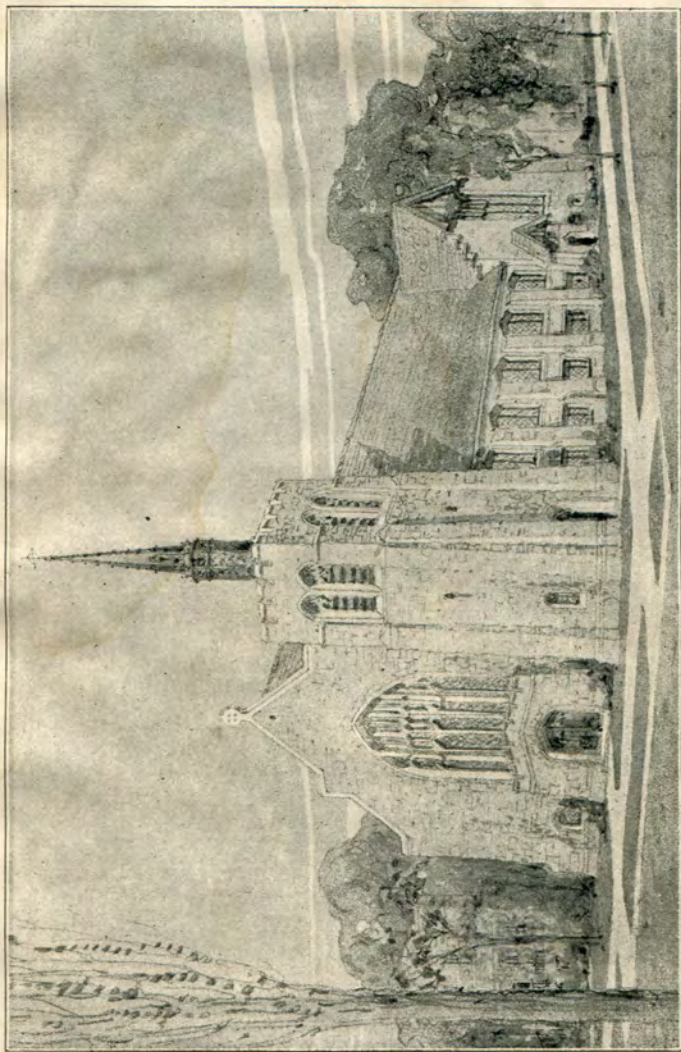

Our New Church Building



Completion of New Church Forecasted in News Story

If there is a basis of fact to justify it the Chicago Tribune will probably publish this story in its essential detail in its issue of Monday, following Advent Sunday, January, 1926.

The Church of the Advent, Logan Boulevard and Francisco Avenue, yesterday took its place as the ranking Episcopal Church of the Northwest side when it celebrated its twenty-fifth anniversary by holding the first public service in the new edifice which has been under construction for two years. Bishop Charles P. Anderson assisted by Suffragan Bishop Sheldon M. Griswold, the Rector, the Rev. Gerald Grattan Moore, and a half dozen other of the more prominent prelates of the Diocese of Chicago took part in the impressive ritual.

With new equipment, including organ and bells, (to be purchased) the property will cost \$150,000.

Bishop Anderson's pronouncement of the solemn benediction and singing by the choir of seventy voices and congregation, which filled the new church to overflowing, brought to a realization and climax the quarter century old dream of the little band of Christian workers who organized the Mission in what is now the thickly populated Logan Square section.

* * *

Transformation of the modest chapel used for 22 years into a pretentious edifice of architectural beauty on one of the prettiest boulevards in the world was made possible by a series of unique features in financing. Possessing a property, consisting of land, building and equipment, estimated to be worth \$30,000, with no indebtedness, when a building fund of \$10,000 had been accumulated the Rector, Wardens and Vestry launched a three year campaign to raise the necessary additional funds.

Beginning within its own circle the Wardens and Vestrymen, in outlining plans for financing the proposed new

church building, put to a secret ballot a suggestion that the Wardens each personally raise \$1500 and the Vestrymen \$1000 each—the cost of an average automobile; that organizations and outsiders be put down for \$20,000; twenty-five members for \$500 each; fifty for \$250 each; two hundred and fifty for \$100 each—or a total of \$85,000.

