In WW2 the RMR had two battalions, one overseas from 1939-45, and a Home unit stationed in Westmount. In an effort to boost morale and keep the lines of communication open between the two battalions, the "Intercomn" ("n" intentional) was born.

The current "Intercom" is published on an ad-hoc basis and is intended to keep the friend & family of the Regiment up to speed with the accomplishments of the current serving members of the Regiment and all affiliated organizations.


Colonel Hart turns 100

Consisting of a display of WW1 artefacts, diaries, weapons, maps and more from the RMR Museum's collection, supported by documentary film viewings four times daily, as well as a reenactor dressed in WW1 replica uniform.

Poppies are not common in Canada, yet grow abundantly in the areas that the Canadians were fighting during the First World War: Northern France and Belgium.
