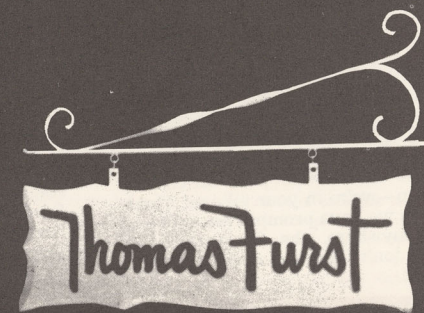

## Christmas Tree Festival To Be Held in Garden Club Saturday, Dec. 3; Sponsored by Women's Council Of Village Church

Except for those few who have already "shopped and sealed" early for Christmas, surely the most Christmas-minded people on the Ranch this October must be those preparing for the Christmas Tree Festival on December 3rd. Under the overall guidance of Mrs. Hardy H. Kent, the festival will be held in the Garden Club this year and the sponsoring Women's Council of the Village Church is anticipating a festival of Christmas loveliness with assistance and support of a multitude of volunteers. Already hard at work pre-planning the event are Mrs. Kent's chairmen, Mmes. Howard Will, workshop; Alanson D. Prentiss, sleigh; Roy Anderson, gourmet; Richard Pharr and William Jack, tea table; Dorothy Patton, treasurer for the day; Edward Dacus, general treasurer; Warren LaBarr, coffee hostesses; T. W. Brotherton, toys, John M. Wilson, money tree; L. B. McLaughlin, festival hostess; Yager Cantwell, opening event and David Van Evera, publicity. A men's committee, headed by Jack Lewis Powell, will aid the women in preparing the Garden Club on Dec. 2 and will assist with the tickets the following day at the festival.

Each Wednesday for the past several months Mrs. Will's workshop in Fellowship Hall at the Village Church has been humming with Santa's helpers. In an atmosphere of the old-fashioned "sewing bee," volunteers arrive at 10:00 A.M. toting sack lunches and busy fingers begin to fly on the projects in production, creating items to stagger the imagination of the non-creative mind. Snowflakes, butterflies and angels, waste baskets, Christmas trees, wise men, aprons, basket "tote bags," and covered apple baskets—all beautifully created and assembled through processes of gluing, cutting, sewing, molding and embroidering. Mrs. Will reported a production of "sleeves," made by covering cardboard with brocade, but so far has been unable to apply this handiwork to a "project." Any ideas, anyone?

In spite of all that has been accomplished, and with only six weeks remaining until festival time, much work remains to be done. Volunteers are still requested to help and would be most welcome. Both "thinkers" and "doers" are invited and no special talents—except enthusiasm and interest—are needed. Mrs. Kent, general chairman, is always present at the workshop on Wednesdays and willing to share her beautiful needlework talents with anyone who desires instruction while creating embroidery work for projects such as the "tote bags" and laundry bags. The senior high group of the Village Church has been very helpful in assisting in the workshop and many of them have continued working on special projects on Saturdays since

school started. Kathy Lewis' work on the butterflies has been outstanding. With glitter, glue and covered wires, Kathy has transformed her materials into truly beautiful figures for Christmas trees or mobiles.

Besides volunteers, project ideas are requested and details of how the project can be made or accomplished should accompany the idea to the Workshop. Also, Christmas materials are needed and your donation of a little silver "dee-do" or a golden "trinket" may be just what is needed to complete or begin another project. These may be delivered to the office of the Village Church at any time or to the Workshop on Wednesdays between 10 and 2. Finally, ladies are needed for sewing at home and for those of you who would enjoy working in this way, please call Mrs. Will.

