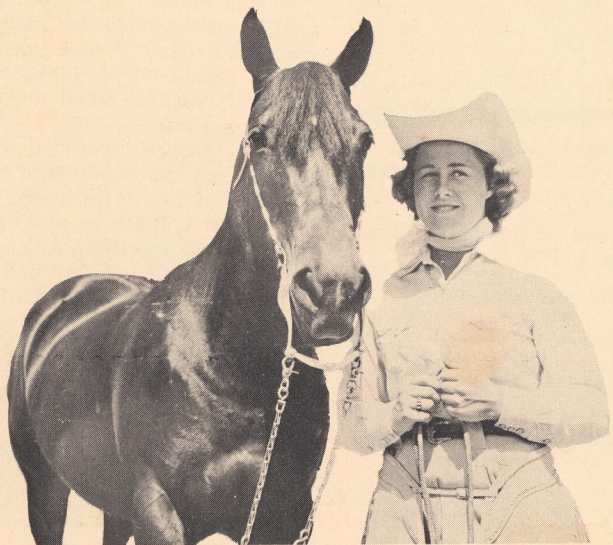

SPECIAL MEETING

Ninety Percent of Voters Back Board Procedure

The May 6th special meeting of the Rancho Santa Fe Association, held at the Garden Club, drew an over-flow attendance of members who backed the current method of board meeting procedure by a ten to one majority.

The special meeting had been called through a petition of a group of members seeking an amendment to the current By-laws requiring all board meetings to be "open" to the public.

The implication that the meetings were "closed" was challenged by the board and other Association members on the ground that any member or group of members who had matters to take up with the board (critical or otherwise) could do so by simply telephoning for an appointment to appear at any of its meetings.

Earlier in the meeting, following a protracted discussion of legal technicalities, a motion to adjourn was defeated by a vote of 124 to 89.

In order to clarify questions raised by the calling of the special meeting, President Weddell outlined the separate areas of governmental control and jurisdiction in Rancho Santa Fe under its status as an unincorporated community. The summary included the County Board of Supervisors, the School, Fire, Irrigation and Sanitary Districts. The Board President then detailed the specific operating procedure of the Directors in the conduct of their responsibility to the 750 Members.

It was moved by Dr. John E. Novak and seconded by Mr. La Motte Cohu that the By-Laws of the Association should not be amended at the special meeting. The motion was sustained by a vote of 185 to 19.

The meeting which opened at 7:30 p.m. with an invocation by the Rev. Chester Tolson, was adjourned at 10:30.

An easement agreement is to be filed in favor of the Association with the County granting a 5' easement along each property line to be set aside for sewer and-or water lines, Vice-President Dewey abstained from voting.

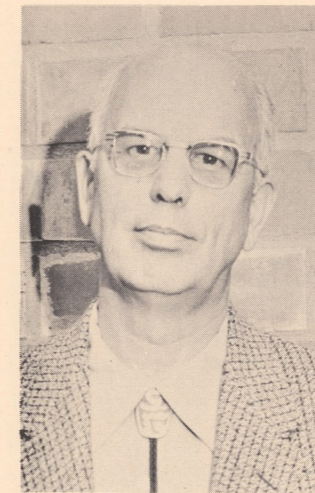

Mr. Lewis, who was born in Syracuse, N. Y., was educated at Colgate University and the University of Pennsylvania, Wharton School of Finance and Commerce. He served as 2nd Lieutenant US Infantry during World War I.

His business connections have

included being general manager of Fiat Metal Mfg. Co., vice president and general manager of Clarin Mfg. Co. and proprietor of plumbing supply manufacturing and housewares manufacturing businesses.

In 1951 Mr. Lewis retired and moved to the Ranch in April, 1953. His hobbies are shop work and music. He is currently serving as an alternate member of the Rancho Santa Fe Art Jury.

Mr. Welles was born and reared in Michigan and educated at Albion College. Most of his business career was spent in Chicago where he was with Marshall Field Co. An official in the treasury department, he was delegated to build the Merchandise Mart, largest commercial building in the world.

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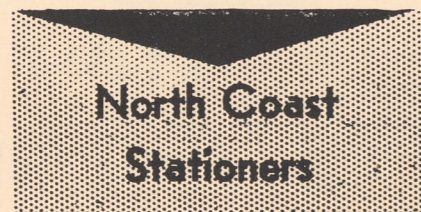

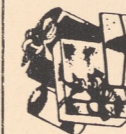

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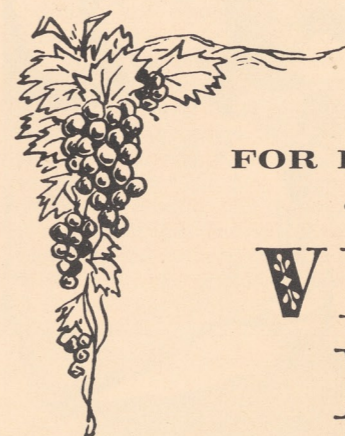
'Pro, Con' Information Proffered

It takes one and one-half years to become an Eagle at the fastest rate of advancement, but it usually takes three years.

Law Affects Dog Owners

Members of the local Humane Society group call attention of Rancho residents to the newly amended county ordinance which affects dog owners.

