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While official records can verify some facts with absolute accuracy, much of our family lore, like that of most families, has been orally transmitted and colored by the recollections and predilections of those doing the telling. The anecdotes that make up the rich fabric of ancestral stories take on the quality of myth and perhaps can never be verified; their "truth" is psychological if not historical.

Betty Uline Engineri, Ruth Kunz Wollenberg, Eileen Sullivan Graziano, Lila Younghans Armstead, and others have conducted extensive research, motivated by their desire to know more about our progenitors and to find those motifs in the tales of the past that serve to explain ourselves in the present. In addition to discovering valuable information, the process of genealogical research spins off other benefits. As expressed by Eileen Graziano, whose mother, Mabel, was a Uline, "I had done quite a bit of research the Library of Congress with Civil War records, also at our Bishop Library, and at the library of the Mormons, but adding my information to Betty's [Betty Uline Engineri] established a relationship: her great-great grandfather Joseph was my great-grandfather Jeremiah's brother. We corresponded for three years, exchanging information, and finally met the week of September 12, 1993, for the first time and developed a wonderful friendship, and from there this family history has emerged. We hope that our first reunion of the Uline descendants will prove fruitful, and we will have more information to add to our family tree." Most of the information that follows comes from the efforts of these individuals, unless otherwise noted.

Standardized spelling, including that of names, is a fairly modern phenomenon, so myriad spellings of the Uline/Uhlein name exist. Betty Engineri shares the following versions she has discovered:

"Spellings had much to do with the recorder of the name in some documents. I think "Uly" and "Uley" were nicknames. I have seen it spelled "Barnhard Uhlein" many times. In his will of 1804, the Surrogate Jeremiah Osborn spelled the name Barnhard Uhlein. In his own handwriting, he appeared to have preferred the spelling "Bernhard Uhlein" at the time of his death" (Betty Engineri). When variant spellings occur, both will be included.

"Our" family is descended from Bernhard (Barnhardt, Bernhardt, Barnhard) Uhleine (Uhlein) and his wife, Anna Maria Weis (Weiss). They had ten children. Bernhard's will, dated 1804, yields the names of these ten children, who married and produced offspring of their own. Adam and Anna Weatherwax Uline had 7 children. Andreas and Margaretha Barringer Uline had ten children. (Andreas' gravestone in Elmwood Cemetery reads: "Andrew, d. 29 April. 1860, aged 87 years, 8 months, 5 days"; his date of birth was probably August 24, 1773.) Mary Catherine Uline and Sebastian Weatherwax produced 13 offspring. Maria Uline (b. 1777) married twice with no issue. Barnhart ("Barney," b.1778) and Sarah Klapper (Clapper) raised four sons, and with his second spouse, Lucy Holmes Doty, Barney produced a son and four daughters for a total of nine children, plus assuming responsibility for two grandsons upon the death by drowning of his eldest child, Bernard Jr., age 32. Margaretha and her twin, Sarah, were born July 9, 1780. One of the twins, Margaretha Uline, and Reverend Daniel Shaffer had two daughters. Sarah Uline and Conrad Barringer brought up six children. Our forebear's eighth child, Elisabeth (b. 1782)

Uline, and Nicholas Sharp had two children. Eva (b. June 30, 1784) Uline (Uhlein) and Christian W. Cooper married February 8, 1805, in Gilead Lutheran Church; their union was witnessed by Conrad Berringer, Andreas Uhlein, and Sebastian Weatherwax, Esq. They produced seven children, of whom six survived (Bernhard Uhleine Cooper, christened November 30, 1806, in West Sand Lake Lutheran Church--presumed to have died between 1806 and October of 1811--Anna Maria Cooper and twin Margaret Elisa Cooper, b. 1808, William Cooper, b. 1810, Barent Uline Cooper, christened October 22, 1811, at Wynantskill Reformed Church, Sarah Cooper, b. 1817, and Caroline Cooper, b. 1820, christened February 23, 1821, at Wynantskill Reformed Church,--sources: Reformed Church of Defreestville, and Mormon Church genealogical records). Johannes (b. 1787) and Catherine Uline had 10 children. In summary, Bernhardt, Maria, their ten children, and 65 grandchildren, represent 77 people in just three generations. (Bernhard and Anna also had a slave named Amos.)

"Large Uline families continued to appear to the turn of the century. As examples, consider Addison Uline of West Sand Lake and Arlington Uline, Sr., of Ballston Spa, New York. On December 24, 1861, Addison married Sarah Bidwell (October 29, 1846-November 22, 1901). He was 19, she 15. In the next 27 years, they produced twelve children. As Addison was an only child, he was something of an anomaly in Uline genealogy. Arlington, born to Tobias and Jane Phillips Uline in 1888, had at least seven offspring who survived his death at 102 years. Arlington operated his own machine shop in Ballston Spa with his brother, Chester, who was ten years his junior. They were outstanding examples of the many long-lived Ulines. I have discovered many to have lived useful lives even to 85 and 90 years. Arlington and Chester trace their lineage from

Johannes, last child of Barnhardt and Anna Maria Uhlein" (Betty Engineri).

