The INTERCOM is the RMR family's newsletter, which originally started as "The Bugler" in 1914 on the troopship carrying the 14th Bn (RMR) overseas. Censorship quickly squashed the initiative, but the RMR tried again in 1916 with "The Growler" (which was also squashed!). In WW2 the RMR had two battalions, one overseas from 1939-45, and a Home unit stationed in Westmount. In an effort to boost morale and keep the lines of communication open between the two battalions, the "Intercomn" ("n" intentional) was born. The current "Intercom" (masthead from the the 1950's) is published monthly and is intended to keep the friends & family of the Regiment up to speed with the accomplishments of the current serving members of the Regiment and all affiliated organizations.

If you've ever wondered the musical roots of our regimental march past, thanks to Colonel (ret'd) Chuck Hamel for sharing this <u>YouTube video</u> about the origins of the RMR's regimental march. February is Black History Month and to mark the occasion, the RMR maintains <u>profiles</u> of service of members that can be viewed on the RMR website. The RMR has longed prided itself on being a diverse unit and it appears that the Regiment had no problem promoting Black soldiers to the rank of Sergeant over 100-years ago. According to

<u>Legion Magazine</u>. <u>Sergeant Wellesley Seymour Taylor</u>, a Trinidadian-born sergeant in the 14th Battalion (Royal Montreal Regiment), who had already been shot twice in the right leg the year before he was killed on May 1, 1916, in the Ypres Salient. Thanks to Captain (ret'd) Tim Reid for bringing Sergeant Taylor's story to our attention.

While there is a widely held perception that Black soldiers serving in the Canadian Expeditionary Force (CEF) were only in support trades and labour battalions, it is clear from the RMR's experience that some did see combat during World War I, and unfortunately some like Sergeant Taylor, made the supreme sacrifice.

Of course, I am only surmising that Sergeant Taylor was Black, because no photos have yet been found of him. His medical records list his complexion as "<u>very</u> dark" (yes, the word "very" appears to have been underlined). You can <u>view his service records file</u> that was prepared by Captain (ret'd) Hamilton Slessor.

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Overall Black soldiers in the CEF were typically not treated equally to their white counterparts and often faced discrimination, including segregation and being denied promotions. Despite this, they served bravely and made significant contributions to the war effort. I encourage everyone to visit the Black Canadian Veterans website and view the stories, pictures, and video testimonials they have created that span from pre-Confederation until today.

I also encourage you to read all the profiles of service of Black Canadians who served with the Regiment that are on the RMR's website, including the latest from Sergeant Megal Johnson who is also featured as this month's 'Meet the RMR NCO's'.


PROMOTION TO CAPTAIN: STEPHAN LEROUX
