# SCULPTURE IN SAND

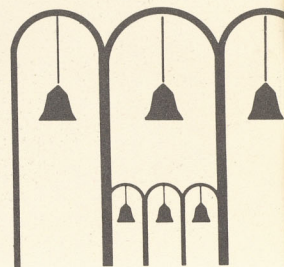
By one Of America's great Artists.

### Roland W. Anderson

Recently, a great American said, "America must recapture her integrity, building tomorrow on 'moral fibre'—which I fear she has lost." Reflection upon these words has produced some conclusions which led me to leave an executive office in New York for a pastorate in Rancho Santa Fe.

This common cliché, "moral fibre," should read "spiritual fibre." Morality changes with backgrounds and cultures. It is the application of spiritual values to society. Morality, which does not have spiritual beginnings, is worth but slight consideration. Mrs. Murray—of Supreme Court fame—is an example of this. An artist begins not with law "morals" but with ideas (spiritual concepts); and, so must the man of integrity

Spiritual fibre is not attained generally. A congress, a state department, a church denomination can not have moral or spiritual fibre. We delude ourselves when we blame an institution "way over there" for lacking integrity.

Spiritual fibre is attained specifically. It is attained for America when each of us translates his spiritual experience into each human situation. Each citizen must act responsibly as a man of faith. Specifically, this means you and me.

If America is to find integrity, she must discover it in her citizens. Our family moved to Rancho Santa Fe because we believed that each person here wants this; that once he attains it, he will influence others; that he will train our youth and send them forth to infiltrate and change our whole society through the spiritual values that they experience here. We're glad to be a part of this.

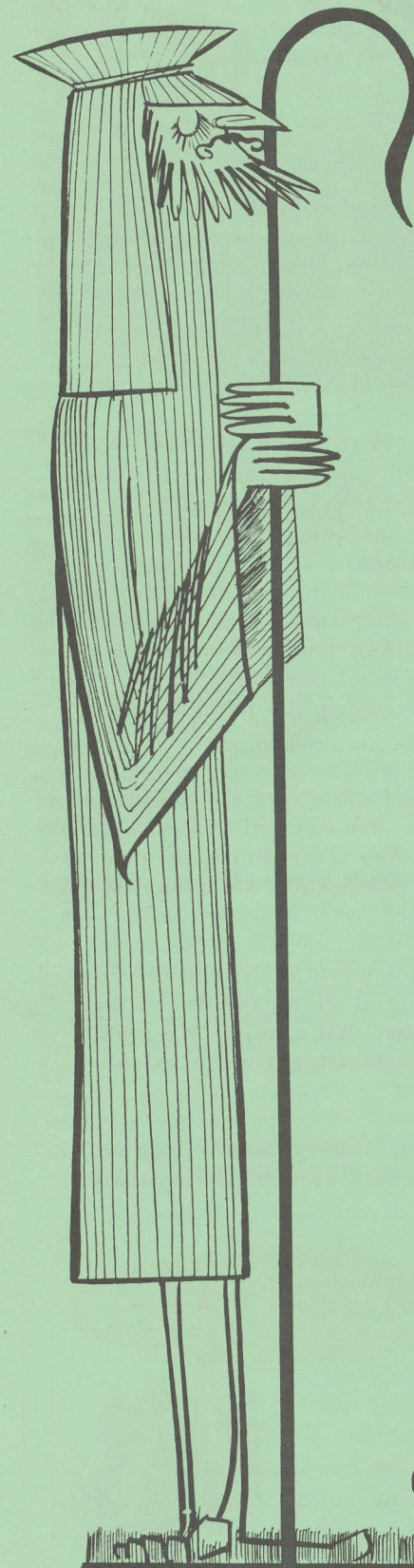

An Open Letter:

Nothing is more delightful to see than a beautiful woman; nothing is more gruesome than the sight of her skeleton. Nothing is more stately and majestic than a beautiful tree when its trunk and branches are alive and become the support of a mass of beautiful leafage. Nothing is less attractive when the trunk of a tree is stripped of its branches and foliage. It then becomes a pole!

Life in the beginning was rude and often ugly in many aspects, when only the functional features of inventions for man's convenience were considered. But, as time elapsed, it was demanded that consideration be given to making a product, or the means of any service, more attractive so that it would be compatible with its surroundings.

