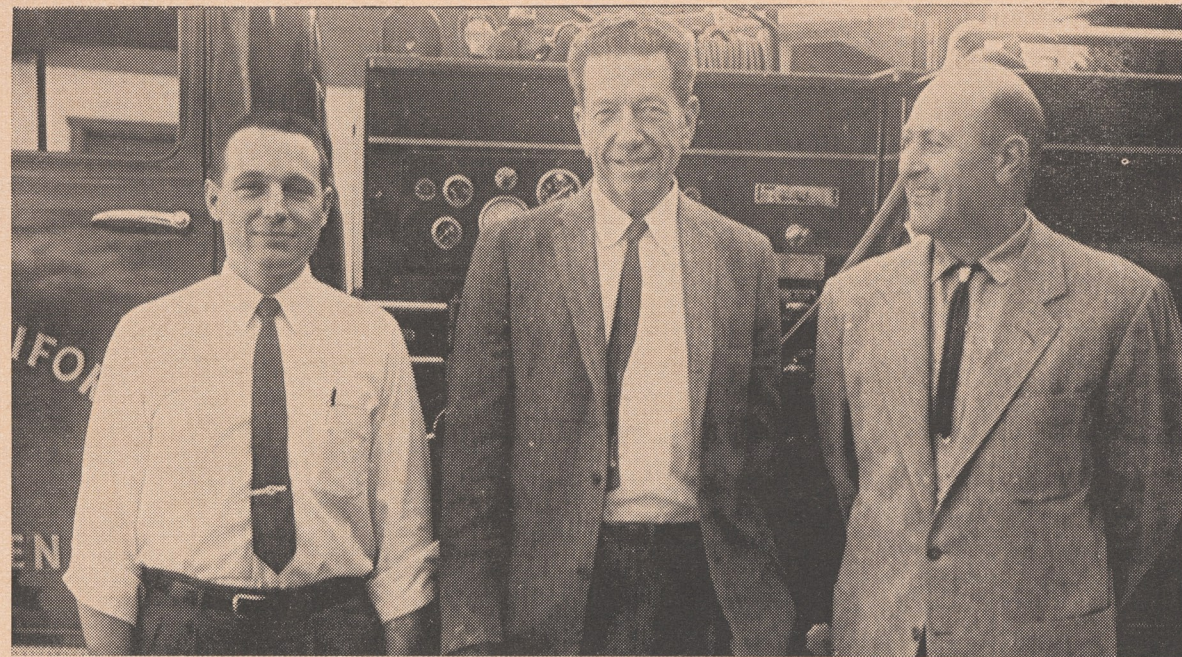

DIRECTORS MEET FEB. 6

Assistant Manager Post Deemed Advisable Move

Preliminary discussion was held at the February 6th meeting of the board of directors of the Rancho Santa Fe Association concerning the possibility of employing an assistant manager to work under the Association's secretary-manager, W. A. Smart.

President Harry W. Booth Jr., announces that anyone interested in the position may contact the Association office for further details.

President Booth's appointment of Fred Lewis as Alternate to the Art Jury was approved unanimously by the Board.

The Board directed Secretary Smart to secure a detailed report from the Golf Course Committee in regard to its recommendation to enlarge the Rancho Santa Fe Association Clubhouse. The recommendation was to be presented at the next board meeting.

The Building Permit Fee was waived to the Rancho Santa Fe School District on its application to construct an addition to the school building.

David B. Dewey Jr., was appointed to serve as a member of the Health and Sanitation Committee following the decli-

nation of Hubert E. Brooke to serve on the committee. Wendell Wheelock was appointed as Alternate Member of the Golf Course Committee for the balance of this fiscal year.

The Board authorized Secretary Smart to make the expenditure of cost of putting facia on the Maintenance Building in accordance with the request of San Diego County.

It was unanimously decided by the Board that \$1000.00 be added to the Parks and Recreation Committee budget to be used at the discretion of Chairman R. M. Clotfelter. Also that the gasoline contract, for gasoline used by the Association Maintenance Department, be executed with General Petroleum Products in accordance with bid dated Feb. 1, lowest of three bids submitted.

Secretary Smart presented the following gross revenue figures for January, 1959: Green fees-cash \$6,555.75; playing privileges, \$3,082.00; electric carts, \$1,324.50; lockers, \$150.25; total, \$11,112.50. Golf Shop - carts, \$559.00; cleaning and storage, \$315.00; merchandise, \$3,414.48; total, \$4,288.48. Restaurant and bar, \$6,489.48; grand total, \$21,890.46.

Secretary Smart gave a progress report on the enlargement of the Rancho Santa Fe Clubhouse, and presented the financial statement for January, 1959.

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Hints Given In Letter On Pole Beautification

In an effort to eradicate the unsightly appearance of power poles in Rancho Santa Fe, the Beautification Committee of the Garden Club has mailed the following letter to its members:

"Is one of your favorite views on this lovely Ranch marred by a bare and unsightly power or telephone Pole? If so, we urge your aid in a concerted Garden Club effort to do something about it.