The Uhlein family originated in Germany in the area of Frankfurt on Main (as told to Barney, the father of Walter Clinton Uline--source: oral history). This Barney Uline was raised by his grandfather, Andreas, son of Bernhard Uhlein. Since the ship passenger list of the Snow Chance contains a Bernhard Uhlein in its listings, it is believed that Bernhard emigrated from Germany via London, England. Germans who emigrated between the years 1717-1776 were known as Palatine Germans. The Palatinate area of Germany was identified as the area along the Rhine River between Germany and France. The government in this area was very oppressive, and religious persecution was wide spread. These Germans were very poor and sought a better life in the new world. Emigration at this time was motivated by the desire for a better life and to escape the devastation of repeated wars, heavy taxes and oppressive financial burdens, the exceptionally harsh winter of 1709, and the campaign by the British to lure Protestant Germans to America to act as buffers against the Catholic French (Henry Z. Jones, Jr., The Palatine Families of New York, Universal City, CA., 1985). "The captains of the ships that transported them labeled them the poor Palatines and considered them largely as cargo" (Pennsylvania German Pioneers, publication of original list of arrivals in the Port of Philadelphia, 1727-1808). The Snow Chance docked at the Port of Philadelphia in 1756. It is possible that Bernhard may have been indentured, as a means of paying for his passage.

From 1756 until the start of the American Revolution, there are no documents or oral histories to reveal the events of Bernhard's whereabouts. The earliest documents confirming Bernhard's life appear in the Revolutionary War enlistment records of the U.S. Government. Bernhard Uhlein enlisted in the Albany County Militia, 6th Regiment (James A. Roberts, Comptroller, New York in the Revolution, 1989). His commanding officers were Col. Stephen

John Schyler and Col. Henry K. Van Rensselaer.

Land Bounty rights were given for military service by Stephen Van Rensselaer. On April 25, 1793, Bernard Uline leased 325 acres of farmland from Van Rensselaer. The farm included within its boundary all of West Sand Lake Village, extending from the four corners of present day routes 150 and 43 almost as far east as the present day Bonded Concrete buildings. It also contained the valuable water privilege on the Wynants Kill Creek. The area of the creek where there are waterfalls was known as Uline's Falls. Uline paid a yearly rent on his farmland as well as an additional rent of \$20 per year for the mill privilege. The grist and fulling mill was built by

Carpenter and Lockwood in 1768. The mill operated well into the late 1800's (<u>History of Rensselaer County</u> by Nathaniel Bartlett Sylvester, 1880). The Cider mill continued to operate into the 1940's. This area was known as "the lovely hamlet of Ulinesville," or, as some have called it, Ulines Corners, since Bernhard Uline occupied the first house in the area (Sylvester). The name of the area known as Ulinesville was changed by the US Government to West Sand Lake when a post office was established there.

The grist mill remained in the Uline family as late as 1920 (Walter Clinton Uline, <u>Family Genealogies</u>, Nappanee, Indiana, 1943). A cider mill occupied the spot until some time in the 1940's. It should also be noted that Bernhard, our immigrant ancestor, owned the first tavern in Ulinesville and also kept a store in connection with the tavern (Sylvester, p. 521). Several sources mention this store which Bernhard ran in conjunction with his tavern. There is also mention of an A. Uline Wool Card & Cloth Dressing Co. on the north side of Wynantskill in West Sand Lake and a W. Uline Wool Card & Cloth Dressing Co. on the south side of Wynantskill, leading to

speculation as to whether these two mills were in competition.

in the village of West Sand Lake, where they were moved later.

Verifiable dates exist for the following information. "Barney" (1778-1858) married Sara Clapper (Klapper) in February of 1801 at Schoharie, N.Y., at St. Paul's Lutheran Church. They had four sons: Bernhard Jr. (February 5, 1803-September 21, 1835, age 32), John Peter (August 7, 1812-March 29, 1882, age 69), Joseph (December 23, 1814-1899, age 85), and Jeremiah (October 18, 1820-June 26, 1896, age 76). Bernhard's first wife, Sarah, died April 25, 1828, and he married Lucy Holmes Doty in 1829. He was 51 at the time, Lucy about 28. They went on to have Stephen H. (b.1829, m. Catherine Mambert), Selinda Maria (b. 1831, m. John Myers), Sarah Ann (b. 1833, m. Arlington Boyce), Sabra Lavina (b. 1836, m. William B. Uline), and Solyma Louisa, (b. 1840, m. Isaac Boyce). Barney also assumed responsibility for the issue of his first son, Bernard, and his wife Maria, when Bernard drowned at age 32.

