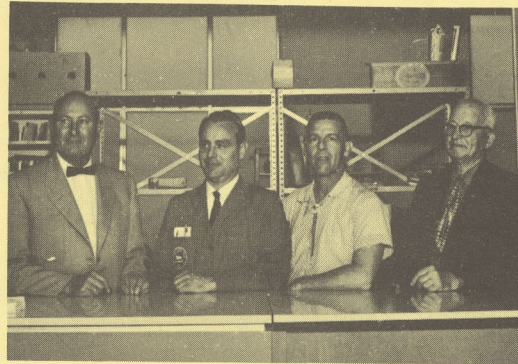
What would Rancho Santa Fe do if a postman delivered mail door to door? Heaven forbid! One of the most important parts of anyone's day...in fact, everyone's day...is going to the post-office! Where else can you meet your friends so regularly...or have all the sporting fun of matching wits with a combination of G ½ ... D ½ ... Z? The records say that it was on April 29th, 1924 when a gentleman by the very interesting name of Mr. Bowly Le. Huray first received the postoffice commission. There was one other postmaster between him and the late George Megrew (but no-one can remember the name). Mr. Megrew took office in April of 1927, and was commissioned again in '28, '32 and '36 when Civil Service Law made a career position of the Postmastership. George Megrew retired in 1946 after 19 years of postal service. Haskell Strawn, our present genial postmaster, received a temporary commission at the time of Mr. Megrew's retirement... and a permanent commission 27 months later.

## STRAWN'S STRATEGY . . . .

The new move to economize by cutting out unnecessary window service on Saturdays beginning May 4th affects this office only in that we will not sell Money Orders. The other services we had given up some time ago. The window hours will remain the same.

Now that we have the zone number for the towns in the county, we should all use it. Speeds the mail and saves tax dollars. Our zone number is also our ZIP number, 92067. Please use it... and use the other fellow's when you write.

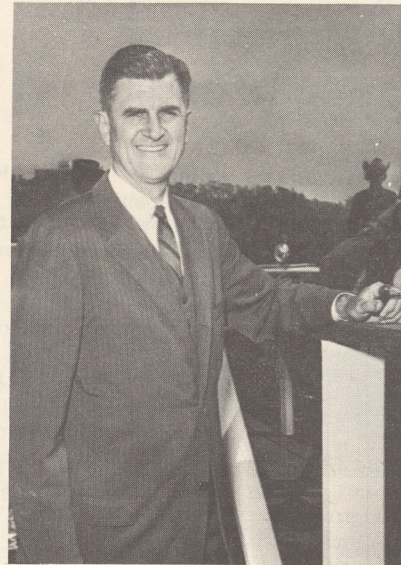

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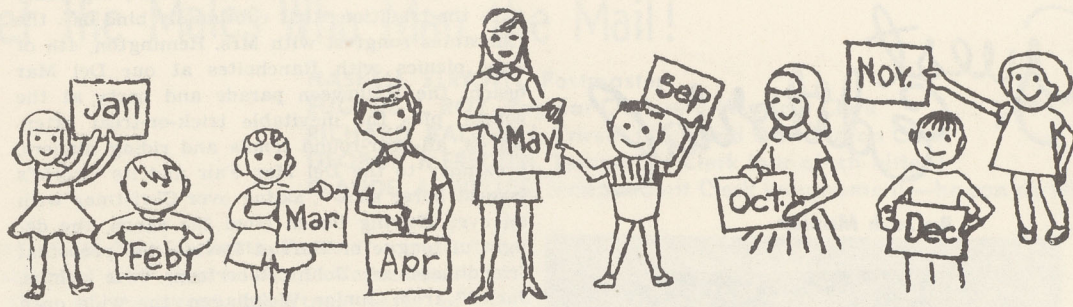

