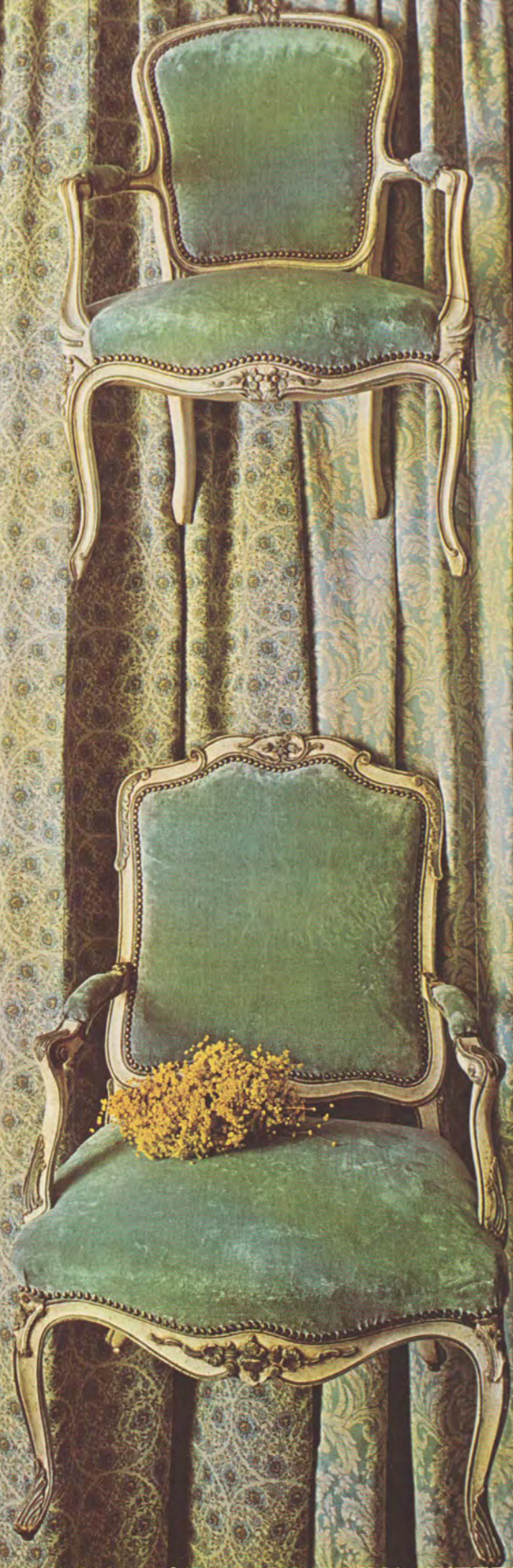

The long and colorful history of the Del Mar Racetrack moves into a new phase and the 31st season of thoroughbred racing is expected to be one of its most successful from every standpoint.

It will be another gala summer "where the turf meets the surf" and festivities get underway July 24 for the first of 42 days, climaxing with the prestige-laden \$100,000 plus Del Mar Futurity on closing day, Sept. 12.

A new corporation will be at the helm—the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club—winners of a 20-year lease for the Del Mar facilities. The group of eight directors, headed by President Thomas M. Hamilton, prominent San Diego attorney, is predominantly horse-oriented. That means a "sport for sports' sake" policy, for the terms of the lease specifically spell out that while Del Mar will be a profit-making organization, all such funds for a good many years will be ploughed back into plant improve-

ment and none of the directors ever will receive remuneration.

In addition to Hamilton, the directorate includes San Diegans John C. Mabee and Mrs. Fred A. Spencer, both noted stable owners, and three others who have extensive real estate and business holdings in San Diego. They are Clement L. Hirsch, owner of a huge farm in Poway; Robert H. Grant, a partner in the Bresa del Mar farm near Escondido; and William R. Hawn, prominent in local land development for more than two decades. Completing the board are Louis R. Rowan, Pasadena sportsman and one of California's leading owners and breeders, and Dr. James R. Buell, prominent veterinarian who maintains a market breeding operation at his Rancho Jonata in Buellton.

As can be seen from the above, all of the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club directors are very much involved with thoroughbreds with the possible exception of Hamilton, and he, too, has had a fling at owning a thoroughbred or two.

## Thoroughbred Racing in the Del Mar Manner



Actual operation of Del Mar will continue under the direction of **Donald B. Smith**, president of the old Del Mar Turf Club and new executive vice-president and general manager, and his assistant, **Eddie Read**, long time public relations head of the turf-surf course. However, there will be new faces in the racing department this summer. One of the first moves of the incoming group was to obtain the services of **Frank E. Kilroe** as director of racing and **Louis H. Eilken** as racing secretary. Both are recognized as leaders in their field. Kilroe heads the racing department at Santa Anita and Eilken is in a similar capacity at all the Northern California tracks—Golden Gate, Tanforan and Bay Meadows.

A positive indication of the Kilroe-Eilken influence was almost immediately forthcoming with the recent announcement of the 1970 stakes program. Del Mar will present a drastically changed program of 20 stakes carrying a record \$445,000 in added value. Nine grass races are on the agenda, topped by the \$50,000 Del

Mar Handicap, which will be contested at a mile and three furlongs, longest added money event ever to be offered at the seaside course. Upwards of \$2,000,000 in purses will be held out as bail for the seven-week whirl of racing, a magnet to draw the finest horses and stables in the track's history.

Indeed, two of the most prominent handicap performers Del Mar bound are Hirsch's Figonero and Rowan's Quicken Tree. The latter was the hero of the Santa Anita winter meeting and Figonero, the Argentine import, won international fame by racing to a new world record for nine furlongs in winning the Del Mar Handicap last Labor Day.

