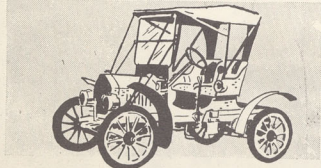

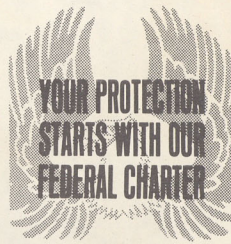

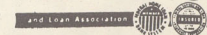

When You Think of Repairing and Refinishing Fine Furniture . . . Think of Eric Masterman!

Eric Masterman, the furniture repairing and refinishing expert with a new shop at 261 S. Highway 101 in Solana Beach, learned his trade as a youth in England by fashioning furniture by hand from solid wood.

Masterman recalls being paid a dollar and a half for 52 hours of work each week when he became a cabinet maker and furniture finisher's apprentice at the age of 14.

He had to sign an indenture that he would "not divulge the master's secrets" and "not enter taverns or ale houses."

When World War II broke out, Masterman went to Portsmouth at the request of the British Air Ministry to assist with construction of the "Air-speed Oxford" wooden training plane for Royal Air Force bomber pilots. He later helped construct wooden gliders used in landing many airborne troops on D-Day.

Masterman will never forget the air raids that destroyed most of the city of Portsmouth. After one of the raids, most of his tools were damaged or missing.

After the war, Masterman went into business for himself in Bournemouth making furniture and restoring antique furniture. Among his many customers was the late British admiral Sir Reginald Hall of Lyndhurst, Hampshire.

Masterman came to the United States in 1948 with his wife and three children, which included a month-old daughter, after hearing from relatives about the fine American and European antique furniture in this area.

He has been restoring and maintaining fine pieces of furniture in La Jolla for the past 17 years. He still does much of his work by hand.

The Mastermans now live at 1000 El Camino Real, Del Mar, with one of their daughters, Shelagh, a student at San Diego High School. Their other daughter, Thereca, and a son, Eric, and their families also live in the North County area.

Masterman said antique and fine furniture should be checked carefully every year or two for loose joints, wood beetle damage and veneer and inlay damage.

He pointed out that neglect of damaged areas frequently leads to more damage, requiring more time and higher cost for repair or restoration.

"Use of correct polish on valuable furniture also is very important in maintaining its intrinsic value," he said.

Masterman will be happy to provide advice on furniture repair or refinishing problems for people in this area. His new shop in Solana Beach (at the north side of the Safeway store) opened in December.

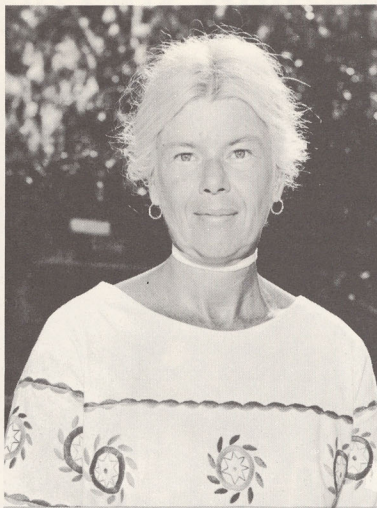

"UNITED WE STAND"

Even in the most primitive forms of Society the members soon learned that in unity there was strength. This is apparently something which America has recently forgotten. Throughout history and up until the present age the perils which beset mankind were predominantly physical and came from without.

In America the tactic of division already has been accomplished in almost every phase of life. First and foremost was the breaking up of the mutual ties of love and respect which once so firmly united the family. Family life was the microcosm upon which the whole macrocosm of civilization was founded, and from which it drew life blood and strength to insure its continuance.

After the sacred institution of family unity is shattered it causes the second basic schism to follow in logical order. The youth in revolution against their elders. This includes total commitment in defying the tried and true framework of morality, law, order and the discipline to live peacefully within its boundaries. When we consider the startling fact that one out of every two persons in the United States is under twenty-five years of age or that about ninety-eight million of us are under twenty-five, the importance of working harmoniously together is doubly emphasized. No one can deny that it is an integral part of growing up for teenagers to separate themselves from their families. However, separation is a far cry from severing and rejecting relationship from the wise and mature guidance of experience.

The clarion call of the Free Speech Movement echoing over the campuses in America, "You can't trust anyone over thirty!" cuts our country right down the center and regroups us automatically into protagonists according to the plan of the Dividers. With the breaking up of the family many older parents have resignedly accepted their banishment from the hearth and heart. They have

retired to the various Solar Cities. Horizontal Horizons, etc. which provide brilliantly for their mental atrophy. There they huddle together trying not to think at all by keeping themselves frantically busy with their golf and shuffleboard games and barbecue toys. The time revered precept of age claiming its rightful place of honor in the home, ever ready to guide or help, if needed, is gone. Nowadays the young and old alike exist apart in the shells of sleek, sterile houses which have ceased to be homes.

