JUNE ELECTION

Four Ranch Men Nominated For Board of Directors Post

Four ranch residents have been nominated for the board of directors by a nominating committee appointed by the board, composed of Ward Miller, Carl Croft and Charles Chapin, and their names have been posted on the Association bulletin board.

The nominees are Thomas P. Faulconer, Francis J. Hoyme, Sidney R. Jandorf and Howard S. Whiffen, two of whom will be elected to fill the places to be vacated by Harry W. Booth Jr., president of the board and Stanford J. Tompkins.

The election is scheduled for June 8 in the association office and all association members are privileged to vote. Absentee ballots are available to Ranch residents unable to be here at that time.

Since association members will participate in the election, the Bulletin is printing a resume of the backgrounds of the four men. For while they may be known socially by many Ranchites, their eminent qualifications for the position may not be generally familiar.

**Francis J. Hoyme**

A fourth generation Chicagoan, Mr. Hoyme was born May 7, 1905. He attended schools in Chicago and the Lewis Institute, Illinois Technical school and Armour Institute, the three now combined into Illinois Institute of Technology.

Mr. Hoyme worked as a civil engineer on underground tunnels, road paving, bridge and building construction projects until 1930, and engaged in sales work for the Peabody Coal company from 1930-42. From 1942 until his retirement in November, 1956, Mr. Hoyme was corporate officer, vice president, director and sales executive of the Peabody company.

Mr. Hoyme married in 1927 and he has one daughter, Jeanie, Mrs. Thomas Lister. He and Mrs. Hoyme lived in the Village of Flossmoor, Ill., a suburb of Chicago for 24 years, where Mr. Hoyme served on the Village board for one term.

He was a member of the Flossmoor Country club, Union League club of Chicago and other social clubs affiliated with the coal and railroad industries. Al-

so, Mr. Hoyme was actively associated with a number of civic and charitable organizations such as Chicago Community Fund, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, American Red Cross, Cancer Fund, Y.W.C.A., and Junior Achievement.

**Sidney Ralph Jandorf**

Mr. Jandorf claims New York City as his birthplace, born there October 1, 1893. He received his law degree in 1915 from Cornell University, where he was a member of Alpha Tau Omega, Delta Phi, honorary law fraternity, and the senior society, Quill and Dagger.

Mr. Jandorf never practiced law but instead went into the automobile business with his father, Louis Charles Jandorf, the two having an agency in New York. Later, he opened an agency in Elizabeth, N. J., and another one in East Orange, N. J.

Mildred Huston Vickerman of New York City and Mr. Jandorf were married in 1935. They have no children but their gray poodle, Mimi, has a place in their affections.

Mr. Jandorf served as a Navy lieutenant during World War I and was with Naval Intelligence in World War II, in charge of the counter espionage section in London.

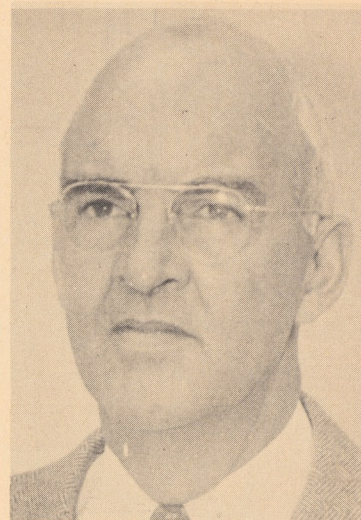
He retired in the fall of 1954, he and Mrs. Jandorf driving to the West coast to "look around." Santa Barbara and Rancho Santa Fe attracted them most with the Ranch given preference when the Pontiac agency in Oceanside became available (Mr. Jandorf by this time having decided retirement was not for him). They returned east and sold their home in Springfield, N. J., where Mr. Jandorf still retains his membership in the Baltusrol Golf club, and settled in Rancho Santa Fe in 1955. They built an attractive contemporary home with a slight touch of the Oriental.

