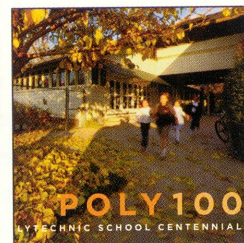

# From the Head of School

## The Poly Oak: Firmly Rooted, Versatile, and Resilient



**I**n this issue of the *Oak Tree Times* we highlight the school's Centennial, a memorable celebration involving hundreds of volunteers and thousands of participants. The focus on Poly's future, as well as its history and traditions, has been on my mind—even going so far as to influence my reading selections. For example, last spring I picked up a book titled *Oak: The*

*Frame of Civilization*, by William Bryant Logan. What I learned about oak trees underscored the aptness of the Poly logo—not just because our campus was formerly graced with a distinctive, 200-year-old specimen, but because of the tree's unique qualities.

Oak trees don't hold any records. They aren't the tallest like the redwood or the oldest like the bristle cone pine. What makes the oak remarkable is its adaptability and durability. Whereas none of the champion trees can survive outside of their native regions, the oak takes root nearly everywhere it lands. As Logan writes, "In any landscape, oaks are the keepers. They make a mark against the sky, so that even without knowing it, people find their way by them." This versatility, resilience and ability to thrive no matter where life may lead are the very qualities that we want to instill in our students.

At Poly, we strive to equip students with the tools to make the best of any given environment, so that they develop the intellectual resources and strength of character to face new challenges and weather bumps in the road. Poly alumni live, work and travel across the globe. They adapt and thrive in Beijing, Cairo, and Sydney. They climb mountains in Tibet, conduct research on Fulbright Scholarships in Norway and Japan, and work in advertising in Dubai. Others enrich their local communities by applying a law degree to teaching in an independent school or converting an old can factory into an emerging fashion studio. Our students come to Poly with the talent, heart and drive to change the world; they leave with the confidence and skills to fulfill that ambition.

Over the past year, the Centennial has affirmed for us that the Poly that exists today is firmly rooted in the values and principles of the school that was founded in 1907. Poly was established by open-minded, forward-looking leaders, and the school continues to draw people who ask questions, who seek to grow and improve, and who are dedicated to making a difference in their neighborhood, their nation and their world.

# Letter from the Board

## The Poly Centennial: Sharing a Deep Commitment

**T**he Poly Centennial has brought back to campus many people from different generations who share a deep commitment to the school that has lasted long after their direct connection to Poly ended. Some of the most heartwarming moments of the Centennial have occurred when those who worked, studied, or volunteered together at Poly in past years reunited at Centennial celebrations. Two events, in particular, stand out in my mind as showcasing the enduring relationships community members have to this school.

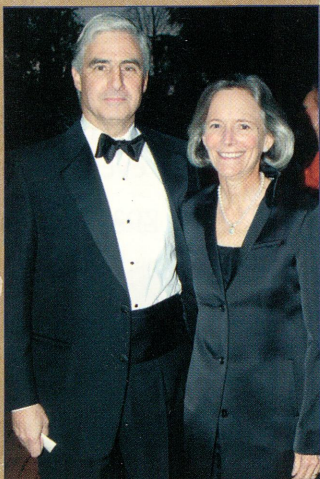
The Faculty and Staff Appreciation Dinner on Saturday, September 15, drew nearly 300 former and current faculty and staff members to campus for a lovely evening of reminiscing with old colleagues and meeting new ones. After a cocktail reception, the guests gathered in Garland Theater for a program led by former Head Mike Babcock, followed by a dinner in McWilliams courtyard. The program began with Debbie Reed's introduction of Mike, in which she reminded the audience that Mike had personally experienced a significant part of Poly's history, starting with his entrance as an elementary school student in 1933 and continuing to the present as the grandparent of a Poly student. During Mike's remarks, he recognized fellow former Head John Bergen, who was in attendance, and then asked the audience members to stand when the Head who hired each of them was named. Faculty and staff hired by Appleton Mason, Willis Stork, Bergen, Babcock, Sarah Levine, Greg Feldmeth, and Debbie Reed all stood to be recognized. It was awe-inspiring to see the seats of Garland filled with those who have been responsible for producing Poly's superb educational program and keeping the school running smoothly for so many decades.

