Remodeling Bid Awarded

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Rancho Santa Fe Association was held on Friday, December 2, 1960. The meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by President Jenkins.

Present were Vice-President Dewey, Directors Hoyne, Jandorf, Lewis, Randol and Schofield. Also present were Attorney Clayton, Secretary Smart, Assistant Secretary Resnick and Messers. Welles, Muench, Stork, Norgren and Architect Jung.

It was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that Architects Sommers and Maurer be awarded the contract for remodeling the 'Old School Building,' said Architect's bid being the lowest received. Director Schofield abstained from voting. Remodeling of the building will entail changing the westernmost room of the building into suitable Association offices. The other two rooms will be adapted for community meetings and generally modernized to accommodate large groups of people.

It was unanimously carried that the firm of Rancho Santa Fe Engineering Company survey the roadway in the vicinity of Lots 64, 65, 66, 68, and 70, Map 2089. Cost not to exceed \$100. Vice-President Dewey abstained from voting. This survey will determine the boundaries of the upper end of the Golf Course, in the vicinity of Nos. 4 and 5 holes.

It was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that the resignation of Claude A. Welles as a Member of the Rancho Santa Fe Art Jury be accepted, with regret, effective January 1, 1961.

President Jenkins appointed Dr. Victor Stork to serve as a Member of the Rancho Santa Fe Art Jury for a three year period, effective January 1, 1961. The Board unanimously approved the appointment.

It was moved, seconded, and unanimously carried that the appointment of William Scho-

field to serve as the Board Member on the Planning Commission, be approved.

It was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that the application of the San Diego Gas and Electric Company to install a Guy Wire on Lot 1, Block 34, Map 4458, be approved.

It was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that Secretary Smart be authorized to prepare for lighting of trees in the Civic Center for the Christmas Carol Community Sing.

It was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that the Subdivision application of E. C. French of Portion of Lot 2, Block 23, Map 1742, plat map dated 10-60, be denied. Vice-President Dewey abstained from voting.

The Rancho Santa Fe Art Jury met with the Board of Directors from 11:00 a.m. until 12:42 p.m. for the purpose of discussing general policies of the Association.

The Board deferred action on the application of the Rancho Riding Club to lease an additional strip of Association property, as recommended by the "Parks and Recreation Board," application dated 11-21-60, pending further study.

The Board deferred action on the application of Roy Miller for an Easement over an Association Parkway, application dated 11-29-60, pending further study.

The Board deferred action on the recommendation of the Golf Course Committee, form of Application for Annual Playing Privileges and letter to be sent to all potential "B" card holders under the New Plan of Operation of the Golf Course.

The Board deferred action on the application of 'Bill and Emma's Restaurant' for a Sign permit, same to be erected on Portion of Lots 1, 2, and 3, Block E conv dated 11-60, pending further study.

The Board recessed at 12:24 p.m. and reconvened at 1:55 p.m.

Secretary Smart presented Gross Revenue for the month of November, 1960 as follows:

GOLF COURSE REVENUE:
Green Fees — Cash \$5084.50;
Playing Privileges \$5204; Electric Carts \$1207.60; Lockers \$2.50. Total: \$11,498.60 this represents a decrease of \$712.25 as compared to last year.

GOLF SHOP: Carts — Hand-\$74.50; Carts — Electric \$292; Cleaning and Storage \$390.50; Merchandise \$2966.30. Total: \$3723.30 or a decrease of \$1090.03 from last year's revenue.

RESTAURANT AND BAR: \$5142.14 a decrease of \$1482.96. The total decrease of the month of November, 1960 as compared with November, 1959 is \$3,285.24.

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July 1 Target Date For New Golf Plan

The Board of Directors of the Rancho Santa Fe Association met at their regular meeting on Friday, December 16 in the Board Room of the Association office. Director Schofield was absent. Present in addition to the members of the Board, the Secretary and Asst. Secretary were Messrs. Truog, Blackledge, Atty. Swirsky, Allen, Fuller and Schuttleworth.

The meeting was called to order by President Jenkins.

