He received his Bachelor of Science and Law from the University of Wyoming in 1958 and his L.L.B. from California University in 1962.

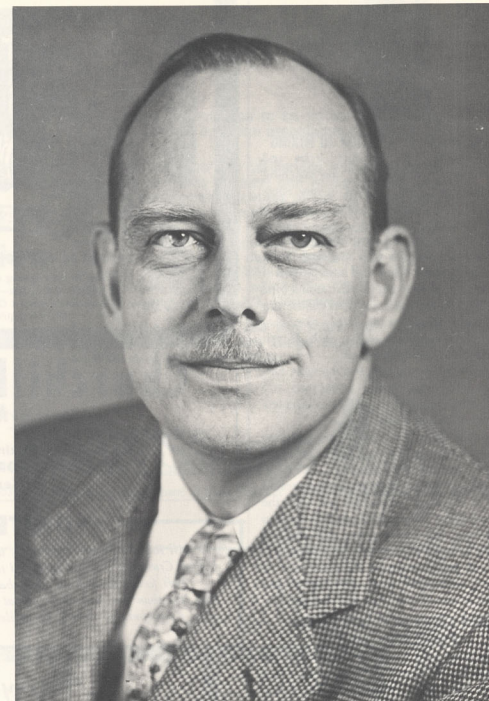
Hammons is a member of the San Diego County Bar Association, State Bar of California, Barristers Club of San Diego and is on the board of directors of the Dodson Home.

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In Memoriam

JOHN ELLIOTT HAINES

1903-1967

Rancho Santa Fe lost one of its most outstanding citizens on the twenty-fifth of November with the death of John Elliott Haines of Paseo Delicias.

Mr. Haines received his B.S. degree in Chemical Engineering from Purdue University in 1925. He was President of the American Society of Heating and Air Conditioning Engineers in 1955, and a Fellow of ASHRAE in 1961. He joined Honeywell, Inc. in 1929 and was Vice President of this company from 1945 to 1965. During this period, Mr. Haines was the author of "Automatic Control of Heating and Air Conditioning," published by McGraw-Hill in 1953. He was awarded the Distinguished Alumnus Award at Purdue University in 1964; was the holder of twenty-three U. S. patents. He moved to Rancho Santa Fe in 1964 and formed an engineering partnership with Arthur Hess under the firm name of "San Diego Engineering."

Mr. Haines is survived by his wife Mary, known to her scores of friends as "Billie"; a son, Jefferson who is with the U. S. Army; a son, J. Thomas, of Dallas, Texas; and a grandson, John.

CALLING ALL HOME MAKERS

YOU CAN MATCH IN ADDITION TO MIXING

While mixing of furniture styles and finishes is still a strong trend, the matching of fabrics, colors and patterns is very effective and popular at the same time.

Here are a few examples:

Ordinarily, you would never think of using the same color on both your sofa and living room carpet; yet, one of the most beautiful rooms we have seen had a dark solid blue sofa with the identical color used on the rug in that room. Of course, in such a case, very strong accents of other colors such as yellows and greens should be used.

In the bedroom you may use the same fabric very effectively on the bedspreads and boudoir chair, provided you use completely different colors elsewhere.

It can also be a good idea to use the same fabric on both drapes and throw cushions to create a co-ordinated look.

Some beautiful kitchens have been created by using the same vinyl tiles on both the floor and walls. Where wall-paper is used in the kitchen, this same paper will make a stunning lining for your kitchen cabinets.

So now you have heard the other side of the "mix or match" story. Whichever you like best, a visit to our store will delight you.

HERE ARE RESULTS OF TESTS ON DINING ROOM TABLES

Tests have been made on the ideal measurements for dining room tables, and because of these tests, here are some of the things you should keep in mind in selecting furniture for the dining room.

These tests have shown that about 24 inches of space should be provided for each person who is going to sit at the table.

The table should be at least 30 inches wide if you want two to face each other across the table and have room for their place setting above the table and their feet underneath.

If space in your room is limited, it is better to choose a narrower chair than to save an inch or two on the table measurements.

Ideally, table legs should not be in the way of those sitting around the table even when it is extended. But they often are, so look to see how inconvenient this will be before making up your mind.

Is the height right? Most people find a height of 28 to 29 inches from the floor to the table top most comfortable. The table should be between 10 to 12 inches higher than the chair seat.