The third step is education. Here, if we can view the problem objectively, we can see specialization has been carried to an idiotic extreme. In schools the curriculum is geared for the students to pursue only one subject to the exclusion of all others. Now the realistic aim of education should be to prepare youth to live a well rounded, balanced life with every atom of its being. But today if one is not specializing in medicine, science, biology, law or engineering you are just not with it. Liberal arts students are beyond the pale. Thus we have a country run mostly by the eggheads who sit upon their isolated walls like Humpty Dumpty making the most intricate complexities out of the simplest things of which they know nothing whatever about. Their education for life has been pitifully lop-sided, bounded on all sides by one subject and not including the basic of basics, common sense. Even when two of these so called intelligent "specialists" marry and pool their efforts, there are so many undeveloped areas in their preparation for living that, at the first sign of difficulty, they come unglued and either rush headlong for the psychiatrists couch or seek to drown their troubles in alcohol. Benjamin Franklin was conceded to be a great man in almost every department of life and like all truly great men was the soul of simplicity. Today greatness is equated with specialization.



No greater authority in judging the mental and physical capabilities of youth can be found than Lt. General Lewis B. Hershey. He has been head of the military draft system during the last three wars and is in a position to summarize his objectively. He says, "I happen to think that the Liberal Arts people are going to have to run this world, because the specialists haven't got enough sense to do more than their own specialty. I believe the salvation of this world will be in trying to get somebody who knows a little bit about a lot of things and has the guts and character to do it." Specialization is only a branch of the great division splitting our country, our minds and our purpose. The warp and woof of life can not be sectioned off into hermetically sealed compartments. Either it is all of a piece or it is nothing at all.

The next area of division is occurring between the sexes. They were originally created to complement each others natures, being incomplete in themselves. Adam, signifying reason, was happily wedded to Eve, who embodied feeling. United the two were blended into one glorious whole. The sweetness of their relationship has been torn violently asunder in todays world. Woman, when she sacrificed her femininity on the alter of equality and then began to flaunt sex in order to

rekindle men's interest, lost the last stronghold of her dynasty. Now the men, not only in America but all over the world, instead of turning to women for comfort, are seeking refuge in each others company. Ironically this could cause civilization's ultimate undoing without any help from the bomb.

The fifth great area under attack is religion. It has been systematically undermined, subjected to a barrage of pressure from every angle and divested of authority. This target is really the most important one of all because without the security, love and strength of man's close relationship with his Creator, he is disoriented and defenseless against all the evils of the world.

Not in vain have the great, yet simple, moral commandments showing people the rules and boundaries of conduct existed for millenniums. The civilizations which have sincerely followed these time honored precepts waxed and prospered and only when they failed to obey the laws of their prophets were their civilizations doomed to obscurity. They lost their nations divine purpose for existence, their right to prosper and the light which guided them faded into darkness.

The wise, God loving founders of our great nation realized it would always require constant vigilance to maintain and preserve our special way of life and freedom which is unique in the whole world. With this in mind, our Constitution was drawn up by great, selfless statesmen with inspired vision, united in their love of humanity and country. If we permit the termites of self-doubt, corruption and the disintegration of our noble virtues to make inroads into the structure of our character and culture, we have only ourselves to blame.

The challenge to save ourselves, our country is not only up to our leaders but rests squarely upon the shoulders of each individual in the United States. Daniel Webster said in effect, "People get the kind of government they deserve." Fortunately there is still hope. The time has come for all of us in every age bracket, race, color and creed to forsake being divided against ourselves and unite, moving forward dynamically to rescue our Country from internal combustion. The famous admonition which Benjamin Franklin gave his Countrymen in time of peril, "We must all hang together, or assuredly we shall all hang separately", holds as valid today as it did two hundred years ago.

Rancho Santa Fe Garden Club

The Beautification Committee of the Garden Club has outlined and received the approval of both The Garden Club and the Rancho Santa Fe Parks and Recreation Board for the following major projects for this year:

Markers to be placed at the four principle entrances to the Ranch. These proposed markers are to be boulders, 3 to 3½ feet in height, with a wrought-iron script attached, "Rancho Santa Fe." It was thought that this type of marker would be in keeping with the native landscape of Rancho Santa Fe. The boulders will be donated by one of our local residents. Mr. Chas. Harris, and the Beautification Committee will have them hauled, marked and placed at the entrances. Mr. David Forbes and Mr. Robert Corlett, members of the Committee, will supervise this project.

Another major project will be the addition of curbing and the alteration of existing curbing at the Association Building parking lot. Additional planting will also be added to soften the appearance of the rear of the building. This is being done with the cooperation of Mr. Brereton Teagle of the Association Planning Commission and drawings for this project will be submitted for Art Jury approval.

Also under way at this time is the replanting of the El Romero and Avenida Maravillas turnarounds. The El Romero turnaround will be planted with colorful, self-maintaining plants which will supply year-round beauty to the surrounding area. The Avenida Maravillas turnaround will be planted with Oleander, Plumbago and Rosemary, for minimum watering and maintenance.

Among the continuing projects of the Committee are the monthly roadside clean-up campaign, the Rancho Santa Fe Elementary School poster contest, stressing civic clean-up and direct mail programs which consist of yearly letters to all residents of the Ranch and to all new contractors working in the area.

The Committee also continues to supervise the maintenance of Association park areas, and at present discussions are being held with the Parks and Recreation Board regarding the condition of the barranca at Richardson Park, the overgrowth of which has resulted in the breeding of mosquitoes and snakes; and also the condition of the barranca in front of the Golf Course maintenance building, the choked condition of which has prevented the proper drainage of water during the recent heavy rains and contributes a generally unkept appearance to the surrounding area.