Electric power and telephones are a necessity and a great joy, but the poles, with a cross-piece at the top--and sometimes two--with a transformer that looks like an ash can between them, most certainly transforms a crucifix into an obnoxious sight. It is incongruous to the natural beauty of Rancho Santa Fe.

As an executive, I learned that management must live in the future. The early settlers here gave great thought to it. We are enjoying the benefits of that forethought. The chances are that they were so pleased to have electric power and telephones that the few poles and "wash line" appearing wires caused them no great concern.

But the village is growing. When building a home everyone is concerned about "his view". These unsightly poles and wires are becoming a blight to the scenic beauty of our locale. We must call a halt! We must insist that something be done about it, just as other attractive locations have done.

Nature puts the roots, the support of trees, underground. The facilities of the poles, guy wires and transformers should be buried similarly. That is the normal place for skeletons.

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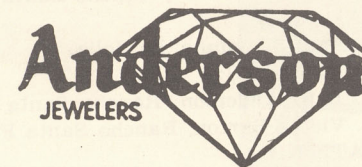

### The Ranch Book Shop

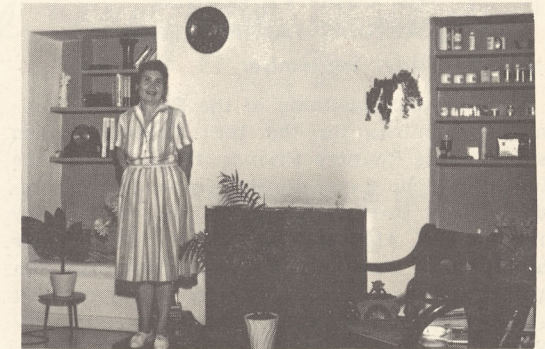

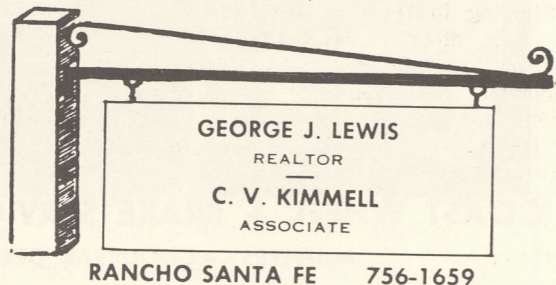

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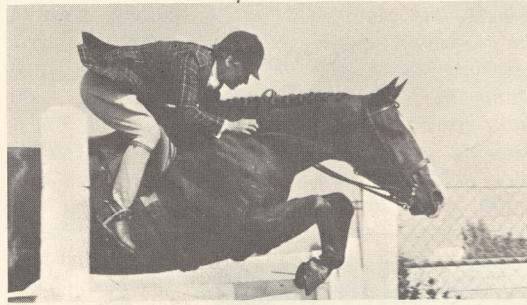
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# HORSES & Habits

There are few places that I can think of that are as unique as Rancho Santa Fe. Horses play an integral part of our life, varying from the high-class race horse to the back-yard horse. Did you ever stop to think how many horses you see during the course of the average day in Rancho Santa Fe? Horses, we might say, are one of the main industries on the Ranch. It would be surprising to actually count the number of horses.

Who are they? Where are they? Why are they? Why Rancho Santa Fe? Simply because Rancho Santa Fe is one of the few areas left where you can keep your horse at home, where there are lovely trails for a couple of hours ride in the sun away from the hurry and tension of everyday life, where it is possible to have an area to keep expensive horses on green grass pastures surrounded by white board fences, or where there is a Riding Club to promote organized activities for children and adults alike. In fact, truly a horseman's paradise.

Let's start with "Crazy Kid," the current world's record holder for six furlongs. He put the Ranch in a position of prominence in the thoroughbred industry. He is standing his first season at stud at Vista Hermosa Farm. There also stand several other fine stallions, and there are pastures of very fine mares and foals. Other farms, such as the San Dieguito Stock Farm, Mrs. Collins' Farm, and Fair Oaks represent many hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of some of the finest thoroughbred horses in California. On a more limited scale, but none the less important, are the several breeders of the American Saddlebred, the Appaloosa, and especially the Quarter Horse.

