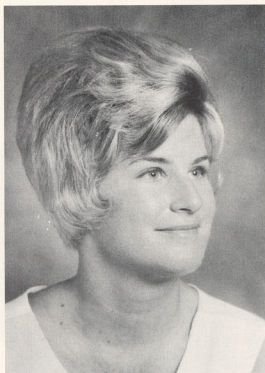

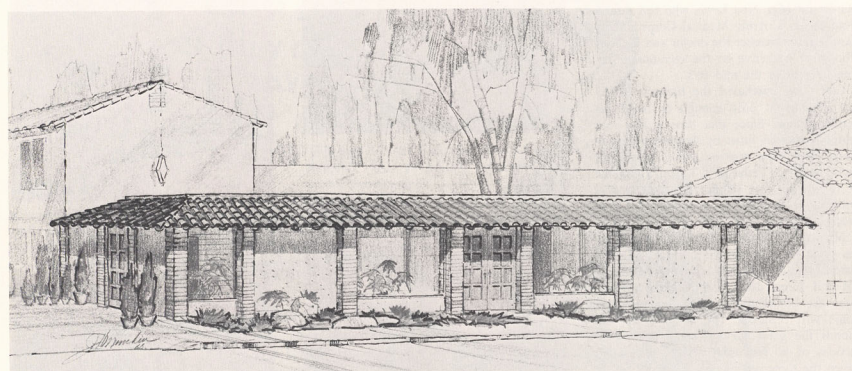

**THE ROMANCE OF A RANCHO
SANTA FE HOME . . . SOON TO BE
RESTORED TO SHOWPLACE STATUS**

Since January 1928 a lovely two-story, Spanish-style home stood on the corner of La Flecha and Paseo Delicias almost exactly as it was originally built by the late Mr. H. G. Larrick as his own home. It was built of solid redwood throughout with beautiful hardwood floors fastened by pegs. It was designed by Lillian Rice, AIA, who designed many of the Rancho Santa Fe homes, and constructed with a quality that is rarely seen today.

Unfortunately, the Larricks were only able to live in their lovely home for a short while when the depression hit and business reverses forced its sale. It was purchased by Major and Mrs. Ned Lewis who had retired from the U.S. Army Medical Corps. Many Ranchoites remember the doctor and his lady who were so active in the community before he died in the mid-40's.

Carl Cato purchased the house in 1955 but lived in it only enough to build his present home. Since that time it has been rented numerous times by short-term tenants while they were making more permanent arrangements. Perhaps it lacked for some of the loving care it once had, but now it will come alive again more beautiful than ever.

Mr. Arnold Kessler, the present owner has great plans for its restoration and relocation. At the intersection of Puerto del Sol and Linea del Cielo on three sloping acres the beautifully restored and enlarged home will command the attention as one rounds the great curve in the road. Two sections of 20 feet each will be placed between the three sections of the house before it is joined together again. A pool and formal garden are to be added and the entire site will be landscaped. Mr. Kessler, who is retired as a business consultant, plans to live in the home with his wife and three sons.



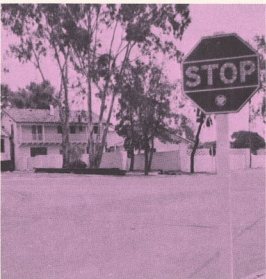
The trip begins as the dining-living room section is moved aside to allow the main section to lead the procession.

Smooth sailing once more at the intersection of Linea del Cielo and Las Flores. Only a few leaves were pulled off the trees because of the skill of the movers crew.