**LINDY NOVAK, Grade 1 — Mrs. Petretta**



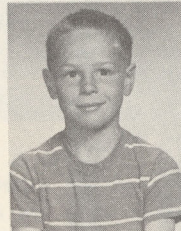

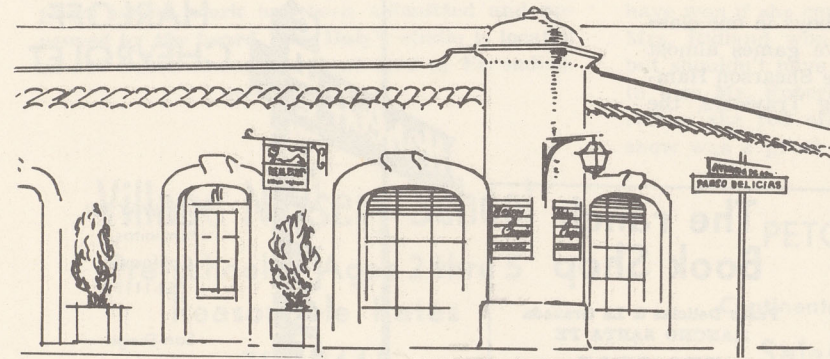
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**FRED WORSTELL, Grades 3 & 4—Mrs. Taylor**

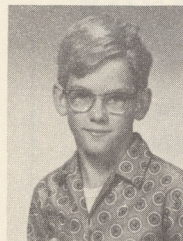

And these are only a few!

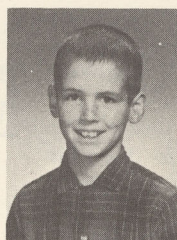
**MEANWHILE, BACK AT THE CLASSROOM!**

Monte Etherton is going with his family back to St. Louis for the Fourth of July. Debbie Kowalski is going to Disneyland.

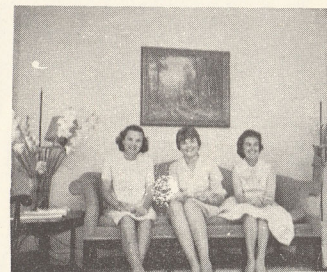
Brent Christensen is also going to Disneyland, and is also getting a swimming pool.

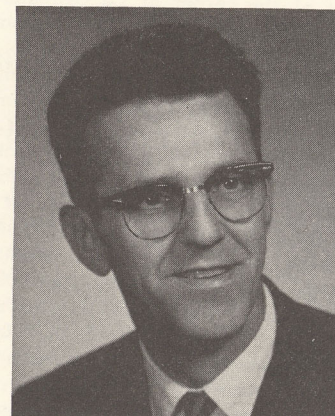


**18th Annual Horse Show is Huge Success**

The Eighteenth Annual Rancho Santa Fe horse show was attended by over 1000 people, making it the largest in our history. Entries came from as far north at Los Angeles and as far East as Indio. It was sponsored by the San Dieguito auxiliary of the Children's Hospital and the home-made cakes, well-run booths and gaily colored decor attested to a well-run show. Under a setting of eucalyptus trees, a Saturday night cocktail party for exhibitors and paying guests added fun to the already fun-filled days.

Many first places were won by our own Rancho people who were up against some of the best stables in the West. A highlight was the John S. Robertson trophy event which featured horses most suitable for Rancho trails. Under the fiction category, historical and current fiction led the vote, and under the non-fiction, the largest requests were for biography and history.

### THE VILLAGE NURSERY SCHOOL

The traffic at the corner of La Granada and Acacias each morning and afternoon is a reminder to those who have graduated from school parent clubs that the education of Rancho children still goes on. Not so obvious but just as important to parents of pre-schoolers is **THE VILLAGE NURSERY SCHOOL** which meets each morning in the educational wing of The Village Church.

In the fall of 1961 Rancho mothers of pre-school aged children sought an organization and facility through which they could establish a nursery school. The local Presbyterian Church was the logical place because of its fine rooms and also because churches across the country have come to know that parents want help in the early years of character building.

School began in January, 1962 for the purpose of creating an atmosphere in which the young can work, play, and learn through the guidance of Christian teachers. They begin to know themselves, and to learn about God as Creator, Friend and Guide. They see and experience and incorporate into their lives the world around them.