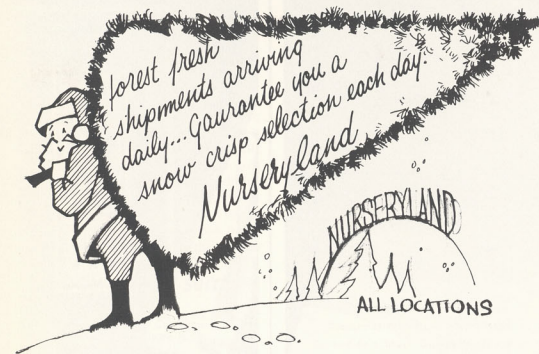

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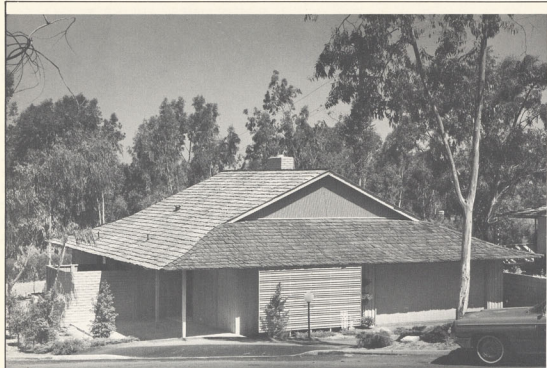

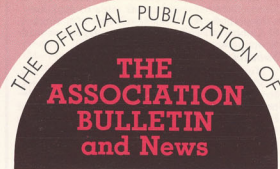

RESOLVED: That the following regulations for the keeping of animals (other than horses and cattle) authorized by Rancho Santa Fe Protective Covenant, Article V, Sec. 5, and subject to the provisions thereof, be adopted effective November 16, 1967:

1. Article I, Section 5, of the Rancho Santa Fe Protective Covenant provides that the keeping of any cattle, hogs, rabbits, horses, or other animals, or poultry, on Rancho Santa Fe covenanted property shall be subject to reasonable regulations to be made by the Board of Directors, determining the numbers thereof, the distance they must be maintained from dwellings and public roads, and other sanitary requirements.

2. The following regulations shall apply to the keeping of any animals or poultry (other than horses or cattle which are covered by separate regulations).

3. The keeping of any animals or poultry, other than horses or cattle, on Rancho Santa Fe covenanted property, shall be permitted only as an adjunct to a family residence.

4. Animals and poultry shall be kept at all times in a manner and in number that is neither offensive nor disagreeable to surrounding residents.

5. Complaints that animals or poultry are offensive to any residents by virtue of noise, odor or other undesirable characteristics shall be made in writing to the Manager of the Association or his designate. The Manager or his designate shall investigate the complaint and may arrange a conference between the complainant and the owner or occupier of the property where the alleged offensive animals or poultry are situated.

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The D.A.R. Story As Told To The PS Chapter P.E.O.

October 9, 1967

"The years between the centennial celebration of our birth as a nation and the approaching anniversary of the discovery of the New World (1876-1892) were marked by a revival in patriotism and an intense interest in the beginnings of the United States of America. Associations such as the Society of the Cincinnati, which dates back to the American Revolution, The Sons of Revolutionary Sires, The Sons of the Revolution, and the Sons of the American Revolution offered men opportunities to perpetuate the memory of ancestors who fought to make this country free and independent.

"The Sons of the American Revolution at a meetings in Louisville, Kentucky, on April 30, 1890, excluded women from membership." Women too felt the desire to express their patriotic feelings. During the summer of 1890 a few women in the Capitol City began to put their thoughts together and after three organizational meetings the Daughters of the American Revolution was organized formally on October 11, 1890. Mrs. Caroline Scott Harrison, wife of the President of the United States, was elected as the first President General.

The Objectives of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution are "to perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of Historical Research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and by records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.

"To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, 'to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge' thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

"To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American Freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for all mankind all the blessings of liberty." These are the basic, unchanging Challenges and Goals of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution.

"Authorizing the pursuit of these objectives is the Congressional Act of Incorporation of 1895 chartering the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution,

signed February 20, 1896, by Grover Cleveland, President of the United States. "The Act of Incorporation requires said Society shall report annually to the Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution concerning its proceedings, and said Secretary shall communicate to Congress such portions thereof as he may deem of national interest and importance."