* * *

This proposal carrying by nine affirmative to three negative votes, it was next decided to submit the plan to a special parish meeting—which endorsed the proposal without a dissenting vote.

To provide for defaults and shrinkage of subscriptions, through removals and deaths, each piece of masonry and carpentry was sold—stone facings, bricks, floor boards, rafters and joists at one dollar each, small articles like nails at a dime each; a system of penalties for non-attendance at Church services and in the Church school netted \$11,857; diagram funds with spaces sold at one dollar each yielded another \$10,000.

Offerings made at Easter and Christmas services during the campaign period as well as proceeds of entertainments and bazaars given by organizations were credited to the Building Fund subscriptions.

of a Debt Fund. He had smiled then, too—a sickly, pathetic, yes, almost tragic smile. The little band of loyal worshippers at the Advent who had remained constant through three years of dissension and who greeted him at this first service, also smiled—in the same sickly, pathetic way.

In a way it all seemed unreal, uncanny to the faithful. The scars of strife still hurt. The remaining members of the formerly prosperous parish had a few weeks previously been lambasted by the Bishop; called a bankrupt, dubbed unworthy; reduced to a dependent Mission state, and then promised a priest—a priest capable of leading them out of the wilderness, as well as to minister to their afflictions.

And here he stood—the personification of Love, of Hope, of Courage, of Inspiration, of Leadership—a complete master of the situation, “confiscating” that insignificant \$19.40 pebble to make a dent in that \$6000 Gibraltar debt. The ridiculous to the sublime in a half dozen simple words.

But turn to the Chronology on another page and witness how the sledge-hammer blows reduced that huge barrier to nineteen-forty variety pebbles. And then read on and witness how the same nineteen-forty variety of pebble has crystallized into a Six Thousand monument—Cash Surplus. Again, sublime!

Is it any wonder this Master Builder has been sought by five or six more pretentious parishes than the Advent in the middle west to lead them? Is it any wonder that he is the talk of the Diocese of Chicago? That recognition of his abilities has taken concrete form in appointments to important positions in Diocesan work? That every visiting priest prefaces his remarks with congratulations to the members of the Advent on having such a leader? That he is beloved by Bishops, priests and people alike?

* * *

Possessing intense humanness; proud of the successes he has achieved; ambitious to win greater laurels in the field of his chosen life work, and, withal, supremely devoted to the Christ whom he serves, Gerald Moore naturally is given to dreams and to the conjuring of Ideals. He would not be worthy to call himself a son of the beloved late Canon Moore if he lacked Ideals; nor to claim succession in a direct line of four generations of clergymen, each of whom constantly essayed the role of missionary in trying to build up the Church. His father, Canon Moore, perhaps the greatest of them all, left some half dozen Monuments of his efforts—Mission ventures guided by him to flourishing parishes with adequate plant and equipment to glorify God and to serve as instruments in winning men to Christ.

Advent members, you now have the privilege of visualizing the Great Ideal—the New Advent Church Edifice—the completed dream of this branch of the Episcopal Church rising in all of its architectural beauty on the boulevard frontage vacant for nearly a quarter of a century; welcoming strangers within its open portals; giving hope and comfort to those who enter to avail themselves of its privileges; an inspiration and a tower of strength for the betterment of the community, for truer Christian lives; for better citizenship; an edifice of ample proportions to accommodate

Fine New Church Building Advent Flock's Great Ideal

Four radiant stars gleam with peculiar brilliancy in a perspective of the constellation of Christian Workers who have contributed to the effort of spreading the Word through the medium of the Church of the Advent.

In turning over the pages portraying the history of this Logan Square branch of the Episcopal Church it becomes more and more apparent that the remarkable achievements scored by the Advent in the nearly quarter century of its existence are due in large part to three clergymen—in the order of succession, Daniel Le Baron Goodwin, Annesley Thomas Young, and Gerald Grattan Moore—and one layman, Elmer C. Jensen.

Each member of this quartet seems to have been assigned a difficult role in the up-building of the Advent and each has measured up—and two of them continue to measure up—to the full Privilege and Responsibility of the task.