The Bernhard Uhlein family was committed to their Lutheran faith and traveled about six to eight miles to Gilead Lutheran Church for the baptisms of their children. (This church, located in Brunswick, just east of Troy in Rensselaer County, was the "mother" of all the subsequent Lutheran churches in the area.) Since this was such a great distance, members of the community formed a religious society, their organization known as the congregation of the church called Zion at Rensselaerwyck (Sylvester). The meeting house was built of logs, c. 1776, on a piece of land given to the congregation by Stephen Van Rensselaer. On the site where the church once stood is now a barn across the street from the original parsonage or school. This property is now part of the Cipperly farm. The site of the building was moved in 1815. The earliest cemetery was adjacent to the old church. Those stones can now be seen flat in the ground in the church cemetery

The Ulines were clearly actively involved in church issues. Mention is made that on January 25, 1790, "Mr. Barend Uelein" was elected to serve one year as trustee of Zion Church. Maria Uhlein, daughter of Bernhard Uhlein and sister to Bernhard (Barney) Uhlein, became the second wife of Anton Theodor Braun, pastor of Zion-Gilead. Reverend Braun was the third minister at Zion-Gilead, and this was the first of two periods he served the church. Reverend and Maria Braun occupied the parsonage of the church and purchased the Glebe farm connected to it for \$750. Although Maria married a John Van Valkenburgh after Braun's death in 1813, she and "Dominie" Braun were interred in the cemetery behind the church in the village of West Sand Lake.

As the church continued to grow, there was controversy over its location. According to Zion Church records, certain members, among them Bernhard Uline and Matthias Younghans, were not satisfied with the church's location on Glebe land. They wanted to erect a new church in the village of Ulinesville, the former name of West Sand Lake. One of the inducements Uline and Younghans offered was land for the edifice to be built on, Barney giving one and a half acres, and Matthias offering the remainder, about three acres, "subject to the original Van Rensselaer leases to Hendrick Yonkhans and Bernhart Uline, fathers of the above grantors" (Zion Church Records). The four and a half acres were released by Stephen Van Rensselaer, as recorded December 29, 1823. The church continued to prosper and grow, and in ten years there were erected two chapels,

one near the Glass Works, and the other in what in now Poestenkill, during the tenure of Reverend

J. D. Lawyer (Zion Church Records).

Then serious conflict flared again. Possessors of strongly held convictions, the Ulines were no strangers to controversy. Many were abolitionists, with involvement in the Underground Railroad. As the awareness of the Underground Railroad was beginning to reach the general public, church members at that time were divided in their thinking. West Sand Lake and Glass Lake became stations on the the Underground Railroad. Members of the Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church of West Sand Lake disagreed on the issues of temperance and helping slaves. Those in favor of helping fugitive slaves and temperance broke away from Zion. They formed a new church in 1837, led by Reverend J. D. Lawyer, linked with the Franckean Synod. This church was the Second Evangelical Lutheran Church. The most famous pastor was Nickolas Van Alstyne--code name "Paul" (noted in his obituary). Slaves were hidden in the minister's home and church and the tinsmith's shop. This church stood across from the present day Miller's Market (Judy Rowe, Averill Park genealogist). Oral history from Grace Uline (Werger) confirmed the controversy over slavery. Those who formed the second Evangelical Lutheran Church were abolitionists. Many members of the first, or Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church, left to join this group. Bernard (Barney) Uline was among the first trustees of the newly formed group. For a time, after the church was organized, meetings were held in Bernard's home. On May 16, 1837, the trustees made a purchase of a piece of ground on which to erect the church edifice which was subsequently built and dedicated on October 5, 1837 (Sylvester, p. 138). Reverend J. D. Lawyer, having been banned from the Zion Church, formed the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Sand Lake, later named the Second Evangelical Lutheran Church of West Sand Lake. On May 1, 1845, John P. Uline is listed as a trustee of the Second Evangelical Lutheran Church. Reverend Nicholas Van Alstyne, known to be involved in the Underground Railroad, was pastor from 1850 to 1861. It is interesting to note that the Addison Ulines named one of their daughters Minnie Van Alstyne Uline, leading one to believe that the Ulines thought highly of their pastor.

In 1908, the Hartwick, New York, New Jersey, and Franckean (which repudiates the Augsburg Confession) synods united to form the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of New York. Zion Church never fully recovered from this schism. The Reverend Charles. W. Leitzell, President of the Evangelical Synod of New York, initiated meetings that led to the consolidation of the two churches in 1927 under the name Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church of West Sand Lake. The former Zion Church was used for worship, and the former Second Lutheran Church was used for fellowship and education. In 1944, the church was destroyed by fire during a lightning storm. In 1954, a new building to meet all the church's needs was built on the site of the destroyed Zion Church. All other church property was sold to pay for construction (Trinity Lutheran Church

History, West Sand Lake, N.Y.in the New York State Library in Albany).