The Beautification Committee sincerely hopes that the projects mentioned here will further contribute to the civic beauty of Rancho Santa Fe and will meet with the approval of all the local residents.

The Country Friends Shop has a new look these days! During the holiday season painters, floor-men and furnace men were busily at work renovating the Shop. It was nice before the changes, but with pardonable pride we now say it is outstanding!

The same warm welcome awaits you when you come into the Shop, and you will appreciate the warmth of our new heating system.

New paint, new floor, and new heater for your enjoyment. But more than that, there are many newly-arrived items to catch your eye and your interest. For the Oriental decor we have ancient bronze Siamese statues, a bronze usubata, two sizes of low teakwood chow tables, a very old and ornately carved teak frame surrounding an Oriental scroll, satsuma ware, Rose Canton plates, bowls and teaset, some fine cloisssonne pieces, and quite a group of lacquerware.

We have a complete set of Royal Doulton dinnerware, a collection of Royal Doulton dogs, a very fine group of cut glass pieces (hard to come by these days), and three beautiful Belleek teaset, also rather scarce. It Takes 354 Days of Planning to Produce the "Happiest Eleven Days of the Year"

The San Diego County Fair!

Like Roy Welch, the County Fair manager says, "A fair is like an iceberg—7/8ths of it is invisible."

The 7/8ths Welch was referring to is the 11½ months of hard work that he and his staff are putting in so that 350,000 fairgoing citizens can enjoy the 11 days of this year's fair, June 24 — July 4.

Already there are 30 people working diligently to put together the 1966 San Diego County Fair.

Take Mrs. Marjorie Thackeray, coordinator of special events. It is up to her to secure and schedule 570 individual special events on the seven stages and in various areas on the grounds during the 11-day run.

One of Marjorie's biggest jobs is filling mammoth Exhibit Hall, which houses 60 feature exhibits of farm bureaus, granges, chambers of commerce, communities, counties, and other displays such as the International Gallery, San Diego Historical Society and the Fair's special display.

She has already booked 11 spaces for exhibits that will occupy the Hall in June.

Another current assignment for Marjorie is laying out and allocating the space for the junior fair and other youth exhibits in Mission Tower.

Besides all this, this busy fairworker is deep in the throes of arranging for special "days" at the Fair — Kid's Day, Students' Day, Senior Citizens' Day, etc.

In the purchasing department Dale Bruce is hard at it buying various supplies and equipment. Some expenditures he anticipates this spring are: \$10,000 in lumber, \$1,000 in hardware, \$4,000 in medals, trophies and ribbons, \$500 for paint, \$1,600 in janitorial supplies and \$800 in light bulbs.

Out in the art department W. B. Zimmerly, replacing the late Jack Carr as the Fair's design chief, has begun to plan this year's Fair-sponsored feature exhibit, and is checking over the hundreds of signs that will help guide and inform fairgoers during the Fair.

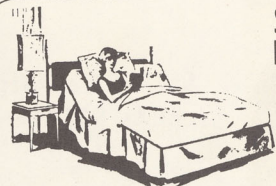

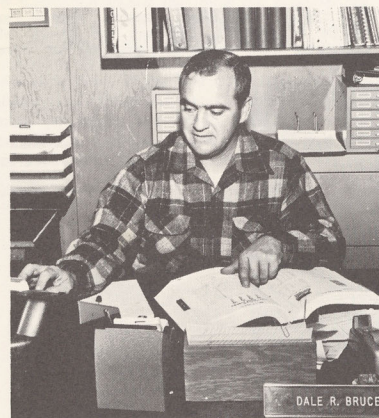

BILL TURNQUIST, entry supervisor; and **DALE BRUCE** purchasing agent, look over some of the hundreds of award statues which must be in readiness for the Fair!

Another major area of effort these days is in the entry department, whose workers must process the 20,000 entries in the Fair.

These days they're busy working on the premium list books that will go into the mail early in April. The premium books, if you don't already know, list every classification of competition — thousands of them — the rules and regulations for each class, and the cash premiums one may win.

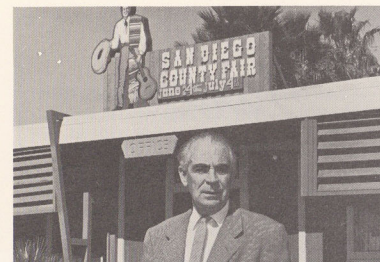
Entry Supervisor Bill Turnquist will send out 2800 senior department books, 1900 junior department books, and lesser quantities of art show prospectii, and photo exhibit premium lists.

These books will go to previous exhibitors, to schools, to clubs like 4-H and FFA, and to people who phone or write requesting a book.

You may not know it, but 110 judges are required to determine the thousands of winners at each Fair. Bill will soon be securing these judges, who must, of course, be qualified in various specialties.

"It will take at least two months to complete the task of securing judges. Some of them are local, some will come a long distance," Turnquist explains.

And when the entries begin to come in, in April and May, Turnquist's department will expand to eight workers, who will be swamped just keeping up with the flood of entries.

Horse Show Manager Eric Atterbury of Cardiff is another staff member whose days are filled with activity and work.