"The threefold purpose of the NSDAR is exactly the same now as when the Society was organized — seventy-five years ago in 1890, to wit: Historical, Educational and Patriotic."

"To carry out these aims the National Society has established various committees, each with a similar committee in each State and also at the Chapter level.



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The Committee on American Heritage was established to aid and encourage the preservation of our rich American Heritage in the fields of art, crafts, drama, literature and music.

The National Defense Committee is dedicated, as it implies, to the defense of the Nation. It is dedicated to National Defense not only in a military sense but to the preservation of the principals and ideals of the Founding Fathers who created the Constitutional Republic in which we are as citizens most fortunate to live. To this end, and in keeping with the by-laws of the National Society, the National Defense Committee seeks to "cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American Freedom." It is, therefore, the continuing purpose of the Committee to foster the moral, spiritual and constitutional values on which American freedoms are based.

Other National Committees are—

1. American Indians—This committee is concerned that all possible assistance for higher education be obtained for the Indian Youth whose families have insufficient resources. The Society aids St. Mary's School for Indian Girls, at Springfield, South Dakota and Bacone College in Bacone, Oklahoma.

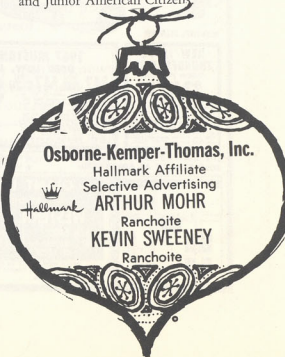
2. Americanism and D.A.R. Manual for Citizenship—the goal of this committee is the development of better citizenship for all persons residing in America.

3. The Student Loan and Scholarship Committee provides ways and means for the education of worthy and ambitious students in training for nursing, commercial courses or for college.

4. The Transportation Committee cooperates with local authorities on programs dealing with traffic safety.

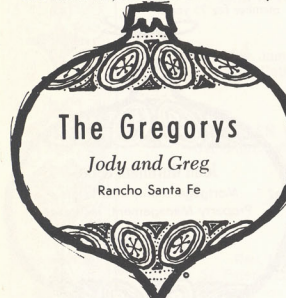
5. The D.A.R. Good Citizens Committee stresses the qualities of Good Citizenship among our Senior High Schools.

Other Committees are: American Heritage, Children of the American Revolution, Junior Membership, Lineage Research, Membership, Program, The Flag of the United States of America, Genealogical Records, Honor Roll, and Junior American Citizens.



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The colors of Washington's staff (dark blue and white) were chosen for the rosette, and a seal and motto were decided upon. At first the motto was AMOR PATRAIAE—love of country, but was shortly changed to "Home and Country." A seal bearing the image of a woman seated at a spinning wheel was adopted. The present seal conforms to the NSDAR By-laws, which provide that the "Seal of the National Society shall be changed with the figure of a Dame of the period of the American Revolution sitting at her spinning wheel, with thirteen stars above her, the whole surrounded by a

rim containing the name, 'The National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution,' the Motto 'Home and Country' and dates '1776' and '1890.' The young woman who sat for the sketch of the 'dame' was a Miss Meikham, one of the great-granddaughters of Thomas Jefferson.

There is appealing symbolism in the component parts of the designs of the seal and the Insignia of the National Society. The figure of the woman and the spinning wheel represent the home, which is indeed the foundation of this nation. Most of the elements of good that favorably influence our national life come originally in some identifiable form from the American home. Here in learnings begins and education has its origin.

The stars on the Seal and the Insignia represent the thirteen original states. They also signify our nation's history, and can be thought of, too, as representing the idealism of true freedom, and the highest aspirations of the "men and women who achieved American Independence," and all those who have endeavored to preserve the freedom and independence of this great country.

The rim of the spinning wheel is an endless circle, and we may think of this as the necessity for endless patriotism in the strong support and progress that must never come to an end if this "democracy in a republic" is to continue for all time for all Americans. If the rim weakens and breaks, the usefulness of the wheel is lost.

Thus the Seal and the Insignia of our National Society may constantly represent to us the objects of D.A.R.—education, history, and patriotism.