While the Workshop hums along on Wednesdays, the "sleigh" committee is soliciting and collecting small items in hopes of overflowing the sleigh on Festival Day. Each year the sleigh, which is donated by an antique shop for the occasion, has proven to be one of the popular highlights of the day and is eagerly anticipated by adults and children from all over the county. All sorts of donations to the sleigh are requested, ranging from toys and books to sink faucets and spark plugs. With over 600 items needed to fill the sleigh, everyone's support is needed. It is requested, however, that items be either new or "like new" and of a nature to please and surprise the recipient who donates \$1.00 for the "grab-bag" present.

The sleigh chairman, Mrs. Alanson D. Prentiss, will be collecting all items at her home on Mimosa and requests that donations be delivered now and through November in order that the wrapping committee can have them delivered on time. Should you be unable to provide transportation for your donation, please call Mrs. Prentiss and she will be most pleased to see that any items are picked up.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE  
BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE RANCHO SANTA  
FE ASSOCIATION HELD ON FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER  
2, 1966 at 9:00 A. M. IN BOARD ROOM.

PRESENT: President Blackman, Vice President  
McLaughlin, Directors Lasswell, Lewis, Millard,  
Teagle and Thieme.

ALSO PRESENT: Association members J. E. Kowal-  
ski and Cecil Johns; non-Association member Bruce  
Dillon, representing Rancho Santa Fe Times; also  
Secretary Van Exera, Building Commissioner War-  
ren and Assistant Secretary Allen.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING:

The minutes of the meeting of August 19, 1966,  
were approved, as presented.

SPECIAL ORDER OF BUSINESS:

Appeal of requirement to underground utilities.  
Mr. Cecil Johns, owner of portion of Lot 22, Block  
36, El Arco Iris, appeared before the Board in  
connection with his written appeal from the Board's  
action of June 22 in denying a waiver of the re-  
quirement to underground utilities on his property.  
The Secretary outlined the matter and a discussion  
followed. After an inspection of the property it  
was the decision to confirm the Board's action of  
June 22, 1966 in denying the request for waiver  
of underground utilities at this property.

Revision of Keeping of Animals Regulations. It  
was the decision, after discussion, that this matter  
be deferred, to be reviewed at a joint meeting of  
the Art Jury and the Board of Directors.

These matters were deferred for review at a joint  
meeting of the Art Jury and the Board of Directors.

6, Block 5, Via de Fortuna, consisting of 13.6,  
+/- gross acres, into two (2) sites of 8.4 and  
5.0 net acres, +/- APPROVED.

DIRECTORS' REPORTS:

Mr. McLaughlin, Finance Committee Chairman.  
There was a discussion of proposed capital expendi-  
tures for the 1966-67 fiscal year.

There was a discussion of delinquent accounts. It  
was moved, seconded, and carried that when any  
person becomes more than sixty (60) days delin-  
quent in the payment of a bill from the Associa-

tion, after having been given and received proper  
notice, his name shall automatically be posted on  
the Golf Shop bulletin board and Post Office bul-  
letin board and his privileges shall be suspended  
fifteen (15) days after such date unless payment  
is made in full.

Mr. McLaughlin presented the auditor's annual  
report. After discussion it was moved, seconded,  
and carried to accept the report as presented.

Mr. Lewis, Golf Committee Chairman, submitted  
estimates for cleaning, painting and carpeting the  
Clubhouse. It was moved, seconded, and carried  
to authorize an expenditure of \$4500 for refurbish-  
ing the Clubhouse.

Mr. Lewis presented the golf playing figures, as  
follows:

Resident—202

Non-Resident—108 311 (total)

Mr. Millard, Board representative for the Parks  
and Recreation Board, reported on the August 30  
meeting of the Parks and Recreation Board. He  
reminded the Board of Directors that there are  
twenty-eight miles of bridle trails on the Ranch;  
these are not connected in some locations. There  
are currently 107 families availing themselves of  
tennis playing privileges. There are forty-seven  
acres of parks in Rancho Santa Fe. He stated the  
next meeting of the Parks & Recreation Board  
will be a field trip to inspect these parks and some  
of the bridle trails.