It was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that the following recommendations of the Golf Course Committee, be approved: "The change over date to the new Plan of Operation of the Golf Course be effective July 1st, 1961." "The Processing Committee of the Association will consist of the following Members: Messrs. Clifford Randolph, Jr. Chairman Carl Croft, Wendell Wheelock, Burnell De Vos and Mme. Marion M. Millar." "Form of application for Annual Playing Privileges and letters be sent to all potential "B" card holders under the New Plan of Operation of the Golf Course." The latter recommendation was approved by the Board between meetings.

It was unanimously carried that Association Employees be given a Christmas gift, the amount to be based on a schedule submitted by the manager.

It was voted that the application of G. M. Robertson for 'Keeping of Animals' be not approved.

It was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that the application of Roy Miller for an Easement over an Association Parkway be denied.

The application of A. S. Hill

for a Sign Permit to Entrance was approved.

Consideration was given to the Rancho Riding Club Lease as recommended by the Parks and Recreation Board and the Board turned the matter over to Attorney Clayton for handling in the form of a license.

The Board deferred action on the application of Grove Mosley for Bulldozing, pending receipt of additional information.

The Board deferred action on the following Subdivision Applications: Scott Youmans for Por. of Lot 1, Block 43, Map 1742; Fletcher - Martin, Inc. et al for Por. of Lots 2, 3, & 11, Parcels No. 3 & 4, Map 4458; H. Wynkoop for Por. of Lot 4, Block 18, Map 1742; Wm. B. George for Por. of Lot 1, Block 36, Map 1742.

Secretary Smart was directed to post on the Bulletin Board and publish in the Association Bulletin an article to determine the number of Association Members that would be interested in connecting to the San Diego Gas and Electric line, if possible.

The following Association Members and Others, addressed the Board on the following matters. Messr. Truog asked Reconsideration of Subdivision of Por. of Lot 14, Block 32. The Board will reconsider the question of Subdivision and notify Messr. Truog of such additional data as may be required by the Board.

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RECAP OF GOLF COURSE OPERATION PLAN

The following Proposed Plan for the Operation of the R.S.F. Golf Course was mailed to all members of the Association on Oct. 3, 1960. Enclosed in the same mailing was the notice of a Special Meeting of the membership at the Meetin' House of The Inn, held on Friday, Oct. 14, for the purpose of discussing and explaining the proposed plan. A written vote on the plan was held in the Association office on November 29. The membership voted almost 2 to 1 in favor of the proposed plan. Since the time of the election many inquiries have been made at the office of the Association for clarification of details. Here, in the sincere hope that it will reach all members and clear up any misinformation regarding the plan, the Bulletin presents the Proposed Plan, the important features and the tax explanation.

"The following plan is proposed in order to provide for better playing conditions and better maintenance on the R.S.F. Golf Course by limiting the number of non-Association players. Limiting the number of people privileged to play necessarily requires increased fees to offset the loss of revenue from public play. We believe that the advantages of limited play and a selected clientele, on a course whose physical condition is the best attainable, will more than compensate for the additional cost to the players. This plan provides for the eventual limitation of playing privileges to members of the R.S.F. Association and their guests, at such time as there are sufficient of those to furnish the necessary financial support. When that time is reached, the prestige and value of being a member of the Association will be enhanced.

For the attainment of these

goals, we submit the following plan:

1. Play on the R.S.F. Golf Course is to be eventually restricted to holders of Privilege Cards and guests. There shall be three classes of Privilege Cards, viz: Class A, Class B, and Class C.

2. Holders of Class A cards shall be members of the R.S.F. Association, or those holding life estates or a leasehold or other possessory estate extending over a minimum period of three years, in property subject to the Rancho Santa Fe Protective Covenant, and who shall pay in advance an annual fee of \$240. Upon request and the annual payment of \$60 additional, or a total of \$300, a "Class A - family" card shall be issued to each of the spouse and unmarried minor children residing in the household of the Class A card holder. Any member of the R.S.F. Association shall be entitled to a Class A card, and they shall be renewed from year to year upon payment of the annual fee as set from time to time by the Board of Directors. Present holders of prepaid playing privileges will pay the above fee as of October 1, 1961.