The Society has built and maintains with D.A.R. funds two modern schools for underprivileged children in the Appalachian area, Tamassee in South Carolina and Kate Duncan Smith in Alabama. Tamassee has 165 boarding students and 141 day students attending the elementary classes, and 50 boarding students attending the Tamassee-Salem High School at Salem, South Carolina—a total of 356 students. Kate Duncan Smith at Grant, Alabama, is a day school with an enrollment of 716 students attending the elementary and High School. In December 1964, Kate Duncan Smith was accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

The household work and much of the manual labor in construction and maintenance is done by the students under competent supervision. These schools are dependent upon the generosity of D.A.R. State Societies Chapters and members for support. The Society has seven other schools and colleges on the approved list—these too are aided by the Society as they do receive aid from other sources. To be on the Approved List a school or college must be for underprivileged boys and girls who otherwise would not have the opportunity for an education. They must maintain high scholastic standards and teach Patriotic American Principals. D.A.R. has been concerned with education for these children for seventy years.

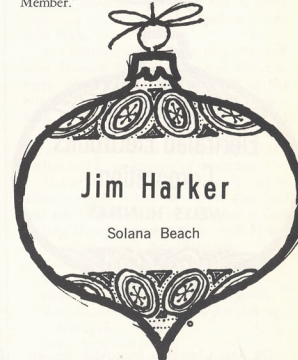
D.A.R. is also concerned with Conservation of both human and natural resources. The committee supports programs of conservation, fire prevention, and tree planting. The D.A.R. has been one of the largest contributors to California's Redwood Parks.

There are seven widely scattered communities in Imperial County with fifty miles from the Mexican Border to Calipatria where the De Anza Chapter was organized in 1934 with 23 members from these communities. This distance and the war years caused many changes. Several members moved away, others became inactive as they could not attend regularly due to family responsibilities and other interests. Although they did remain members of De Anza Chapter the

active membership became very small. Many times the attendance was a bare quorum. It is no wonder then, when two active members moved from Imperial County, it was thought to disband.

In the fall of 1965 the National Society granted permission to transfer the Charter to the San Diegoito area which includes the six communities of Del Mar, Rancho Santa Fe, Cardiff by the Sea, Solana Beach, Leucadia and Encinitas, where the Chapter Charter is now registered.

The move has been a happy one as the Chapter has grown with 22 new members. We have three juniors of whom we are very proud. Three Charter members still belong to the Chapter and we have one "Fifty Year Member."

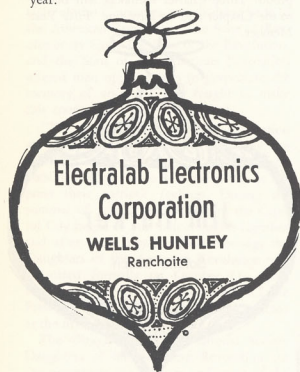
The Chapter has two yearly events—a Membership Tea in December when we invite prospective members to a Christmas Tea, and the George Washington Tea in February when friends and those interested are invited. The Girl-Homemakers, Good Citizens and the winners of the History Essay Contest are also honored.

The Chapter gives certificates of Merit to outstanding Girl-Homemakers in the food and clothing phases. Good Citizens Pins are awarded to Senior High School Graduates who possess to an outstanding degree the qualities of Dependability—which includes truthfulness, loyalty, punctuality, Service—cooperation, courtesy, self-control, consideration for others, Leadership—personality, ability to assume responsibility, Patriotism—unselfish interest in family, school, community and nation.

Awards and medals are presented for outstanding work in American History. Essay contests are held for the grade schools on given subjects each year. Medals to the winners are given at the George Washington Tea. Other certificates and awards are presented at Graduation in the High Schools at the Chapter level.

At the National level, this year for the first time an \$8,000 scholarship was granted to a High School Graduate who had shown

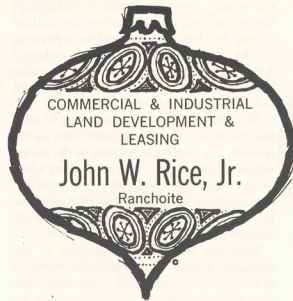
unusual interest in American History and planned to make history a major study in College. This was won by a California girl, Miss Joan Ellen Reynolds. She was one of five national winners chosen from the winners in forty states. One of the Judges, Dr. Robert Morris, President of the University of Plano, Texas was so impressed with the candidates that his university offered to the other four girls—one full four year tuition scholarship, one full two year scholarship, one half full four year scholarship and one one half full two year scholarship. The first two being worth \$1,000 for each year and the last two being worth \$500 for each year.



