remington and Mrs. Remington moved to Rancho Santa Fe in 1951 after he had served six years as suffragan Episcopal bishop of Philadelphia. The bishop died in 1963.

Mrs. Remington was well known as a prominent leader in work of the women of the Episcopal Church. Survivors include a sister-in-law, Mrs. Elsie Mitchell of Rancho Santa Fe.

A native of Burlington, Vt., Mrs. Remington had an extensive musical education. She married in 1905 and lived for a time in Philadelphia where her husband served as a chaplain overseas.

During World War I, she was the musical hostess at Camp Devens while her husband served as a chaplain overseas.

They lived in South Dakota from 1919 to 1922, where he served as suffragan bishop. They moved to Oregon in 1922, where Bishop Remington served as missionary bishop for eastern Oregon until 1945.

Services were held at noon Tuesday at St. Peter's Episcopal Church, Del Mar. La Jolla Mortuary was in charge. Inurnment was in Bryn Mawr, Pa.

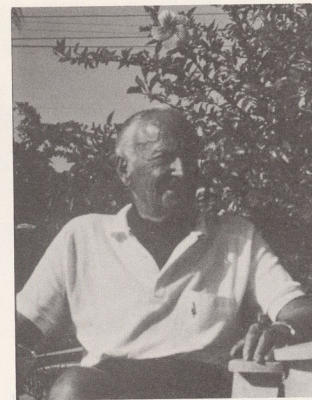

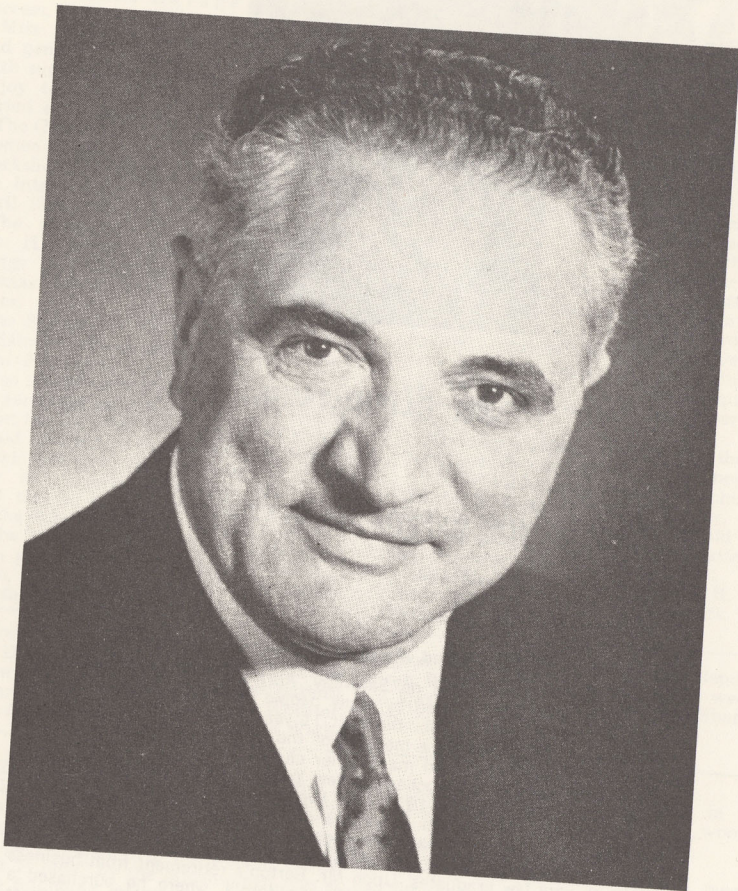
He was an ardent golfer, a member of the Rancho Santa Fe Golf Club, Los Ancianos Supper Club and many other clubs.

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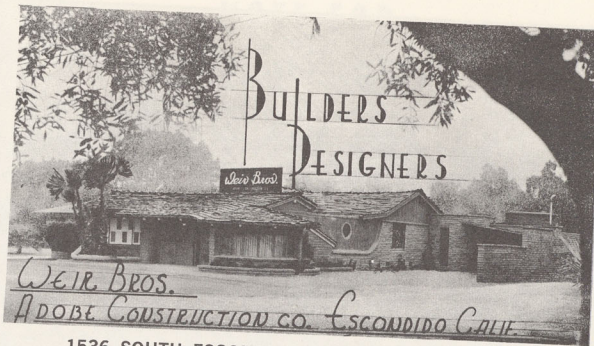