Showing horses, hunters and jumpers, saddlebreds and Western horses is a very active sport here, and exhibitors from the Ranch cover the State from the Del Mar Fair to the Big Jump, and the Quarter Horse Futurity at the Cow Palace. Rancho Santa Fe has the largest concentration of show horses in San Diego County

and it covers the whole spectrum of the sport . . . especially in the field of Hunters and Jumpers.

It seems to me that the quality of the horses from the Ranch is outstanding. However, let's never underestimate or neglect that largest part of our horse population, the fun horse, the back-yard horse, the horse that all the kids use as a taxi-cab or arm chair and friend. This horse is the one that most epitomizes Rancho because there are so few places left where one can ride for miles without leaving the Ranch; ride into the Center and find a hitching post or a convenient tree at which to tie a horse and have lunch. For the kids, horses are a built-in babysitter, afternoons after school and during the summer months. Where else can you find a sitter so patient, understanding and entertaining?

2. Do not pass the horse ahead of you unless you warn the rider of your intention. If you don't, you might startle the horse and lead to an accident.

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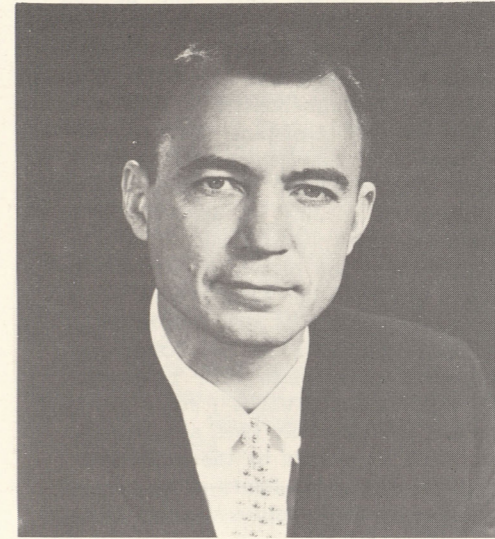
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## did you know?

CHARLES S. AMES, JR.



This month's brilliant flight to the moon by NASA's Ranger 7 brings to mind the part played by Rancho Santa Fe's Charles S. Ames. As Vice-President and Program Director-Space Launch Vehicles at General Dynamics-Astronautics, Charlie was responsible for the Atlas booster which started Ranger on its historic journey. The Ranger shot was one more outstanding achievement by Atlas, which previously had put all four United States astronauts into orbit around the earth besides performing many missions for the U. S. Air Force.

As an Astronautics Vice-President, Charlie Ames ranks as one of the country's veterans in the missile business. He started his career after graduating in 1936 from the University of California in Aeronautical Engineering. After rising to the position of design supervisor with General Motors, he joined Convair in 1946 and went to work on the MX-774 program. Charlie supervised the design of the structure and propulsion system of the MX-774 rocket which, during launchings at White Sands Proving Ground in 1948, proved many of the concepts later used in the Atlas. Later, as an assistant project engineer, he directed design studies in the MX-1593 program which led to the Atlas, the United States' first intercontinental ballistic missile.

Starting in 1954, Charlie, as Chief Design Engineer, directed the design of the Atlas. He was promoted to Chief Project Engineer in 1957 and was made Atlas Program Director in 1960. Then, early in 1962, he was appointed Vice-President and Program Director for the Space Launch Vehicle Project. During the past ten years, Charlie has seen the Atlas grow, first as a long-range weapon and then as the work-horse of the space age.

Charlie moved to the Ranch in 1951 where he lives with his wife, Miriam, and daughter, Cynthia, in their home on La Gracia. The Ames' son, Peter, is an aircraft maintenance technician in the U. S. Army. Earlier this month Peter visited with the family while enroute from Viet Nam to Fort Benning, Georgia.

Despite a heavy schedule, Charlie enjoys playing the golf course on Saturday mornings. That is, unless he is off on a trip to Cape Kennedy, Washington, Cleveland, or any other city where the space business may take him.

The meeting was called to order by President

President Teitsworth presented framed SERV-

sonal appreciation as well as that of the entire  
community and the Association for their out-  
standing service and generous contribution of  
time and effort the past three years on the  
Board of Directors.

COUNTY DEPUTY SHERIFF PONCHOT  
made a presentation on TRAFFIC CONTROL in  
Rancho Santa Fe and recommended that resi-  
dents alert the Sheriff of any suspicious door-  
to-door solicitors.