Our Beautification Committee's objective this month is Project Power Poles — A plan for natural landscape screening through the planting and proper grouping of trees around exposed power poles.

If there is a bare pole on your property, won't you join us in this worthwhile planting and screening project? Small and inexpensive young trees (1 gallon cans) started this month (planted at a minimum of ten feet to observe Power Company's easement) will make an enduring contribution to the charm and beauty of Rancho Santa Fe.

You might make a note of any unattractive poles on your nearby road sides and we can ask

County Maintenance if they would consider it for future roadside tree planting schedules.

Vines are not to be used as they can create both difficult and dangerous conditions.

Looking around the Ranch with poles in mind, you will find many effective plantings to inspire you.

Below is a selected list of suitable trees available at local nurseries and recommended by the Power Company in their fine booklet "Trees."

Eucalyptus — Citradora — innocent roots, white trunk

Eucalyptus — Sideroxylon — reddish bark, red flowers

Eucalyptus — Leucoxylon — white iron bark, pink flowers

Eucalyptus — Corynocalys

Eucalyptus — Viminilis

Eucalyptus — Lehmanni — if width is available

Eucalyptus — Erythrocorys — white bark, red buds, yellow flowers

Fraxinus Udhei or Shamel ash — tall elm-like tree

Eugenia — suitable for frost-free places

Canary Island Pine — Blue-green column.

The committee requests that any Ranch resident interested in following any of these suggestions take pictures before planting and after, that the club would like to have the pictures for its record.

Garden Checklist

1. Save that potted poinsetta by giving it a complete rest for two or three months. Early in May, repot it to a larger s and start watering it again.
2. After pruning roses, spray them to catch any over-wintering pests and get the plants off to a healthy start.
3. Snails are ever with us. Use bait or pellets at scattered points in the garden for control.
4. Plant gladiolus at two-week or one-month intervals to have a succession of bloom through summer.

Santa Fe Irrigation Directors Set Price on Acreage Sought by Schools

Prices on tracts sought by three separate agencies for education purposes were set and other progress was made toward the sale of some 700 acres on which appraisals recently have been completed, at Monday's meeting of Santa Fe Irrigation district directors.

The board set a price of \$2250 per acre on 40 acres lying South of the county disposal area, sought as a future site for a second senior high school in the San Dieguito High school district.

This offer was expected to be discussed by high school trustees Tuesday night. Earlier, SFID directors had indicated that they would set a price subject to a 90-day option.

Solana Beach Elementary school district was given an option to purchase ten acres to augment its Skyline school campus, at a price of \$2500 per acre.

The price on 100 acres sought

as a campus for a Baptist liberal arts college, near the Monticello subdivision and Border-road, was set at \$2000 per acre.

In mid-January the SFID directors toured the 700 acres proposed for sale and arrived at their own conclusions relative to the appraisals made by two separate appraisal agencies.

A first step toward a series of auction sales was taken Monday when the board set minimum prices on 100 acres lying just to the east of the tract sold most recently.

William Schofield, who will take office as director in Division II at the March meeting, succeeding W. M. Vandersluis, was introduced and sat in on Monday's meeting. Leon P. Janinet was appointed to a new term in Division I.

Past presidents of the organization presided at the tea and coffee tables. Mrs. Herbert O'Rand is president now.



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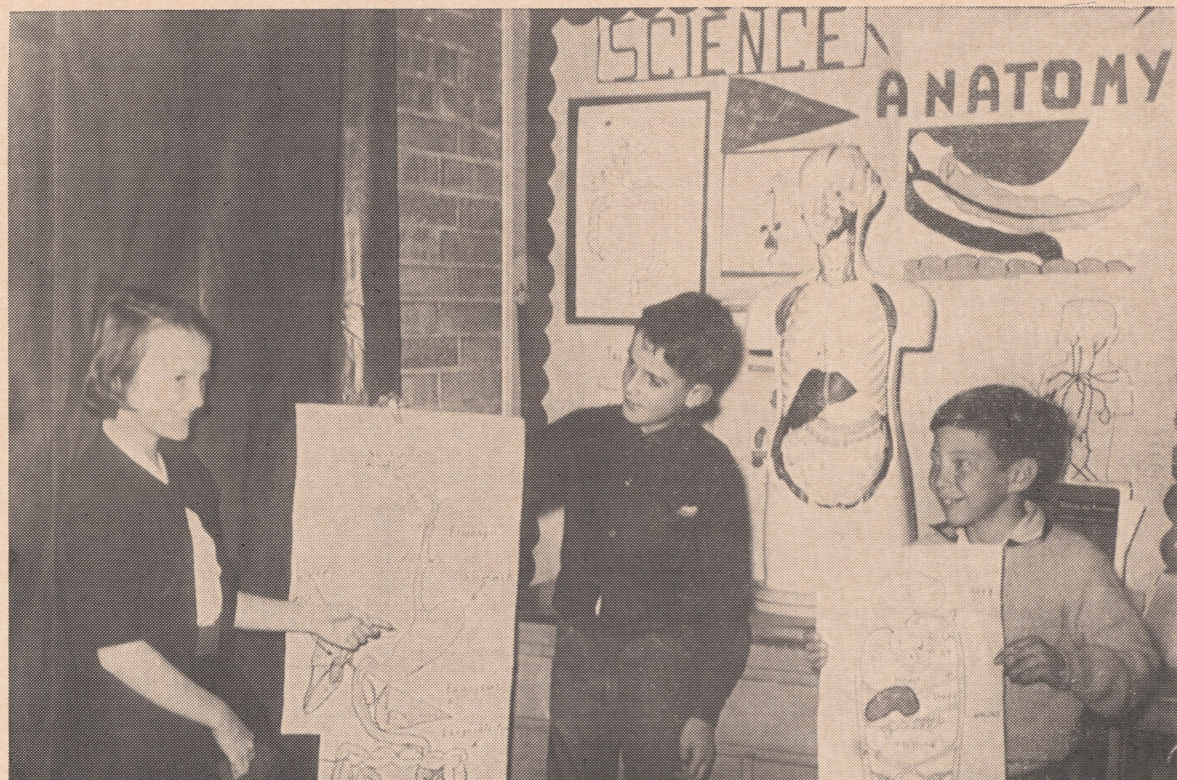
Elementary School