On October 10, the Founders' Day assembly brought the entire student body together in the Gamble Gymnasium to watch a

program celebrating the day that Poly opened. Current and former Poly trustees, including past Alumni Board presidents, were invited as special guests to join the current students, faculty, and staff at this event. The assembly began with the flag salute and the singing of "America the Beautiful" and included the presentation of a proclamation by Mayor Bogaard of Pasadena and performances by the Upper School Advanced Acting Ensemble and the Middle School Cantatori singers. The program ended with a humorous and thoughtful speech by distinguished alumnus and former trustee R. Stanton Hales '57. The presence of the trustees as distinguished guests at this event, including those who have served over the past 50 years, was fitting, because the school was founded by its Board of Trustees 100 years ago. The volunteer service of trustees, and in particular the trustees' continuing efforts to plan for the future, have contributed greatly to the success of the school and are a source of its ongoing strength.

The Centennial has given us a wonderful opportunity to reflect on our school's founding principles and enduring values, its excellent academic program and balanced educational approach, its innovative, open-air campus, and most importantly, its community of students, faculty, staff, alumni, parents, and friends. Within all of these groups in the Poly community, there have always been those willing to volunteer their time for the benefit of the school. The Centennial has been a gift given to all of us by the volunteers who worked so hard on all of the celebratory events, and once again I thank them all.

## Something for Everyone: Celebrating the Poly Community

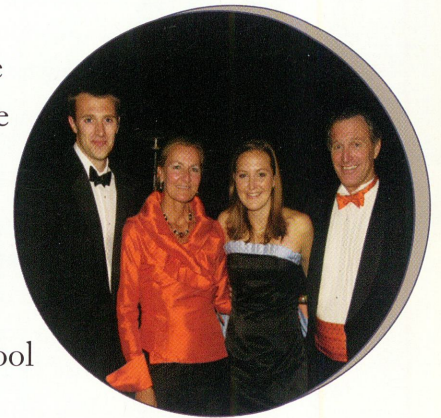

## Poly Centennial Blood Drive Sets Record

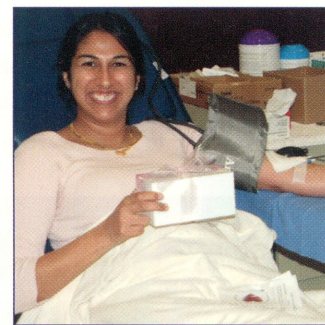

The Poly Centennial Blood Drive, held February 13 in the Scott Gym, collected 142 pints of blood for Huntington Memorial Hospital—far exceeding the goal of 100 pints. This event was the most successful blood drive HMH has ever had, doubling the previous record! We were especially proud of the terrific turnout by the Upper School students, as over 30 students participated.

In conjunction with the blood drive, Poly student Isabel Sunshine arranged for the City of Hope to register bone marrow donors at the same event. This project was the mitzvah (blessing) part of her bat mitzvah. She says that she learned about the importance of bone marrow donation when her father was diagnosed with a condition for which a bone marrow transplant was the only cure. City of Hope reported that the number of bone marrow registrants was twice the average percentage they usually collect when done in conjunction with a blood drive.

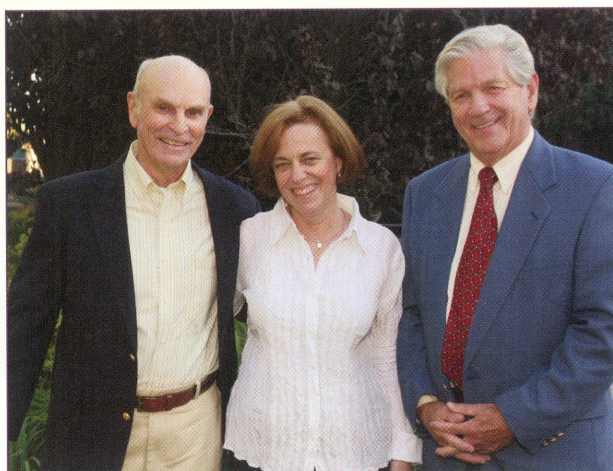

In attendance were a number of distinguished guests, seated at center court. Among them were current and former trustees and presidents of the Alumni Association, as well as former Headmaster Mike Babcock '48.

