very fine man, was fair to the colored and did not allow abusiveness toward the colored employees.

Gaines, Baptist and Washington are edgemen, and while Gaines and Baptist claim a pay rating of 36 cents per hour, Washington claims a pay rating of 24 and 34 cents per hour – as some hours he is paid 24 cents, while other hours of the day he is paid at 34 cents. Some claim to have helped laid the foundation of the mill plant, while others say that they came here with this company. That they are treated well, worked fairly, and are well pleased.

White claims to be a dogger for the company on a pay rating of 26 cents and better per hour. That he was treated well, worked fairly, and had been with the company quite a while.

Green and Beckham claim to be green chain employees on a pay rating of 24 cents per hour. That they came here with the company, were treated well, worked fairly and were well satisfied.

Henry claims to be a log pond man for the company, having worked for the company as a pond man for 15 years. That is on a pay rating of 24 cents per hour, was treated well and was well pleased.

Tom Erwin and Jones claim to be trimmer loaders, while Erwin claims to be operating a jump saw as well. According to their statements, they are on a pay rating of 29 cents per hour, have worked at the plant some twenty-one years, having worked for the former company that owned the mill and were well satisfied.

Williams and Sowles are Ford drivers for the company, and according to their statements, they are on a pay rating of 26 cents per hour, came here with the company, were worked fairly, and were well satisfied with the conditions in general. With reference to the treatment accorded the negroes by the company's officials and foremen, the negroes claim that it could not be better. That they are paid well, the general manager did not allow the whites to abuse the negroes, were allowed any favor within reason, had churches, good school house, adequate teachers and eight month session, good living quarters with electric lights and water, consequently they were well pleased.

Ben Jones, Miller and Vallery claim to be lumber stackers for the drops, averaging \$2.50 per day and upward. That they had been with the company many years, were treated well, and were satisfied.

According to Will Jackson and Lambert's statements, they are log cutters in the woods and are getting 38 cents per thousand feet, which was nothing like what they should be getting. However, they had to be satisfied with the present conditions, and make the most of the situation. Jackson claims to have been with the company but two years, while Lambert claims less.

Gray and Grisby claim to be employed on the steel gang crew of the company and the pay rating of the steel gang employees is \$2.24 per day. That they are treated well, worked fairly, and were well satisfied.
