

I am Elizabeth (Jaeger) Pfeiffer - born 1914 in
the south part of Glendale in a rented house owned
by Mr. & Mrs. Harry Orns, Mr. Orns owned a
saloon on Rt. 4, later named "Century Inn".
At the age of 5 my parents bought a 4 bedroom house
on Glendale Ave. that is now no longer, it burned
several yrs. ago. The Ave. is not in a very good
condition today.

(Brewed)
The names of the business people in the downtown
area. The B + O railroad station was in full use in at
the time, taking passengers to & from work, my older
brothers & Dad caught the train six days a week.

The place of business was owned by Mr. Bracker
& was called "Bracker's saloon," later was named
"Bracker's Cafe". It was a dive way back to an area
that had no outlet & had an ice house there that
was filled with blocks of ice by the Brindle brothers,
in the warm months, they also delivered ice house to
house before refrigerators were in every home.

Not to that was Mr. Friedhoff's tailor shop, he made
suits, trousers, smoking jackets on order for men & did
fine work. Not was a lg. building, at the time was
used by the State of Ohio Highway Div. 8. to make
wood stops & go signs & etc. My oldest brother Bill
got his start working there & "worked his way up the
ladder" for the next 50 yrs. He lived in Glendale
for years & married Phoebe Foster, he died at the age
of 74, Phoebe died at the age of 95.

This same building later was the village fire

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house, much later it moved up town to the Town Hall, Mr. Stanley Newton was fire chief at the time. Not come a diverse way back of businesses I will be mentioning. Not was Mr. Adolf Guttings coal yard office, his nephew George Gutting was most often in the office. Not came Walter Schatzman's tin shop, he installed metal roofs & gutters etc. Not come Mr. Koch barbershop, Mr. Grasso shoe store & Kroger grocery & meat counter, on the corner was Herman Igler's drug store, around the corner was the post office a Ray Schatzman hardware store, he & Walter were brothers. Above all of this two story building were apartments whose doors came down between some of the businesses. Also the telephone Co. was above Igler's drug store for years until they built the new building on the corner of Sharon Ave & ?

Across the street from above mentioned was a grocery store owned by Mr. & Miss (brother & sister) Lekyer. When they retired Mr. Breitfelder closed his store uptown & moved in the Lekyer store. Not was Stanley Newton's grocery store & meat shop, when he retired Mr. Kereck took over the space & ran a dry cleaning business, not was Mr. Shephard dry goods store.

Mr. Newton was the fire chief, Mr. Edward "Smoke" Meagher was was the day policeman & Mr. John Coleman was the night policeman, Mr. Van Camp was Justice of the Peace. Mr. Jim Corrothers was Mayor.

On Sharon Ave near the railroad was a 2 story building on the SW corner that changed businesses several times. A shoe store owned by an older couple, the Mrs. & their niece ran the shoe sales & the Mr. repaired shoes in a back room, don't remember their names. After them Mr. & Mrs. Pollard (Mrs. Pollard was Edna Suttman, of the Suttman family that lived a few doors west of Church St. on Sharon Ave.) opened a delicatessen. It was a new building built & owned & operated by Mr. Estudge? as a car repair shop & filling station. Up the street (Sharon Ave) was the ~~Community~~ Community House Ms. Taylor was the house.

On the N side of Sharon Ave. W. of the R.R. was a two story brick building that Mr. Frank Miller had a barbershop with a pool table in the back room, he also lived in part of the building.

It was a store called the "Home Store" owned & operated by Mr. Phelan & Miss Grannon, they sold yard goods, house dresses & women's garments.

One hall was used for the Cin. Library for books, the big truck came every week or so & brought new issues, the library section was well used by all.

If I can't name his name? He was living quarters & he was a dentist, name? It was a two story building owned by Mr. Grasso, he & fam. lived in one half & rest was rentals.

Glendale had several Doctors, Dr. Robert Allen, Dr. Brown, Dr. Keller, & ~~a~~ Dr. I don't remember his name.

Glendale had several schools. St. Gabriel

Catholic School, the public school & an all black school up to the 8th. Grade, now should be called African American.

There were several Church's, St. Gabriel

Catholic Church, Presbyterian Church,

Episcopal Church, ^{Rev. Jimmie} Methodist Church, & two African American Church's, one up on Washington Ave., the other on a culdesac off of S. Troy Ave.

Glendale had some of the richest families & the blue collar workers of which my family were factory workers, & then there were those less fortunate who had hard times & depended on the Community Chest for help, today it is called Welfare.

Several families had only a lg. barn & lot for a dairy herd, after being milked they drove them to pasture they rented near by.

Mr. Hekes (pronounced Haik) lived 2 doors east of Troy Ave. ^{from} He drove them thru a long lane, crossed Troy Ave., over the R.R. tracks to rented pasture owned by Mr. A. E. Anderson.

Mr. Mc Namara did the same & drove his herd north on Troy Ave to a woods at the end.

