



The INTERCOM is the RMR family's newsletter, which originally started as "The Bugler" in 1914 on the troopship carrying the 14th Bn (RMR) overseas. Censorship quickly squashed the initiative, but the RMR tried again in 1916 with "The Growler" (which was also squashed!). In WW2 the RMR had two battalions, one overseas from 1939-45, and a Home unit stationed in Westmount. In an effort to boost morale and keep the lines of communication open between the two battalions, the "Intercomn" ("n" intentional) was born. The current "Intercom" (masthead from the the 1950's) is published monthly and is intended to keep the friends & family of the Regiment up to speed with the accomplishments of the current serving members of the Regiment and all affiliated organizations.



25 Years of the Canadian Junior Rangers

Westmount, Quebec – 18 January 2025: From January 11-14, 2024, the Junior Canadian Rangers (JCR) program marked its 25th anniversary with a series of commemorative events involving Junior Rangers, Canadian Rangers, and dignitaries from across the country. This milestone celebration highlighted the vital role the JCR program has played in fostering leadership, citizenship, and community engagement among youth in remote and isolated communities.

Many RMR officers and NCO's have served in the Canadian Rangers over the past decades. The Canadian Rangers serve as mentors to the Junior Rangers, and were instrumental in organizing and leading many of the celebratory activities. Known for their presence in some of the most remote regions of Canada, the Canadian Rangers are a vital part of the Canadian Armed Forces, providing support for sovereignty operations, search and rescue missions, and disaster response.

The Junior Canadian Rangers program was established in 1998 as an initiative to provide young people aged 12 to 18 with opportunities to develop practical skills and enhance their knowledge of traditional and modern life in northern and remote areas. Operating under the Canadian Rangers, a sub-component of the Canadian Armed Forces Reserve, the JCR program focuses on leadership, outdoor survival, first aid, and cultural education, ensuring participants build a strong sense of identity and community.



Quest for Missing RMR Battle Flag

Westmount, Quebec - 15 January 2025: The Royal Montreal Regiment (RMR) has always cherished its storied history. From its origin story of valiant efforts during the First World War to its enduring commitment to Canada's defense, the regiment's

legacy is enshrined in artefacts, symbols, and traditions passed down through generations. One such artefact, however, remains conspicuously absent: the RMR's original battle flag.

A Flag That Told a Story: The RMR's battle flag served as a rallying point for soldiers of the 14th Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force, during the First World War (1914-1918). This distinctive flag bore a bold red background, a white circle at its center, and a dark blue dome surmounted by a red rectangle — each element steeped in meaning. It symbolized unity, identity, and the indomitable spirit of the regiment amidst the chaos of war. It's said that the flag accompanied the battalion through key battles and stood as a silent witness to their sacrifices and victories.

A Vanishing Act: Regrettably, this important piece of RMR history has been missing for decades. Records suggest the battle flag was last housed at the RMR Armoury, where it was displayed as a tribute to the regiment's contributions during the First World War. However, at some point in the 1930s, the flag disappeared without a trace. Despite inquiries and efforts to locate it over the years, its whereabouts remain a mystery.

Why This Matters: For serving soldiers and veterans, the battle flag represents more than just fabric. It is a tangible connection to those who came before us, who forged the regiment's identity through grit, courage, and sacrifice. For members of the public interested in Canadian military history, it offers a window into the shared heritage of a nation shaped by the service of its citizens.