At 9:30 A.M. the Board adjourned for a Pub-

"A" TO "L" (Riding Stable and Polo Fields),  
Por. Lot 3, Blk. 23 (La Noria).

Following a visit to the property, consideration  
of the recommendations of the Art Jury and a  
presentation by Mr. Miller, agent for Mrs. Cum-  
mings, and after first determining that the Pub-  
lic Hearing Notice had been posted on the Asso-  
ciation Bulletin Board and copies had been sent  
to surrounding property owners, it was moved,  
seconded and unanimously carried that the PETI-  
TION OF MRS. BETTY KERN CUMMINGS be  
APPROVED. (Por. Lot 3, Blk. 23, La Noria.)

**Traffic Control.** There followed a discussion of traffic control on the Ranch. It was the opinion of the Board that the California Highway Patrol be contacted with a view to securing traffic patrol coverage, particularly during the off-duty hours of Sheriff Ponchot.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

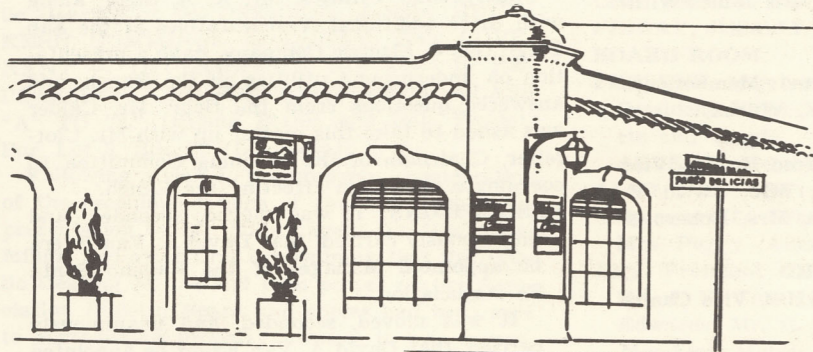

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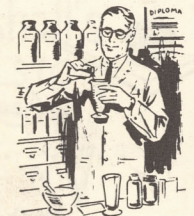
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### COUNTRY FRIENDS . . .

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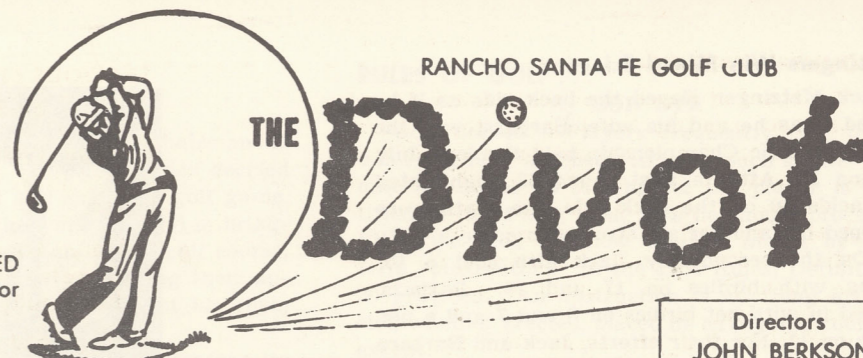

### TIP FROM YOUR PRO . . .

**Steady Head Position** — Much has been said about keeping the head steady during the golf swing. One thing that I have found that helps keep the head in position is to tilt the head to the right so it is positioned slightly behind the ball.

Tilting the head in this manner permits a full windup on the backswing. It also encourages a proper start to the swing and swinging from the inside out on the forward swing.

The head does move, but not until well after the ball is hit. This allows a proper finish to the swing.



### Glenn and Eva Conner Score in Mixed Flag Tourney . . .

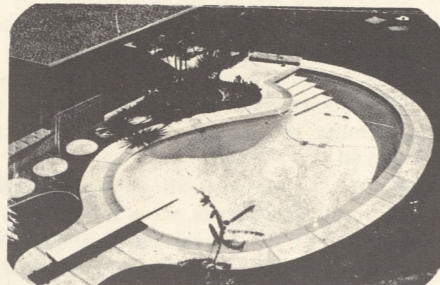

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### RULES OF GOLF . . .

