

(Obverse)

Unfolded letter size and faded color paper that have been folded in 3 equal parts (three thirds) vertically.

The first and third parts have been folded further in the middle - which makes 5 visible folding marks.

Horizontally the paper is folded in 3 equal parts – which are very visible in the obverse. The sheet is scratched at the top center of the first third and at the center of the second third from right to left in vertical position.

(Reverse)

Unfolded letter size and faded color paper that have been folded in three equal parts (three thirds). The first and third parts have been folded further in the middle - which makes 5 visible folding marks. Horizontally the paper is folded in 3 equal parts – which are less visible in the reverse than in the obverse. The sheet is scratched at the top center of the first third and at the center of the second third (from left to right). In the left corner can be seen a watermark stain maybe produce by the paper exposure to a liquid. In the same position, visible but not readable few lines of a text handwritten in the other side of the sheet.