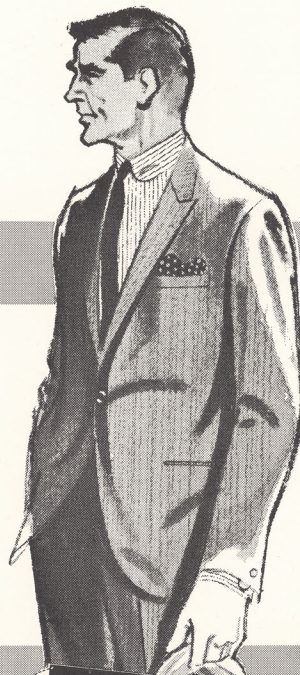

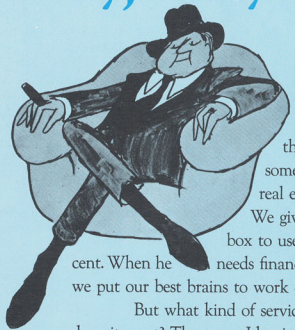

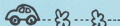

THE SAN DIEGO OPERA

Walter Herbert, Artistic Director and Conductor for the San Diego Opera, has announced casts for the company's 1968-69 season.

Peter Glossop, the English baritone, is to sing the title role in "Rigoletto," which opens the three-opera season October 17. It was as the hunch-back jester that Glossop made his very successful La Scala debut.

Soprano Anne Elgar will portray Gilda, his daughter and Michael Trimbel is to be the licentious Duke of Mantua. Miss Elgar, who is with the New York City Opera was Rosina in the 1966 production of "The Barber of Seville." Trimbel is currently appearing with the Frankfurt Opera.

Arriving from Interopera, Milan, who are supplying sets and costumes, will be Stage Director, Rexford Harrower, an American who has built up an international reputation in his field.

The leading roles of Mimi and Rodolfo in "La Boheme," opening November 14, will be sung by Lee Venora and John Stewart. Miss Venora's last appearance here was in the San Francisco Opera Company's "Gianni Schicchi." John Stewart is a personable young tenor, currently appearing with the Santa Fe Opera.

The role of Schaunard in "La Boheme" which is a repeat of the company's first production, will be sung by Raymond Gibbs of San Diego who now sings with the New York City Opera.

William Adams, the company's Assistant Artistic Director, will direct the staging and, sets and costumes will be those designed by Peggy Kellner for the 1965 production.

Massenet's "Don Quixote," opening April 24, will feature Norman Treigle as the Don, a role he has long coveted. Soprano Nedda Casei will be the courtesan, Dulcinea, the inspiration for his chivalrous, if foolish deeds. Andrew Foldi will portray the faithful Sancho Panzo.

Costume and set designer for this tribute to San Diego's 200th Anniversary will be Robert Darling of San Francisco. William Adams will again direct the staging.

Season tickets are still available but subscribers are urged to order before the September 1 deadline if they are renewing previous seating locations. Single performance tickets will go on sale at the Civic Theatre Box office, September 23. Ranchosites who haven't received brochures may call 232-7636 for information.

Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Board of Directors of Rancho Santa Fe Association Held on Thursday, June 20, 1968 at 9:00 a.m. in the Board Room.

PRESENT: Directors Millard, Evans, Bakewell, Lasswell, Lee, Price and Witherow.
ALSO PRESENT: Association members L. B. McLaughlin, G. J. Lewis, W. Wyman, D. Kintner, Mrs. T. C. Ward, W. Schofield; Mrs. Ann Clevering, representing Rancho Santa Fe Times; Attorney L. H. Silverberg, representing W. Wencke; Secretary Van Evera and Recording Secretary Butts.

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m.

Pursuant to the returns of the Annual Election held on June 10, 1968 the following Board members took their seats: D. M. Bakewell and J. E. Lee.

Nominations for President of the Board were declared open; Mr. H. Ray Millard was nominated. There being no further nominations, it was moved, seconded and carried that the nominations be closed. Mr. Millard was unanimously elected President.

The President called for nominations for Vice President. Mr. Bakewell nominated Mr. Evans. Mr. Price nominated Mr. Lasswell; Mr. Lasswell declined. At Mr. Lasswell's request, Mr. Price withdrew his nomination. There being no further nominations, it was moved, seconded and carried that the nominations be closed. Mr. E. J. Evans was unanimously elected Vice President.