Obviously the commander-in-chief cannot wage a successful campaign unless he has the confidence, respect and loyalty of the rank and file, and it is because the personnel of the Advent Army of Christian Workers have ever been loyal to intelligent leadership and appreciative of conscientious effort that marked progress has crowned the joint endeavor of priests and people.

May this be the rule at the Advent always!

GERALD GRATTAN MOORE

1917—.....

It was only a slip of ragged-edged white paper on which was written five figures, but that terse, cryptic inscription probably gave Gerald Grattan Moore the greatest thrill of his entire ministry.

For one brief instant his countenance reflected the entire gamut of human emotions with kaleidoscopic swiftness and then it all gave way to an infectious smile radiating appreciation and happiness. The figures told him that in six years he had scored one of the greatest achievements in the annals of the Diocese of Chicago; his dream of transforming a \$6000 debt into a \$6000 surplus had been realized. The 1923 Anniversary Sunday collection of \$425.21 had carried the Building Fund over the \$6000 mark.

* * *

Six years earlier—on his arrival—standing in the same position between Chancel and Nave he had announced that the collection of \$19.40 would be used as the nucleus

our own people and strangers as well, at Easter tide, at Christmas tide, and on other special occasions; with adequate facilities for the Church School; for the parochial work of its guilds and other organizations; as a recreation center for its young people.

* * *

Completion and dedication of this new Church home on Advent Sunday, 1926—the twenty-fifth anniversary of the founding of the Church of the Advent—is therefore the Great Ideal for accomplishment of the Rector, Wardens, Vestry, and people of the Advent in the next three years.

Gerald Moore for one is supremely confident this Great Ideal can be realized. He is confident it simply means pyramiding the nineteen-forties, plus hard work, plus an abiding faith in the God of all and in the love of Jesus Christ to Whom failure is unknown.

DANIEL LE BARON GOODWIN.

1903-1909

When Daniel LeBaron Goodwin, fresh from Western Theological Seminary and possessed of high ideals, aspirations and ambitions, was appointed as lay reader, the struggling infant Mission was nearing its second anniversary. The handful of earnest, loyal workers had written many vicissitudes into history in its brief existence. The place of worship was remindful of earlier pioneer days.

Temple hall, a "Church" on Sunday, a dance hall during the week, on Fullerton Avenue was midway between a community group radiating from the end of the old Milwaukee Avenue Cable tramway at Armitage Avenue and the village railway station on the Northwestern railroad, named Maplewood. For the most part the vacant acres west of California Avenue were largely devoted to truck gardening. The present thickly populated Logan Square district was then facetiously designated by the guards on the recently completed "Polly L" branch line as the "end of the world."

* * *

But all this had no terrors for the young and ambitious clergyman in embryo. He literally pulled off his coat and went to work. The field was virgin and fertile. The opportunities great. At the end of six months on the parish register was inscribed the names of ten souls baptized and of fourteen confirmed. Eight months later as the result of the vision, pluck and energy of the young priest and his band of faithful followers the present church site was purchased. One year from the date of the purchase of the church lots the last installment on the purchase price of \$5250 was paid and title taken. Eight days later plans for the new church were presented, accepted and contracts awarded, and in another two weeks ground had been broken for the Chapel.

* * *

In January 1906, came the first issue of the parish paper, the "Advent". The directory shows the great strides in organization in the first three years—Choir 46 members, St. Agnes Guild 22; Women's Auxiliary 15; Altar Chapter 6;

Girls' Friendly Society 18; Junior Girls' Friendly 14; Men's Club 43. The first issue as well as those succeeding for many months, fairly teem with special articles urging more regular attendance and consequent greater spirituality; pleas to parents to have their offspring baptised; exhortations for members for the confirmation classes; outlines of policies for more aggressive work to meet the increasing responsibilities growing out of the new properties and enlarged scope of the work in the parish.

* * *

Seven months after ground had been broken the new Chapel was completed. The property, land and building, represented an investment of approximately \$16,000.00. The dedication saw this obligation liquidated to a \$5000.00 mortgage.

ANNESLEY THOMAS YOUNG.

1910-1913

Viewed in retrospect after ten years have elapsed the Advent was due for a severe jolting to arouse it from its lethargy and it got it when Annesley Thomas Young was appointed as priest-in-charge in January 1910. The clergyman, English born and the son of a clergyman, had pioneered as a priest in Northern Wisconsin, and elsewhere and came to the Advent from Minnesota.