**"Obstructions"**—Players frequently find their ball lying near an obstruction. In such a case, the question arises as to whether the player is entitled to relief and, if so, how he should proceed. First, we need to know what is meant by the term "obstruction." In the 1964 Rules, Definition 20 provides: "An obstruction is anything artificial, whether erected, placed or left on the course except:

- Object defining out of bounds, such as walls, fences, stakes and railings;
- Artificial surfaces and sides of roads and paths;
- In water hazards, artificially surfaced banks or beds, including bridge supports when part of such a bank. Bridges and bridge supports which are not part of such a bank are not obstructions;
- Any construction declared by the Committee to be an integral part of the course.

Thus, "obstructions" include such things as pipes, vehicles, paper, water outlets, bottles, rakes, buildings, shelters, benches, and hoses.

Relief from movable obstructions as provided for under Rule 31-1 is easily understood. However, discussion of Rule 31-2 covering interference by an immovable obstruction may be of help. First of all, the Rule applies if any of the following conditions exist:

- Your ball lies on or touches an immovable obstruction.
- An immovable obstruction within two club lengths of your ball interferes with your stance, stroke or backward movement of your club for the stroke in the direction in which you wish to play.

If these conditions exist, you may obtain relief by lifting your ball without penalty and dropping it within two club lengths of that point on the outside of the obstruction nearest which the ball originally lay. The ball must not come to rest in, on, or touching the obstruction or nearer the hole than its original position.

There are two important things to watch for when applying Rule 31-2. First, you may not measure over, through, or under an obstruction. And second, you are not permitted relief simply because an obstruction interferes with your line of play. For example, if your ball lies within two club lengths of the comfort station by the eighth fairway, you are not permitted to drop just because the obstruction lies between your ball and the green. It must also interfere with your stroke. In this particular case, you should also observe that the bushes around the house are not obstructions.