Creative crafts, action games, seed planting—all are activities through which a child can express his love or fear, or happiness, and at the same time learn scientific truths and acceptable social standards. He learns how to handle himself in similar situations which are bound to come to him.

The Nursery School Board, consisting of Mrs. Robert Bible, Mrs. Arthur Mohr, Mrs. H. C. Howe, and Mrs. Eugene Fletcher has chosen Mrs. H. D. Heltzel to direct and teach in the school next term. This Board has also evaluated the needs of parents and children and are offering two services new to the school. There is to be a class for two-year-olds, and also extended care one day a week for 3-4-5-year olds.

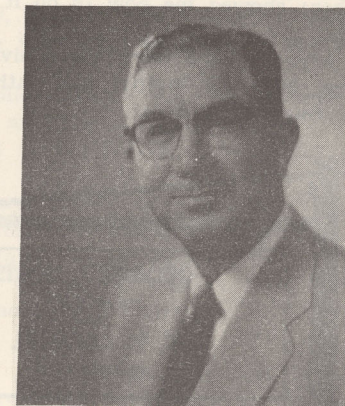

The Country Squire courtyard began as an idea in the mind of Mr. James M. Young, Jr., who was attracted to Rancho Santa Fe because of its dignity, serenity and beauty — and its inhabitants. Having been reared on the north shore of the Chicago area, Rancho Santa Fe offered a similarity.

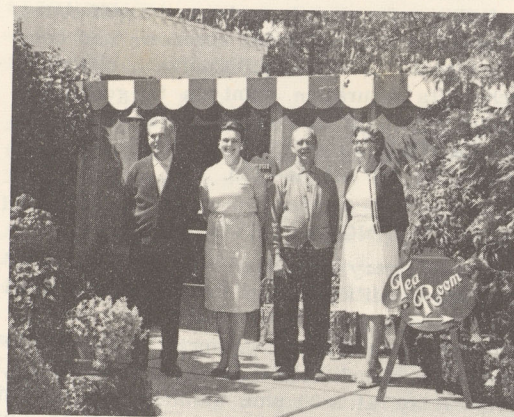

## BOARD MEETING, MAY 1st, 1964

Secretary Cope presented the Gross Receipts for the month of April, 1964.

A very brief resume was presented by the Secretary on Mr. Charles Larrick's discussion with the Parks & Recreation Board in regard to his personal recommendation that various communities in North County give consideration to petitioning the Board of Supervisors of the County of San Diego to establish a large natural park area, similar to "Spooks Canyon."

The latest plan of development of the **Amberwood Construction Co.** for "San Dieguito Estates" (the area east of Whispering Palms) was presented to the Board by the Secretary.

The following letters were presented and properly dispensed:

San Diego County Traffic Committee—Approval of relocating the 50 m.p.h. speed sign from in front of the Village Church to a more easterly point; San Diego County Board of Supervisors (Supervisor Cozens)—Estimated financial participation of adjacent property owners, should they desire paving the westerly section of **San Elijo**; Loma Santa Fe—A meeting being held May 1, 1964 for the purpose of presenting local area development plans.

**KENNETH WALKER**, on behalf of the Trustees of the **George Richardson Foundation** presented the Financial Report for the period May 1, 1963 through April 30, 1964 for the Foundation. The Board expressed its sincere appreciation to Mr. Walker and Mrs. Nancy Walker, who are relocating from this area, for their family interest in developing and maintaining Richardson Park including the Little League area.

The Association Counsel reported on matters of interest to the Association; one item being that the Gullickson-Morton et al litigation may be delayed to July 13, 1964 due to a crowded Court Calendar.

It was unanimously carried that a sum not to exceed the Budget figure of \$950.00 shall be expended in the purchase of a new ice machine to replace the old machine at the Clubhouse.

The Clubhouse Committee and the Finance Committee were instructed to jointly select a means of supplying a ventilation and/or air conditioning system for the Clubhouse.

Director Shaw discussed increasing the storage facilities for electric carts on the golf course and noted that experienced observers had commented that the RSF Golf Course had already reached its saturation point as to golf carts. Various aspects of this situation were discussed.