Aided by Secretary "Corky" Cormier, Eric is currently occupied with a myriad of details in connection with the 12-day horse show, which begins June 3, a day before the Fair.

He's currently securing sponsors for stakes (cash awards) and for trophies. And also seeking renewal of the 40 boxes at the arena.

Even before January Eric had secured the five judges who will decide the winners in the world's largest horse show. About 2000 horses will compete for 12 days, beginning at 9 a.m. and ending at 10 p.m. daily.

And, he is working on the horse show premium book, scheduled for mailing April 1. It will go to 2,000 exhibitors.

Another of Welch's key staff people is Ted Terwilliger, grounds manager, who is responsible for the readiness of every facility and service on the fairgrounds.

Even now he has a staff of 10 carpenters, teamsters, painters and utility men.

The commercial exhibit department, is already accepting orders for space. Bing Crosby Hall, where 100 of the 250 commercial exhibits and concessions are located, will be bursting by June 1.

The main problem is enough space. In four months it will be difficult to satisfy everyone who wants to exhibit at the Fair.

Besides Bing Crosby Hall, commercial exhibitors will be located in the Arcade area, the Maze — just west of the flower show — and at various other locations around the grounds. The Arcade area, fronting on the Turf Club riding ring, was new last year to commercial exhibitors.

Food, drink and novelty concessionaires are also under the commercial department. There will be a line of them, figuratively, hoping to get a spot somewhere on the grounds. The demand is greater than the supply.

In the accounting department, where John Russell holds forth, February is a time of preparation for the big job of paying out the \$130,000 in cash premiums to winning and placing exhibitors.

In all, John's department will issue about 2,200 checks, varying in amounts from 50 cents to as much as \$2,500. Although there is no premium over \$500, some exhibitors with numerous entries do accumulate much more than that.

Actually the task of recording the judging results, and of determining the amount due each winner and placer, is done by computer, through a punch-card system.

"We now can have every one of the 2,200 checks in the mail not more than 10 days after the Fair closes," Russell explains. The computer system, installed by Russell three years ago has greatly speeded issuance of checks, and also reduced the number issued by nearly half.

In publicity, Norrie West's secretary Fran Mathes is oiling up the mimeograph machine. And throughout the county about 300 pretty young ladies — from 16 to 24 — are waiting to fill out entry blanks preparatory to competing in their community's combined "Miss" and Fairest of the Fair contest. Winners of the 25 "Miss" contests will vie for the title June 8.

In the boss' office, Roy Welch is just as busy as any of the others, signing contracts for a myriad of services, negotiating for various Fair features, and hoping that the 1/8th above-water tip of the iceberg that people will see June 24 — July 4 will excite, delight and attract them.

In the final analysis this is what Welch lives the other 11½ months for, as he will enthusiastically tell anyone within earshot!

Rotary Marks a Milestone

Rotarians of this city are this month observing the 61st anniversary of the founding of the first Rotary club. Within the next few days, more than 581,500 Rotarians who belong to 12,000 clubs in 131 countries will have celebrated this occasion.

Rotary began in Chicago on February 23, 1905, when four business associates came together to lessen the loneliness in their lives and to test the founder's belief that business relations could — and should — foster friendly relations. Business practices, thought the founder, need not be a barrier to friendship.

Since those early days, Rotary has become a prime mover in community-betterment work, youth activities, helping the crippled and the handicapped, raising the standards of business and professional practices, and in forming friendly personal ties among men that have contributed to better international understanding.

It has long been our observation that Rotarians believe in practicing rather than preaching. They are more concerned with finding new opportunities for service than with patting themselves on the back for past achievements.

The Rotary club of this community, as do other Rotary clubs in their communities, helps in many ways to make Rancho Santa Fe a better place to live and to work and to raise happy, healthy families.

Our congratulations to Rotarians of this community on this anniversary. We wish for the Rotary clubs of the world continued success in rendering the kind of creative service to humanity for which Rotary is especially suited.

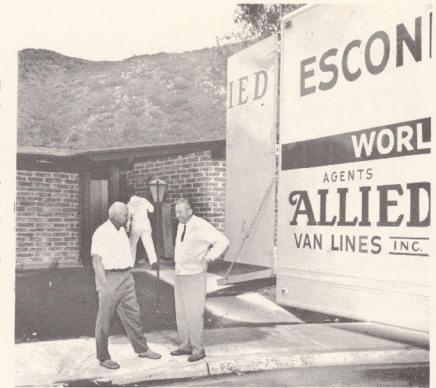

Pala Mesa Village is America's Only Adobe Community

Two Rancho Santa Fe residents have been instrumental in the development of America's only adobe community, Pala Mesa Village near Fallbrook, into which the first residents have just moved.

The Rancho Santa Feans are George Schnur, project director at Pala Mesa Village, and Jesse Powers, a salesman for Pala Mesa Company Realtors, exclusive sales agents for the community.

They were on hand to greet the first of 300 families who will ultimately reside in Pala Mesa Village.

The first residents were two sisters, both widows, Mrs. Mary Sabina Hammond and Mrs. Marguerite Vandawarker, who formerly lived in Fallbrook. Mrs. Hammond is a retired Michigan school teacher who came to California 10 years ago.

Schnur said 15 other homes in the initial unit of 93 have been sold and the owners plan to move in within a few weeks.