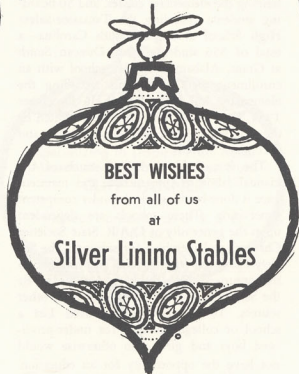
De Anza Chapter is responsible for various contests in 35 grade and High Schools in Imperial County and the San Dieguito area of San Diego County—which is a large order for a small chapter. As long as we have members who still live in Imperial County, we will continue the contests there.

This year a Scholarship Fund was established by one of our members for Crossnore—one of the approved schools in the Appalachian area. The Antelline Fruit Bazaar gave us ads for the D.A.R. Magazine and they have offered De Anza Chapter 10% of all sales resulting from these ads for the Scholarship Fund.

The National Society owns our buildings in Washington, D.C. which covers a complete block, and consists of three beautiful buildings, Memorial Continental Hall, which houses the genealogical Library and seats nearly two thousand. Twenty-seven States have furnished rooms in this building filled with priceless antiques. The Administration Building has forty-five offices and the Museum, the President General's Suite, Assembly Room, National Officers Club Board Room, the Archives Room housing the American Collection. The Auditorium in Constitution Hall seats approximately four thousand, its primary purpose is to house the Annual Meetings of the Continental Congress. The perfect acoustics have made it desirable as a Concert Hall. This building holds the Pres-



ident General's Reception Room, various offices of the National Committees, Managing Director of Constitution Hall and the permanent Headquarters of the Children of



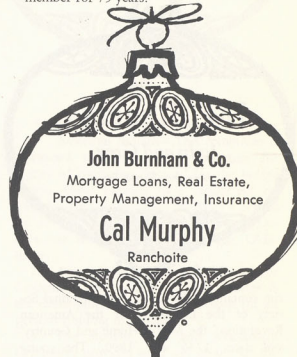
the American Revolution.

Constitution Hall has been the Cultural Center in Washington since 1929 and the home of the National Symphony. All the buildings have been refurbished and air-conditioned—as a Diamond Jubilee Project. The air-conditioning was completed for use in April when the 76th Continental Congress met.

Any woman is eligible for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is not less than eighteen years old, and who is descended from a man or woman who, with unflinching loyalty to the cause of American Independence, served as a sailor, or a soldier or civil officer in one of several Colonies or States, or in the United Colonies or States, or as a recognized Patriot, or rendered aid thereto; provided the applicant is personally acceptable to the Society.

In April at Continental Congress which is our National Conference in Washington, D.C. the Credential Committee reported the National Society had 2884 Chapters with one each in France, England, Cuba, Mexico City, and one in Puerto Rico. There were 33 new Chapters formed last year. The total membership is 200,000—3,992 entered Chapter Eternal last year, yet there was a net gain of 2,000, the largest net gain in many years.

The last known Charter Member of the Founding Group passed away during the past year. She was Annitta Peabody Trowbridge—Mrs. Cabell Carrington. She had been a member for 75 years.