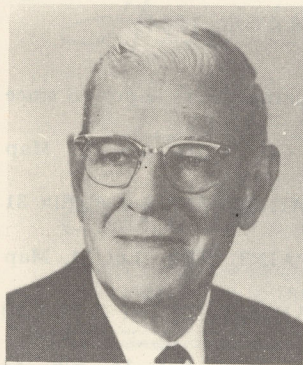

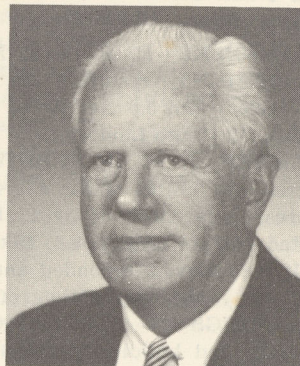

It has been a genuine privilege to have had the opportunity to serve on the Association Board these past three years...an experience that has made me deeply aware of the continuing need for each of you to take a personal and vital interest in your Board's effort, working within the Protective Covenant and Articles of Incorporation, to maintain the desirable high character of our community of Rancho Santa Fe.

I recently swapped a few recipes with one of the food experts who seemed to be well-armed with every known method of handling a strawberry. In giving her recipe for strawberry cream pie I might comment that one does not launch such delicacies upon the world every day. At least, in my world one doesn't.

**STRAWBERRY CREAM PIE**

- 1 baked 9-in. pastry shell
- 1/2 cup slivered almonds, toasted
- 2 1/2 cups fresh strawberries
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 tsp. cornstarch
- few drops red food coloring

**CREAM FILLING**

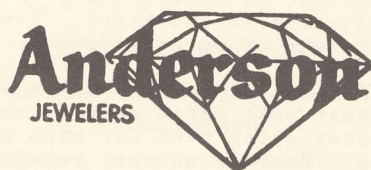
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 3 tbl. cornstarch
- 2 tbl. flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 2 cups milk
- 1 slightly beaten egg
- 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Combine sugar, cornstarch, flour and salt. Gradually stir in the milk. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Lower heat, and cook and stir till thick. Stir a little of the hot mixture into egg; return to remaining hot mixture. Again bring just to boiling, stirring constantly. Cool, then chill, beat well; fold in the whipped cream and vanilla.

**You're not through yet!**

Cover bottom of cooled baked shell with almonds. Fill with chilled Cream Filling. Slice 2 cups of the strawberries in half; pile atop filling. Crush the remaining berries; add the 1/2 cup water and cook 2 min.; sieve. Combine the 1/4 cup sugar and 2 tsp. cornstarch, then gradually stir in berry juice. Cook, stirring constantly, till thick and clear. Tint to make bright red. Cool slightly and pour over the halved strawberries. A beautiful glaze! Keep in refrigerator 'till serving time.

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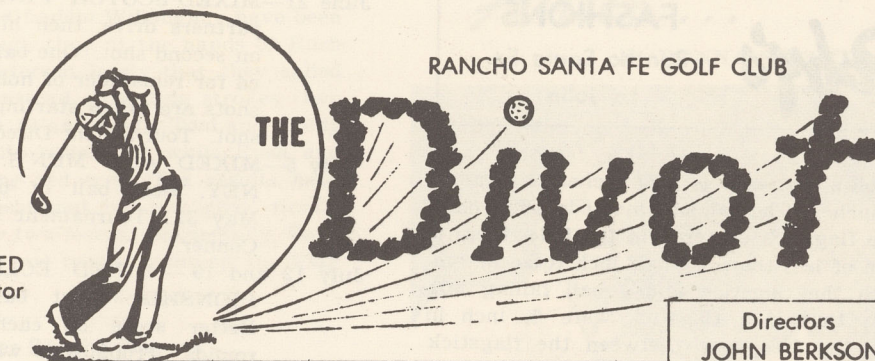

**Ball Deemed to Strike Flagstick in Hole**—In stroke play, a competitor's ball was within 20 yards of the hole; the flagstick was in the hole, unattended. The player chipped. The ball hung on the lip of the cup briefly and then dropped. The competitor claimed that the ball was holed without striking the flagstick—that a ball which first hangs on the lip of the hole and then falls in would not strike the flagstick until after it were holed out (that is, until all of the ball were below the level of the lip of the hole).