Also set for extensive campaigns on both the infield grass and the main dirt course are powerful stables trained by **Charles Whittingham**, **M. E. Millerick**, **Farrell W. Jones**, **Jerry Fanning**, **Gordon Campbell**, **Jimmy Jordan**, **Harold McBride**, **Warren** and **Mel Stute**, **Wayne Stucki** and a host of others. Whittingham's string will include such distinguished older stars as Fiddle Isle, Pinjara, Daryl's Joy and Bargain Day and 3-year-old stalwarts such as Colorado King Jr. and Whittingham, his namesake which he owns in partnership with **Mary F. Jones**.

The jockey colony will be strongly bolstered with the return to daily Del Mar action after a sixteen-year hiatus

of **Bill Shoemaker**, who will be striving, the fates willing, to succeed **Johnny Longden** as the world's winningest rider. Every day of competition brings Shoemaker closer to the record of 6,032 established by Longden, who retired from riding to be a highly successful trainer in 1966. The odds are Shoe will attain his goal late in the Del Mar season and it is entirely possible it could be on a horse saddled by Longden, who won his world title at Del Mar in 1956.

Shoemaker won't have it all his own way, however. The riding brigade will consist of such established reinsmen as **Don Pierce**, **Jerry Lambert**, **Bill Mahorney**, **Rudy Rosales**, **Ismael** and **Mario Valenzuela**, **Fernando Toro**, Apprentice **H. K. "Duke" Wellington** and many more.

Racing fans, too, can look forward to many improvements at the seaside this summer. More than \$200,000 has been spent in a variety of projects prior to opening. These include a new grandstand roof, extensive painting throughout the stands, complete re-decorating of the turf club and clubhouse with new carpeting on all floor surfaces, a new backstretch racing office, extensive improvements in the jockeys' quarters, installation of video-tape cameras for instant replays on the expanded closed circuit television monitors and many other innovations.

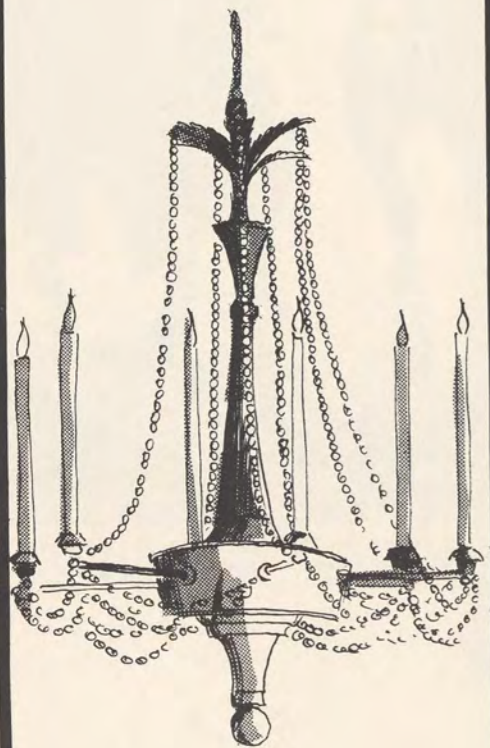
Del Mar again will be the scene of the West's most important and successful thoroughbred yearling sale. The event, sponsored by the California Thoroughbred Breeders Association, will see 163 head of the finest young horses in the state go through the auction ring in Bing Crosby Hall on the nights of August 23 and 24. This event is free to the public and annually draws a capacity turnout.

Another "first" for Del Mar will be unique in racing. Arrangements have been made for San Diego's No. 1 disc jockey, popular **Ernie Myers**, to conduct his morning program daily from the track during the season. Myers will broadcast music as well as interview horsemen and fans from 6 a.m. to 10 a.m. "live" from the Radio Station KOGO booth right at trackside.

Another innovation at Del Mar will be the inclusion of the widely accepted Exacta form of wagering, to be held on the ninth race daily. In this wagering method, selectors try to pick the finish one-two, in that order. If successful, the rewards can be more than generous. The popular daily double will also be offered on the first and second races daily with a first post time of 2 p.m.

All in all, it appears Del Mar is headed for a smasher. The racing and riding talent will be second to none and excitement and fun seem assured at the vacationland for the racing fan.