Short in stature, keen and alert and possessing a clear, deep voice that penetrated to farthest niches, his first sermon at the Advent literally electrified his hearers. He spoke straight from the heart; smashed straight from the shoulder and there was no mistaking the meaning of his clearly enunciated policies. It was at the same period that Col. Roosevelt was paying his respect to the nation's mollycoddles and the newly-appointed clergyman, in brushing aside human obstacles to the development of the work at the Advent, was quick to make use of the appellation.

* * *

"A human dynamo" "A diamond in the rough" was the characterization of some of his brother Clergy. And when in less than a year he had presented a class of fifty-nine members to the Bishop for confirmation—the largest class in the history of the Advent—the brother clergy were perfectly willing to concede that he was an indefatigable worker—and he was. It was no uncommon program for him to devote an entire day to the duties of his parochial work and then to spend more than half of the night retracing his steps that he might meet and win the Man in the family. He was essentially a Man for Men.

At no time in its history up to the last few years had there been so many men enrolled as communicants at the Advent. In the four years of his ministry a total of one hundred and thirty-eight were presented to the Bishop for confirmation.

It was during the incumbency of Father Young that the Advent organized the first time as a parish, automatically cancelling future grants from the Board of Missions and more than doubling the Diocesan Assessment for the support of the Episcopate, and the pro rata of the apportionment for domestic and foreign missions.

During the incumbency, too, the parish paid off \$1500 of the \$5000 mortgage bond issue.

ELMER C. JENSEN.

Alpha to Omega.

The name of Elmer C. Jensen is so closely interwoven with the beginning and development of the work of the Advent that not to indentify him with it would be tantamount to taking a considerable portion of its life-blood away. In whatever activity one may select there will he find the name of Elmer C. Jensen indelibly stamped upon it. Every available scrap of historical data, every document in the archives carries the name of Elmer C. Jensen.

Whenever red blood was needed to quicken the heart's pulsations in the work of the Advent, during the first decade and a half at least, it was Elmer C. Jensen who contributed the red corpuscles. He has been tireless in his efforts, the strings to his purse have ever been unfastened to the requirements of the Advent.

* * *

That his efforts have been appreciated is best evidenced by a news paragraph in the parish paper which chronicles that on May 7th, 1906, a parish reception presented him a loving cup "for being the inspiration and moving spirit in the Mission since its inception." He has been the recipient of many other encomiums since then.

From childhood a resident of Maplewood, Mr. Jensen was one of the first to realize the necessity for an Episcopal Church in this section of the city. He was a member of the first confirmation class, he was a member of the first finance committee, he was the first choirmaster, he was the president of the first men's club. He has been a leader in every movement for development; he has taken the initiative in every activity worth while, and, albeit, there has been no task too menial, nor task too great for him to perform.

* * *

Architect and principal benefactor of the Church he also served as boiler stoker and mop wielder when necessity demanded; Lay Reader and Sunday School Superintendent when his services were required, with equal facility he also served on pledge campaign committees or took a pen in hand to praise the work of an individual or organization through the columns of the parish paper for "loyalty, hard work and splendid showing."

The archives reveal that in numerous financial "pinches" in the earlier history Mr. Jensen's favorite method was to offer to match dollar for dollar the sum total raised by the congregation. Several obligations in excess of \$1000.00 each were liquidated in this way.

* * *

Possessing the patience of a Saint, the gentleness of a woman, the tact of a trained diplomat and also the tenacity of a bulldog, Elmer Jensen has ever been the source of inspiration to all associated with him—on the Finance Committee and later on the Vestry; in the Sunday School; in the Choir; in the Men's Club; on committees or whatever else, for to know him is to admit his leadership, to admire him, to respect him, to love him.

Obligations

Every member of the Church within the parish has a duty to live up to with regard to his Church. None can escape it and to neglect it is to cast a shadow over our spiritual experience.

Every duty we omit obscures some truth which we should have known. Duty is carrying on promptly and faithfully the affairs now before you—it is to fulfill the claims of today. You have a claim upon the Church and the Church has a claim upon you.

In every way the Church as it is represented in your parish is endeavoring to do its duty, and the doing of that duty is a big task.