**Howard S. Whiffen**

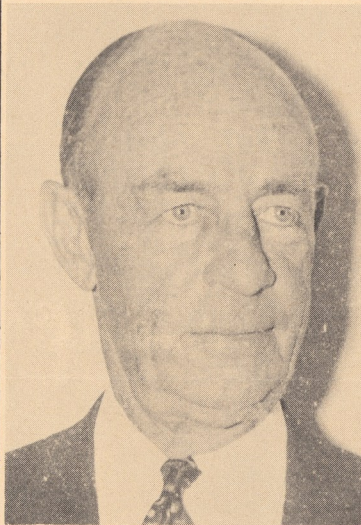
Flint, Mich., is the birthplace of Mr. Whiffen, who received his early education there before coming to Los Angeles, where he became associated with the National Cash Register company in 1916. He was in Los Angeles, except for a short term in the

Navy, until 1943, at that time accepting the position as North Eastern division manager for the company. He and his wife, the former Amy Cornell of Wichita, Kan., whom he married in 1917, lived in New York City for 11 years before returning to Los Angeles in 1954, where he served as branch manager of the Na-

tional Cash Register company. In June, 1957, the Whiffens acquired a residence on the Ranch and Mr. Whiffen retired in December of the same year, stating that the opportunity for gracious living offered by the Ranch was a strong influence in setting the date for retirement.

BOARD MEETING

At the April 17 meeting of the board of directors of the Rancho Santa Fe association, Vice President William Weddell appointed directors B. F. Jenkins, chairman of the planning committee, and David B. Dewey as a committee of two to meet with Santa Fe Irrigation board.

Purpose of the committee is to discuss with the irrigation board land use and possible restrictions of the 850 acres which lie between Rancho Santa Fe and Solana Beach.

The board approved the application for "keeping of animals" by Don L. Reynertson, the facilities for housing and feeding having been approved by the Art Jury.

It was voted that President Harry W. Booth Jr., and Secretary William Smart be authorized to sign covenant acceptance of Roger M. and JoAnn Ketron of portion of lot 3, block 6.

The recommendations of the Parks and Recreation board were accepted.

Edward Dobroth and attorney, H. C. Schulze discussed with the board the proposed amendment submitted by Title Insurance and Trust company to change the number of building sites from six to 14 on lot 5, block 10. No action was taken.

Action was deferred on the subdivision applications of:

Gordon Kern of portion of lot 4, block 47. Letha E. Sober of portion of lot 2, block 20.

Action was deferred on the lot realignment application of William Drew between lots 2 and 7, block 47.

Attorney Howard B. Clayton reported on legal matters of the association.

Secretary Smart presented the financial statement for March, 1959; the progress report in regard to delinquent assessments of association members, and the landscaping subcommittee's report.

By a resolution, the board of directors at the April 3 meeting ordered the revised by-laws of the association be adopted and printed. Copies will be available in the near future and any association members wishing a copy may apply at the association office.

Secretary Smart was directed to make a written demand for payment of each amount due on

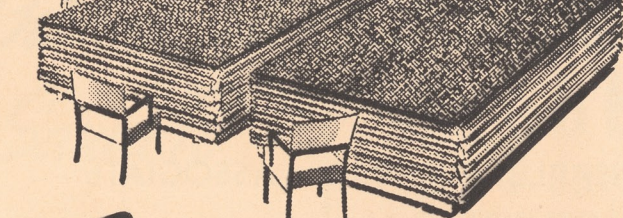

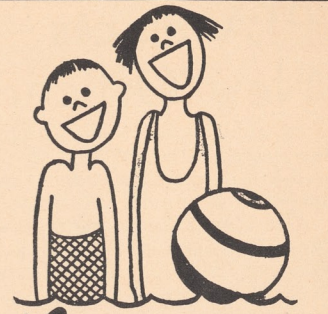

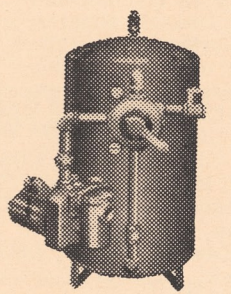

### Fire Hazards in the Home Should be Found, Eliminated

How many fire hazards are there in your home?