Pasadena Mayor Bill Bogaard presented Board President Wendy Munger with a commendation from the City. Distinguished

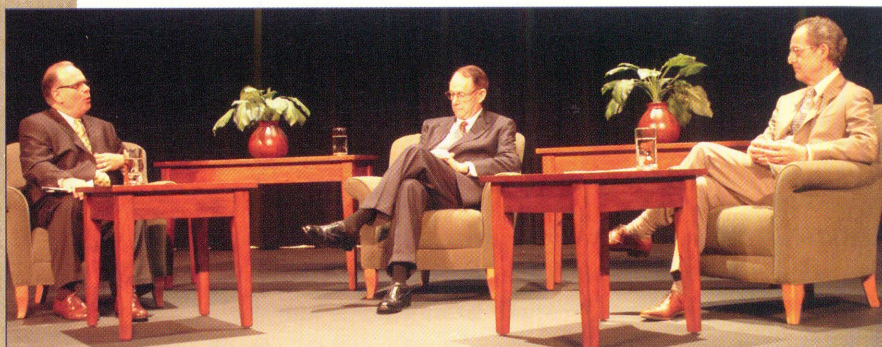
Alumnus R. Stanton Hales '57 spoke on behalf of Poly alumni. His remarks connected his own experience with that of today's students.

# Poly Centennial Book

A Project of the History and Archives Committee

There is a hidden treasure at Poly, cleverly disguised in a rickety old set of metal file cabinets in a closet tucked away in the offices above the Flagler Learning Center. Once you get past a heavy, locked door and squeeze into a chair next to a tiny work table, the school archives are literally at your fingertips.

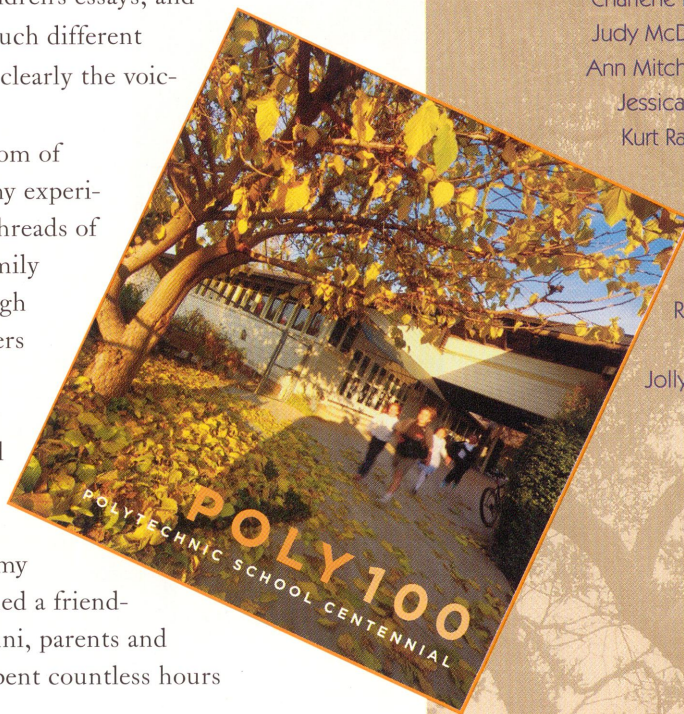
When I first glimpsed the place in 2005 after joining the varied and eager band of Poly Centennial volunteers, I was surprised by the cramped quarters and quickly learned to watch out for the top file drawer with an unreliable catch mechanism. But soon our History and Archives Committee agreed that a new coffee-table-style book celebrating the school's hundred years was in order, and the writer in me anticipated weekly visits to the archives with secret excitement.

Inside the files I found speeches, budgets, photos, children's essays, and letters that stirred my imagination about a time in Pasadena much different from today. Even more startling than the differences was how clearly the voices of the past rang out with familiar messages.

Former Principal Grace Henley's words touting freedom of discussion and a scientific spirit in the 1930s well articulated my experience as a Poly student during the 1980s and '90s. The sturdy threads of academic innovation, service to the community, and strong family involvement seemed to hold the school tapestry together through expansion and societal change. I wished the school's foremothers and fathers could witness how thoroughly their values had endured, yet how much had changed on campus and beyond.