It was the recommendation of the Parks and  
Recreation Board that the Association establish  
a permanent reward offer of \$100 for information  
leading to the arrest or conviction of persons  
committing vandalism to any Association property.  
After discussion, the recommendation was referred  
to Mr. Thieme for investigation and advice.

Mr. Millard advised that the Parks & Recreation  
Board wished to go on record as being opposed to

decision that \$750 be replaced in the maintenance

Mr. Teagle, Planning Commission Chairman,  
reported the progress of the grading project being  
done in conjunction with the Rancho Santa Fe  
Elementary School. He enumerated the additional  
costs to be anticipated. It was moved, seconded,  
and carried to approve a total expenditure of not  
to exceed \$15,000 to complete the grading and  
paving incidentals of the new parking lot.



#### SECRETARY'S REPORT:

Proposed Fiscal Policies. There was a discussion of fiscal policies and the Secretary presented an outline adapted from "Article VI: Department of Finance; Model City Charter" by the National Municipal League, New York, N.Y. It was the decision to study the matter prior to reaching any decision in setting specific fiscal policies.

Status of Petition to Amend Covenant. The Secretary advised the Board that a petition to amend the Covenant filed by Mr. Joe Wickstrom, owner of portion of Lot 1, Block 48, Map 1742, Puerta del Sol, and considered by the Board on July 15, 1966, had been withdrawn in writing by the petitioner.

#### RECESS AND ADJOURNMENT:

The Board recessed at 11:55 A. M. for a field trip to inspect properties, and adjourned at 12:40 P. M.

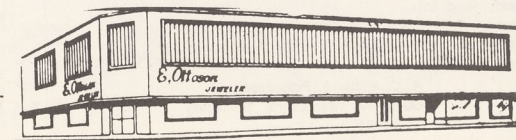
Mr. Teagle, Planning Commission Chairman, reported on the grading project adjacent to the Association offices currently under way.

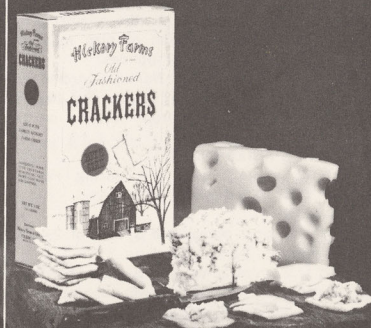

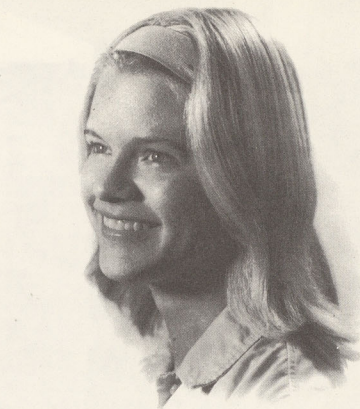
Misses Peggy Suydam and Mary Courtney Suydam served as bridesmaids and Miss Taylor Renfrew performed the duties of flower girl.

# Rancho Santa Fe Elementary School Begins a New School Year

R. Roger Rowe is commencing his ninth year of service with the Rancho Santa Fe School District having started as a classroom teacher in the Fall of 1958. Successive promotions from Vice-Principal to Principal were followed by appointment to the Superintendency in September of 1964.

Rowe was graduated from the University of Missouri in 1952. Here, in addition to earning the Bachelor's Degree, he married Jane, a graduate of Stevens.

Immediate duty as a Naval officer followed, including three years aboard a Pearl Harbor based destroyer. Continuing his association with the Navy Reserve, Roger has since risen to the grade of LCDR and billets as Engineering Operations and Executive Officer aboard various Pacific Fleet units. Recall to active duty during the 1961-62 school year included another (his fourth) seven month tour of duty in the Western Pacific.

Following Navy life the Rowe's returned to the midwest where Janet was born in January of 1956. While Roger was teaching in Kansas City Schools he completed work for the MA at the University of Missouri at Kansas City.