The three aspects which are emphasized are: that all dogs when off of their owner's property must be on leash; that all dogs must have a license and that all dogs must have rabies shots.

At clinics recently set up in this area, nearly 700 animals received a 2-year vaccine at cost charge of \$1.50. Such clinics again will be set up an announced.

Dog owners may obtain a license by sending their name and the name of their dog with a \$2.00 fee to the county tax collector.

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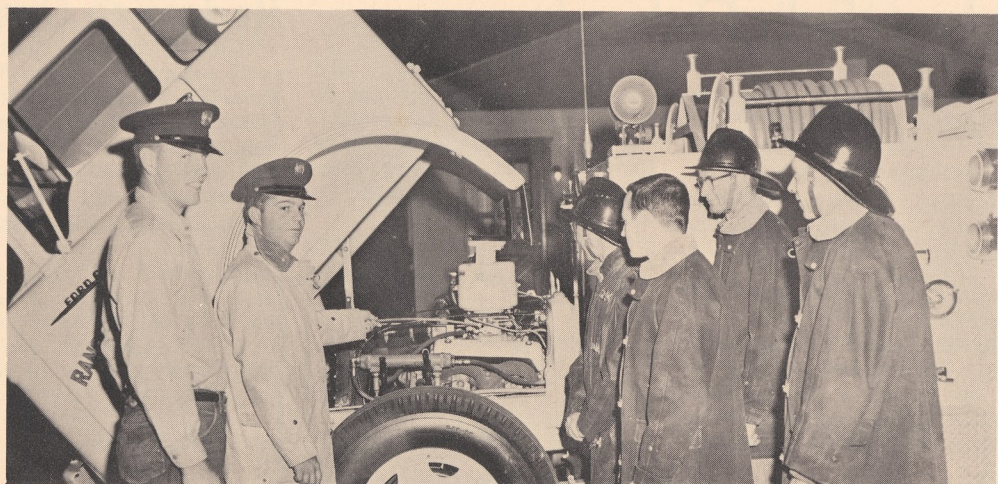

Fire Department Chief Gives Best Techniques To Report Emergencies

The Rancho Santa Fe Fire Department, through its chief, James A. Fox, asks all residents to have vacant lots disked. A recent grass fire which burned over five acres on Fortuna, caught fire from nearby controlled burning that was permitted. But in such cases all sparks cannot be controlled, so it is important that vacant property be made less of a hazard with diskings.

Another grass and eucalyptus fire on Via de la Valle which called out three units and 11 members of the department, was

caused from the cigarette of a careless motorist. One-half acre was seriously damaged.

Chief Fox asks that when a fire or other emergency is reported, the number PL 6-1126 should be called. For business and routine calls the number is PL 6-1522. The person reporting should give the name and correct address, state clearly what is burning, or the nature of the emergency, so that the proper equipment may be sent at once. For not only are there fire trucks to be sent, but emergency oxygen is on hand for difficulty in

breathing, heart attacks, asphyxiation, drowning, seizures, et cetera.

If possible it is helpful to have someone at the side of the road or street to give further information when the fire department arrives.

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TREACLE and INK

There is much variety and considerable quality in a newly-published book containing the works of some of our neighbors to the south. It is titled **THE MUSE IN MEXICO; A MID-CENTURY MISCELLANY** which is edited by Thomas Mabry Cranfill (University of Texas Press, 180 pp., \$4 and on the shelves of the central library).

There is considerable variety within the chronological scheme, for example, represented are writers Jose Vasconcelos who is 77 and Emilio Carballido who is 34; poets Tabalda born 1871, and Rivas in 1930; or painters Dr. Atl and Rafael Coronel who are 81 and 26, respectively.

Drawings Included

The contents are composed of poetry and prose fiction and a generous portfolio of drawings.

And although this miscellany is not comprehensive, it is intensely interesting.

Hans Beacham has photographed sixteen of the creative artists of Mexico and the reader is able to see the fine faces of such recognized creators as Dr. Atl, Juan Rulfo, Alfaro Siqueiros and Rosario Castellanos.

Contemporary

Except for one or two (Orozco, Rivera and Tablada) and the translations of dateless Aztec poets, all of the contributors are living. This contemporary spirit about the book gives it an even more interesting aspect, for we always enjoy knowing what the people next door are about.

There are five fables by Juan Jose Arreola and they concern the hippopotamus, a hen, seals, the rhinoceros and the hyena. Here is terse, refreshing prose-

poetry. There is a certain mixture of Aesop, St. Francis and possibly Chesterton and Belloc.

The hippopotamus is a "bulldozer of swampy terrain," but bereft of his swamp and pensioned off by nature to a zoo, he becomes a mere "paperweight of history."

Fables Told

The rhinoceros charges "with the single-minded vigor of a materialistic philosopher." Or "During the mating season the bull rhinoceroses repair to clearings in the forest. There, laden with excessive armor, they abandon themselves to the graceless, lumbering joust in which only the medieval clangor of the collision counts."

William Carlos Williams and Lysander Kemp contribute translations of the Aztec poets, and the portfolio of drawings gives indication of a diversified influence and experimentation with art techniques as well as other means of expression.

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