Pala Mesa Village will be developed in three stages, he added, with each unit of approximately 100 homes containing its own elaborate recreation mall which features a king-sized swimming pool, clubhouse, barbecue area, sauna bath, pitch-and-putt golf green and shuffleboard courts. There also is an adobe-enclosed playground for visiting children. The \$200,000 recreation area in the initial unit has been completed for use by the first residents.

Located at the junction of U. S. Highway 395 and State Route 76 about five miles east of Fallbrook, Pala Mesa Village homes range in price from \$22,850 to \$26,850. Purchasers receive free title to their house and lot and an undivided interest in the recreation facilities and other common areas, which are maintained through a monthly fee.

All yards are landscaped, with adobe walls assuring privacy. The homes all have two bedrooms and two baths, adobe fireplaces and numerous built-ins.

Schnur said adobe was chosen as the building material because of its maintenance-free qualities.

"The community was designed for adults who want their permanent homes in a rural setting with an almost-perfect climate or for persons who want a weekend home near several golf courses and other recreational areas," he added. "These persons do not want to spend their free time painting or otherwise caring for their homes, so we used adobe for all construction and provided landscaping, along with its maintenance as needed, so their leisure time would be a time to relax."

Five 18-hole golf courses are within 15 minutes drive from Pala Mesa Village. One, Pala Mesa Country Club, is within walking distance.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE RANCHO SANTA FE ASSOCIATION, FRIDAY, JANUARY 7, 1966, AT 9:00 A.M. IN THE BOARD ROOM.

PRESENT: President Harris, Vice President Larson, Directors Corlett, Loretz, McLaughlin, Teagle and Thieme.

ALSO PRESENT: Association members V. R. Tomlinson, Fillmore Rose, E. T. Price, Elroy O. Jones, J. M. Jayne, Lee Miller, Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Fowler and Mrs. Ann Clevenger; non-Association members Bruce Dillon, Edward Mills, Mrs. Albert Larson and Robert Brett; Association Counsel H. F. Tebbetts, Secretary Van Evera and Assistant Secretary Allen.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING:

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved, as corrected.

SCHEDULER APPEARANCE:

Mr. Lee Miller appeared before the Board to discuss an application of Silver Lining Stables for the keeping of 37 horses and get on a portion of Lot 3, Block 23, La Noria. The Board approved the recommendation of the Art Jury for the keeping of 30 horses on the property. Consideration for the additional number of horses and possible zone change to receive further study.

RECOMMENDATION OF THE ART JURY:

SUBDIVISION:

GETSON, Victoria: Por Lot 5, Blk 29, (Rancho Getson), consisting of 8 gross acres into four (4) sites of 2.0 each. DEFERRED for joint meeting with Art Jury.

BOARD ACTION:

Cook Subdivision. Action withheld pending further consideration by Art Jury.

Road Name. The Secretary outlined the request of the San Diego County Building Inspection Department for a suggested name for the Via de la Valle cut-off resulting from the new alignment of Via de la Valle along the Whispering Palms development. Results of letters to the residents living in the vicinity, and newspaper articles requesting suggestions were discussed. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the name "Via Osuna" be submitted to the County as the choice for the road in question.

Letter of Appreciation. It was moved, seconded, and carried that a vote of thanks be accorded Mr. Gordon Calder and that the President direct a letter to him expressing the appreciation of the Board and the entire Association for his devoted and conscientious work as member and president of the Art Jury.

DIRECTORS' REPORT:

Mr. Harris read a copy of correspondence between Supervisor Cozens and Mr. David Spear, County Surveyor and Road Commissioner, wherein Mr. Cozens had requested that department to reduce the projected paving width on the new section of El Camino Real, and that it be built in conformance with that section of La Noria which was recently improved.

Mr. Corlett, Chairman Golf Course Committee, reported on the recent Committee meeting and submitted a report prepared by the Greens Superintendent of equipment needed for proper maintenance of the golf course, totaling approximately \$13,000. The report was referred to the Finance Committee for study and report in view of the fact that no specific provision had been made for this in the budget.

Mr. Corlett reported that the following golf members, for various reasons, had resigned from golf playing privileges, effective January 1, 1966: Mr. Paul Dobson, Mr. Anson Lisk, Mr. Edward A. Merrill, Jr., Mr. Charles P. Martyn and Mr. Edward W. Dobroth. One of these persons had requested a pro-rata refund of the special assessment. The Board accepted the resignations and reaffirmed its policy that the Special Assessment and the now required initiation fee for all new members, is non-refundable.

A request from a resident of Whispering Palms for non-resident golf playing privileges was referred to Mr. Thieme, Chairman of the Legal Committee, for consideration of the possible applicability of Covenant provisions.

Mr. Teagle, Chairman Planning Commission, reported on a recent meeting of interested parties concerning location of proposed new library building, and expressed the opinion that a satisfactory resolution of the situation could be presented at the next Board meeting.

Mr. Teagle reported on a recent meeting of the Planning Commission. He stated that the group feels that a thorough study should be made of objectives relative to ultimate population and density and will proceed with further consideration of the question.

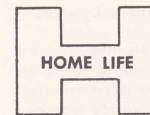

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE RANCHO SANTA FE ASSOCIATION, FRIDAY, JANUARY 21, 1966, AT 9:00 A.M. IN THE BOARD ROOM.