A years teaching at Coronado preceded the Rowe's move to the Ranch where two sons, Carl and Steven, have joined the family which moved some four years ago to the present home on Via de Fortuna.

**MRS. GENEVA PIERCE**  
Kindergarten

My first "yen" at the age of five was to be a nurse, mainly because of the glamour of wearing a white uniform. This desire changed, however, at the age of six when I entered first grade. I fell in love with school. I decided that one day I was going to become a teacher. This goal I kept in mind while completing the eight elementary grades in Escondido. The urge to become a teacher became increasingly stronger as I hurried through Escondido High School in three years rather than four. As I entered Palomar College in 1950, I had pretty well decided I would prefer teaching in the primary grades. It wasn't until I began observing and student teaching at San Diego State College that I began to focus upon the charm, sincerity and industriousness of the five-year-old. Since that time I have been studying the five-year-old as a science.

My first day as Miss Rose "kindergarten teacher," was one I shall never forget. It was a beautiful, sunny September 10, 1954 in a "kindergarten" classroom in Escondido. My age group for my one class per day schedule was the four and a half to five year olds. It seemed to me that morning that each child as he filed past my desk either screamed and jumped into his mother's arms or began cavorting through the room, something like a mountain goat. Half a dozen little ones cried and wailed throughout the morning and only one ran away. This was really a learning situation; more for me, though, than for the children.

I continued to learn more about the intricacies of the five-year-old for the next three years. By this time I had become Mrs. Pierce and left the field of teaching for three years to acquire two little Pierces.

In 1961 I began teaching kindergarten again; this time in Poway with two classes per day of 30 children each session. It was here that I learned much about the "Language Approach to Reading," and began to employ some of the same techniques in my kindergarten classroom. But when the greener fields of teaching one small

class of kindergarten each day began to beckon from Rancho Santa Fe, I began to feel that four years of two classes per day was just about enough. So in 1965, I joined the staff at Rancho Santa Fe and met the most marvelous group of five-year-olds I have ever known. This year's crop seems to be equally as grand. If they had not been much different than that first class of 1954, perhaps by now I would have decided to change my profession to the white uniform and noiseless shoes. Half a dozen little ones cried and wailed throughout the morning and only one ran away. This was really a learning situation; more for me, though, than for the children.

I continued to learn more about the intricacies of the five-year-old for the next three years. By this time I had become Mrs. Pierce and left the field of teaching for three years to acquire two little Pierces.

In 1961 I began teaching kindergarten again; this time in Poway with two classes per day of 30 children each session. It was here that I learned much about the "Language Approach to Reading," and began to employ some of the same techniques in my kindergarten classroom. After teaching for several years, Carrie joined the Navy to see the world by marrying Leroy Taylor who rose to the grade of Captain, USN.

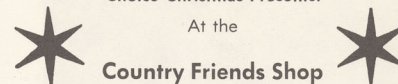

Know one language and you know one world: know many languages and you know many worlds—this is the basic philosophy of Mrs. Nancy Martin, the Spanish Specialist at Rancho Santa Fe Elementary School.

In my leisure time I enjoy water skiing and dancing. I like to travel, and plan to spend next summer seeing the United States.

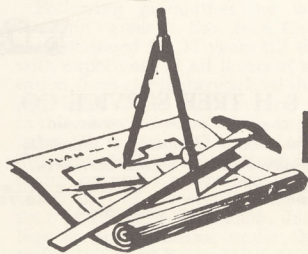

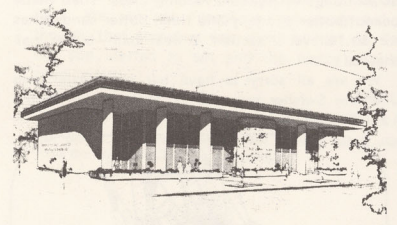