Examining the line of Joseph, we find that Joseph married Sarah Ann Berrenger (Barringer), (December 15, 1816-November 22, 1884) on February 29, 1840. They had only one son, Addison, born April 12, 1842. Addison married Sarah J. Bidwell (October 29, 1846-November 22, 1901) on December 24, 1861. Addison was 19 years old, and Sarah was 15 years old at the time of their wedding. They had twelve children: Irving E. Uline (October 3, 1862-May 14, 1863), Minnie Van Alystine Uline (August 22, 1864-August 14, 1908, age 44), Irving Grant Uline (February 15, 1867-1949, married to Jennie Fake, March 25, 1888), Adella Uline ("Della," November 15, 1868-July 11, 1885), Emma Julia Uline Younghans (April 4, 1870-1948, married Madison Younghans), Joseph W. Uline (February 4, 1872-November 3, 1918), Burton Uline (August 21, 1873-June 19, 1948, married to Nettie Calkins, no issue), Elizabeth A. Uline ("Lizzie," May 11, 1876-December 17, 1902--in an interesting historical discrepancy, a note written by John Henry Uline says that Lizzie died in 1902, but the death date on her tombstone says 1918!), Grace Anna Uline Werger (May 19, 1878-October 11, 1956, married to Harry Christian Werger), William Garfield Uline, April 11, 1880-October 5, 1965, married to Mary A. Loomis Gage), John Henry Uline (February 1, 1886-August 7, 1959, married to Elsie Stichleman), and Charles L. Uline (January 23, 1888-December 27, 1919, who died on military

leave at age 31). Of Addison's children, six married, and five had children (Irving Grant, Emma,

Grace, William G., John Henry).

Barney, in his will of 1804, had left Joseph 60 acres. Possibly Joseph sold off the land in retirement, keeping only the house. There exists a record of sales by Joseph, Addison's father, of several transfers in 1869, 1870, 1872, and 1873. According to Joseph's will of April 15, 1899, granddaughter Minnie was executor, along with Addison. The will says, "to my granddaughter, Minnie, to her heirs & assigns, piano, etc., all ground rents reserved on the village lots in West Sand Lake." Also to Minnie and Elizabeth Uline, daughters of son, Addison, went all household furniture, beds, bedding, carpets, books. The remainder of the personal property went to "Addison Uline together with my farm whereon I now reside, after paying all my just debts and funeral expense, the said real estate nevertheless chargeable with the payment annually on the first day of January each year, of the sum of seven dollars to the heirs of Stephen Van Rensselaer, at their place of transacting business in the city of Albany, State of New York." The estimated value of the property where Joseph resided, which he left to Addison in 1899, was \$600. Addison did not follow in the farming tradition.

Addison is listed in Landmarks of Rensselaer County, N.Y. by George Baker Anderson (Troy Press, 1897) as Justice of the Peace in 1891 and again in 1895. Fortunately for us, there is also a wealth of personal anecdotes, recollected and transmitted as accurately as oral history can permit. For example, "Addison's wife, Sarah Bidwell, had died in 1901. According to Minnie Werger Kunz, Addison was taken in by a ______Brown (female) whom he never married. He

'squandered' his money on Brown" (Betty Uline Engineri).

Both Mary and Ruth Werger remembered their grandfather Addison coming weekly for visits. He always brought the newspaper with the comic strips. This they enjoyed mightily. On Sunday nights he made oyster stew for the family, and it was delicious. Addison walked with a cane, and he used it for discipline when the children were unruly. Ruth and Mary said that they would hide under the bed, so he could not catch them. He came to watch the children on

Saturdays, so their mother, Grace, could go to town.

Addison was known as a peddler of medicines. According to William Addison Uline (son of William Garfield, grandson of Addison), the first Addison's nickname was "Doc," and his granddaughter Minnie Werger Kunz said with amusement that today he might be called a "quack doctor." He had a recipe for liniment that was used for aches and pains. Grace's daughter often helped him prepare this. It had to be cooked at an even temperature, or it would separate and be useless. It was then put in bottles that had Addison's picture on the front. People from all over came to buy this liniment, as it was alleged to help so much. This was probably the product known as "Uline's Infallible."

There exists what is either a bottle label or an advertisement for this remedy. There is a picture of a man, presumably Addison, with the words "ULINE'S SPECIAL PREPARATION"" above and "Price, \$1.00." below. According to the text on the label:

DIRECTIONS for Piles, Internal Hemorrhoids, treat as follows:

Inject from a half to a teaspoonful into the rectum, from one to three times a day, according to the severity. Keep bowels in a laxative condition. For Protruding apply to parts affected. For Stricture, Gonorrhea, Female Problems, Painful, Irregular or Profuse Menstruation, Leucorrhea, Falling of the Womb, Inflammation of the Ovaries, Bladder and all Urinary Troubles affecting either sex.

USED AS AN INJECTION

For male, use small 1/4 ounce Urethral hard rubber syringe. For female, use No. 3 or corresponding hard rubber syringe. Use from one-half to a teaspoonful, from one to three times a day according to condition of patient.