3. Holders of Class B cards shall be non-members of the R.S.F. Association who shall pay in advance an annual fee of \$300. Upon request and the annual payment of \$60 additional, or a total of \$360, "Class B - family" cards shall be issued to each of the spouse and unmarried minor children residing in the household of the Class B card holder. The number of Class B card holders shall be limited at the discretion of the Board of Directors. The present thinking is that when the total number of Class A and B cards issued reaches 400, no further Class B cards will be issued. Applications for Class B cards

shall be in writing and applicants shall be approved by the Board (acting through committee) before the card is issued. Renewals of Class B cards from year to year shall be at the sole discretion of the Board. Present holders of prepaid playing privileges, after approval of their applications for renewal, will pay the above fee as of October 1, 1961.

4. Class C cards will be issued upon request, to all members of the R.S.F. Association, and shall entitle the holder thereof, his spouse and unmarried minor children, to the privileges of the Golf Course upon payment of such regular green fees as may be set from time to time by the Board of Directors.

5. Permitting an unauthorized person to use a Playing Privilege card to gain access to the Golf Course shall be cause for revocation of the card.

6. GUESTS: Any holder of a Class A, Class B or Class C card may have guests, provided the established green fees and charges are paid for them, and provided they are accompanied by the card holder. Special guest cards may be issued at the sole discretion of the Board of Directors and are revocable at any time upon the reimbursement of fees paid for same. Holders of Special Guest Cards need not be accompanied by another card holder. They shall generally fall into the following classifications:

(a) Non-resident guests (who reside outside the San Diego County) for not to exceed two weeks per individual in each calendar year, and at regular green fees.

(b) Seasonal guests (renters) residing in hotels and/or residences located in Rancho Santa Fe and owned by Association members, who shall pay in advance for playing privileges at

the rate of \$108 for the first month, \$84 for the second month, and \$54 for each month thereafter. This privilege shall extend to the holder thereof and his spouse. Children to pay regular green fees.

(c) Other Special Privilege cards as may be authorized by the Board of Directors.

7. No Playing Privilege is transferrable. The Board may revoke any playing privileges for misconduct, destruction of property, non-payment of bills, or violation of rules.

A handbook of rules shall be issued with each privilege card.

8. EFFECTIVE DATES:

(a) As of January 1, 1961 only annual Privilege Cards will be issued, but may be issued at the beginning of each quarter.

(b) The new rates stated herein will become effective October 1, 1961. They include federal tax.

(c) Rates for Privilege Cards issued on January 1, April 1, and July 1 will be prorated. For example: On January 1, the rate will be nine months at the present rate (plus Federal tax) and three months at the new rate.

(d) Special Privilege Card rates under Paragraph 6 (c) will become effective January 1, 1961.

(e) As of October 1, 1961, or sooner at the Board's discretion, all public play is to cease and thereafter play is to be limited to cardholders and their guests." (Signed)

Enclosed herewith is "Proposed Plan for the Operation of the Rancho Santa Fe Golf

Course." The Board recommends the adoption of this plan. The important features of this plan are:

1. Management and direction of the Course remain under the Board of Directors.

2. No member of the Rancho Santa Fe Association will be denied the privilege of playing on the Course.

3. The plan does not establish a private golf club, but does remove our Course from the public golf course category.

4. This plan does not contemplate the construction of additional facilities.

Also enclosed is a notice of a Special Meeting of the Members of the Association. The Meeting will be held at the "Meetin' House" on October 14, 1960 at 8:00 p.m.

This meeting is solely for the purpose of discussion of this plan. A written vote will be held at a later date.

VOTING NOTICE

TO: The Members of the Rancho Santa Fe Association:

A written vote on the "Pro-

posed Plan For the Operation of the Golf Course" will be held on November 29, 1960. You may vote at the offices of the Rancho Santa Fe Association between the hours of 11:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. A copy of the proposed plan was previously mailed to all Association Members and a Special Meeting of the Members was held on October 14, 1960 for general discussion of the plan. Absentee ballots will be sent to all non-resident Members of the Association and should be returned so as to reach the Ranch November 29, 1960.