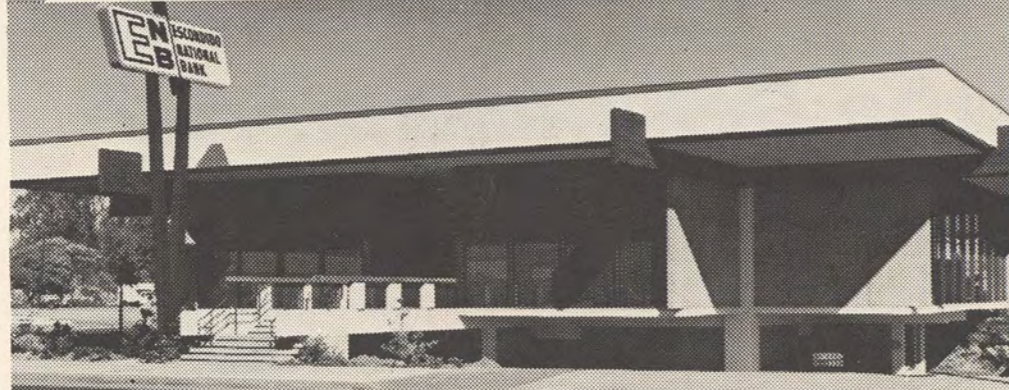

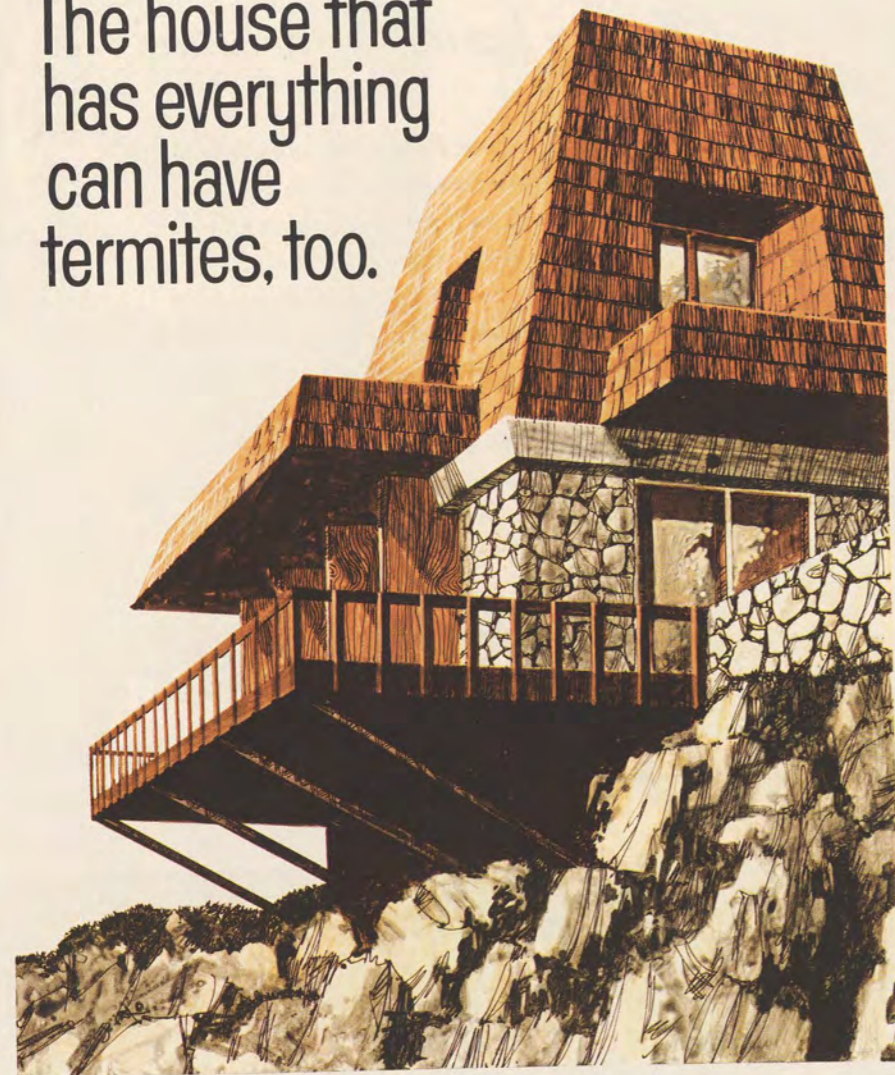

# YOU ARE INVITED TO GET ACQUAINTED

When Bill Cowling, Sr., established Dixie Lumber Company, now known as Dixieline Lumber Company, in San Diego in 1913, little did he suspect that it would some day house \$3/4 million in fine art.

Yet, that is exactly what happened May 15th and 16th when Dixieline's Valley Division yard in Escondido held its 1st Annual North County's Art Corner. Its theme was, "Fine Art in a Lumber Yard". Over 85 outstanding Southern California artists exhibited and sold their paintings and the response from the more than 9100 viewers was that it was one of, if not the finest art shows ever held in North County.

"The North County is growing not only in population but culturally as well, and we want to be a real part of it," stated C. C. Snyder, General Manager, in a recent interview. With this in mind, the art show idea was born.

An outstanding feature of the show was two masters recently brought to this country from Europe by Austin Deuel, owner of the Lake San Marcos Art Gallery. "THE CRUCIFIXION" by Sir Anthony Van Dyck was painted in 1630 and is valued at \$250,000 while "THE BEGGAR BOY", painted in 1780 by John Rising is valued at \$300,000. It is believed to be the only John Rising painting in the United States. Though Dutch, Rising is considered an English Master and has exhibited 91 paintings in England's Royal Academy of Art. "THE BEGGAR BOY" was featured in the Royal Academy during 1787 and was considered the No. 2 painting of the art world at that time.

The public will have an opportunity of again viewing these masters along with paintings by 100 outstanding artists at the 6th Annual Lake Marcos Invitational Art Exhibit, August 29th and 30th.