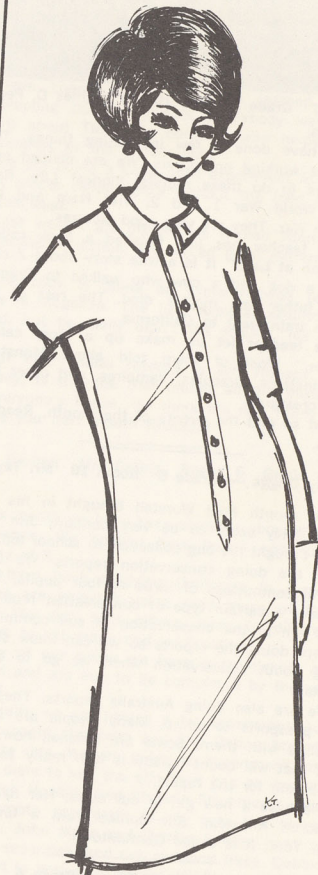

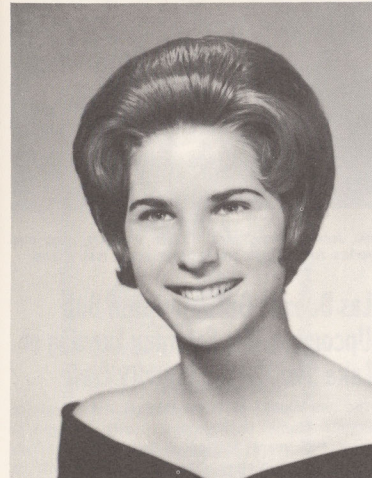
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Miss Jennifer Jean Abels Announces Forthcoming Wedding Plans

In 1937 the first auxiliary was organized. Since then the number has grown to 202. Members of the auxiliaries help to interpret the Society's program and raise funds to assist in financing its services. These enthusiastic women who give of their time and talents now number 9,000.

Las Duenas, an auxiliary group to Childrens Home Society, was organized in September of 1960. Membership draws from Rancho Santa Fe, Del Mar and Solana Beach, with a maximum of twenty-five active members. The Mariposa Ball has been the most outstanding fund raising event during the past years. Last year's ball netted \$1,380.00.

Associate members are entertained twice annually at an autumn tea and Christmas champagne luncheon. Associate membership, which is unlimited, plays an important role in contributing to Childrens Home Society. Auxiliaries now raise more than twenty percent of the Society's total operating budget.

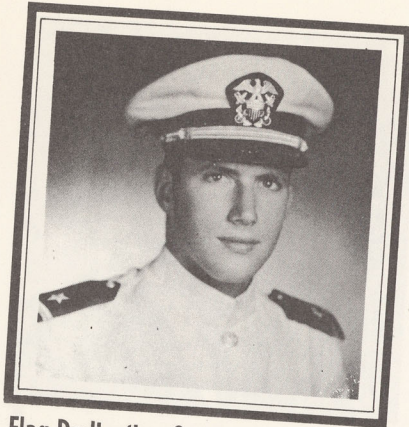
Watching the newspapers and other media the past few weeks, I have come to the realization that the public generally can be quite misinformed and confused on the interest rates being bandied about on savings. A very large movement of savings funds has occurred recently with the banks offering higher returns on Certificates of Deposit or term types of savings. These term higher rate savings are in direct competition with the traditional higher rate on savings being paid by Savings and Loans. Although the insurance on savings is virtually the same with both institutions the banks, especially in the east, have been quiet successful in securing funds during the past period. This higher rate being paid by banks, however, are for specified periods of time, usually one year, and the depositor cannot realize his funds during the specified period. There regular savings accounts still pay approximately 4 percent return. On the other hand most Savings and Loans to meet this competition, have raised rates on all savings accounts to five per cent which effects a compounding return of 5.09 percent annually. To meet the term type of savings most Associations, such as Tri-City, has instituted a \$5,000.00 Minimum Term type of savings (non-advertized) which pays an additional 1/2 percent bonus at the end of three years which effects an insured overall rate of approximately 5.6 percent.

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Flag Dedication Ceremonies Held for The Late Lt. Arthur S. Hill, Jr.