The real fortune of my involvement in this Centennial project was the chance to work again among those who embrace Poly's principles. How could I imagine as an intimidated fifth grader that someday I would co-write a book with my Lower School director, the insightful Jolly Urner? As we formed a friendship collaborating on the text, other volunteers including alumni, parents and spouses of alumni, and former staff and board members also spent countless hours researching, selecting photos, and editing.

Our collaborative meetings revealed that the archival material spoke to us all in a similar way. Somehow the stories of the distant and recent past evoked our own connection to Poly, no matter how or when the school had been part of our daily lives. In over 100 pages of photos and text, some familiar and some surprising stories emerge. The quaintness and other-worldly quality of Poly's archives might be missing, but the essence of the school's enduring character is there.

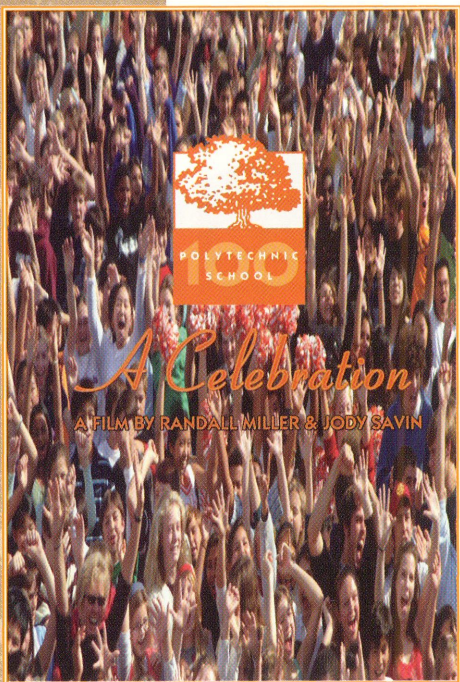

# Poly Walking Tour and Historical Displays

## A WALK THROUGH TIME

As of mid-January, everyone in the Poly community got the chance to walk down memory lane and see what the school's historic campus looked like throughout the decades. At the Campus Kick-Off Event for students and faculty, a series of 26 signs depicting various buildings and events of historical significance was displayed on the North and South Campuses. "The purpose of this walking tour was to show people what took place in a particular spot on campus," said Ann Mitchell '79, a current parent who created Centennial exhibits as a member of the History & Archives Committee. "I wanted people to be able to visualize the school as it looked 10, 50, even 100 years ago as they learned more about the traditions and events that have shaped Poly over time."

The walking tour was also on display at the October Founders' Day ceremony. Mitchell said that the banners will continue to be available to campus groups interested in visualizing the history of the Poly campus.



## LOOKING BACK

On October 10, 1907, Polytechnic School welcomed 106 students in grades K–8 for their first day of classes. A mere six months prior, it had been decided that a new grammar school should be established to serve students who formerly attended Throop Grammar School, and over the summer, architects Myron Hunt and Elmer Grey set about building the school's beloved one-story classrooms and adjacent courtyards.

Starting in January 2007, visitors to Poly's campus got a glimpse of what the school looked like in its earliest years. On the North Campus, 17 exhibit cases along the library, the

Flagler Learning Center and the Stork Administration Building featured a timeline of pivotal moments, photographs of key people and events and other memorabilia from 1907–1932. In April, exhibits



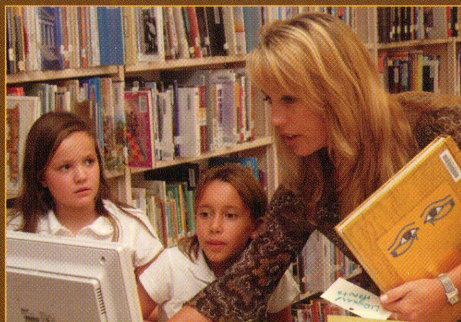
were replaced by materials from 1933–1957. An extra exhibit of Poly musicals over the years was added to the cases in May, complete with costumes and playbills, and some of this exhibit was used to decorate the All-Alumni dinner on May 12.

The final 12 posters, covering the history of the school from 1957–2007, was displayed at the Centennial Gala. Afterwards, the 1957–1982 exhibit was moved to the display cases on the North Campus, and included some fun clothing from the '60s and '70s. Mitchell said that the material covering the school's most recent 25 years, from 1982 to 2007, will go into the cases in early December and be on display through January, to complete a full year of Centennial displays.