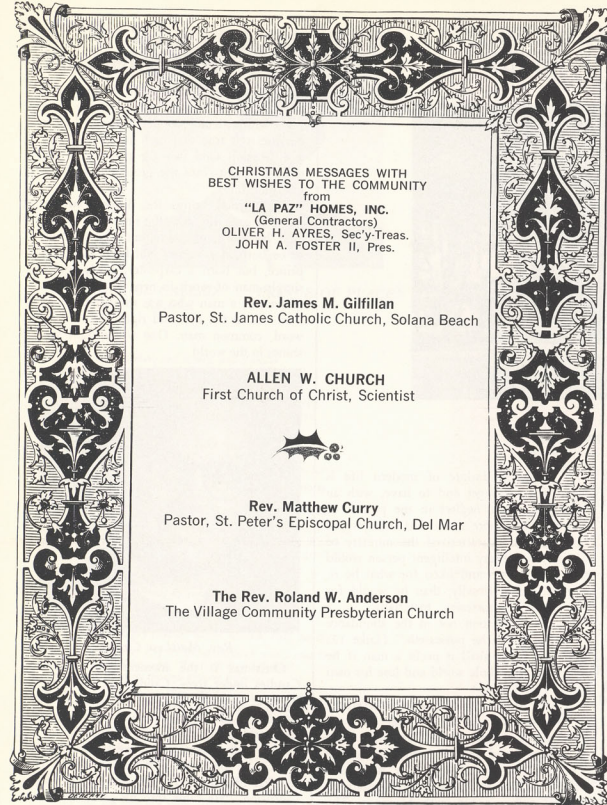

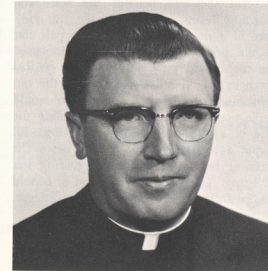


A Christmas Gift

SOME THOUGHTS ABOUT CHRISTMAS BY A CHRISTIAN SCIENTIST

Christmas is not just a season, really. It is meant to be, and in reality is, a way of life. Christmas is not intended as a celebration of human gratification and accumulation. Christmas in its true sense is BEING—being oneself, the reflection of God's being. That should be everyone's purpose in life, not mainly to "get and have." There would be no shallow, meaningless, or superstitious transcendentalism connected with Christmas if mankind would study, learn and apply the teachings of Christ Jesus. He demonstrated the laws of God. He proved His laws to be the truly practical way of life. So when we think of Christmas we should give undivided attention to its spiritual meaning, and relegate seasonal materialism to a minor role.

Christ Jesus and his ministry, to be properly understood, must be cognized through the spiritual senses. Material possessions, and sheer mortal power, he had none, and wanted none. Jesus knew that man can be a failure if he is absorbed in what is accumulated materially—so absorbed that he neglects the infinitely more important spiritual animus of trying to get a better understanding of God, and man's true status as the image and reflection of God. This is the Christian birth in the thoughts of mankind, and should be the reason for gratitude at Christmas time. Christmas then becomes a daily experience. What man knows and uses of this understanding is much more important than what he possesses or does materially and humanly.

So at Christmas time we should determine to make its meaning a way of life, and to the best of our ability practice Christ's Christianity daily. Although men may properly possess things, does not God intend that we possess our possessions rather than permit our possessions to possess us? It has been said, "Possessions should be the tools and not the Dictators of mankind."

A noticeable failure of modern life is man's frenzy to get and to have, with an equally apathetic neglect in the pursuit of understanding more about God and spiritual living, which characterized the ministry of Christ Jesus. Every intelligent person would rather be known and liked for what he is, morally and spiritually, than he would for just what he possesses, materially. "... a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of things which he possesseth." (Luke 12: 15) "For what shall it profit a man if he shall gain the whole world and lose his own soul." (Mark 8:36)

A very significant and worthy reference to the Master, and to the real spirit of Christmas is found in the "Preface" (vii) of "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy, where she writes:—"To those leaning on the sustaining infinite, today is big with blessings. The wakeful shepherd beholds the first faint morning beams, ere cometh the full radiance of a risen day. So shone the pale star to the prophet-shepherds; yet it traversed the night, and came to where, in cradled obscurity, lay the Bethlehem babe, the human herald of Christ, Truth, who would make plain to benighted understanding the way of salvation through Christ Jesus, till across a night of error should dawn the morning beams and shine the guiding star of being. The Wisemen were led to behold and to follow this daystar of divine Science, lighting the way to eternal harmony."

As the recognition of spiritual mindedness, Christly inspiration and the Master's example develop in the minds and affairs of mankind, the ethics of correct relationship between men and nations will be realized. The triumph of good in the daily life is related with the true meaning of Christmas, the Christmas which we live in our hearts continually, not just seasonally.

THE MIRACLE OF CHRISTMAS DAY

Each year as we come up to the incredible miracle of Christmas Day, we become more filled with awe and wonder than ever before because it is true that each year as we pray and worship God, we are given new and deeper insights into the great truths of the Christian faith.

That which brings the deepest awe to many of us is the fact—the simple fact—that God became a man and humbled Himself to be born of a virgin. Not born a king or prince, but born a carpenter; lowly, quiet, simple man of work in need of labor; man of people; a man who was available; a man who was in the best and right sense of the word, common man. One who's light still shines in the world.

Our runs are concrete, with shade as well as sunlight; we have inside facilities that are air-conditioned and chemically sanitized, where our dogs sleep and rest in unusually hot weather. Our feeding program accommodates every special diet owners may require, and the regular food is invariably the best available."

