# JOHN WIELAND

FORTY FOOT
ONE HUNDRED TEN YEAR OLD PLEASURE BARGE
LAUNCHED 1887

John Wieland, a gold miner, baker and beer baron, was a charter member of the Dolphin Club. When he died in 1885, his family commissioned the construction of a magnificent new boat for the Club as a tribute in his memory. This boat, named for Wieland himself,

was launched in 1887. It has served as the flagship of the Club's rowing fleet ever since.

Not being quite a ship of the line of the Navy, the John Wieland has come to us with little history recorded about her voyages in the century since her origlaunching. inal Old timers recall that one time she nearly sank off Alcatraz with a cargo of horse manure, that she transported Club

members to Candlestick for the ball games, that she regularly served as a team bus for softball competitions on Angel Island, and that she frequently contributed to the public safety by keeping Club members off the state highways on

return trips from Sam's in Tiburon and other bayside watering holes.

Perhaps the details of this hard usage were better left unrecorded. However, by the late 1980's, the *Wieland* was showing desperate signs of age and wear. She leaked. Blows to the side had stove in and cracked her sheer strake. Short term repairs had caused stress to the planking at the turn of the bilge and had fractured it. In order to permit a

new keelson to be installed in a repair job done in the 1970's, every frame had been cut at the centerline, destroying the frames' main job of tying one side of the boat to the other. The oarlock mounts had worked loose. While her copper rivets had survived, her numerous steel, bronze and brass

fastenings had largely disintegrated. In short, the old *Wieland* was very tired after a century.

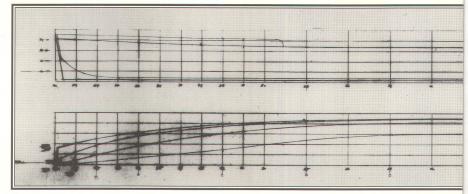
To remedy condition, this the Dolphin Club Board of Governors approved rebuilding the Wieland. After a last row around Alameda, place of her construction in 1887, the Wieland was decommissioned December 1991 and placed

in the Dolphin Club boatshop.

With help from Tuesday "boat night" volunteers, boatbuilder Jon Bielinski took off the *Wieland's* measurements and lofted her lines. With this information, he constructed molds to

define her shape upon reconstruction. Once these molds were placed into the vessel as a final check upon her shape, her bottom and keel structure were cut out with a Sawzall. With the bottom out of the old boat, Bielinski laid a new and lighter keel, stem, sternpost and deadwood.

With the help from the volunteers, Bielinski milled the 3/8th inch garboard planks the six and inch 5/16th upper planks out straight Port grained Orford cedar. Each strake was flat scarfed in two places to complete the forty foot run of the boat's length. The strakes were lapped with adjoining planks rabbeted and

towards the bow and stern.

On a single night in June 1996, forty-five volunteers steamed, bent and fastened sixty frames into the *Wieland*. Teams of volunteers drove over a thousand copper nails through the planking and

volunteers. These lines were used to build a half hull model. Principal dimens, 13'; rowing stations, 6.

frames and peened them over roves.

Bielinski and the volunteers installed longitudinal stringers, thwarts and fore and stern sheets of Douglas Fir, rub rails of oak, and grown knees of applewood. With guidance from the design of the traditional eight-oared shells, volun-

teers engineered the layout of the rowing positions. Oarlocks were acquired from George Pocock in Seattle.

Nine coats of varnish protect the inside of the planking, six coats shield the frames and interior fittings, and six coats again seal the outside hull.

The most significant design change from the boat as decommissioned is in the keel structure. The

heavy log keel installed in the 1970's as a repair was replaced by a "T" structure composed of a 1" by 1-1/4" oak keel topped with a 1/2" oak hog piece slightly over two inches wide. This single change saved approximately three hundred

pounds in weight over the old log keel. It stiffens the boat to resist bending in her length but allows the boat to twist to soften the stress of the waves.

With a crew of six on the oars and a helmsman, the *Wieland* should cruise at six knots. With two crews aboard trading rowing watches, she will travel San Francisco Bay waters to Sacramento and further and back.