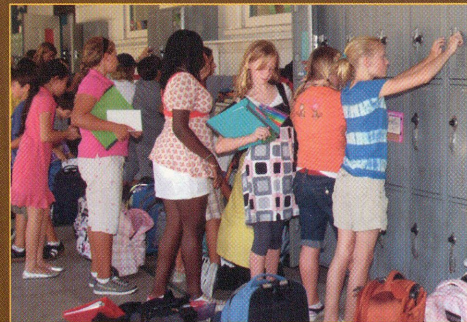
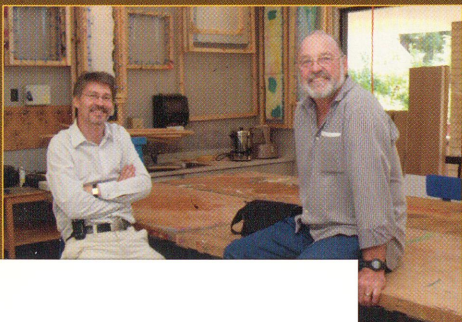


### **Renee Larios, Sixth Grade English**

# Joann '90 and Taylor Smith '90

## *Mr. and Mrs. Smith Go to Washington*

Taylor Smith and Joann Louie Smith, both Poly Class of 1990, began their relationship in their junior year of high school. They have come a long way since then, making their way from sunny Southern California up to the Pacific Northwest.

In 1995, after they graduated from UC San Diego, Taylor and Joann moved to San Francisco with classmate Laura Morris Dwyer '90. Taylor took a job working for the advertising agency, Foote Cone & Belding. Meanwhile, Joann was earning her Master's in Animal Behavior at San Francisco State University, where she became immersed in a National Science Foundation project, studying communication in the endangered Giant Kangaroo Rat. She had an "Aha! moment" when she realized that she was spending more time designing PowerPoint presentations than doing actual research. So in a gutsy move, she left SFSU and began to work at an interior design firm. In 1997, she started her own company, Balance Design, Inc. "Graphic design is a mathematical and scientific art. I was really able to incorporate my strengths with my passions," she explained.

Meanwhile, when Taylor heard about a job with Microsoft in Redmond, Washington, he was initially hesitant. He had some common misperceptions about Microsoft; for example, that everyone would be highly technical, that it would be an overly corporate environment. But keeping an open mind, he quickly discovered the opposite. "On my first visit there, it seemed like the perfect fit," Taylor says. "We hit it off right away."

He and Joann had married in 1998 and felt like they had "run their course" in the City by the Bay. Joann's design business allowed her much portability, enabling her to move to a different state, yet still maintain her clients. So, going out on a limb (and with some assistance from Microsoft), they accepted the opportunity that "fell into their laps" and moved to Seattle in 2003.

"I started out working in advertising for Windows Server," says Taylor, "but recently switched to the XBOX group to manage marketing communications for all the games that Microsoft publishes." For the recent launch of the XBOX game, *Halo 3*, Taylor and his marketing team created an integrated marketing program that spiraled through web sites, blogs, email,

television, retail stores, and events. *Halo 3* went on sale September 25, bringing in \$170 million in US sales, making it the largest opening in entertainment history.

Joann uses the interactivity of technology in a different way. "I always start with pen and paper," Joann reveals. "I focus on the look and usability of the finished product." Joann affirms that technology has made the world much smaller, more accessible and allows her to reach a wider client base. She can work with people all over the world, including a long-time client in New York, whom she has never met in person, and her most distant client in Taiwan.

Although technology has enabled Taylor and Joann to do business on a global level, they credit much of their success to the small, nurturing environment at Poly. "We've made bold decisions in our lives and we couldn't have done so without the motivating spirit instilled in us," says Joann. "That spirit, as well as the education and resources I received throughout my time at Poly, gave me the drive and confidence to do something creative." Taylor agrees, "It's the kind of place where you learn how to work and communicate with people. It's something I draw upon daily."

Taylor and Joann remember Poly for the camaraderie and lifelong friendships they established. "Our Poly friends are part of our family now," they concur. And, indeed, they have started a family of their own: twins Cooper and Rosa (age 3 1/2) and Kobe Louie Smith, the newest addition, born on November 9, 2006. Nearby in Seattle is Taylor's mom (and proud grandmother) Debby Taylor Smith '64, and classmate Brandi Bazler Wolchko '90.