In 1945 Valley Lumber Co. was established in Escondido by the Garmon brothers, J. S. (Stuart) and W. A. (Bill). In November of 1969 Valley merged with Dixieline Lumber Company and Stuart's son, J. 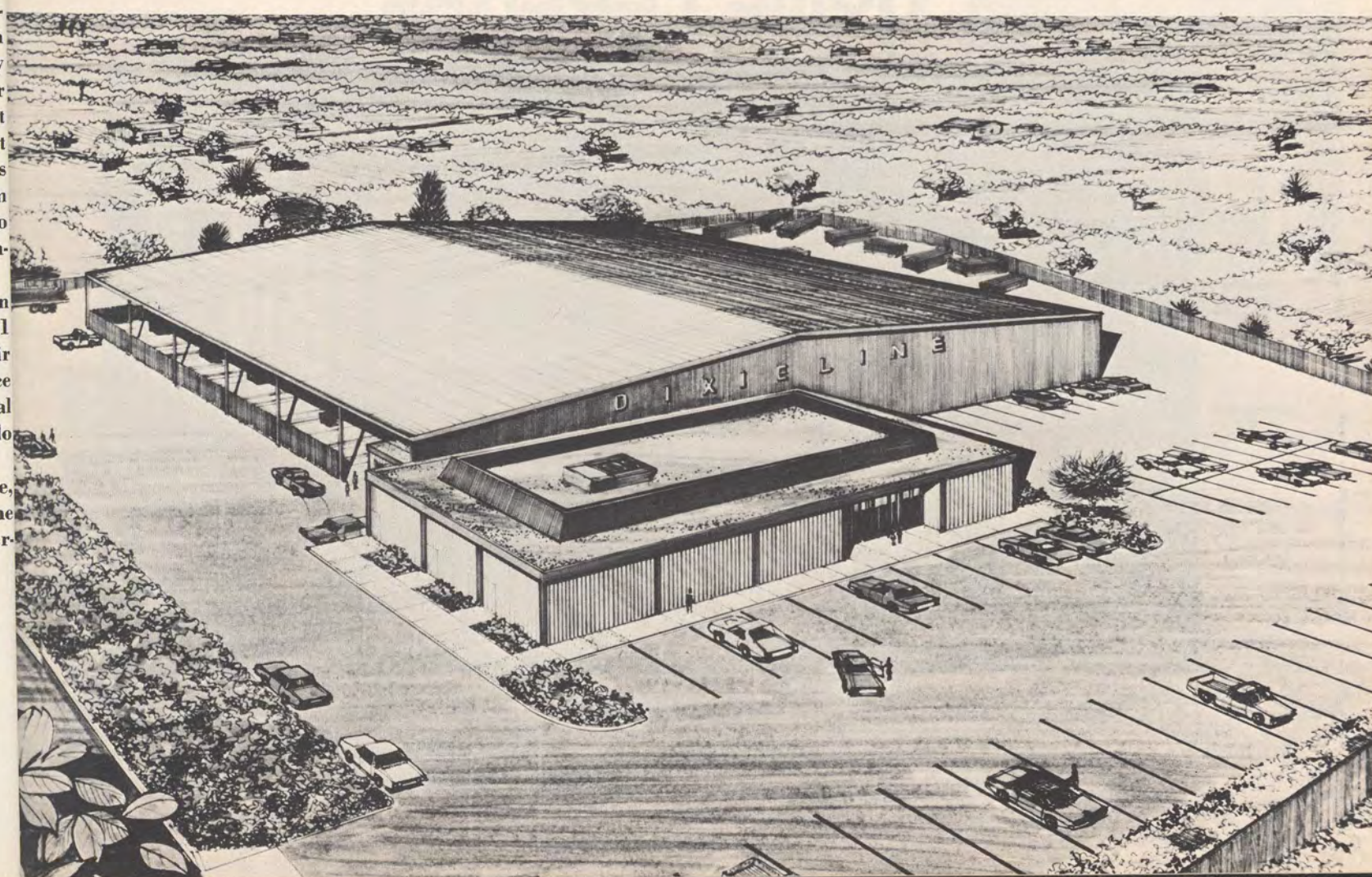

Set in a great valley, Escondido is almost completely surrounded by mountains. In the early 19th century, it was the grazing place for cattle of the padres of the Mission San Diego de Alcalá.

In 1843 the area was part of a 12,600 acre land grant made by the Mexican governor — the Rancho Rincon de Diablo (The Devil's Corner). About 1886 it was divided into farms and a townsite. Escondido was incorporated as a city a few years later.

Today the city's population is nearing 40,000, marking its emergence as a major center for business and industry in northern San Diego County.

The operating policy of The Inn is best stated by a new colorful card headed by the title "The Small Hotel."

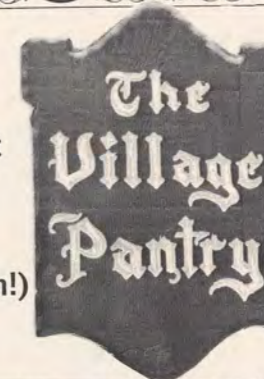

The life of any artist has always been difficult especially if you add the words "fine art" and "sculpture." One can teach in order to supplement an income, or one can produce pot-boilers, neither of which really enhances a creative endeavor. To work daytime at your chosen occupation and evenings at your chosen field may not be right for all artists, but in at least one case it works.

Gene Blome has been using it for years and has developed a groove . . . a groove which allows he and his wife Edna to enjoy the good life plus the personal satisfaction of producing sculptures of merit that are selling as fast as they are completed.

The hours that Gene puts in each day and night at the two occupations would confound most people. A person with less desire and stamina would not be equal to it. To say he does it all alone would be taking much credit away from his good wife, Edna, for she assists him closely in both businesses.

To be classified as a fine artist one must work in durable materials that withstand the test of time and be enjoyed for generations. The materials that Gene likes best are bronze and the hard hardwoods: Lignum vitae and Rosewood. Clay is also used and as pre-Columbian sculpture of Mexico shows—stands the test of time.

The tools of the trade are simple and unchanged. Clay modeling tools, wood carving tools, ruffles for shaping, sand paper for smoothing; add a couple of mallets and one has all he needs. Power tools are of no value in wood carving.

To produce a sculpture that "talks" is the thing. It's easy enough to sculpt a recognizable object or for that matter an unrecognizable object. Giving sculpture **voice, honesty, and merit** is where thoughtful planning and application of talent enters the picture.

Donal Hord, the great sculpture who lived here for many years, was instrumental in Gene's development. They worked closely together for five years

and without that kind of help Gene feels it would have been nearly impossible to obtain the abilities so essential for sculpture.

Over the years, Gene has placed sculpture in schools, churches, private collections, and recently at the River-edge Foundation in Calgary, Alberta. In addition to the sculptures shown here, pieces owned locally by Dolores Parker and Robert Young are worthy of mention.

Last year, Gene accepted a commission from the Copley Press to produce a large perpetual trophy and a smaller player trophy for all San Diego professional sports. The figures are cast in bronze by the A. J. Bayer Company of

Los Angeles. Each year the "MVP," Most Valuable Player, of each team will receive one and have his name added to the list of MVPs on the large one. To date, Len Ronson of the Gulls, Nate Colbert of the Padres, and Elvin Hayes of the Rockets has each received a trophy.

