GLENDALE NOTABLES IN SPRING GROVE CEMETERY

BABBITT, DAVID s. 17 I. 45 The brother of Platt Babbitt, who was a Daguerreotypist and famous photographer from Niagara Falls who took a famous daguerreotype of Niagara Falls. He was known to wave an umbrella at others wanting to use "his" spot at Niagara Falls for taking photos. David bought a farm here in Glendale in mid-1862 and moved the family there. David was born in 1820 in Mass. and died in 1868.

BATEMAN, WARNER M. s.86, I.42 Ohio Senator and Judge who broke up a whiskey ring. Born in Springfield, Ohio in 1827 and died in 1897 from heart disease in Washington, D.C.

BROWN, HARRY WHITING s. 118 l. 158 Prominent Glendale citizen and founder of local boy scout troop. The Douglas-Giague House in Glendale was built around 1869 and was presented to the village for community purposes in 1929 as a memorial to Harry W. Brown. It's now the home of The Harry Whiting Brown Community Center Library. Born in Glendale in 1859 and died in Atlantic City, N.J. from chronic myocarditis in 1929. BURCHENALL, CHARLES H. SR. s. 86 l. 113 Board chairman of the

BURCHENALL, CHARLES H. SR. s. 86 I. 113 Board chairman of the Cambridge Tile Manufacturing Co. who lived at 155 Magnolia in Glendale. Born in 1896 in Glendale and died in 1972.

CLARKE, ROBERT s.51, I.36 a prominent book publisher and book dealer; William A. Procter, second-generation head of P&G, bought Clarke's private library and several thousand volumes and gave them to U.C.; Clarke was an expert in Americana, history, and geography. Lived at 70 East Fountain Avenue

CLEVELAND, JAMES HARLAN s. 118 l. 218 United States District Attorney who formed a law partnership with Hon. C.B. Mathews and married the daughter(Grace) of Supreme Court Justice, Stanley Mathews. Born in 1865 and died in 1906 of Brights in Glendale.

COX, JUDGE JOSEPH s. 30 l. 82 Judge of the First Judicial Circuit of Ohio. During his term in office, he succeeded in breaking up what was known as the Big Sandy gang of counterfeiters, sending ten of the members to the penitentiary. Born in Chambersburg, Pennsylvania in 1822 and died in 1900 CRAWFORD, ROBERT s.52, l.107 merchant; 1st mayor; one of commissioners of original village plan; lived at 160 E. Sharon

DABNEY, DR. CHARLES W. s. 118 I. 26 an educator who believed Cincinnati's municipal university must always be a vital part of the city. He became president of the University of Cincinnati in 1904 and held it until 1920. Early on, he was at odds with George Boss Cox on funding sources for UC but eventually, Cox gave in to Dabney's insistence on equitable financial treatment for the university. He and wife Mary C. Brent lived at 804 Woodbine Ave. in Glendale, Ohio. Born in Virginia in 1855 and died in 1945 DANSON family s.118 I. 325 Edward and Anna (Celtic cross with carved "Danson" + 2 foot stones) paternal grandparents of actor Ted Danson of "Cheers" tv show fame

ELLIS, WILLIAM HARTSHORNE JR. s. 19 I. M The general contractor of the Ingalls Building on 4th Street and grandson of furniture maker Robert Mitchell. Born in 1893 and died in 1939 on Forest Avenue.

GARBER, FREDERICK W. s. 113 I. 205 Architect of many schools with Clifford Brooks Woodward. Born in 1877 and died in 1950 at 28 Oak St. GLENN, HUGH s. 49 I. 38 An Army contractor and Santa Fe trader. Edmund R. Glenn was the namesake of Glendale. Born in Berkley Co., Va. in 1788 and died in 1833.

HALDEMAN, R.J. (or J.I.) s.45, I.34 early resident; Lockland paper mill president

HARKNESS, ANTHONY s.29, l.89 He built steamboats and train engines and was Mayor of Glendale.

MATHEWS, STANLEY s. 36 I. 106 Supreme Court Justice, Founder of the Literary Club, U.S. Senator and the architect of original Children's Hospital. He was the first to move to Glendale. His funeral was ordered by Harlan Cleveland, Asst. U.S. Attorney Gov. Supreme Court. Born in 1824 and died in 1889.

McLAREN, DANIEL s.12, I.1 a C.D.&H. railroad superintendent in 1869; lived at 815 Greenville Ave.

McLAUGHLIN, JAMES W. s. 54 I. 50 Architect of Shillito's-Passenger Pigeon Pagoda at Zoo -Shillito's/McAlpin's-Mabley & Carew-Art Museum-Gaslight & Coke Building on 4th St.-flower stand on Fountain Square-Masonic Temple-and...the lamp posts in Glendale! His father was a partner of John Shillito. He designed the plans for the first grandstand in 1867 for the Cincinnati Red Stockings. He was born in 1834 and died in 1923.

MUSSEY, REUBEN D. s.18, l.11 Surgeon and Professor of surgery who organized the Miami Medical College when he got fed up with problems at Medical College of Ohio. Born in Portsmouth, Ohio and died in 1901 at age 53.

PHILLIPS, ROBERT C. s.74, I.6 civil engineer who laid out the village of Glendale

PISE, REVEREND DAVID, JR. s. 110 I. 263 Pastor of this Church! In 1848 he was called to Trinity Church, Fayetteville, N. Y. It was during this period that President Cleveland was his pupil, the latter's father being at the time pastor of the Presbyterian Church in that village. In 1875 he became rector of this chuch. Born in Belchertown Mass. in 1815 and died in Glendale in 1894.

PROCTER, WILLIAM A. JR. s. 87 I. 117 The son of the Procter & Gamble co-founder, William Sr. and Olivia. Born in 1834 and died in 1907 in Glendale.

SAWYER, CHARLES s. 117 I. 35 Secretary of Commerce, Ambassador to Belgium, lawyer, politician, businessman and namesake of Sawyer Point. He lived at 95 E. Fountain Avenue in Glendale. Born in 1887 and died in 1979 in Palm Beach, Florida at age 92.

STRAUCH, ADOLPH s. 20 I. S He landscaped gardens in Clifton and Glendale. He developed Burnet Woods, Mt. Storm, The Windings, Schoenberger estate and Eden Park, where he had a deer preserve. Born in Eckersdorf near Glatz Silesia, Germany in 1822 and died in Spring Grove Cemetery in the superintendent's house of pneumonia in 1883.

WILSON, HENRY NEILL s. 48 l. 1 The son of James Keyes Wilson, who designed the Glendale Lyceum and Rookwood Pottery Building. Born in 1855 and died in Pittsfield, Mass. in 1926.