Always keep the bowels in a laxative condition. It is essential in cases of Gonorrhea and Stricture to use a Eiuretic [sic]. The best remedy for it is Uline's Infallible Remedy taken as per

directions on label, rub same over Kidneys and Bladder to stimulate muscular actions of these organs."

Prepared by ADDISON ULINE, West Sand Lake, N.Y.

This product was probably what is referred to by those contributing recollections as Addison's Hemorrhoid Cure. While there is a reference to Uline's Infallible, no recipe for that preparation has been found; however, it is possible someone may have it in his or her possession. (Phyllis Uline Patrie, daughter of William Garfield Uline, who was the son of Addison, described Uline's Infallible as a very strong smelling liniment. She suggested that the recipe was a closely guarded secret, passed along to only one person at a time. According to William Addison Uline, Addison's grandson, Addison gave the recipe for Uline's Infallible to his son William Garfield Uline on the condition that he destroy it.)

There were other treatments that he prescribed. He was not a trained doctor, but people seemed to trust his recommendations. He told his grandchildren that he once had to amputate someone's leg. He also had a cough syrup that was supposed to cure any common cold. A set of

handwritten directions exists for preparing what is probably this medicine:

Whooping-cough Cure

Boil one pint molasses and one-half cupful of vinegar togather [sic] for 20 minutes. Let cool; then add a dessert-spoonful of paregoric and a spoonful of laudanum and bottle for use.

Dose

Small teaspoonful when coughing. If taken properly, will cure in six or seven days.

Good for other coughs.

Another recipe reads:

3 cts [?] salts of amonia [sic] [a druggist consulted suggested that "ct" may refer to "cents," as in "3 cents worth of"; "grams" would have been abbreviated "z"]

5 ct sticks licorice 5" Rock candy 5" licorice bark boil to 1 pint. Then add amonia.

Minnie, his granddaughter, told of the time she had a very severe sore throat which she

called "Quincy Throat". Addison applied an hot poultice; it burned her neck and left a scar!

According to Lila Younghans Armstead, the colorful Addison was educated for the ministry, but she doesn't know how or where. "He did preach, but did not like being a minister." Mary and Ruth Werger also indicated that their great grandfather, Joseph, had felt called to be a preacher. He preached his first sermon, sat down, and said that he missed his calling. Census records indicate that his occupation was farmer. (The striking similarity between these two anecdotes about men in two successive generations may provide its own commentary on memory and oral history!)

From a note left to Ruth Uline Brown by her father, John Henry, we learn that Addison died at his daughter Grace's home from edema of the lungs. His legs were very swollen, and the story is told that warm cow manure was placed on them to reduce the swelling. His

granddaughters Ruth and Mary said that gangrene set in, and he died from this malady.

Mary and Ruth Werger also related the story of their grandmother Sarah Bidwell's death. Sarah went to visit her daughter Grace in Whitehall, New York. She wanted to see her grandson Harry Grant Werger. Grace and her husband, Harry Christian Uline, had a dry goods store in Greenwich, New York, in partnership with Irving Grant Uline, Grace's brother. While Sarah was

there, she contracted pneumonia and died. An owl had flown on the windowsill during her illness, and Grace said, "That's a sign of death." Sarah was known in her town as a very kind woman and devout Christian. She died singing the hymn "Near to the Heart of God." Neighbors said that, despite the demands of raising twelve children, in the afternoon she was always dressed impeccably, and not one hair was out of place.

Addison and Sarah's eldest child, Irving E., "Little Irving," Uline died May 14, 1863,

aged seven months, 11 days.

Their oldest surviving child, Minnie V. A. Uline, was a music teacher who also taught the deaf. Her grandfather, Joseph, must have respected her highly, as he made her co-executor of his will. He also willed her his piano. Minnie V. A. Uline died August 14, 1908, of typhoid fever.

Irving Grant Uline died in 1949, cause of death unknown. Born February 15, 1867, he married Jennie Fake of Gloversville March 25, 1888. They had two children, Lila (Lida) Uline, born around 1890 and Jennie Uline, born around 1897. Jennie died in 1933. He worked as a salesman and clerk and as a thermometer maker, in addition to his partnership in Grace and Harry Werger's dry goods business.

Della Üline died in 1886 of Bright's disease of the kidneys at age 17.

Emma Julia Uline Younghans died at 78. According to her daughter Lila Armstead, Emma "was crippled with pernicious anemia....if not treated, certain tracts in spinal cord will degenerate, leading to difficulties in walking. And, as the disease progresses, it can become fatal." Today, such a disease is treated with medicine and B 12 shots. The nieces Ruth and Mary Werger tell of their aunt Emma Uline Younghans. Emma's family lived on a lovely farm, and the nieces would sometimes go there and help pick vegetables. Mary remembers riding in their carriage, which had

fringe on top.