President Millard called for a motion to reappoint Mr. Van Evera to the position of Secretary-Treasurer of Rancho Santa Fe Association. It was moved, seconded and carried that Mr. David A. Van Evera be reappointed Secretary-Treasurer of Rancho Santa Fe Association.

President Millard presented framed certificates to Past President McLaughlin and Past Director Lewis in recognition of their service to Rancho Santa Fe Association.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING: The minutes of the meeting of June 6, 1968 were approved as submitted. The President declared a recess at 9:10 a.m. for a Public Hearing.

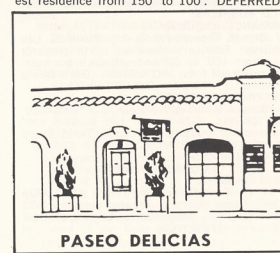

- (2) Effective October 1, 1968 that said restaurant, bar and snack shop be operated on a "chits only" basis and that no cash be accepted for merchandise or services;
- (3) Effective October 1, 1968 that a monthly charge be established for the use of these facilities of \$10 per month per family said sum to be used for the purchase of food or services at said facilities or forfeited if not so used.

After discussion, the motion was seconded and unanimously approved. A letter will be sent to Association members and holders of annual playing privileges which will explain the plan.

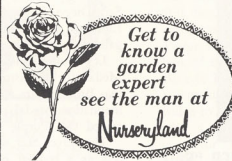

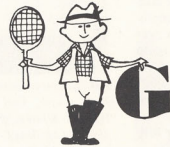

To the Board of Directors, Mr. Chairman, Gentlemen, we have the honor to present the Report of the Rancho Santa Fe Fire Department outlining its activities and accomplishments made during the fiscal year, 1967-68.



ORGANIZATION

The Rancho Santa Fe Fire Department was formed on October 14th, 1946 and is legally organized under the Local Fire District Law of the State of California. Prior to this date the Community had no organized fire protection of its own and depended on the California State Division of Forestry for fire cover.

The first public effort to create a local fire department came as a result of a disastrous brush fire in 1943 which resulted in the destruction of the ranch.

The fire district covers an area of approximately 14 square miles, has 1012 residences and estimated population of 2,800. Taxable equalized assessed valuations, secured and unsecured for the fiscal year under review was \$19,966,010. The tax rate being 37 cents per \$100.00 of assessed valuation.

As a result of a National Board of Fire Underwriters re-insurance classification grading conducted in 1960, the Community was placed in a National Board Class 6. This resulted in a substantial reduction (approximately 50%) in insurance premiums over the former Rural Class 3 established in 1953.

PERSONNEL

At present the Department is organized on a call volunteer basis with seven paid firemen, the Fire Chief and 15 volunteer firemen. Two firemen being detached to the Costa Community in compliance with a contract signed with the San Diego County for the establishing of fire protection in that development. The Chief is on a continuous duty system, while the firemen operate a two hour work week. Again, as in previous years, we are indebted to the Rancho Santa Fe Association and Director Grist for permitting personnel under their jurisdiction to be available in case of emergency.

EQUIPMENT

Attached to the Department are nine emergency vehicles:

- 2—750 gpm Pumpers
- 1—500 gpm Pumper
- 1—Tank Truck of 1500 gallons capacity equipped with a portable pump
- 1—Dodge 4 x 4 Grass Rig equipped with pump and 200 gallons of water
- 1—1000 gpm State owned Pumper
- 1—State owned Heavy Duty Rescue Truck
- 1—Pickup Truck and Trailer
- 1—Intensive Care Unit Ambulance

Alleged on call to the department are two tank trucks each of 1200 gallons capacity. We are grateful to the Rancho Santa Fe Maintenance Department and Rancho Pasa Tiempo Farm for allowing the trucks to be made available to the Department in emergencies.

A strict preventive maintenance schedule is followed to ensure that emergency apparatus always operate at peak performance and to reduce the need for expensive major repairs. Records are kept of all repairs including the cost of operation of each unit.