The proposed plan will provide sufficient net revenue, after taxes, to defray all expenses of the Golf Course. A question has been raised as to the Federal tax consequences in the adoption of the plan. If the proposed plan is adopted by the Association, the most UNFAVORABLE Federal tax consequences are as follows:

1. EXCISE TAXES:

(a) Advanced Playing Privileges will be subject to a 20 per cent tax which will be paid by the golfers;

(b) Your Rancho Santa Fe

assessment may be subject to a 20 per cent excise tax. For example, if your present assessment is \$40 (an amount in excess of the average Association assessment) the tax would be \$8.

YOUR COUNTY PROPERTY TAX IS NOT AFFECTED IN ANY WAY BY THE ADOPTION OF THE PROPOSED PLAN.

2. INCOME TAXES: The net income of the Association may be subject to income taxes. Our gross income would include revenue from assessments and all operations. To arrive at net income, we would deduct all allowable expenses and depreciation taxes small.

The tax consequences may be less severe than above. The tax consequences which should make any Board had purposely considered the plan from the most unfavorable possible position. We are of the opinion that if the proposed plan is adopted, steps can be taken to improve the tax situation. A study of these steps has already been undertaken.

The Board again recommends the adoption of the "Proposed Plan For the Operation of the Rancho Santa Fe Golf Course."

Bookmobile materials are loaned for a period of 28 days. No renewals.

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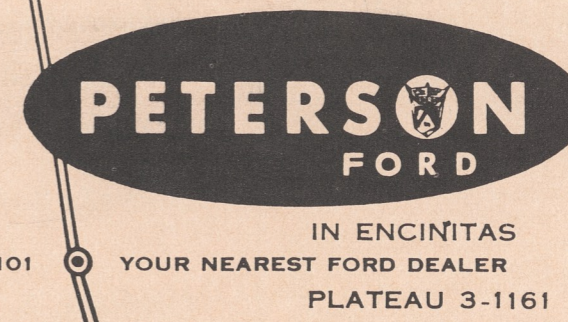
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'Dig Kids' to Appear in National Magazine Soon

On Saturday, December 10, the local young archaeologists participated in a special all day dig. The purpose of this special session was to allow "This Week" magazine to take a picture story of the activity. Over four hundred photographs were taken and from these the best will be selected for publication at a later date. They have also been fortunate enough to have the cover of whatever issue of the magazine the story will appear in, assigned to them.

Mr. Lambert W. Baker, principal of the Rancho Santa Fe School has prepared a report to parents on the progress of the "dig." With kindest thanks to him for his generosity we publish here some parts of his report.

"At the time of the writing of this report 2,482 artifacts have been unearthed by the children. They include hundreds of manos, (grinding stones) and mano fragments; many metate, (grinding platform) fragments;

hard stones which have been formed to work other softer stones; plano-carver scraper (flattened rocks with edges chipped to form a crude blade); thumbnail scrapers (small rocks chipped in such a way as to form a small blade); choppers (large stones used for chopping fish, etc.) stone awls slender rocks formed into crude points; and "game balls" for lack of a better name (large perfectly round rocks apparently used to roll back and forth on the ground.)

Certain very significant items have been uncovered in our site, among these items are included fine projectile points, three of which were uncovered in place and photographed. They are the first such points uncovered at a La Jollan site.

A charm stone has been uncovered, the first of its kind ever found and a possible link to a hitherto unknown religious belief held by this civilization.

Fragments of chalk have been uncovered at the eastern perimeter of the site, chalk which when moist does a beautiful job of face painting. This variety is not found anywhere near San Diego County and therefore in all probability was brought in by these Indians for painting — what or why is still unknown, but the find marks another first.

The excavation is being conducted on land occupied roughly 7,000 years ago by Indian tribes which we know today as the La Jollan culture.