Jim and Lila Armstead have supplied extensive information on Lila Marian Younghans (Armstead), born February 5, 1906 in North Greenbush, the daughter of Emma Julia Uline Younghans (April 4, 1870-April 18, 1948) and Madison Younghans (July 21, 1860-January 29, 1949). She was the granddaughter of Addison and Sarah Bidwell Uline. Her father was an austere disciplinarian, for whose high standards and wise counsel she had high respect, and her mother required considerable care as she was confined to either bed or a wheel chair for 21 years as the result of pernicious anemia. She was deeply saddened by the loss of a favorite uncle, her mother's brother Charles Uline, during World War I. Lila studied nursing at Samaritan Hospital in Troy, receiving a B.S. in Nursing and a New York State License as a Registered Nurse. Her hospital training included three months of obstetrics in New York City and three months of pediatrics in Philadelphia. She did private duty nursing, with cases both in homes and at the hospital. In those days, nursing care required of her 12 hour days, seven days a week, at fifty cents an hour or \$42 per week! Her only days off occurred between cases. She worked while her husband finished college, something rather unusual for her day. In later life, she traveled. On one European trip, she visited Schramburg, in the Black Forest of Germany, where the Junghans clock factory is located. The Junghans clock factory had an international reputation for fine clocks and watches. Though no member of the family is left in the business, there are contemporary mechanisms still bearing the Junghans name.

Joseph W. Uline died in 1918 at the age of 46, cause of death unknown.

Burton Uline died in 1948 of a heart attack. He was 75 years old. He never had children of his own, but he and his wife, Nettie, were very kind to the children of William Garfield, his brother.

Elizabeth Uline ("Lizzie) died at 26 from "spinal meningitis and female trouble," according

to a note written by her brother, John Henry Uline.

Grace Uline Werger died at 78 from heart trouble in 1956. She was grossly overweight. Warm recollection of Grace, ninth child of Addison and Sarah Bidwell Uline, abound. Grace enjoyed bicycling in her teen years, and there is a photo of her and her beau, Harry C. Werger, next to a bicycle built for two. Grace Anna Uline (1878-1956) and Harry Christian Werger (1876-1944) had eight children: Harry Grant Werger (1902-sometime in the 1970's), Sarah Catherine

Werger (1904-1984), Mary E. Werger (b. 1905), Joseph Uline Werger (b. 1907), Ruth E. Werger (b. 1907), Minnie Üline Werger (1909-1997), Emma H. Werger (1913-1978), and John Addison Werger (1915-1925). "In addition to raising her own children, Grace's heart and home were open to others. She was the aunt who traveled by boat to New York City to rescue the children of John Henry and Elsie Uline. Elsie was ill and institutionalized for two years." Grace is remembered for her welcoming presence, the happy life in her home, her wonderful soft sugar cookies. "After Mary Loomis Gage Uline, wife of William G. Uline, died in 1914, and the three Uline children, William, Donald, and Phyllis, went to live at the Troy Orphan Asylum, Grace was one of the aunts (also Emma and Nettie) who helped maintain a sense of family. Bill [William Addison Uline], who was quite a favorite with the Wergers, has fond recollections of her [Grace's] kindnesses. Grace's daughters, Minnie Kunz and Ruth Goeldner, attested to the special fondness Grace had for Bill. In 1926, when Elsie, John Henry Uline's wife died in childbirth with six surviving children, besides the new baby, Richard, Grace once again stepped in to help and took the new babe into her family. This was in 1926, just twelve years after her brother William lost his wife, Mary. John Henry's family had to split up. Grace was there to help. I think there must be other stories about Grace and her ability to 'mother' many. She was a big lady

and had the heart to match" (Betty Uline Engineri).

William Garfield Uline died in 1965 at age 85 of hypertensive arteriosclerotic heart disease. A carpenter for most of his life, in retirement he ran a bait business out of his home in West Sand Lake. Marilyn Uline Hasbrouck, daughter of William Garfield Uline's middle child, Donald Loomis Uline, interviewed her Uncle Bill (William Addison Uline, her father's older brother) about William Garfield Uline's family. "Bill [William Addison Uline], Don [Donald Loomis Uline], and Phyllis [Phyllis Winifred Uline Patrie] did not have a typical happy and carefree childhood. They lost their mother at a very young and formative age. They were placed in the Troy Orphan Asylum (later called Vanderheyden Hall) for about 9 years, while Grampa Uline [William Garfield Uline] worked for the Remington Firearms Company in Hartford, Connecticut. While at the home, Uncle Bill and Dad both became members of the first uniformed Boy Scout troop in the United States. That was about 1918-20. They were also in the Scouts' Fife and Drum Corps, where Dad played drums and Uncle Bill played fife. Uncle Bill recalls being embarrassed when his knee-high socks would fall down during a parade. Uncle Bill recalls different families who were wonderful to them. He remembers Aunt Grace Werger as being 'a lot of fun.' The Younghans family would take them to church on Sundays, either in a wagon or sleigh. If the weather was cold, they would heat rocks and wrap them in blankets to keep their feet warm. Aunt Nettie and Uncle Burt were also very good to them. She would entertain them at the piano while Uncle Burt played his trombone, and Grampa his violin. Orphanage life did not lend itself to a close relationship among siblings. Each of the the children was placed in a different building. The boys hardly ever saw their younger sister and rarely saw each other. Once in a while, they were assigned the same work details and were able to spend some time together. Uncle Bill passed on a red brick which he removed from a stairway outside near Patterson Hall, at a spot where he and our father had a 'boyhood disagreement.' He was able to retrieve the brick many years later after the facility was closed but before the buildings were razed to make room for a new residential development. He remembers that on New Year's Eve the children would be visited by members of the Masons' 'Knight Templers,' who would show Charlie Chaplin movies and give the children shoe boxes filled with fruit and candy. Our children would have a difficult time comprehending how very special such a small box was to the children of that day, whether at home with family or in other accommodations such as these children knew. Though separated by time and space, their later years made it possible for them to see each other under more favorable circumstances. Several years ago, Uncle Bill and Dad planted a dogwood tree near the grave of their mother, Mary Loomis Gage Uline, at Oakwood Cemetery in Troy" (May 1998).