"Not many people can answer that question fully," says Fire Chief Jim Fox. "But more people are living with one or more of the conditions that cause fires — they cause more than half - million home fires every year in the United States, according to National Fire Protection Association records."

Surest way to get rid of these dangerous conditions, says the Chief, is a fire department inspection of your home. A fireman knows where fires start and what breeds them, he points out.

Some of the hazards are defective wiring, improper fuses, frayed extension cords, or extension cords under rugs. Rubbish that piles up in closets, attics, basements and yards can be treacherous. Paint and flammable liquids carelessly stored may start a fire.

Other causes of fire that kill

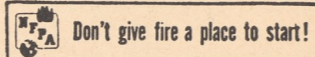
some 6000 people in their homes every year include defective chimneys and heating and cooking equipment, ignorance about the use of cleaning fluids.

Careless smoking and bad habits with matches are at the very top of the list.

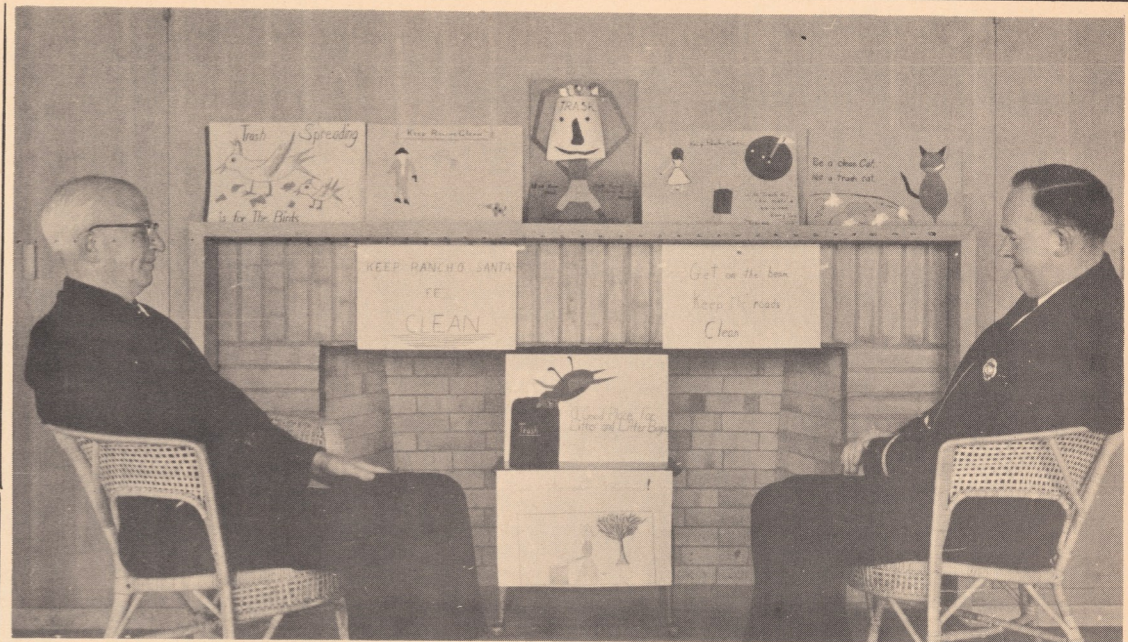

Cancer Center Negotiates With SFID Board for Site

At a recent meeting of the Santa Fe Irrigation district board negotiations for a 100-acre site, somewhere between Rancho Santa Fe and Solana Beach, for a hospital were initiated.

A spokesman said that plans for the hospital called for it to become the leading cancer treatment clinic in the United States.