* * *

What is the duty of the Church?

You should ask that question and expect an answer. The duty of the Church is to dispense the Sacraments that bind men's souls to God; to ensure definite instruction through teaching and preaching; to secure a finer social life for all people. All these things go to make up the duty of the Church. But when this statement is made, everything has not been said. There is a purpose in them, and it is the purpose for which our Lord founded His Church.

The duty of the Church and its purpose is to make men and women; strong men and women; God-filled, Christ-controlled, and Spirit-filled men and women. It is the Church's duty to produce in this world men and women whose lives are hid with Christ in God; whose ways are pleasantness and whose paths are the paths of peace.

That is the duty of the Church and it forms the highest ideal that Jesus our Founder could give.

Now what is the duty of the parishioner?

To neglect is to kill; to be luke-warm is to be worse than cold; to be apologetic is to become a cipher. The duty of the Church is your duty, nothing more nor less. The work of the Church through her priesthood cannot go on unless you do your part. Every parishioner doing his duty helps to bring the Sacraments of grace to all people, aids in teaching and instruction, and assists in bringing into the community and the world a better social life.

Your part of the great commission is to provide the means for the work of the Church to make progress. Have you faced that obligation? Have you a definite part in the work of the Church? Can you be depended upon to do your proper share? Many of the saints among us are doing their own share and yours because you are unwilling or unthoughtful. Shadows are across your spiritual life because you neglect your common duty to God and His Church. Re-

Editor's Note: The figures used in the compilation of the table of financial statistics have been taken from incomplete parochial reports to the Diocesan Secretary, from incomplete reports of Treasurers, as given in the minute books of the clerks of finance committees and vestries and from the parish paper "The Advent." In the nearly quarter century period, too, the Diocesan form of financial report has been changed four times and these changes in allocation of funds seem to have caused treasurers considerable confusion. For these reasons the receipts figures probably show lesser amounts than actually received. No attempt has been made to strike balances or to fill gaps in reports by averaging. By way of illustration the "Diocesan designated objects" shows \$1,679.14 received and \$2,195.76 disbursed. Obviously the receipts for the difference are carried in some other column. The Easter and Christmas offerings for 1904, 1905, 1906, 1907 and 1908 were carried in the reports as a Special Building Fund.

Our World Wide Work

It supports the City Mission Staff who bring the Church into every penal and charitable county institution in Cook County. It helps the weak Missions to build churches and rectories. It provides a living salary for every Mission priest in the Diocese. Out of every dollar you give to the Nation-Wide Campaign, 50 cents is given to this work in our own Diocese. In 1922 The Advent gave over \$900 to this fund in addition to the many gifts we made directly to the various institutions. Out of the 108 churches in the Diocese the Advent ranked 17th in our missionary gifts.

4. THE NATION. The other half of our Missionary gifts is divided between Church work in America and Church work beyond America. The church is doing wonderful work for the colored people in the South and the Indians in the West and in many other places.

5. THE WORLD. The Episcopal Church has planted strong missions in China, in Japan, in Alaska, Cuba, Panama Canal Zone, Philippine Islands and many other countries. We built and support the best college and finest hospital in China. We rejoice that the Advent is a force in sustaining the world wide work of the whole church.

Aduent Church School

SUPERINTENDENT—THE RECTOR.

Nothing can be more important than the work among the children. Therefore the Church School stands first among all our organizations in importance. We are glad to say that the enrollment is steadily increasing and that we have a splendid staff of capable, earnest teachers. Our work is two-fold, first training in worship. We begin every session with a half hour service in the Church; in which the children are trained to take their part of the regular worship of the Church and taught to find their places in the prayer book. Secondly is instruction. We use the system of instruction put forth by the Episcopal Church called the Christian Nurture Courses. This is followed in a two year cycle. This year we are using the odd numbered courses and next year in every class we will use the even numbered courses.

This system aims to give every child a thorough knowledge of everything that a Christian ought to know. This course is supplemented by special instruction by the Rector on the catechism and the Christian year and other material.

The Sunday Schools of the Episcopal Church are not as large as many other denominational Sunday Schools, but they are noted for the thoroughness of their work and for the great percentage of pupils who continue steadfast members of the church when they are grown up.