## *Right Place, Right Time*

After he graduated from Poly, Ezra headed north for Stanford, where he majored in Symbolic Systems. "It's a combination of cognitive/computer science," Ezra explains. "People who major in symbolic systems usually go on to study Artificial Intelligence." Around the time that Ezra moved out of the house and began applying to law school, Parker made the acquaintance of a couple of Harvard students/software engineers, and became president of their new start-up.

While he waited to hear from schools, Ezra traveled to Europe and the East Coast. In December 2004, while in Dublin, he got good news from the University of Chicago Law School. A couple of days later, Ezra got an e-mail from Parker: would Ezra be interested in working for the new start-up?

"I wasn't doing anything else," Ezra recalls, "So I showed up on their doorstep in Los Altos. By this time, one other software engineer had joined them, so I was the first non-engineer on staff. The five of us, once again, shared a house together." Ezra explains that he was hired as "a sort of do-everything business guy," responding to business emails, doing sales stuff, dealing with ads, with some customer support thrown in.

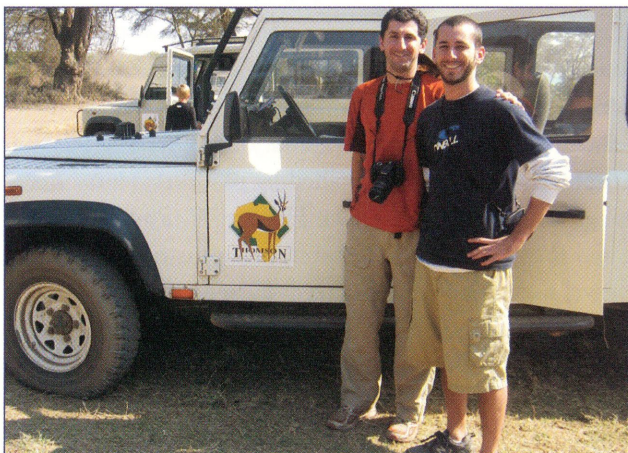
"Sean told me that he didn't know exactly what I'd been doing when I worked for the *Stanford Daily*," Ezra remembers, "but he noticed that I was always working, and he thought the company could use a guy like me."

Now it's time to talk about that little company which, according to Ezra, "kept growing like wildfire." It's called Facebook. As Ezra explains it, Facebook started at Harvard as an online version of a print publication intended to introduce new faces to the campus community. The online version was so successful at Harvard that Facebook spread to other college campuses, where students used their college email addresses to log on.

"In late December 2004, just after I joined the company, the site had expanded to include 200 colleges

with over a million users," says Ezra. As venture capitalists such as Peter Thiel (PayPal), Accel Partners, Greylock Partners, and Meritech Capital Partners continued to invest in the company, Facebook broadened its reach to include high schoolers and, by fall 2006, was available to anyone who wanted to join.

"The fastest growing age group is the 'over-30' demographic," Ezra explains. "Seventy-five percent of our users are college graduates at this point." He mentions that all the presidential campaigns have Facebook pages, and that he initially served as the point of contact for their political staffs, though like everything else at Facebook, the election staff has grown.

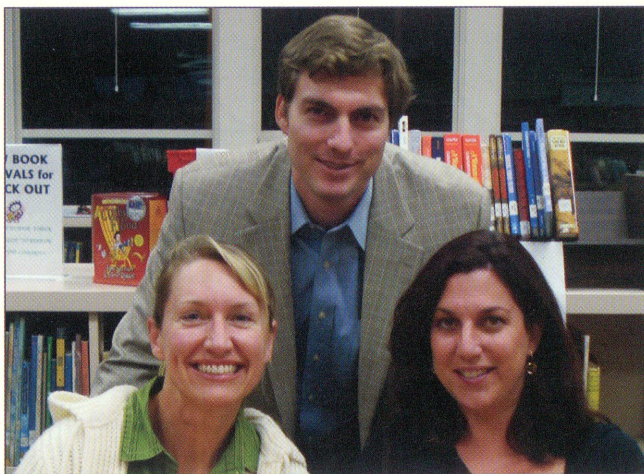


Josh '96 and Ezra Callhan

In fact, Ezra estimates that there are around 100 engineers and over 300 employees total, spread through four offices in Palo Alto. At last count there were 43 million active users, making Facebook the sixth most trafficked site in the United States (according to comScore). Ezra says Facebook is the largest website in Canada, which has the most users outside the U.S., followed by the United Kingdom, Australia, Norway, South Africa, Sweden, Egypt, India, and Mexico, making Facebook a truly global company.