During the 5 years the Friends have been in existence, they have donated over \$50,000 to charity in San Diego County.

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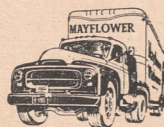


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For Dazzling Brilliance, Try Bougainvillea

Plant a Bougainvillea and you plant a vivid reminder of Southern California's past. It is this vine, gaudily arrayed on a mission wall or later against a Spanish-type stucco that once stereotyped our area in the minds of countless tourists.

For dazzling brilliance, there is just nothing to compete with the Bougainvillea. And for that matter, nothing should be made to compete with it. This is one vine that is best planted where its brilliance won't clash.

As a site for your Bougainvillea, try a sunny wall or corner of your house, garage or what have you. Stick to greenery at its feet or — if flowering shrubs are desired — to shrubs with white or neutral blooms.

Perhaps we're not being quite up to date on Bougainvillea's ability to blend with other flowering shrubs. The California Association of Nurserymen tells us that recent years have seen the introduction of many new varieties, some of them quite compatible for the general garden scene.

The traditional magenta Bougainvillea has given way to varieties of many another shade. Today you'll find red forms, a rose-pink, a gold and bronze-gold variety — all far cries from the memorable vine with its magenta bracts, yet all as profuse and as brilliant in their own rights as their common cousin.

Climate-wise, Southern California offers the best conditions to favor the Bougainvillea. It reaches perfection in areas near the coast and blooms for months on end. But it is top rated for inland gardens as well.

Give it a sunny spot — the sunnier the better. Water is no problem since it can take it or leave it provided drainage is good.

J. T. REED DIES

J. Theodore Reed, 71, whose career as motion picture director and producer began in the days of silent screen and lasted until 1947, died Sunday, Feb. 22, in a San Diego hospital.

Reed, who lived at 230 11th St., Del Mar, was a life member of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences. He was president of the academy two terms, in 1933 and 1934.

For 10 years, from 1918, Reed was production manager for Douglas Fairbanks Sr. He also was production manager for the Mary Pickford company.

In 1928 Reed became sound director for United Artists studios then went to Paramount studios as an assistant producer, according to his son Theodore S. Reed, of San Diego. He became a producer there and retired in 1940. He moved to Rancho Santa Fe.

It's Time to Think of Shade

It's a nice thing about deciduous trees — they're cool in the summer and warm in the winter. Not to suggest that they radiate heat. But they do shed their summer-cool foliage to admit what warmth a winter sun offers.

"But, oh, those fallen leaves," some will say. "What a job to rake them up." True, answers your nurseryman, but they only fall once a year. Evergreens shed a few leaves the year round, creating a slight, but ever-recurring problem. Remember this next time you rake a deciduous tree's leaves.

All of this brings us to our point. Namely that it's time to think of shade. Right now in the middle of winter. Deciduous trees are dormant in January and February, which means you'll find them barefoot in nurseries — less expensive than they will be later in containers.

Before planting, give thought to what you want in the way of shade. If you need plenty of it, make sure the tree will eventually grow big enough. If, on the other hand, you only want some shade for a patio, don't plan a giant.

Shade trees in the tall class include Norway Maple and Silver Maple, Scarlet Oak, Moraine Locust and Maidenhair Tree. Better suited to smaller gardens are the Modesto Ash, Silk Tree, White Mulberry and Chinese Pistachio.

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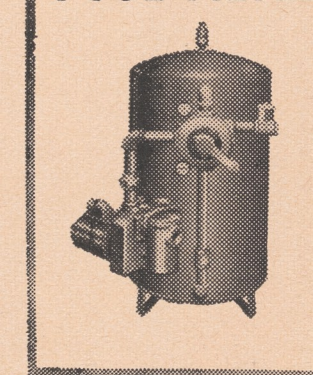

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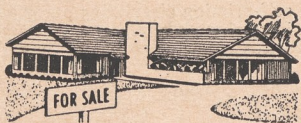
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