These Indians were short of stature, muscular, and were amazingly free of vitamin or food deficiency diseases. Apparently the abundance of sea food and the availability of edible land vegetation insured straight and sturdy bones and a well-balanced diet. The teeth in all skeletons thus far recovered in adjacent sites indicates almost no dental caries, which offers further proof of their apparent good health.

Of their religion very little is known. Their dead were always buried, never burned as in many other Indian cultures.

Each body was placed in the earth with a metate (an ancient grinding platform) over it. Each metate thus far found over a burial has had a hole knocked in it or has been broken in half, indicating, perhaps, that with its owner's death, it, too, had to die.

All sites thus far excavated, not including ours, have indicated that no weapons of any kind were needed or used. Thus, the projectile points found by our group have been a significant find.

Apparently tribes, once settled, did very little moving. They remained in one spot generation after generation. This is indicated by the extremely rich soil (midden) found in all sites.

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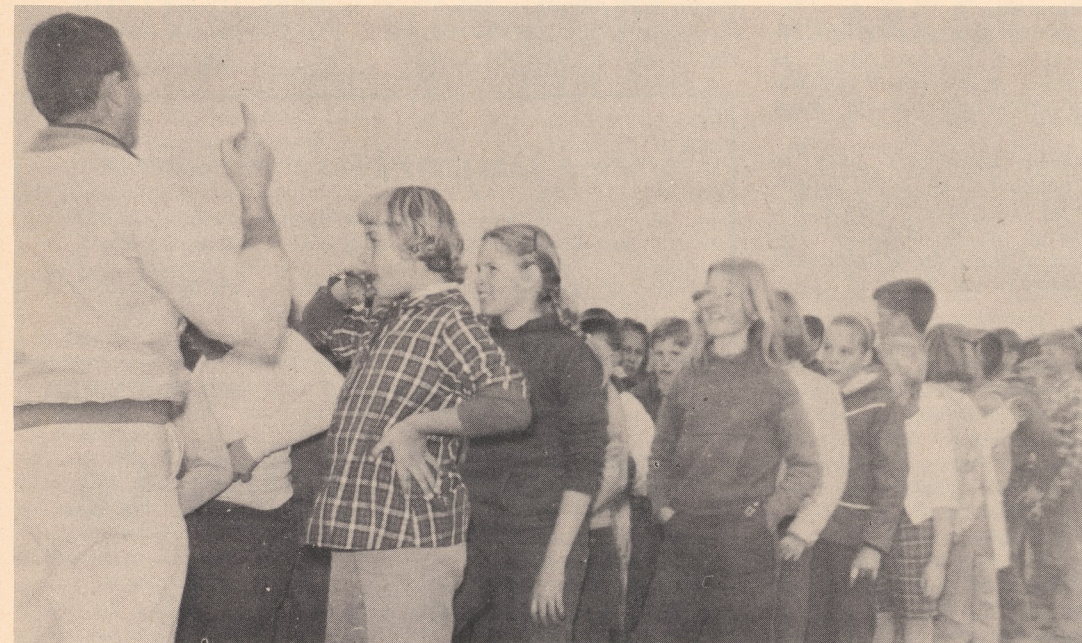
Annual Church Dinner Jan. 9

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BRITISHER TO ADDRESS GARDEN CLUB JAN. 16

A distinguished diplomat - turned - author comes to Rancho Santa Fe when the Right Honorable Anthony Nutting, former Minister of State for Foreign Affairs in Great Britain addresses the members and guests of the Rancho Santa Fe Garden Club on Monday evening, January 16 at 8:00 p.m.

Mr. Nutting, whose rise to leadership in Britain had been meteoric before his dramatic resignation of his position in the government and his seat in Parliament in 1956 at the height of the Suez crises, has covered the continuing story of friction in the Middle East in an intermittent series of articles for the New York Herald Tribune.

As a powder keg in Iran, Lebanon and Jordan threatened to erupt into a global holocaust, Mr. Nutting was the first journalist to fly into the latter country with British paratroopers to cover the volatile situation there. He continued to file dispatches from Lebanon and Cyprus as long as the crisis remained hot.