On drills and emergency and Department business, the apparatus covered a distance of 10,477 miles during the year, pumped for 23 hours 52 minutes and used 10,477 quarts of oil and 1,687 gallons of gasoline.

3,468 gallons of gasoline were issued to the Deputy Sheriff's car under an agreement with and paid for by the Rancho Santa Fe Association. 1,924 gallons of gasoline was issued to the R.S.F. Maintenance District, this is also provided for by an agreement with the Special District Services of the County of San Diego. Six "Plectron" Radio Monitors on our trucks frequently have been practiced in homes of firemen. This equipment enables an immediate response of off-duty men to be made during an emergency.

NEW APPARATUS

Placed into service during the year under review was a Intensive Combination Class A Pumper and the Intensive Care Unit. A pumper was purchased to meet the requirements of the Intensive Fire Rating Bureau in view of obtaining a reclassification of the fire defenses of the Ranch and hopefully once again reducing the insurance rates.

As a result of surveys conducted by ourselves and the Ranch Doctors over the last several years on the feasibility for providing the Community with an "ambulance," the conclusion was reached having evaluated the many variables that such a unit would be desirable. As a result of your recommendations such a unit was developed and built by the Department in cooperation with Mr. Mr. Schriever. The entire cost of the apparatus together with equipment amounting to \$15,000.00 was borne by the Ranch and Mrs. Leon Janinet as a gift to the Community.

The ambulance or "Intensive Care Unit" as it is called, was placed into service in September 1967 and to the end of the fiscal year has responded to over 30 emergency calls.

ALARMS

The total number of alarms responded to by the Department during the year was 65. These were made up as follows:

This represents an increase of 5 calls over the previous years total. The estimated loss for the year under review was \$14,255.00.

SPECIAL SERVICES

Each year the Department is called upon to render an assortment of services outside the field of fire fighting. These calls are in effect due to a realization of the special skill and equipment the Department possesses to do unusual jobs: from killing rattlesnakes to pumping water from flooded basements.

During the year under review, special service calls amounted to 26. These included removing trees from roads, removing harmless snakes, first aid to animals, finding lost children and animals, removing cars from trees, cooling LPG tanks, turning off appliances, removing dead animals, and many other services.

The Department's Training Room continued to serve as a meeting place for organizations on the Ranch during the year. The room facilities were used on at least 104 occasions by such groups as the Boy Scouts, Church groups, Civic groups and Little League meetings.

COMMUNICATIONS

During the Fiscal year the Department purchased new mobile radios for the Intensive Care Unit, Unit 38, and the new Pumper Truck, Unit 30. These radios are of dual-frequency design, with all transistor receivers and partially transistorized transmitters. We applied for and received authorization to use a second F-M frequency, shared with the Solana Beach Fire Department, to which we have previously been denied. This frequency is blocked or otherwise out of primary use. During the coming year most of our color radio equipments will be modified to have dual-frequency capability.

Two more "Monitor" receivers were purchased during the year. The result that all regular full-time members of the Department are now able to monitor our primary frequency at home. This factor helps greatly

to shorten the response time of off-duty men when an emergency arises.

Department personnel completely refurbished the Operations area of our station, building a modern console to house essential communications controls, time clock, 24-hour digital clock and a new tape recorder. The addition of the tape recorder marks a significant improvement in the operating practices of the Department. The recorder turns on automatically whenever a telephone call is answered on the primary emergency number, 756-1126. Both sides of the conversation are permanently recorded and may be played or immediately reviewed by the Department for purposes of verifying the message, the address or other pertinent details. Tapes will be stored for safety in a fireproof safe in order to retain such data for possible legal purposes and to serve as excellent training material for department personnel.