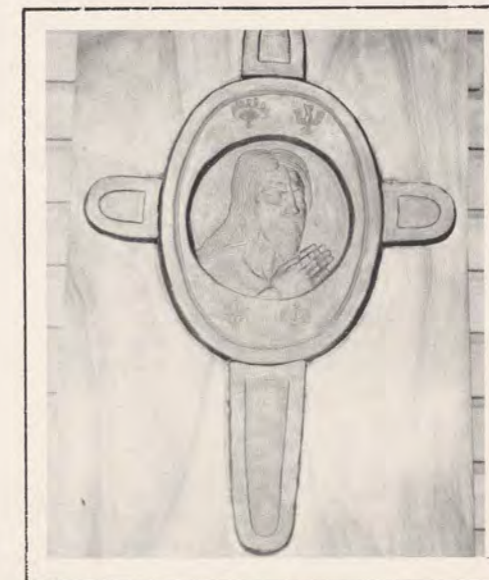
When someone approaches Gene about the acquisition of a sculpture, he will produce, to the best of his ability, what he feels the party wants . . . aligned with his style . . . and will accept payment only after the patron and he are satisfied. Enthusiastic satisfaction is usually the result of this approach. Gene has yet to produce his best effort—that will always come next.

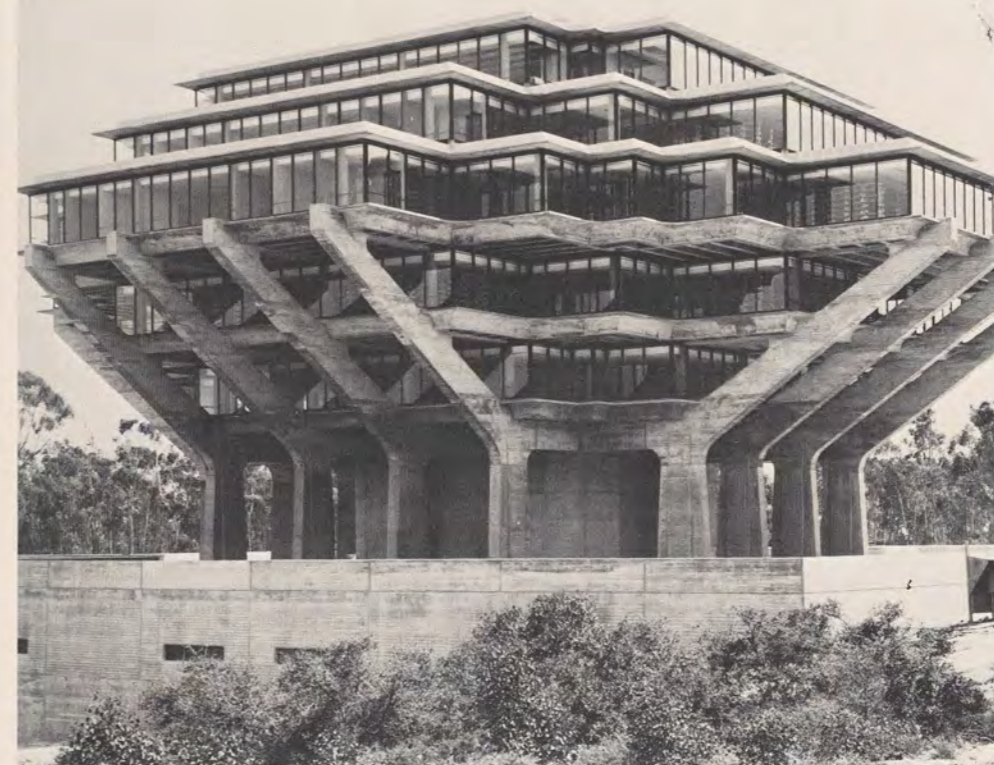

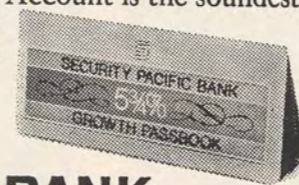

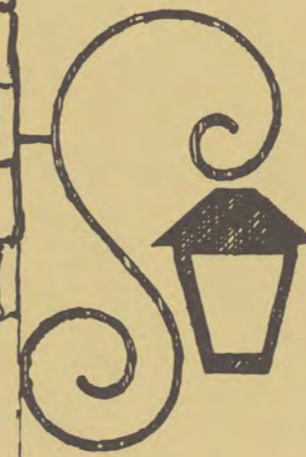

The reputation of the Oberammergau Passion Play remains for the unbiased visitor what this play has been in the past, a testimony to the words: "For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life." (John: 3, 16)

Once again Oberammergau prepared itself to fulfil the holy vow made by its forefathers during the terrible plague of 1663. The Passion and death of Jesus Christ was originally performed in a religious play by the village community for the village itself, and the surrounding areas. In the course of time the audiences came from farther afield. Men of creative genius devoted themselves to the Oberammergau Passion Play, and to this was added—particularly in recent times—growing fame. But this also

meant that here and there, sometimes quietly, sometimes loudly, voices were heard . . . demanding this or that for the play and its performance.

If one is an atheist, an agnostic or not a follower of Christian beliefs . . . they would still enjoy the magnificence of the performance. It is impeccable. The music is polished and quite grand. The cast . . . superb. It is unfortunate that some critics try to stir up cries of 'anti-semitic' in regard to a script that follows the most widely read book in the world.

Not all people believe in the bible . . . and for those that do believe . . . there is of course . . . a large degree of diversified interpretation. However, the Passion Play is just the story of what every Christian child studies in Sunday School. Truly . . . it has no other nuances.

Oberammergau presents the "Passion of Our Lord" on the

stage. "It was God's inscrutable decision as to when, where and how the redemption of mankind was to take place through Jesus Christ."

This plan selected that area which today . . . we call the Holy Land. The inhabitants of this land became participants in the trial of Jesus.

It is a sad commentary indeed . . . that certain critics in this country . . . can stir up feelings of resentment among a large segment of our population . . . that have no way to judge for themselves. Because of these few critics

. . . pressure has been brought to bear on all peoples connected with the production. I guess that in this age of so called . . . freedom of expression . . . if a stage production doesn't have the shock value of sex, violence, filthy language, et al . . . well, its just not 'Box Office'.