The cleaning and spraying routine is religiously observed on a strict daily schedule at Falconmoor, and at least two things attest to its efficacy: the unexcelled state inspection rating, and the fact that the kennel's business has more than doubled since the Herwigs bought the kennel from Peggy and Dan Carson just over a year ago. And the Carsons ran a fine, top-rated kennel too.

They in turn distribute them to the "New Life" villages of PHUOC TONG and HOA PHAT. "New Life" means they are refugees from the Communists. Mrs. Hart sends 100 kits per month, and altho the company donations are very generous—this many per month soon depletes her supply. Then there is the problem of postage which amounts to \$25.00 per month for this many packages. She would appreciate any donations for postage, either cash or stamps, which can be sent directly to her. She also needs soap, combs, 3 1/2 oz. bottles of shampoo, tooth paste, tooth brushes and plastic bags (shirt size). The above articles can be deposited in a box marked "Articles for Vietnam" in the Locker room at the Golf Club. Once a month they will be picked up and taken to Mrs. Hart for shipment.

This is a long range program. The Women's Golf Club donated \$100.00 for toys and clothing to this cause. We are happy to say they were shipped in time to arrive for Christmas.

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THIS LAND DOWN UNDER

A letter from Billie and Dave Comey



"Dear olde golden rule days . . ."

Dear Ranch friends:

For the past several weeks I have been observing the marathon of my son studying for the state examinations for university entrance. Five weeks ago Clif moved out of our home in the hills to save the hour's traveling time per day for shuttling to and from the city. Also, although he had a room of his own, the YMCA to which he removed himself would save him from the distraction of four noisy younger sisters and brother. He has spent every hour after school at the Adelaide library until its close-down time of 11:00 p.m. then studied in his "Y" room. He has done this without let-up or relief seven days a week for the past five weeks and I would say it takes a great deal of determination and dedication to "make it" education-wise these days. Although he passed his senior high school exams second in his class this does not enable him to enter university. He, and everyone else concerned, must sit for the public examinations controlled by the state of South Australia which are again on another competitive level, and if passing these satisfactorily, he will be among the privileged allowed to enter. There are only a total of thirteen universities in all of Australia, making it an impossibility for all but the really motivated ten percent to attend.

Of course, the whole school system is different here. We had to "learn the ropes" as naive Americans. In the first place, there is a great deal more importance attached here to what school you attend or attended. The Adelaidians themselves joke about the fact that until only recently the two leading questions asked a new acquaintance or job-seeker were: (1) "What church do you attend?" and (2) "What school did you go to?" The correct answers, until the impact of secularization recently made itself felt, were: (1) "The Church of England" (a high Episcopalian order) and (2) "St. Peters School for Boys" or "Prince Alfred College"—the two

jects since the number of females who attend university here is about two-thirds less than that of males. This broader spectra helps prepared them to be Little Ladies of the future society. And tho I say this tongue in cheek I must confess that I find the pretty manners of the Australian ladies-school-miss extraordinarily pleasing in contrast to our more casual American breeziness.

Claudia and Kimberley attend a Church of England school for girls which, tho it teaches modern maths, still clings to much Victoriana in its attitudes. Some of the Victoriana is good—like neat, clean uniforms, polished shoes and immaculate white gloves . . . some is bad like having your form-mistress pull your braids hard when the color of your hair-ribbon is a shade off . . . it's good when you must learn to accomplish all your work with fountain pen—not ballpoint—in a clear, neat and pretty hand . . . but perhaps too rigid when you must have a Saturday morning detention (come to school for 3 1/2 hours) for whispering in the library. They have a diary, in which all their homework assignments are placed, which must be seen and signed regularly by a parent. Upon neglect of this on one occasion, Claudia had to write a five-page theme on "Why I Must Not Neglect My Diary" and hang it on the bulletin board for her fellow schoolmates to see . . . Their subjects are, typically: English (one period of grammar, one of literature), history (English and Ancient), geography, maths, French, German, science, art, crafts (knitting, embroidery work, tapestry) and sport (cricket, basketball, soccer). All of the work suitable is written into individual copybooks for each subject and illustrated with their own color drawings.

"Senior school," where you graduate from knee socks to long cotton stockings (or knee pants to long trousers for boys) is from the eighth grade onwards. Eighth and Ninth grades are termed "First and Second Year,"

leading schools status-wise. The power of the Old Boys (past graduates) of these two colleges (private high-schools are termed 'colleges') is not to be underestimated in South Australian politics or business. They have had the upper-hand in running things here for the past several generations though I am told this Victorianesque condition is beginning to wane in the wake of more modern attitudes.