John Henry Uline died from influenza. His nieces Ruth and Mary Werger said he was a great salesman. They also related that he was diagnosed with manic depressive disorder. He was committed to a mental facility in Troy, New York, where he had to be restrained in a straitjacket.

He was able, however, to get himself free, and he escaped through the window! His life was difficult, as he and Elsie lost baby son Robert about 1918, according to his daughter, Ruth Uline Brown. Later, Elsie died in childbirth in 1926 after giving birth to Richard, two years after a stillbirth. They produced six children who survived to adulthood: John Shirley Uline, Dorothy Uline (Dobbins), Ruth Uline (Brown), Robert Uline (b/d about 1918), Margaret (Peg) Uline (Cole), Lynetta Mae Uline (Heggen), and Richard, b. 1926, who lived into his forties. Deciding that the burden of loss and child care was greater than her brother could bear, his sister Grace offered much support to John Henry, as did Emma, his other sister, and Burton, his brother. John Henry lived with Grace for a time. She also reared John Henry's youngest child, Richard. John Henry was a wonderful sportsman who loved to hunt and fish, as did all of Addison's sons.

The medical news of recent years that manic-depression and depression can be genetically transmitted may be significant in understanding some of the darker aspects of the Ulines. It was widely known and accepted that John Henry Uline was in and out of institutions and that his wife, Elsie, also suffered emotional problems. Another member of his generation was said to have been "drug addicted." There are other accounts of terrible depressions, obsessive-compulsive disorder, alcoholism and substance abuse, postpartum depression, and attempted and completed suicides. Today, when problems such as these exist, they are dealt with through intervention and/or

medication.

"Uncle Charlie" or "Uncle Chuck," Charles L. Uline, was spoken of with affection by many. He served on the USS O'Brien. Charles died from drinking what he thought was good alcohol that was actually poisonous. Grace, his sister, who had had a very close relationship with her brother, was greatly grieved by his death.

Betty Engineri makes an interesting observation. After Charles's death in 1919, just six of Addison's twelve children were still living. Each one of these was married, but none of the six who had died had ever married. The relative longevity of those who survived is borne out by the current medical belief which holds that married individuals tend to live longer than those who

remain single.

From Eileen Sullivan Graziano, we learn the following about the line of Jeremiah Uline, the fourth son of Bernard and Sarah. Born on October 8, 1820, he married Catherine Head on December 7, 1844, the Reverend P.S. Wnykoop officiating (according to records received from the Blooming Grove Reformed Church, Defreestville, N.Y). Their first son Bernard Stephen was born March 14, 1846, in North Greenbush. Jeremiah worked in the iron works in Troy, N.Y., to support his family of seven children, three of whom did not live past the age of two years. Due to his work, his health deteriorated, and he suffered a serious back injury, resulting in his having to leave the iron works for less profitable employment. When he inherited 30 acres of land on the death of his father, he turned to farming. Part of his land was swampy and had poor soil; the land was worth about \$30 per acre and had no buildings on it. We know from his father's will of 1858 that he was given "part of his father's dwelling, cellar, wood house and wash house, dooryard and garden for a period of 2 years." He first built a barn with the help of his young son, Bernard, who was a "strong and industrious young man." Since income from the farm was insufficient to support his family, he and Bernard often hired out as laborers to other farmers. The crops he raised were mainly corn, potatoes, and, when times were right, strawberries. His wife Catherine died in childbirth on August 3, 1860, and the baby died two month later, leaving him with four young children to raise, the oldest Bernard, 14, and the youngest Albertine, 5. On November 26, 1861, he married Hannah Cooper; there were no children from this marriage. On August 26, 1862, his son Bernard enlisted in the "war of the Rebellion." He was sorely missed by Jeremiah, who, since he could not handle the farm, was forced to hire outside help. Unfortunately, his son took ill from drinking water at Folly's Island, S.C., and was in and out of hospitals, finally dying from severe dysentery on November 8, 1864. In 1867, Jeremiah purchased another 18 acres of land adjacent to his farm, in the hope of increasing his crops, but, unfortunately, his health kept failing. His other two children, Sarah and Charles [Eileen Graziano's grandfather], left the farm. Sarah was not heard of after 1870. Charles worked in a laundry and later as an express driver.