The Southern California Cancer Center is interested in establishing such a hospital here, directors were told by William L. Kaye of Sunnymead, who is a land developer but was present as an agent for the cancer group.

Research in addition to treatment would be conducted at the center which would include a main building, circular in shape, with wings devoted to specific operations including use of a 2½-million voltage radiation treatment device and there would be 35 individual cottages for patients. Additional space would be needed to house the large staff, he pointed out.

Earlier in the meeting the board had scheduled opening of bids on 100 acres near Monticillo but there was no bids. Directors agreed that they were free to sell this tract to the cancer agency at the \$2000 per acre minimum, provided it proved suitable; or in view of the project's non-profit nature, to negotiate for sale of other lands among the 700 acres soon to be offered at auction.

Mr. Kaye was to view the property later. He also expressed interest, as an individual, in acquiring and developing the entire 700 acres. One other group of developers with a similar objective, was invited to meet with the board. This group proposed

the establishment of subdivision and building standards which SFID might possibly incorporate in its brochure in connection with the sale.

The SFID board rejected with little ceremony the petition of the 22nd District Agricultural association for annexation to the district of about 50 acres including much of the stable area in the fairgrounds. Directors said the district's water supply was not great enough to supply the fairgrounds, but indicated that five acres on the north side of Border road might be annexed to close a "window" in district boundaries. They said the inclusion fee of \$10,000 proposed by the fair association was "ridiculous."

The board agreed to sell at \$3000 per acre up to 3½ acres in Eden Gardens to the Apostolic church as a new church site. No action was taken pending consultation of the County Planning department.

When no one bid on the 100 acres up for sale, Frank Gilloon, a property owner, asked whether real estate brokers had been notified of the commission policy of the district. He was told that usually the advertising had included the phrase "courtesy to brokers" but in this case it had not.

In the course of discussion it was brought out that the district pays to brokers involved in the successful bid, 10 per cent up to \$50,000 valuation, 7.5 per cent on the next \$50,000 and 5 per cent above that. As on some previous occasions, Gilloon sharply objected to this practice which, he said, had been criticized by the chairman of the 1957 county grand jury.

## Foreign Language Classes Scheduled at Rancho School

If you hear strange sounds coming from the Rancho Santa Fe Elementary school, don't be misled. You are not in France! It will be just the students, kindergarten through sixth grade, practicing their French.

Lambert Baker, school principal, has decided that since the tender years are the easiest in which to learn a language he is going to take advantage of it. Putting the idea into action, he now has Dr. Gerhardt Wolter coming to the school each Monday to "introduce" the children to French, and is observing their response to the program.

Dr. Wolter, from Germany, is a physics professor at San Diego State college. Monday is his day off and since he is enthusiastic about Mr. Baker's forward approach to education, he is com-

ing to the Ranch this spring to help initiate this language course.

Mrs. Adrienne Vinciguerra, presently in San Diego, has been signed to teach the third grade next year and will continue Dr. Wolter's studies in French. The language class will be held on Saturday, with teachers at the school attending also, and they, in turn, will drill the children in the language during the week.

Mrs. Vinciguerra, who will study at the Sorbonne in Paris this summer, is well qualified for the position, since she speaks seven languages and it is the hope of Mr. Baker to offer other languages as the demand arises. She received her M.A. from Columbia university as well as de-grees from several European

universities including the University of Heidelberg.

### Deep Watering Advised to Save Rancho Trees

With the past winter being the driest since 1903, the beautification committee of the Garden club asked Mrs. Gifford Ewing, its consultant on horticulture and landscape design, to give suggestions on the care and preservation of the eucalyptus trees, integral part of the beauty of Rancho Santa Fe.

Mrs. Ewing stated that since the rainfall was not sufficient to bring up the decreasing water table from which the deep-rooted trees draw their life that trees will be continuously lost as the dry year progresses unless they are watered.

Deep watering by the following method is urged by Mrs. Ewing: Sprinkle surface sufficiently so that the water can penetrate the hard, dry soil,