Here education is still based on the traditional British old-school lines, the accent on depth not breadth of traditional subject material. However, the girls, in their private "ladies colleges" get a wider range of sub-tertle grade is "Intermediate" level, and eleventh grade is called "Leaving" as is the time when a large portion of Australian youth leave school at age 16 to take jobs. At this stage they are as educated as our average high-school graduate. The senior year is termed "Matriculation" and is generally attempted only by those planning to attend university. "To matriculate" is an old British term meaning to pass from Secondary to Tertiary education. The Matriculation year prepares young people to be able to take the university entrance examinations (20 hours) and is equivalent in content and arduousness to a first year's work in a good university (not junior college) in the States. Thus, three years work here at Uni gives one their B.A. degree.

A youngster can get as good an education at a public school here as is assured at a private one. Yet everyone who can scrape enough shillings together at whatever sacrifice sends their child to private school. Why? The tradition of the old status pattern of "Where did you go to school?" still lingers on and the polish available in private school is not so readily available in the more democratic public system. There are private schools by the scores here . . . run by the Church of England, or the Presbytery, or the Methodist group, or Catholic, or just plain non-sectarian.

Kenyon and LiLi (now aged eight and five respectively) attend a hundred year-old public school up here in the hills. Children begin first grade at age five and therefore are ready for University at age 17.

Clif says he prefers the broader spectra of schooling undertaken in the States as opposed to the narrow-in-depth field here, but Claudia and Kimberley prefer their Australian schooling. As I watch them and review my own education, including three haphazard years in various colleges and universities, all I can say is "I wish I'd been educated!"

While the original of hot drinks for the holiday season is lost in the alcoholic mists of antiquity, we suspect that hot mixes of alcohol were the forerunner of the electric blanket.

Colonial America was nurtured on hot buttered rum, a refreshing and exciting concoction that every New England ski bum still finds irreplaceable to this day.

Some of the bracing winter drinks are the HOT BENEFACTOR, a delicious drink that combines Jamaica rum with Burgundy, sugar, nutmeg, lemon slice and hot water. CAFE BRULOT uses brandy, sugar, orange peel, stick cinnamon, whole cloves and strong black coffee.

The HOT TODDY not only is a delicious beverage but a couple of years ago a world-famous neurologist recommended it to the writer seriously as the "best sleeping medicine" ever developed. For this delight you merely pour boiling water over a jigger of bourbon or brandy and a teaspoon of sugar in an old-fashioned glass. The foregoing physician warned of the possibility of "addiction" if the hot toddy is used too freely as sleeping medicine.

The TOM & JERRY is a fabled holiday and winter drink but like EGG NOG is feared for its caloric content by many serious holiday imbibers. The Tom and Jerry contains brandy and Jamaica rum, egg, allspice and powdered sugar.

Not long ago we were gratified that our traditional EGG NOG had gained such reputation abroad that we were asked for the recipe for our secret receipt for a holiday drink piece in the magazine section of a Los Angeles newspaper.

There must be hundreds of versions of the recipes for EGG NOG and none of them very correct. A simple one follows:

- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1 pinch salt
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 jigger bourbon, brandy or rum
- Milk

Beat the egg with salt, sugar, vanilla, and liquor of your choice. Pour into tall glass and fill with milk. Stir and sprinkle lightly with nutmeg.

If you omit the alcohol you have a nutritious drink for the convalescent, the invalid or the merely thirsty.

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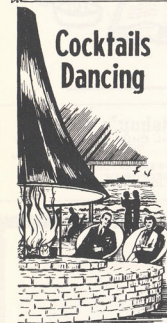

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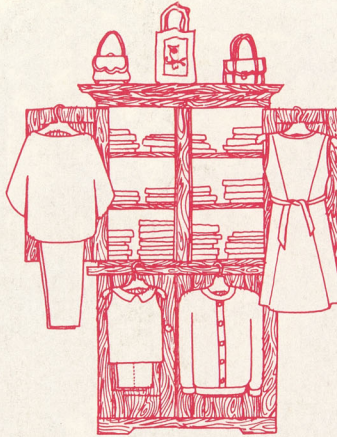


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