So, what about University of Chicago Law School? "The first year I got a deferral, because working at Facebook was fun, and I wanted to see where it was going to go. I got a second deferral, just in case. And then I decided to stay with Facebook. My parents were supportive."

# Steve Beerman: Poly's New Athletic Director

On a warm and sunny Saturday afternoon in early September, the Poly campus is populated with hundreds of gridiron and aquatics fans for football, water polo, tailgating, and the continuing celebration of the institution's Centennial. Today there are grilled hamburgers! There is Panther Club Wear on sale! Both stadiums are filled to capacity with fans clad in orange! With all the events taking place on campus, one familiar face (in a new position) strides across Babcock Field towards the public address tower. Smiling, shaking hands and checking in with coaches and campus facilitators, this particular face is now in charge of the entire show. And it's a good thing!

Throughout the past few decades, the Poly athletic department thrived under the watchful eyes of Chuck Ellis. With Ellis retiring, the Panthers' sports division is now nurtured by coach, parent, and long-time faculty and P.E. department leader, Steve Beerman. Judging by his confident stride, engaging manner, and overall knowledge, he is more than ready for the challenges ahead.

Recently, Beerman shared some of his thoughts with the *Oak Tree Times* on various topics from his new job, lessons from his predecessor, and the proto-typical Poly Panther athlete.

## Why is this job so special?

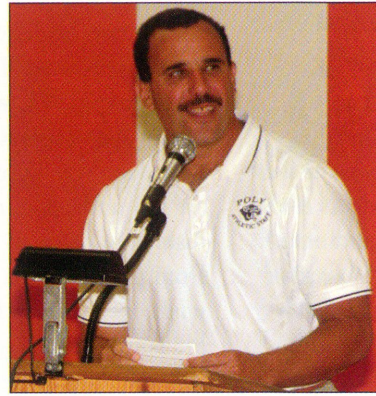
"The nicest thing about my new job is the fact that we can continue the philosophy that Chuck (Ellis) helped to cultivate."

It's clear that Steve is motivated by his desire to maintain on this idea. "That premise won't change. I get to carry it on. Plus, I'll be able to influence my own kids with it as well."

**"Excellence in sports as well as continuing the concept of the student/athlete."**

## Lessons from the taskmaster:

"Chuck (Ellis) and I worked together a long time. In those twenty-seven years, I got to watch him handle situations, coaches, parents and his kids on a daily basis. It was a real education for me, and now I get to implement those techniques. So, it's all about continuing what Chuck helped put in place."



## The Poly athlete:

"There's nothing better than being involved with a Poly kid, because they're so intelligent and they love sports! They're like sponges. Once you communicate it to them, they soak it up. Our kids get to participate in a variety of sports, even

with so many hours of study time on their hands. We encourage a healthy balance between academics and athletics. The typical Poly athlete doesn't have aspirations to play at the professional or even college level. So, it's about the opportunity to play with classmates—some of which they may have known since age 5—and more than anything enjoy their high school experience. We want our kids to remember these experiences."

## Learning from the Poly athlete:

"The kids here are very good at understanding their level and realistic expectations. They digest information you give them, and they use it to the best of their abilities while understanding themselves. It's important to understand your abilities even when we as coaches might not."

## Steve's attributes:

"In everything I've ever done with my life, I've always liked being involved in a big way. As a parent, coach and now a leader of this department, I feel I've had experiences that will benefit me. I've been that parent watching his/her kids compete. I've coached these kids, and now I can continue to lead them. Plus, our faculty and staff share the same experiences and commitment."

Beerman's message to the Panther community revolves back to the commitment to the school's values: "When someone takes a new role, you never know what direction it will go. Here, we'll simply maintain the energy, the care, the understanding our philosophy. That'll stay in tact."

## Being 'the man':

In general, the athletic director maintains and oversees the entire athletic program, ensuring that the program runs efficiently. Beerman also continues his duty as the head of P.E. "The biggest difference in my duties is the time required to help with all the athletic events. I've got so much help here, but overseeing the entire operation is unique."
