The best estimate we have is that Oakhurst was built in 1854 by James K. Wilson, early in his prominent career. He had punchased six acres from Usiham & Elizabeth Moores who'd acquired the property from Crawford & Clark, funders of the subdivision.

Old man Davis soon bought it, and according to report, he had many out buildings. One of them was a museum of sorts, another was the barn that Archibald Denison turned into the house at three Forest Place. What once was the driveway for the form is now the street (Forest Place).

The Matthews family awned the house from 1925-64, but rented it out for most of that time. Miss Elizabeth decided to live in it husself in about 1958 in order to be close to On. Fasoldt. Unfortunately, he and his family were renting it at the time - and they made for away. Actually, it was less than a mile away to a house at Chester Road, which was then country!