The "Poway" fire of last October dramatically illustrated the need for a mutual aid district frequency by which fire fighting vehicles from various departments throughout the County could communicate with each other for coordination purposes. The San Diego County Fire Chief's Association, of which we are a member, has asked the County of San Diego for help in determining the best course of action by which to achieve this mutual aid frequency. In turn, the County has requested all manufacturers of two-way radio and all other interested parties to submit proposals for consideration. It is expected that a satisfactory program will be developed before the end of 1968. We have no idea to what extent our present radio equipment will be affected by this program. Extension modifications may be necessary, or possibly even the complete replacement of all two-way radio equipment presently in our inventory. We are taking an active interest in the proposed program, to help find a solution that will provide the greatest overall benefits to ourselves, with expense to our District and the least disruption of our present communications system.

TRAINING

Despite the overwhelming importance of manpower in effective fire suppression, increasing population, property values and hazards in urban areas have occurred at a time when firefighting forces have decreased in both actual and proportionate strength. With the universal urban financial plight, there is no likelihood that they can be built up to required strength. These depleted forces must then be highly trained to be effective. Each man must be able not only to perform his own job at highest capacity, but to fill the gaps in personnel by performing other's specialized assignments. Officers face the administrative complexities arising from the necessity of deploying inadequate forces over larger areas, while at the same time they must increase their specialized knowledge and revise their tactical plans to cope with the multitude of potential hazards which until recently were unknown. Firefighters must learn to use and maintain new and specialized equipment. They must keep abreast of construction changing hazardous materials and the techniques of dealing with them.

The Department devotes a good deal of time and effort to maintain a training program. On duty personnel are required to conduct training in quarters each day. One night each week all personnel and volunteers report to the Fire Station to receive training and instruction.

During the year, 169 drills were conducted involving 1060 man hours. These were made up as follows:

Once again it is my pleasure to report that considerable improvement continues to be made in the supply of water for firefighting purposes throughout the County. The Fire District's closest liaison is maintained with the Manzanita and Santa Fe Irrigation District, Mr. Tolley and his staff, on matters in which both Departments have mutual interest. 19 approved type six inch hydrants were installed during the year.

Clean up" week, Christmas Fire Safety, and with the excellent cooperation of the "Rancho Santa Fe Times" and "Rancho Santa Fe Living" frequent publicity reminders.

During the year hundreds of pieces of fire prevention material were distributed, including literature, Christmas tree tags, fire helmets and badges, also visits to the Department of organized parties of school children and adult organizations are encouraged as they provide an excellent opportunity of showing the Department at work and the correct action to ensure the prompt attendance of the Department at fires and incidents is demonstrated.

Lectures to various organizations have continued to be a feature of the Department's activities to educate the public in the area of Fire Prevention. Additionally lectures and demonstrations to the R.S.F. Elementary School illustrating the dangers of fire were taken with the cooperation of the School's Officials.

The Department is indebted to Superintendent Rowe and his staff for their cooperation in bringing an understanding of the importance of fire safety to the children of the "Ranch."

Fire Drills at the Elementary School were carried out on a monthly basis and the results recorded.

WORK PROGRAM

During the year personnel have painted, serviced and tested hydrants throughout the District.

The Department pumps have been tested in accordance with the requirements of the Pacific Fire Rating Bureau. All pumps successfully passed the test. The Bureau also requires that all fire hose be tested annually and that a complete record be kept on each piece of hose.

RESIGNATION

One fireman was required to resign due to his inability to pass the probationary examination.

RECRUITMENT

The standards set for recruitment were maintained with the following results: Applicants called for examination, 5, 3 attended for examination. Recruit appointed, Carl B. Pohlman.

EDUCATION

A systematic and deliberate educational program leading to a broad knowledge base is the only sure approach to professionalization. It is unrealistic to expect every member of the department to have a formal education (college degree), nevertheless, efforts are being made within the Department, for a professional level to be established. To this end five members of the Department attended the following semester courses in Fire Science held at Palomar College.

Rescue Practices

Fire Fighting School Practices Codes and Ordinances Besides the schooling held at Palomar College, Chief Fox and members of the Department attended a number of training exercises during the year ranging from a medical symposium in San Diego to demonstrations covering new firefighting equipment and techniques.