Jeremiah, because of his declining health, requested a pension from the government in 1883, based on Bernard's service and death. A number of affidavits were submitted by people who knew him and his condition, and the pension was granted. Sources: Library of Congress, Washington DC; Pastor Henry McGriffen, Blooming Grove Church (marriage records); Rachel Ostrander (birth of Bernard Stephen), Henry D. Uline, Abraham Miller, Addison Uline [nephew], and Nicholas

Cipperly (on the health of Jeremiah and the condition of the farm).

Charles Edward Uline, son of Jeremiah and Catherine Uline, was 40 years of age when he married Sarah Schenck, who was then 20. He left Troy after 1886, when the census lists him as a laundry worker. What he did or where he was from 1886 to 1893 remains to be discovered. When his daughter Mabel Albertine Uline (1906-1996) was born, they lived on Greenwich Street in New York City, and he was listed as working in a stable. From stories about him, it is learned that he worked for a man named Gary Herring, and would tell the local boys about the time he "dusted Gene Tunney's pants." He was also said to have shaken Abraham Lincoln's hand when he was a boy. Mabel loved her dad very much and would look forward to Friday nights when he would take her for oyster stew. He looked like a fairly tall man, slim, with a white handlebar mustache. The family seemed to move between New York and New Jersey quite often, as he lived in Jersey City, New Jersey, when his father died in 1896, and in Hoboken when his third daughter Helen was born in 1914. He was still working at the stables when he died. The story was told that his death resulted from a horse kicking him, from which he got lumbar pneumonia, dying in February of 1927. He is buried in Evergreen Cemetery, Brooklyn, N.Y. Source: Eileen Graziano.

In summary, the Ulines have been strong-willed, principled, hard-working, very productive members of their communities. They distinguished themselves in agriculture and commerce, healing and craftsmanship, and in the quality of their family life and values. Firm in convictions, embracing an intense work ethic, they are "a wonderful family, representative of the strong pioneer faith and determination which made America in the first place" (Betty Uline Engineri).

This booklet is a work in progress. The occasion for its compilation has been the Uline Reunion of August 23, 1998, in West Sand Lake, N.Y. Those who have collected this family history hope that it will grow as more factual and anecdotal material becomes available. We have attempted to record, share, and explain data available at this time. However, new information and insights are welcome. This is the history of our family; it belongs to all of us. 





Second Uline Family Reunion Scheduled for Summer 2000

For those who congregated in West Sand Lake in August 1998, it was the first time descendants of Barnhardt Uhlein (Uline) gathered. It was a wonderful beginning. The first reunion was pioneered at the Salem Methodist Church in West Sand Lake, a piece of former land owned by Barnhardt Uhlein. It was the dream of one of the descendants, Ruth Wollenberg, who took on the challenge of organizing the first reunion, to hold the first reunion on his land.

Barnhardt Uline earned his land rights by serving as a private in the American Revolution. For his service, Uline was awarded a land lease of over 300 acres from Stephen Van Rensselaer in the area now known as West Sand Lake. At the time, the area was familiarly known as "Uline's Corners" or Ulinesville until late 1840's when a post office was built in the area and the town's name changed to West Sand Lake. At the reunion in August 1998, the town of West Sand Lake issued a proclamation renaming the town once again, "Ulinesville" every August 23rd, the anniversary date of the first reunion.

Records show that Barnhardt Uline came to America aboard the ship *Snowchance* in 1756 from Germany. There is no documentation to date of his birth, but it's estimated that he was born about 1735-1740. He died in 1804 in West Sand Lake. Judy Rowe, Sand Lake Town Historian, has done much research on this family and concludes that Barnhardt and his wife, Anna Maria Weis, are buried in the old graveyard in West Sand Lake on the grounds of the former log church.

Barnhardt and Anna Maria had ten children. At the time of the first reunion, over 800 descendants had been documented and of those, about 150 people reunited at the Church. To date, over 1,100 descendants have been documented.

Since then, this group has established a family newsletter, *Uhlein Family News*, to keep family members updated on their current lives and information concerning Uline family research. The newsletter is mailed quarterly; dues are \$5.00 per year.

The next reunion will be held at the Boys Scouts Camp in Averill Park, Rensselaer County, New York, just outside West Sand Lake. It is scheduled for the weekend of August 26 –27th, 2000. It is the hope that by scheduling events over a two day period, there will be time for a speaker, visiting local sites that were a part of their ancestors' lives and too also have the opportunity of being able to exchange family information, histories and traditions.