**Oberammergau**  
In the year 1633 when the black plague snatched away most of the inhabitants of the little mountain village the parish fathers, driven to desperation, took an oath that they would stage a performance of the Passion of Christ every ten years if the plague vanished. And the story goes that from this moment on the village was spared from the black death.

Already in the year 1634 the inhabitants of Ammergau fulfilled their oath. They kept their promise and performed the Passion Play every ten years right up until the present day.

The play depicts the story of Christ's Passion beginning with the entry into Jerusalem and ending with resurrection and transfiguration.

A performance lasts an entire day. It begins at 8:15 am and ends after 5 pm. The midday-break lasts two hours.

The text for the Passion Play was written between 1850 and 1860 by the parish priest Alois Daisenberger from Oberammergau. The Daisenberger version is the fourth largest text period in the 366 year history of the play. It has been somewhat abridged for 1970 and several passages have been improved. The construction of the play with its living pictures from the Old Testament and the acted scenes from the New Testament have been retained.

The music for the Passion Play was written in 1815 by the Oberammergau school teacher Rochus Dedler. Employing a large choir and orchestra his compositions still compass the entire play today.



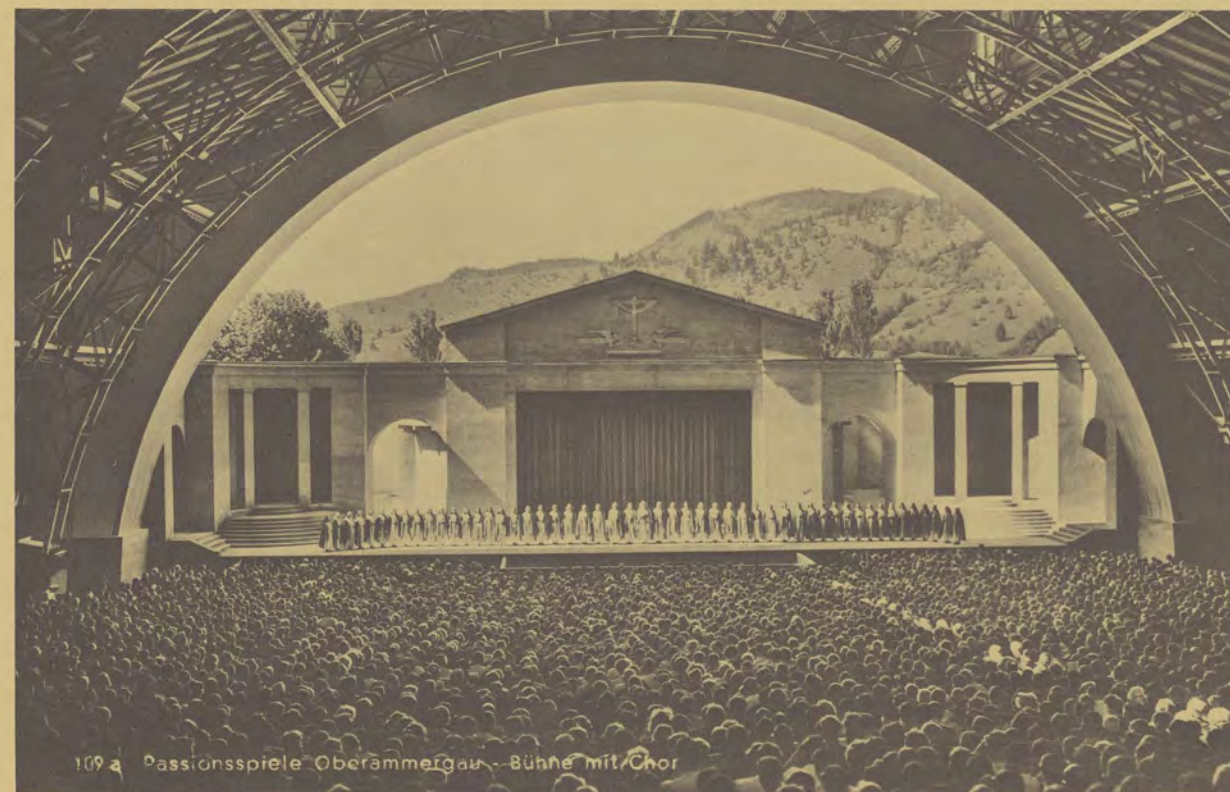

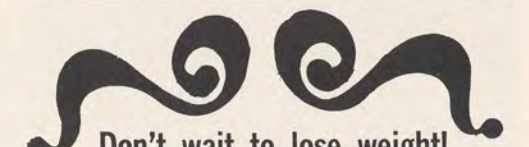

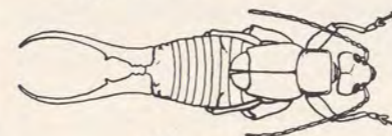

## Terminix Topics

JULY

"Bug of the Month"



Earwig

I have been receiving a number of queries regarding a peculiar looking insect that appears to have its pincers at the wrong end of its body (see illustration).

These insects are slender reddish brown and vary from 1/8" to 1" in length. These are "Earwigs" and there are several different species.

They are principally pests of gardens where they make nightly attacks on many kinds of plants, the damage they do is often blamed on slugs. When there is a large population they may become a household pest as they are omnivorous.

Control of these pests is an area problem, as when they are killed inside the house, others soon move in from outside.

Therefore treatment should be made to the entire garden, and when an acute problem exists, the residents of a number of adjoining properties would find it advantageous to join together in taking control measures.

## old globe THEATRE SCENE

## "Ukase To Destroy"

Many thousands of wild animals have been cruelly and needlessly destroyed in San Diego County, in the past several years particularly.

The steel-jawed traps set for the coyotes, foxes, bobcats, opossums, badgers have made no distinction as to many dozens of dogs who have been caught in these devilish contraptions.