The Department was represented at a number of meetings held during the year for Fire Training and Fire Prevention Officers. During these meetings much valuable information is presented relative to training and fire prevention. Also an exchange of experiences and ideas is carried out which is of great help to members of the Department in dealing with problems that come up in the area of fire suppression.

FIRST AID

Department personnel devoted a large portion of its training session to first aid during the year under review. This was due to the Department's new Mobile Medical Unit placed into service. Members of the Department found it necessary to both receive and conduct additional first aid training in medical emergency problems and equipment that they had had little prior experience in dealing with or handling. Some of these were:

Handling and carrying patients with a variety of injuries on new specialized medical —hospital designed stretchers.

New and advanced types of resuscitation and aspiration equipment.

Medical information and procedures, to enable personnel to be of more assistance in working with doctors.

Advanced first aid skills.

Advanced training in coronary care, cardiac arrest, closed chest and heart-lung resuscitation.

218 manhours were spent on this undertaking.

First Aid lectures and demonstrations of the oral method of resuscitation were given by Department personnel on four occasions to members of the Backyard Swim Program.

A 16 hour first aid course entitled "Family Guide Emergency Health Care" was held at the Fire Station with a number of local residents attending.

One feature of the course not usually given in standard first aid procedures was a lecture and film on emergency child birth. We are grateful to Dr. Wood for giving of his time to this session.

INSPECTIONS

It is essential for firemen to become well acquainted with the types and occupancy of buildings in which they will be called upon to fight fires. Through such inspections, firemen are informed concerning the physical structure of building and how fire might spread and consequently how best to fight the fire.

In Rancho Santa Fe, the Department has few target hazards such as key industries or properties where there may be considerable life hazard. However, eight special inspections for pre-planning fire fighting operations were conducted by full time and volunteer personnel during the year under review.

These were:

1. The new Library
2. The new Badger Building
3. The new Badger school complex
4. The Silver Lining Stable
5. Del Mar Fair Grounds
6. The Inn
7. The Golf Course Restaurant
8. Post Office

In reviewing this report one must keep in mind the outstanding effort and spirit of cooperation demonstrated by the volunteers, the paid members of the Department, and Sheriff Chermak.

Once again it is my pleasure to pay tribute to Volunteer Captains Gillies and Fox for unstintingly giving of their time to the Department. To the members of the staff both paid and volunteer, I wish to place on record my thanks for their loyal and efficient service given me and the community.

In conclusion I would like to extend my sincere appreciation to the support I have received from yourselves and other organizations of the community.

When I was first born I wasn't any bigger than a honey bee and lived for several weeks with my brothers and sisters in my Mommy's pouch. Life was perfect—we had wall to wall carpeting and a snack bar too! When we grew big enough we came to live in the outside world and to begin our 'possum lessons. Our Mother, Petunia O. Possum, was our teacher. We stayed close by her side and she showed us the intricacies of The Beetle Hunt, Mouse Capture and Garden Snitching. We learned how crunchy-good big black beetles are and how sweet and juicy corn on the cob and fresh fruit can be. My mouth waters when I think of such goodies. Mother also showed us good 'possum table manners—how to hang from a tree branch upside down by your tail and how to hold your food carefully with all four feet. We 'possums are neat and never spill a morsel because our hind paws have a fifth toe which I've noticed works very much like a people-thumb. I've often wondered how anyone can properly digest their food if they're not upside down!

When Mother took us on long trips for food, and when our little legs got too tired to make the journey back, Mother would stop while we all clambered up her strong back. Then we would dig to her long fur and ride until we were safe and snug in our hollow log home. Sometimes as a special treat for good behavior, she would arch her powerful tail over her back and we'd swing from it by our little tails and pretend we had our own 'possum playground.

