

- The downstairs bathroom was originally a butler's pantry.
- There are messages and facts about the house written on the dining room walls, under the wallpaper. The hieroglyphics in the basement are from the Holmes family.
- We believe the Holmes family added the family room on the back of the house. Mr. Holmes was an art teacher at Princeton H.S. Reportedly the shop teacher lived next door at 965 Congress Ave. The 2 men spent summers working on their houses, such as adding the family room. It was also said that occasionally, shop students from the high school would work on projects in the houses. (None of this has been verified, but the remodeling definitely appears not professionally done.)
- The house originally had a farmhouse style porch across the front. Mrs. Gladys Conner told us they had the porch removed, and put on the current smaller porch to get more light in the living room. The Conners also built the bookcases into the living room.
- The fireplaces were originally gas fireplaces at one time. They burned coal at another time. The coal storage was in the small basement room with windows, next to the driveway.
- Mr. Schleuter, from Schleuter Plumbing, told us that he played in the basement of the house as a child. His family lived 2 doors over, at 935 Congress.

- Stan was quarantined with scarlet fever in the front bedroom at this house, his grandmother's house (Muthert). Chums from school stopped by to chat out the front window.
- There was to be a wedding in the front parlor, but the groom did not show up. The jilted bride had some difficulty getting over this and her ghost reportedly still haunts the house - hoping for a wedding - we've never seen/heard her.
- The Mutherts were a housekeeper/cook and gardener at one of the homes in the Village. A son was a chauffeur for one of the Procter daughters - for many years. As a token of appreciation, she had the house next door (941 Congress) built for him as a gift and he lived next door to his parents.
- The son once brought a goat home late one night and kept it upstairs in the attic.