In the past 12 months the trapping has been intensified the County Health Director basing the "Ukase to Destroy" on the death of a small boy in Lakeside area. The boy was given massive doses of anti-rabies vaccine went into a coma and had lain in this condition for 127 days before he died. It was the first (unsubstantiated) case of human rabies in 26 years.

Although most people doubt the claim of death from rabies, the wildlife has paid dearly. The really tragic part is that a sick animal (rabid or otherwise) does not fall into a trap because it lacks interest in food. Consequently, our wild life has been decimated, healthy animals the victims,

dying in traps after many agonizing hours. Fear, starvation, or the man with the gun, free these innocent creatures.

Through the spring months many young animals have died of starvation after their mothers have been trapped and killed.

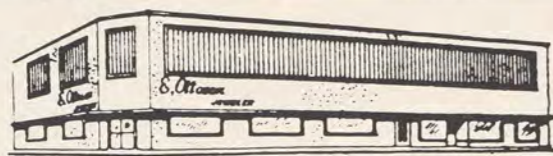
After pressure from organizations thousands of private citizens, as well as from a number of noted conservationists, the Board of Supervisors ordered the trapping stopped. The \$71,000 annual expense for trapping was reduced. There are still THREE trappers going about their grim business. One is paid by the State, two others by the Federal Government.

Only a week ago a scientist connected with research on trapping admitted that all these animals have been trapped needlessly; they are **not** the ones responsible for rabies! Checks of the trapped animals revealed that no rabies has been found.

Rancho Santa Fe residents have signed 121 petitions to the Board of Supervisors requesting that the extermination of our wild life be stopped.

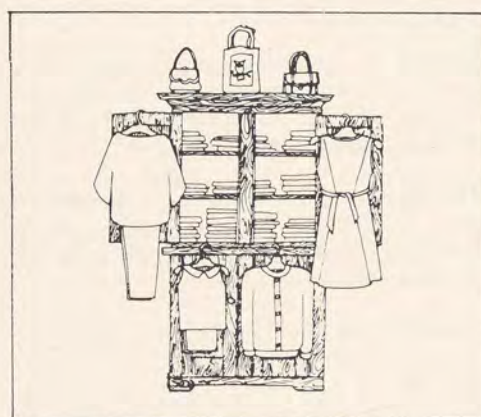

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the Rancho Santa Fe Association strongly endorses Proposition 7 as necessary to protect the welfare of all Californians and does hereby urge all citizens of the State to join in casting a "YES" vote for Proposition 7.

## Y.M.C.A. "How to Study and Stay in College" Course

Rollie Ayers, Executive Director of the local North Coast Family Y.M.C.A. which serves the Tri City and San Dieguito Communities, announced this week that Dean James Blackwell, Professor of Industrial Relations at Purdue University, will be the lecturer for the "How To Study and Stay in College" course being offered by the Y.M.C.A. from July 6th to 10th at Cal Western University-Boney Hall.

Designed specifically for high school graduates about to enter college, the five evening course has been hailed nationally as a way of helping to meet the growing college drop out problem. The five lecture series aids new students in coping with the social and academic pressures to today's rigorous campus life. Last summer's course was termed an unqualified success by the 200 students in San Diego County who took it.

While the course answers many individual questions of college-bound youth, it also covers such specific items as the art of listening, how to take lecture notes in the college classroom, motivation for maximum college performance, how people learn, planning and maintaining a study schedule, preparing for and taking examinations and what students must know about each course and instructor.

Ayers stated that over 25,000 high school seniors have taken this course since it was developed some twelve years ago. According to Ayers, 50 Y.M.C.A.'s across the nation have adopted this program as a regular part of their service to the community.

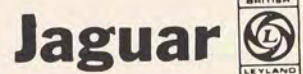

### FROM THE OFFICE OF ASSEMBLYMAN JOHN STULL

#### The Missing Voters

Since the primary election June 2, there has been a lot of speculation as to why more Californians didn't vote. The explanations range from the fact that the ballots were extra long with a lot of unknown names to the idea that the top results of both major tickets were considered a foregone conclusion. Whatever the reasons, the interest in the election was not in any way proportionate to its importance. As a curtain raiser for the fall, it was not reassuring either from the number of citizens who voted or from the disastrous way in which the votes cast were counted in many areas.

Last fall, a UCSD student told me that she thought citizens should be forced to participate in their government. I cannot subscribe to this force concept, but the fact remains that citizen-interest is what glues our form of government together. There can be no doubt that the price for full freedom is a sense of full responsibility and that as a nation and state, we all lose if this is eroded.

This fall, California has a choice between two men for Governor whose philosophies are diametrically opposed; two men for United States Senator whose whole approach to government is radically different; and a choice in the State Assembly and Senate that will decide how California is reapportioned. It is difficult to conceive of a more important election and, for all our sakes, I hope no details will obscure what is at stake and that we, here in this area, can lead the state in challenge met.

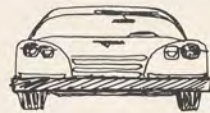

### Village Church Session Dinner

June 8 Event for Past and Present Session Members and Wives Proves A High Point in Church Activity.

More than a decade of spiritual and physical growth in the life of the Village Community Presbyterian Church was reviewed at a potluck dinner in Friendship Hall at the church on June 8. On the happy occasion, all past members of the Church Session and their spouses were the invited guests of current Session members and their wives or husbands.

Approximately 80 attended the affair, initiated and developed by the Rev. Donald R. Caughey, Village Church minister. Wives of the ruling elders of the church, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Eugene B. Fletcher, prepared and served the excellent dinner.

Rev. Caughey, serving as toastmaster for the program following dinner music rendered by U.C.S.D. students Miss Mary Abel and Miss Susan Tanner, welcomed all of those present, and called upon Dr. Herbert Willy Meyer, first Clerk of Session of the church to speak about the formation and early progress of the Village Church.