One day that I'll never forget, Mother took me and my brothers and sisters, Peter, Pickles, Pepper, Penny, Priscilla, and Pinafore Possum, on a search for a bedtime snack. It was unusually late in the morning—we 'possums hunt at night and snooze during the day so that your people morning is our 'possum bedtime. Mother had always warned me about ambling far away from her, but I didn't pay much attention—you know what worriers mothers can be. I had forgotten all about Mother's warning because I'd seen a magnificent black beetle crawling toward a distant rock, and he looked so yummy-good that I couldn't resist following him. Guess I was too slow because he'd disappeared by the time I got there. Then I thought I saw a small leaf stir and heard a soft rustling. 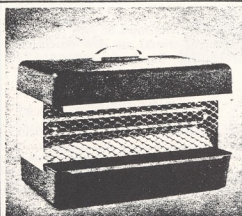

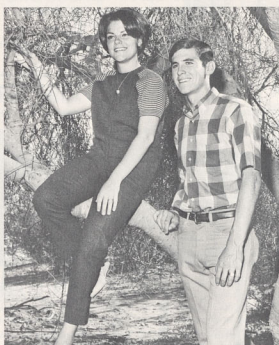

SACRAMENTO REPORT

FROM THE OFFICE OF ASSEMBLYMAN JOHN STULL

It would be reassuring to say that the 1968 session of the California Legislature ended in a blaze of glory. However, as this is written (August 4), there is a historical debate raging as to whether the session has ended at all. August 2, Assembly Speaker Jesse Unruh recessed the lower house over Sunday. A few hours later, in a blast of invective, Unruh's fellow-Democrat, Acting Governor (normally Senator) Hugh Burns adjourned the session by proclamation. Shortly after Lieutenant Governor Finch's GOP Convention-bound plane crossed the California border, Burns assumed the power of chief executive and took the action, unprecedented in 117 years of Golden State history.

The whole history-making situation is interesting, but one of the amazing facets is the fact that the Democratic leadership of the Assembly has viciously locked horns with the Democratic leadership of the Senate. One of the main issues is Unruh's habit of taking a large number of important bills (mostly money-type), packaging them together at the last minute and ramming them through the legislature. This year the combination was designated AB 1962, marked "URGENT" and sent to the Assembly about two hours before the vote. The impossibility of even knowing what was involved can be shown by the fact that the amendments alone totaled some 40 pages! Personally, in the brief time available for study, I found some parts acceptable but could not take the rest. Nevertheless, by considerable pressure, the bill passed the Assembly by a 54 to 14 vote.

In the Senate it was a different story. Unruh's fellow-Democrat, Senator George Miller, charged the lower house leadership with "holding bills for ransom until they get what they want." I don't know where this will all end, but as of this date, the checks and balances of our state government are working well. The strong-arm tactics of the Assembly leadership were stopped cold in the Senate. It is the best argument I have seen for retention of a bicameral legislature.



"WHEN'S THE NEXT BUS TO CATALINA?"

That's a good question, considering there's 27 miles of sea between the mainland and Catalina Island.

But it's not a question that Pacific Telephone information operators can answer easily, if at all.

And to decrease the number of off-beat inquiries, the phrase "Directory Assistance" will be put into use in Northern San Diego County Monday (August 12) by information operators.

The change in terminology is nationwide throughout the Bell System, according to Gordon Moser, district traffic manager, although the complete change-over in Pacific Telephone is not expected until November.

"The term, 'directory assistance,' accurately describes the function of an information operator," Moser said. "She helps a customer locate numbers not in a directory, numbers outside a directory area, or new numbers not yet listed."

Studies have proved that where the phrase "Directory Assistance" has been substituted for "Information," the number of kooky queries has been reduced substantially, and customers in need of telephone assistance has been given quicker service. So, if you're wondering how to boil corn or are worried about whether or not to wash your dishes after your kitchen has been exterminated, don't dial 411.

Chances are the information operator still hasn't figured out when the next bus leaves for Catalina.

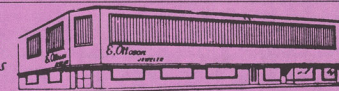

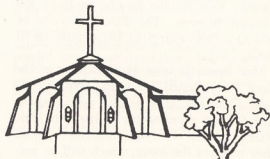

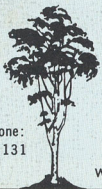
