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BIBLIOGRAPHY OF THE DUTCH PERIOD.

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### DUTCH.

1. A good work to start with, giving the period in compact and interesting form, is Tuckerman's "*Life of Stuyvesant*," (Dodd & Mead, and in Astor and other libraries.)

2. Solid works on which others are based are *Broadhead's* "History of New York," 2 vols., and *O'Callaghan's* "New Netherlands" (in all libraries). These are compiled from the original sources.

3. *New York Colonial Documents*, published in some ten volumes, containing an immense amount of original and official correspondence and historical material for the student of these periods. Look in Vol. XI, containing the Index, under titles *New Amsterdam* and *New York City*.

4. The *Documentary History of New York*, four volumes, is another similar work, with miscellaneous original matter, some of it valuable. See table of contents of each volume.

5. *Switt's History of New York*, 2 vols., written in the middle of the last century, is valuable and standard. Good notes in appendix.

6. Winsor's "*Critical and Narrative History of America*." See in Vol. IV the chapter on the Dutch Period by B. Fernow, p. 395, and especially the notes that follow on the sources of information. Maps at the close.

7. Bryant's and Gay's "*Popular History of America*." Vol. I and II.

8. Lodge's "*English Colonies in America*." Climp. XVI.

9. E. H. Roberts' "*History of New York State*." Vol. I.

10. The well-known modern histories of the City, by Mrs. Lamb, Miss Beall, W. L. Stone, Theodore Roosevelt, C. B. Todd.

10a. Wilson's "*Memorial History of New York*." Vol. I. The Chapters on the Dutch Governors. This is the most exhaustive and authoritative of our local histories. Illustrated.

10b. The "*Magazine of American History*," 1879-93.

13. Vol. I of *Long Island Historical Society Memoirs*, contains the journal of Labadist ministers who visited New York soon after its surrender to the English. Not much information about the City, but worth reading.

19. VALENTINE'S MANUAL of the Common Council of New York. The volumes from about 1850 to 1896 contain much historical information in the form of original documents, maps, illustrations and articles. See index to each. In Pasko's "*Old New York*," Vol. I, p. 25, etc., there is a list of the engravings in *Valentine's Manual*.

20. G. F. Diasway's "*Earliest Churches of New York*"—Dutch French, English, Presbyterian, etc.

21. H. W. Dunshee's "*History of the Schools of the Collegiate Dutch Church*."

22. *Felix Othloy's New York*.

23. G. Bancroft's "*History of the United States*" necessarily has a valuable critical summary account of the Dutch in New York, as all our general histories have in the early chapters.