PRESENT: President Harris, Vice President Larson, George Lewis, Directors Loretz, McLaughlin, and Teagle.

EXCUSED: Director Thieme.

ALSO PRESENT: Art Jury members A. C. Ridland and E. T. Price; Association members H. Pratt, Harry Cottingham, R. Blackledge, D. Getson, J. M. Jayne, F. F. W. Krohn, Mrs. Jane Brett; non-Association members Brice Dillon and Roger Brett; also Counsel Tebbets, Secretary Van Evera and Assistant Secretary Allen.

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 A.M. Mr. Harris announced that at a special meeting of the Board of Directors on Tuesday, January 18, the resignation of Mr. R. C. Corlett from the Board of Directors was accepted with regret. In accordance with procedures specified by the By-Laws of the Association, The Board appointed Mr. George Lewis to fill the unexpired portion of the term of Mr. Corlett, ending June 1968. Mr. Lewis was welcomed to the position of Director on the Rancho Santa Fe Association Board of Directors.

PUBLIC HEARING:

Mr. Harris declared the Public Hearing open to consider the petition for appeal from a ruling of the Art Jury denying a request for subdivision of portion of Lots 4 and 5, Blk 7, Avenida Alondra, filed by Mrs. Beth Cottingham.

Mr. A. C. Ridland, President of the Art Jury, presented the reasons of the Art Jury for making the decision being appealed from. Mr. Ridland stated that although an area of this size could physically accommodate two house sites the proposed subdivision was not considered compatible with the surrounding area and did not lend a uniform and reasonably high standard of artistic result and attractiveness.

After some discussion Mr. Cottingham withdrew the petition for appeal.

Public Hearing closed at 9:07.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING:

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved, as read.

BOARD ACTION:

Cook Subdivision: The Secretary reviewed the matter of the application by Mrs. Wardie Cook for subdivision of portion of Lot 8, Block 34, El Puente and the actions of the hearing held on December

3, 1965. The Secretary reported on the Art Jury's re-examination of the site on January 13, 1966 and the decision to sustain its previous recommendation of disapproval. After due consideration, motion was made, seconded, and carried to sustain the decision of the Art Jury in its original recommendation for disapproval of subdivision of 4.71 gross acres, into two sites of 2.12 and portion of Lot 8, Block 34, El Puente, consisting of 2.59 ± net acres.

Appointment of Art Jury alternate. A vacancy in the position of alternate member of the Art Jury had been created by the appointment of Mr. E. T. Price to full member. The Art Jury submitted a recommendation to the Board for the appointment of Mr. J. E. Coberly, Jr. After due consideration the President of the Association, with the approval of the Board of Directors appointed Mr. Coberly to the position.

Appointment of Board member to fill vacancy. Mr. Larson announced his resignation from the Board of Directors due to personal reasons. It was moved, seconded, and carried, to accept the resignation of Mr. Larson with deep regret and gratitude for the fine work he has done, the resignation to be effective February 4, 1966.

Mr. Harris opened the meeting for nominations to fill the unexpired term of Director Larson. Mr. Loretz nominated Mr. Horace L. Blackman. There began no further nominations the President declared the nominations closed. It was moved, seconded, and carried to appoint Mr. Horace L. Blackman member of the Board of Directors of the Rancho Santa Fe Association, to serve for the unexpired term of Mr. Larson, ending June 1967.

DIRECTORS' REPORTS:

Mr. McLaughlin reported that the Finance Committee had reviewed the Golf Course Committee's request for funds to replace needed golf course equipment, and upon the recommendation of the Finance Committee, it was moved, seconded, and carried to authorize the expenditure of not to exceed \$7,000 for purchase of a seven gang hydraulic tractor mower and \$450 each for purchase of three 22" putting green mowers.

The need for replacement of the ice making machine and ice crusher at the Clubhouse was pointed out, with both reported beyond economical repair and both machines fully depreciated. It was moved seconded, and carried to authorize the expenditure of not to exceed \$1,000 for these two items.

On the recommendation of the Finance Committee it was moved, seconded, and carried, that effective January 1, 1966, all prepaid golf privileges and other charges formerly subject to the 20 percent federal excise tax be increased by an amount equivalent to the tax. This action was taken to affirm the decision formerly approved but not heretofore formalized.

Mr. Teagle, Chairman of the Planning Commission, reported on a recent meeting of the various groups involved to discuss the proposed library location. It was pointed out that the original request for use of Association property has never been denied; however, a more practical arrangement has been worked out for better utilization of the land area. There is no disagreement among the parties involved and the matter is proceeding harmoniously.

SECRETARY'S REPORT:

Joint Meeting. A joint meeting of the Art Jury and the Board of Directors was confirmed for February 8, 1966, at 9:00 A.M., the intent being to discuss procedures in which both groups are involved.

CITIZENS' COMMITTEE FOR STUDY OF INCORPORATION:

Mr. Larson reported on the meetings to date of the Committee. At the first meeting the Bigger and Mangore reports were discussed. The second meeting was attended by Supervisor Robert Cozens and Administrative Assistant William Cravens. Mr. Cozens as the Chairman of the Local Agency Formation Commission, outlined the factors that would require consideration prior to any move toward incorporation. It is the intention of Chairman Schofield of the Committee to call in a number of persons whose experience in matters of incorporation would be helpful to the committee's deliberations.

