We believe that Judge Charles Hoffman did extensive renovations to the house prior to 1920. During renovations done by the Parks, a wooden tank toilet dated 1920 was removed.  
We have heard that in the early 1900s ~~the~~ a tennis court was located in the back yard. The Rogers had gorgeous perennial gardens with gladiolas in the back yard. Laura and Jay Rogers <sup>moved</sup> ~~came~~ into this house about 1920 and celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary here.

We have met Dorothy Rogers Emig, daughter of Jay and Laura Rogers as well as their granddaughter Jay Schreiber who lives near Oxford, Ohio.

The Rogers were long time members of Glendale Presbyterian Church and Laura was one of the founders of the Glendale Centennial Gardeners.

In the 1840's prior to the construction of the Swedenborgian church and the parsonage, these grounds were the site of Swedenborgian Church camp meetings attended by

John Chapman, "Johnny Appleseed" who was a Swedenborgian. Folks came with their wagons from throughout the tri-state area for as long as two weeks and camped on what is now ~~the~~ our property (formerly the church parsonage)

The bench that John Chapman used at the camp meetings now sits in the entry of the Swedenborgian Church.