Prior to this assignment, Mr. Nutting traveled in Poland and East Germany reporting his observations for American readers in the Herald Tribune.

This past year Mr. Nutting returned to the Middle East on a trip to Lebanon, Syria, and Iraq to gather background material for a novel. He also traveled through Europe and talked at length with Paul Henri-Spaak, of NATO, France's Couve de Murville, Germany's Adenauer and Erhardt, and other officials of French and German foreign ministries on the future of Europe, the common market and Britain's relationship with the new European community.

During this same year, he wrote two books, one a definitive history of modern disarmament negotiations which was published in England; and the other book, a story of postwar Europe and the development of the European community from 1945 to 1959, with particular reference to America's and Britain's re-

lationship to it.

Mr. Nutting's renunciation of what promised to become a truly brilliant career in government made world headlines in November 1956. In his dozen years of political life, the youthful diplomat earned a reputation for strong convictions and deep perception of the issues that keep the world in turmoil. His prime concern has always been a furthering of Anglo-American relations and, in this interest, he wrote a series of articles for the New York Herald Tribune syndicate early in 1957 on how America and Britain can lead the free world to defeat the growing challenge of Soviet Communism.

The youngest of three sons of Sir Harold Stansmore Nutting, 2nd Baronet, Anthony Nutting was born in Shrewsbury, England in 1920. After being educated at Eton and Trinity College, Cambridge University, he joined the Leicestershire Yoomany as a trooper in 1939. Invalided in France during the early months of World War II, he then served as an attaché to the British Embassy in Paris. Among the last of the Embassy staff to leave after the Fall of France, he escaped in a small merchant ship that survived a torpedo attack in the bay of Biscay.

Later, attached to the British Embassy in Madrid, he organized intelligence and escape lines in Spain for Allied personnel who had been captured by the Germans. He next returned to the Foreign Office to serve as private secretary to Sir Anthony Eden and was then in charge of Scandinavian affairs in the Northern Department. From 1944 to 1945 he served in Rome.

Mr. Nutting won his seat in Parliament in the general elections of 1945 as the Conservative member of the Melton Division of Leicestershire. He was twenty five years old and impressed fellow M.P.'s with his remarkable grasp of foreign affairs in his maiden speech before the

House of Commons.

Early in his Parliamentary career, he became a sparkplug in the newly formed Young Conservative Association he subsequently served as chairman of the National Executive Committee of the Conservative Party.

When the Conservative Party won in 1951, Mr. Nutting received the appointment in the Government as Under-Secretary of State to the Foreign Office and three years later reached senior ministerial status. Early in 1954 he accompanied Sir Anthony Eden to Germany for the Berlin Conference. In October of the same year, he flew to Cairo to conduct the last phase of the negotiations on the Suez Canal base which resulted in the withdrawal of British armed forces from that zone.

Mr. Nutting led the United Kingdom delegation at the General Assembly of the United Nations in 1954 and again in 1955.

Mr. Nutting's resignation from his government post on October 31, 1956 because of his disagreement with Prime Minister Eden over Great Britain's

military attack on Egypt was of particular interest because he had been regarded for years as a rising star in the Conservative Party and a special protege of Sir Anthony's. When he resigned his seat in Parliament two weeks later, the break was complete.

In January of 1957 Mr. Nutting began his association with the New York Herald Tribune syndicate in a six-part series of articles of analysis of Anglo-American relations.

Since his resignation from active politics, the tall, slim Britisher has spent his time traveling in the Middle East, studying nationalism in that area and methods by which the Western Alliance can work with nationalism in preventing Communist infiltration.

In the Spring of 1957 Mr. Nutting made a comprehensive tour of the Middle East, North Africa, India and Pakistan. His book, "I Saw For Myself" was published later that year and was an account of his findings on this prolonged tour of observation.

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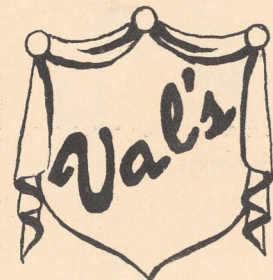
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