REQUESTED APPEARANCES:

Mr. Harris recognized members of the audience who had requested permission to speak to the Board. Mr. J. M. Jayne presented a request of his client, Mrs. Victoria Getson, and requested an early consideration of the application for subdivision of portion of Lot 5, Block 29. Association Counsel H. F. Tebbets pointed out areas of possible controversy in effecting the subdivision in question. Mr. Jayne agreed to submit an application for realignment of the Getson property to satisfy the necessary conditions.

Mr. Blackledge spoke to the Board concerning procedures for obtaining Art Jury minutes and other matters involving decisions concerning subdivisions. He was advised by Mr. Harris to discuss the matter further with the Art Jury.

San Diego Gas & Electric Company Launches New Program to Show Dramatic Effects of Night Lighting

SAN DIEGO, Feb. 2—Interest in exterior lighting is mounting rapidly here as the result of a new program launched recently by the San Diego Gas & Electric Company to show the beautifying effects of night lighting.

Key to the success of the program is a custom-made Nightlighter demonstration truck equipped with a variety of flood lights and decorator lights that can be positioned quickly and easily to show what proper lighting will do for a structure.

The primary advantage of the demonstrations is that viewers can see the effect; they don't have to imagine it.

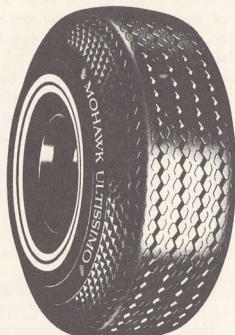
So far, the Nightlighter has been used to illuminate downtown office buildings, schools, clubs, and government office buildings. It also has lighted the Serra Museum on the site of the first padre mission in Old San Diego and the Star of India, an old sailing ship that has been converted into a floating museum.

Demonstrations have led to active preparations for the installation of permanent lighting at several sites.

The Nightlighter is a complete demonstration unit that carries its own power supply, light fixtures and mountings. Fixtures can be mounted on posts and attached to the corners of the truck or on a 30-foot boom. The boom is equipped with a TV antenna rotor to turn fixtures horizontally to any desired position.

Lights used in the demonstrations range from PAR-30 150-watt lamps to a 1500-watt quartz light. A 5-kilowatt generator supplies the power. The truck also carries 200 feet of cord mounted on two reels, making it easy to handle and leaving the area around the truck uncluttered during the demonstrations.

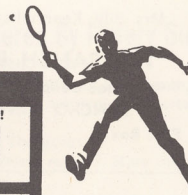

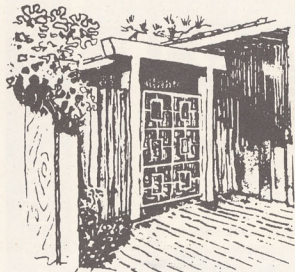

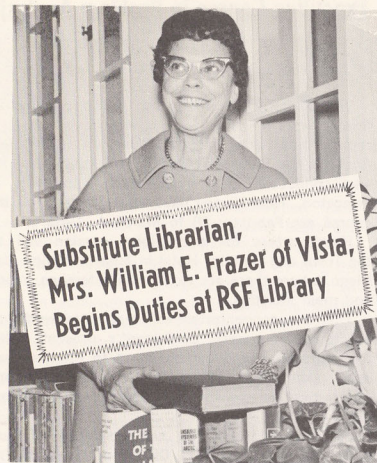

Mrs. William E. Frazer of Vista who began her duties as substitute for Librarian Fran Johnson on January 28, realized at once that the Ranch library was a very special place.

"For instance," she said, "there's Fran herself. She knows which books interest which people and her breezy manner combined with her know-how has helped in a large way to build up the excellent patronage the library enjoys among all age groups. Then of course there's the really splendid collection of books the County and the Library Guild have provided. I am certainly looking forward to becoming better acquainted with both the people and the books."

Mrs. Frazer's library experience dates back to 1939, when she was secretary to Laurence M. Klauber, then Vice-President in Charge of Operation of the San Diego Gas & Electric Company. Mr. Klauber is one of the world's outstanding herpetologists.

"When the company librarian married," Mrs. Frazer explained, "Mr. Klauber offered me the job, and I took it. I learned from working with other librarians the intricacies of cataloguing, processing and many other techniques needed in a five-thousand volume library geared to the needs of engineers. In 1945, when my husband returned from overseas, I resigned."

Mrs. Frazer completed the two semester library course at Palomar College in January, 1965.

"Sometimes," she remarked, "visitors to the Ranch just come in to browse, and they invariably go away leaving compliments on the selection of books.

"Right now there's an unusual treat for everyone. It's a stunning arrangement of cyclamen and philodendron brought in by Mrs. Henry S. Sanger, who has kept flowers in the library for over a month. This arrangement rests in splendor on a table just below a large window which frames a massive acacia in full bloom. In the late afternoon, when Gwen and I are busy getting the books back on the shelves, we take time out every now and then just to look at this exciting combination; the cyclamen accent like a piece of costume jewelry on a gown. Gwen Titcomb, by the way, has five children, but manages to assist a few hours a week, and she does a very fine job.