Mr. Wm. Fennessey also milked his herd & only drove his herd across Morse Ave in front of ~~his~~ his house. (Cnr. of Morse & Glendale Ave.) to a ~~rental~~ rental pasture. He & his wife pasturized their milk, bottled it & delivered to his customers & then went on to his work, (where ever).

Mr. Stucker lived upstairs, lived south of Sharon Ave, back of a pm. pub. He drove his herd

5) across Sharon Ave to a rented pasture.
Henry Igler, brother of Herman Igler had an
ice house on N. Troy Ave. next to Fred Sulsted,
he cut ice from the ice pond on Glendale Ave.,
now is the sub. of "Corruccini's Pond", & stored
it in this thick walled ice house with straw
between the layers. It was sold in the summer
for cooling only, not safe to cool a drink of water.
Later an ice business started in Lockland & it was
pure.

Family names most popular back then were
Cooper Proctor, several Rogans, A.C. Anderson
several Allens, a number of Richardsons,
Dr. Keller, Mr. Newton, Macnamara's, Maguire's,
Gutting, Koch, Cook, Kelley's, Downing, Hallman,
Fain, Beckner, Walter Beckner had a garage on Oak
St. at S. end of S. Troy Ave. Rickters, Phelons,
Dickmans, Ditmyer, Haverlan, Wagner,
Sulstedts, Hines, Schumakers, Fricke off Mc Guigan,
and many more than ~~sixty~~ from my memory.

Glendale had several sections of African
Americans, all were fine people, no trouble to the
village.

I came from a lg. fam. of 9 children of Adam & Ida
Jonger. My family was Tom., Carl, Henry, Ada,
Otto, Marie, Samuel, m^r Elizabeth & Herbert.
I am the only one left & am now 98.

I have ~~old~~ old photos to show, a photo of me & our house.
I forgot about uptown businesses, the Kelley grocery

4) & meat shop was on the corner of Harbor Ave & Congress, they lived in the back part, also sold school supplies. Across the street from them was Bill & ? Corcoran ice cream parlor & lunch counter.

On Congress & Washington Ave was John Brown's grocery store, as mentioned before Mr. Breitfelder was across from Mr. Brown's store. Later a saloon was opened in that area, name slipped my memory.

The B. & O. railroad had claimed several deaths back then, one was an African-American man, name unknown to me, found along the tracks at Glendale Ave & Troy Ave. early one morning.

The dates of all of these I don't remember, another time two young boys were walking south on the tracks after being up in the woods looking after their animal traps, they trapped animals for their pets, that was common those days. They could see a train was coming from the south & felt they were safe, they weren't, a train was coming behind them that they couldn't hear due to the approaching one from the south.

I was on my way home on Troy & I saw the last one to wave to the boys as I sent them from school, they were Paul Nuttall & Bobby Elsasser, students at St. Gabriel in my brother Tom's class.

Mr. Mc Namara seen what was going to happen & came out his driveway screaming & waving his arms to get their attention, he did, they became confused & instead of jumping to their right down over the bank into the weeds, they jumped to their left into the path of the northbound train, & wasn't &

billed, I did not see them be hit, when I looked their way they were down the bank at the edge of the road. Word was spread fast & Glendale had no ambulance so Mr. ~~Newton~~ Newton had a covered delivery van, he had it emptied & swept out & sent to the scene. The passenger train had stretchers in their baggage car & furnished two of them.

No one seemed to know who the boys were, I went into shock & could not speak. I knew more & more cars came including Bobbie's sister Catherine, took one look & she fainted, some one took her to the Dr. & then on home to tell the family.

In the meantime my Mother knew I was due home but wasn't, when a train finally gets stopped back up we know something is wrong, Mom had arthritis in her knees & couldn't walk that far to see what was going on, she stood glued to our kitchen window watching for me, needless to say supper was very late, she was very relieved when I came into sight. When I got home I was crying & couldn't talk. My brothers heard the news when they returned from work & told Mom what happened.

Another "death" was a cow ~~the~~ belonging to Mr. Mc Namara (cousin to the above Mr. Mc.) being brought home for the evening milking (as mentioned before) it got frightened by the train & for what reason the cow left Roy Ave. & darted in front of the train was killed, it landed on the "cow catcher" in front of the train.

Another death was at the Sharon Ave. crossing after

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midnight, no watchman on duty at that hour, was a car with two couples, two were sisters, the Hekew sisters lived very close by & should of known better to watch for a train, they were hit, one of the girls was killed on sight, the other one spent months in a hospital, I don't remember how the two young men fared, I know neither were killed, car was totaled.

Another accident only totaled a car, on the next crossing south of Sharon Ave., Officer Meagher was crossing the crossing in his police car & stalled & he couldn't get it started, no one came to his rescue to shove it off the track, he got out safely & watched his car be pushed down the track. It was a while before the Village got another patrol car.

There was an all Female college in Glendale on the north side of Sharon Ave. on the hill we all called "College Hill". It later was torn down, ground prepared for several lg. lovely homes built in the same area - they saved most if not all of the lg. trees. I don't know when the three story college was built & have forgotten when it was torn down. I hope someone does remember these dates.