Dr. Meyer noted that he was one of three members of the original Session of the church present, the others being R. Victor Venberg and Richard R. Pharr. He reminisced about the early services of the struggling young church in the Garden Club quarters, and about the raising of funds for and building of the present church plant, which was opened for its first service on October 11, 1959. Dr. Meyer mentioned the names of those who had served on the committee to build the church, and pointed out that vital as the new church was to the needs of the adult community of Rancho Santa Fe and environs, it was even more indispensable to the guidance and welfare of the youth of the community. He also mentioned the church manse, given to the church by Mr. and Mrs. Arthur R. Lindburg.



With a series of projected charts, Rev. Caughey then dramatized the progress of the church in several areas of activity: membership, church school membership, income and budgeted expenditures. After making the point that the increase in projected population of Rancho Santa Fe during the years directly ahead suggests strongly that present church facilities, now being fully employed and in some respects being taxed severely, will need to be expanded in accordance with a realistic program of development to meet the needs of the community.

To illustrate his point concerning the constant and sometimes overlapping uses of present church facilities, Rev. Caughey enumerated the multitude of functions now conducted regularly in the Church School area. In this connection, he announced that the summer Child Assistance Program for Mexican-American pre-school children and their mothers, from the Eden Gardens area west of Rancho Santa Fe, will be the newest group to be given the use of the church's Christian Education facilities.

The Rev. James C. Murray, assistant minister for Christian Education, then reported on the youth program he has developed since his call to the Village Church last November.

### Carlsbad Summer Recreation Program

An exciting and diversified summer recreation program is being planned by the City of Carlsbad. The plan, which has been conceived, and will be administered by the North Coast Family Y.M.C.A., will include four separate activities.

Starting July 13th, a school playground recreation program will be held at all four elementary schools in Carlsbad. The hours will be 1 p.m. through 5 p.m., each Monday through Friday. This program will include sports, games, crafts, tournaments, special events, and other activities for both girls and boys. This activity will run for eight weeks.

A series of Saturday Matinee Movies will be held starting July 18th. A Walt Disney movie will be shown at 10:00 a.m. at Buena Vista School, and will be shown again the same day at Jefferson School. This will be free to school children from Carlsbad.

Four days of special outings at the Y.M.C.A. Aquatic Park in Carlsbad will be held during the week of July 20th through 24th. Each day 40 girls and boys who have signed up at the playgrounds will have a fun-filled afternoon of sailing, swimming, boating, fishing, and other aquatic activities. There is no cost for this activity to Carlsbad girls and boys.

A field trip will be held each Wednesday for seven weeks. Children will need to sign up in advance for each trip at the playground. There will be a nominal fee of 25c for each trip. Trips will include the Zoo, Scripps Aquarium, Mission Bay, Torrey Pines, Natural History Museum, Naval Station and many others.

Experienced college students from the City of Carlsbad will be hired to be playground Directors at each of the schools. High School students will work with them as Assistant Directors. High school students who are interested in helping others and working with children are invited to call the Y.M.C.A. at 753-6536 and apply for a position as Assistant Director.

It's a deep love I can't explain.

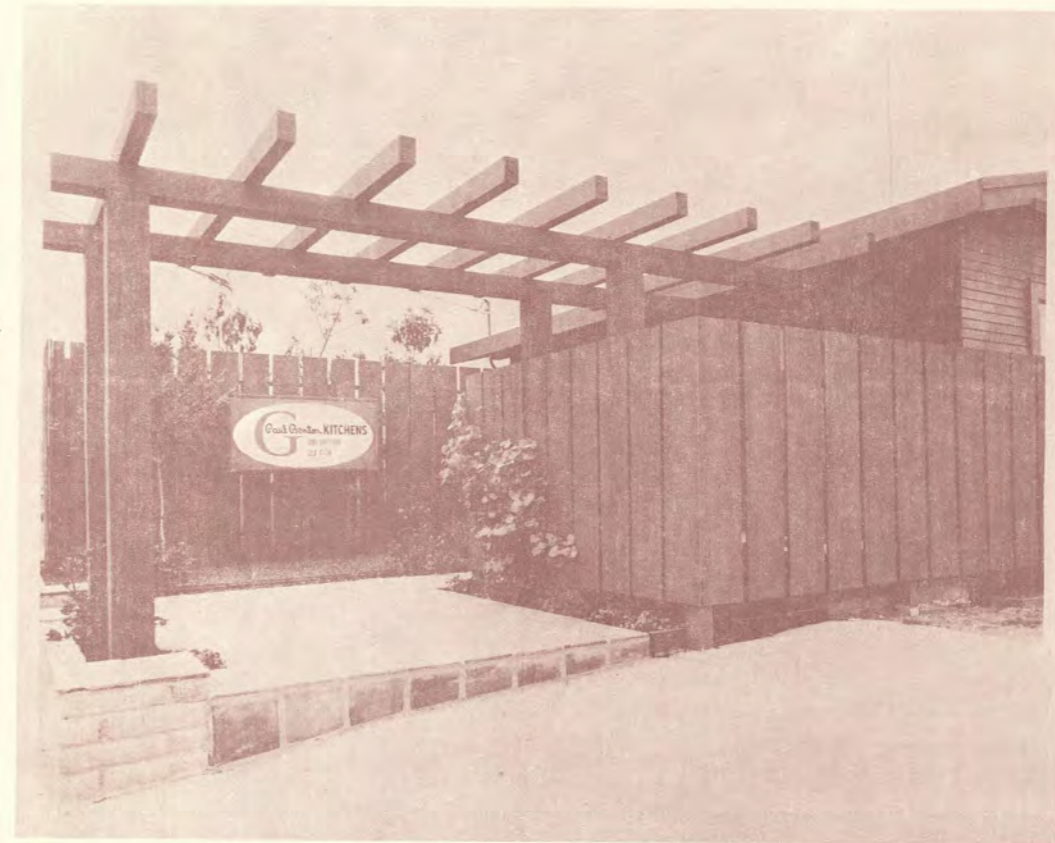