"How I wish I could have helped the eager lad who wished to make a model of the Globe Theatre. There's a book about the history of theatres, but nothing helpful for a model builder. If anyone who might happen to read this know knowledge of such a volume which could be borrowed locally, would they please let me know? I have the boy's name."

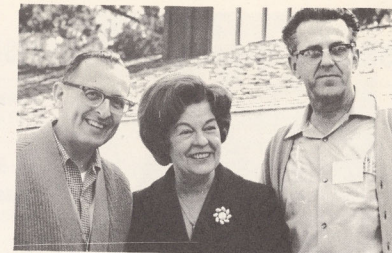

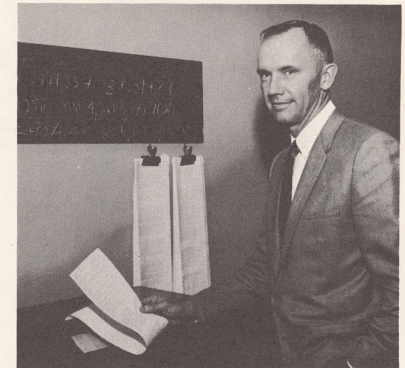

Ranchoite Donald Frick Now Conducting Class in "Securities and Personal Investing" at San Dieguito High School

A nine-week adult education class in "Securities and Personal Investing" offered by the Adult Education Department of the San Dieguito Union High School District, Santa Fe Drive, Encinitas, is now in progress.

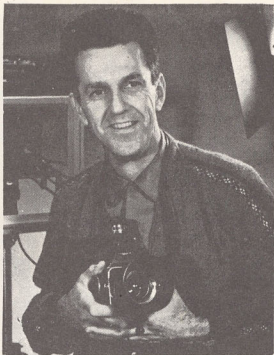

**Ranch Flying Enthusiast --
Alan De Bakcsy!**



PART OF THE TRADITIONAL RITUAL following a successful first solo flight, is cutting off a piece of the pilot's shirt — thereafter to be hung up in the office, properly inscribed with date of flight, as a lasting memento of the occasion!

There are many young men and women on the Ranch who aspire to a driver's license on their sixteenth birthday . . . but with most of them, this means the license to drive a CAR. In the case of Ranchoite Alan De Bakcsy, this also meant soloing in a Cherokee 140. And he did! Although this is almost a year ago now, the pictures above depict the delighted look of victory which came to Alan on April 4th, 1965 at Palomar Airport in Carlsbad.

At age 16 there are many rules and regulations to consider. First of all, the flying instructions take roughly ten hours of actual "in the air" time with an instructor. Alan's work was done with "Flight Trials" and he spent six hours of dual time in the air before he soloed — and since then, in the year following, his solo time has been about three hours. His local flying is necessarily limited because, until he is 17, he can take no passengers. At age 17 the picture changes. Alan can become a full pilot by passing a written test and a flying test. He must travel solo cross-country at least 100 miles from his home base; and dual cross-country at least 100 miles from his home base. When all of this has been done to the satisfaction of his instructor, Alan will become a full pilot — privileged to take passengers.

There are other young Ranchoites who are also vitally interested in this exciting sport . . . among them Muriel Titcomb, Debbie Booth, and Cliff Comey. All will testify as to the satisfaction and exhilaration which comes with flying. As far as Alan DeBakcsy is concerned, he hopes to continue with this as a possible career — and when his service time rolls around, the Air Corps will be his choice . . . and understandably so!

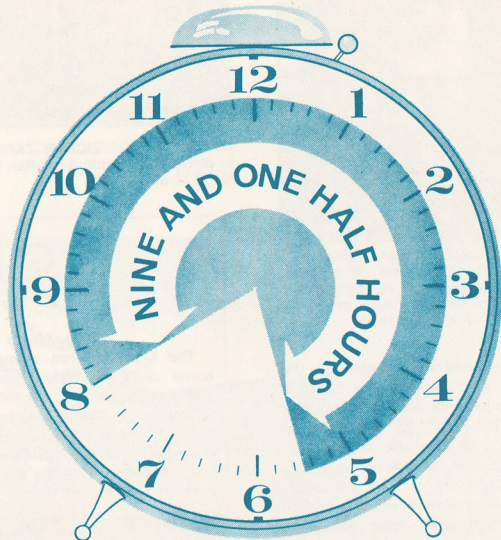

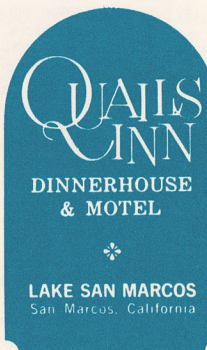

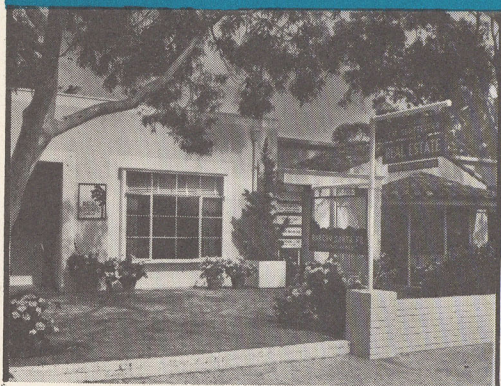