The Village Church in Rancho Santa Fe was the setting for an impressive dedication service on Sunday morning, April 17th, when the American Flag and the Christian Flag were dedicated to the beautification of the sanctuary in memory of Lt. The flags were given by the Women's Council of the Village Church, the Members of the Session, other friends of the family. Although the flags were purchased several months ago in loving memory of the young lieutenant, they were purposely dedicated on the April 17th date so that his sister, Mrs. Russell F. 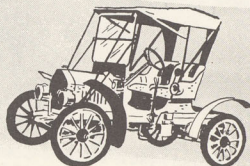

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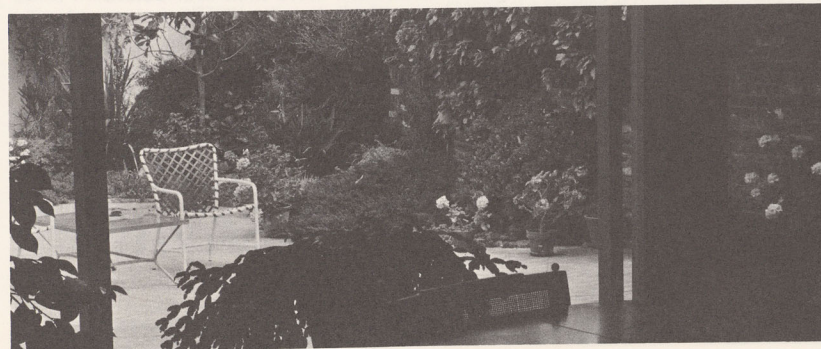
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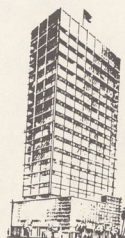

be abated in the best interests and spirit of the
Covenant, and directed the Secretary to so inform
the offending party. The Board stipulated that
said action should be taken prior to April 28, 1966
and requested the Art Jury to inspect the site at
that time.

Protest of radio antenna. The Secretary reported
a complaint from an Association member in re-
gard to a radio transmitting tower and explained
the circumstances surrounding erection of same.
The Board directed that a review be made as to
the technical necessity for the tower at its present
location.

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Recommendation from Parks & Recreation Chairman. The Secretary read a letter from Mr. Howard L. Wellman, Parks & Recreation Board Chairman, which was in reply to a request of the Board of Directors for comment on some system of levying charges against horse owners and tennis players to help offset expense items relative to the maintenance of trails and tennis courts.

At a regular meeting of the Parks and Recreation Board on March 22, 1966, the following motion was made, seconded, and carried: "That the Parks and Recreation Board recommend to the Board of Directors that all bridle trails, tennis courts and parks be considered community assets from which all property owners benefit and that, as such, the cost to develop and maintain same should be borne by the community at large through their assessments to the Association."

The Finance Committee Chairman reviewed some of the expenses which are directly attributable to the establishment, maintenance and improvement of bridle trails and tennis facilities. It was moved, seconded, and carried that it be the intention of the Board, effective July 1, 1966, to levy a charge of \$40 per year for tennis playing privileges, and a \$10 filing fee for the application for keeping of animals. This motion was referred to the Parks and Recreation Board for further comment.

(Mr. Harris was excused from the Board meeting at 10:25 and Vice President Blackman took the chair.)

Letter from Self Realization Fellowship. 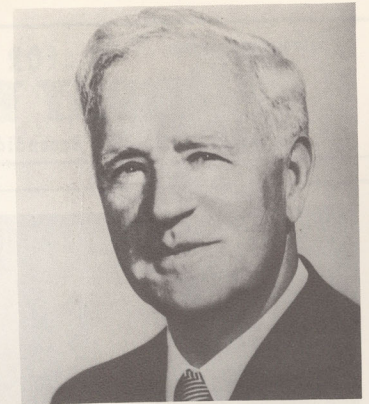
Following the program a short business meeting was held.

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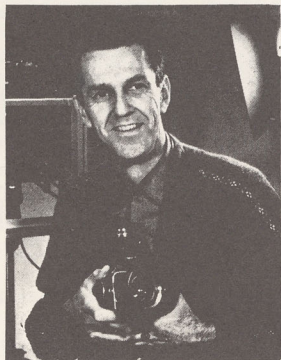
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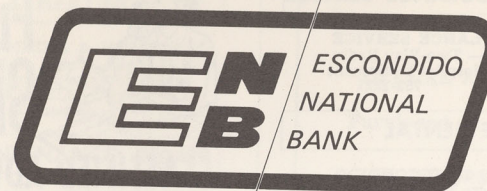

May 29 — "Safety is of The Lord"

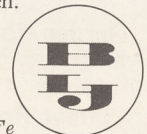