**Answer:** No. The competitor sustained a two-stroke penalty under rule 34-3c because under these circumstances his ball played from within 20 yards of the hole must be deemed to have struck the unattended flagstick.

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The hole's diameter is 4.25 inches; its radius is 2.125 inches. The ball's diameter is 1.68 inches. With the flagstick centered in the hole, there is a margin of less than one-half inch to accommodate both the flagstick and a ball falling into the hole; thus if a flagstick were  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch in diameter, the free space between the flagstick and a ball against the side of the cup would be 0.07 inches. In view of these considerations, any doubt as to whether the flagstick were struck must be resolved against the player.

**Tips From Your Pro . . .**

**The Pitch Shot**—A common error in the short pitch shot with a 9-iron or wedge is the belief that no body movement is involved. Although there is no pronounced pivot and shifting of weight, as in the long swing, there has to be a slight movement of the shoulders, hips, feet and knees. An effort to restrict this movement causes a quick, tense action and a bad shot.

The pitch is played much the same as the chip or run-up shot previously discussed. A narrow, open stance, with the hands ahead of the club head and ball at address, is correct. The stroke is a firm downward action with a minimum of wrist movement. Above all, relax and let the body move with the hands and arms.

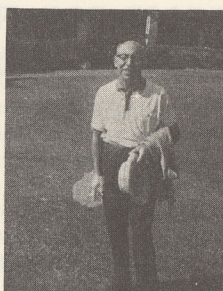

## RANCHO SANTA FE INCORPORATION FEASIBILITY STUDY SUMMARY & CONCLUSIONS

1. There appears to be no compelling reason for the incorporation of Rancho Santa Fe at this time. There is no legal possibility of Rancho Santa Fe being annexed in its entirety without consent of the majority of the voters in the area.

2. Incorporation of Rancho Santa Fe is economically possible with a minimum government. There would be an increase in property taxes, which over the years might be substantial.

3. There is something to be said for avoiding incorporation as long as possible. The community should recognize that in achieving whatever advantages can be obtained by incorporation, it will necessarily sacrifice some of the atmosphere and character that it is trying hard to preserve.

4. Incorporation will not necessarily provide the final and absolute control of land use and subdivision that might be hoped for.

5. The time may come when developments will dictate incorporation as a protective measure. Such developments might include:

a) The outcome of pending or future legal attacks on the Covenant.

b) The growth of populous and aggressive communities on its borders resulting in gradual erosion of its control.

6. The existence of the Association structure alongside that of a city government would present many problems, including inevitable jurisdictional conflict. Incorporation would necessarily contemplate a considerable reduction in the functions and responsibilities of the Association.

7. The legal problems involved in stripping the present Association of responsibilities (or its complete elimination) are beyond the province of this study and report.

8. It would be well for the Association to study carefully and continually the legal and operational problems involved in such a transfer of responsibilities so that if incorporation were to be desirable, the community could act in an orderly fashion in its best interest. Substantial legal issues may be involved and we suggest that they should be analyzed and that plans be developed for the ultimate disposition of the functions of the Association in keeping with the legal determinations.

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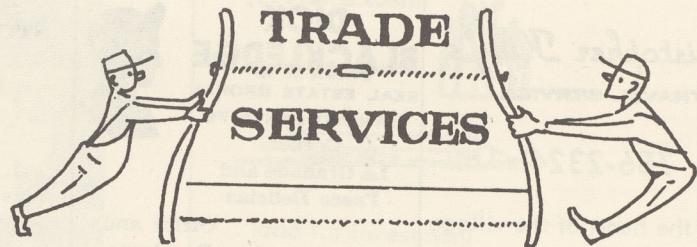
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