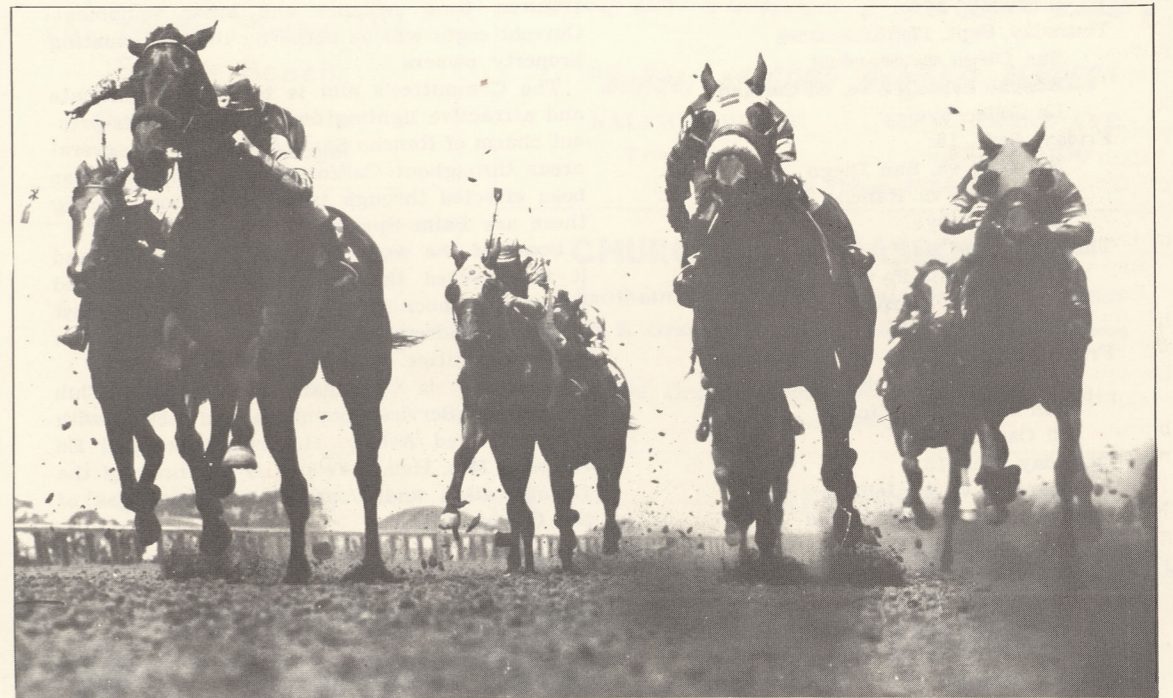
**Rancho Players in the Money . . .**

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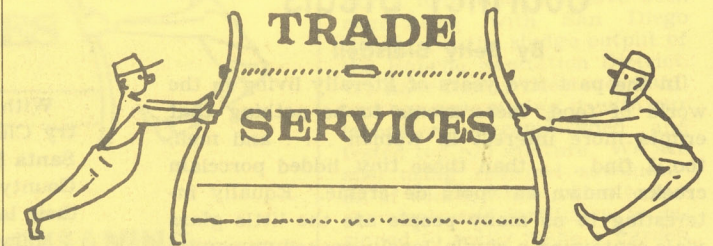
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## Gourmet Steals

In the past five years of literally living in the world of food, there seems to be nothing that erupts more interest in women . . . and men, too, I find . . . than those tiny, lidded porcelain crocks known as "pots de creme." Equally interesting to as many people are the little glass vials containing a single, lonely, corked up vanilla bean. Strangely enough the two have a very happy relationship. I must confess I didn't always know this. Vanilla beans, to me, were little black sticks that mysteriously perfumed my grandmother's sugar canister and were always in the way when I was given the task of filling the sugar bowl with a scoop too big for the purpose. As for a "pot de creme" I thought my hostess just had to be kidding when I was first served one for dessert! Having spent many years in the country, and as a little girl on my grandmother's Pennsylvania Dutch farm, I had grown accustomed to life-size porcelains of similar design, but never had they ever made an appearance in the dining room — big, middle-sized, or in miniature!

The dessert, I think is entirely worthy of its wide-spread interest. Not too very different actually, from the rich Yankee custards I grew up with, which were always precariously set to cool on the kitchen window sill (these had meringue on top, though). But the French version is even richer, and tiny as they are, one is all one needs to nicely top a full course dinner.

### Vanilla Pots De Creme

Scald 2 cups milk with one-inch piece of Vanilla Bean and ½ cup sugar, remove it from the heat and let it stand 10 minutes to absorb the Vanilla flavor. Remove the vanilla bean and slowly pour 6 beaten egg yolks into the milk mixture, stirring constantly. Strain the mixture into a bowl and then fill the pots de creme. Set them in a pan of hot water and bake in a slow oven (300 F.) for 15 minutes, or until a small pointed knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Add cold water if necessary to keep the hot water in the pan from boiling. Cool and chill, and serve—if you would be fancier—with Brittany Lace Pancakes—one on the plate is enough but two is even better.

Mrs. Alex DeBakcsy makes a delicious pot de creme, I hear, and I would like to have given her rule, here, instead of mine but couldn't reach her by telephone today . . . and here comes Ruth Giffin for my copy.

Incidentally, don't throw away those one-inch pieces of vanilla bean . . . they can be used again and again. Honestly. Where to store them? How about the sugar canister?

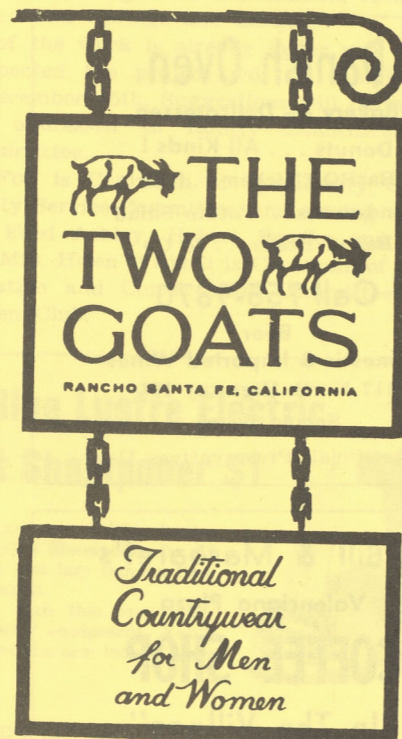

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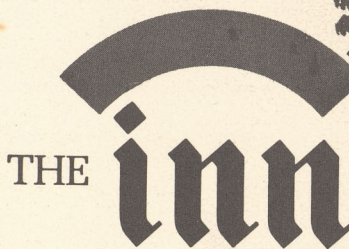
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
