This he also declined.—Dickons afterwards complained to him of the money he had lost in treating the Irishmen, and of the unfortunate job it was of the fony men being acquitted.

The sailor did so; O'Shea fied, and immediately the former, having changed some bad money, came out with a loaf. He was instantly seized by Vaughan, who was in waiting, and having secured him and brought him before the Magistrate, he was fully committed for trial, and convicted.

The Sheriffs did not go from the Sessions House until near a quar-ter after eight, and this circumstance induced the populace to conjecture that he had received another respite. The unhappy malefactor was attended early in the morning by the Rev. Mr. Devereux, the Catholic Priest, who impressed upon him the necessity of offering up his prayers to Heaven for forgiveness. From this moment he became extremely penitent, but would not admit the justice of his sentence. The Rev. Mr. Cotton and the Under Sheriffs met him in the Press-yard, from whence he was conveyed to the fatal scaffold, where, after remaining a few was conveyed to the latar scanoti, where, after remaining a few minutes in prayer, the signal was given and he was launched into eternity. After having hanged the usual hour, his body, pursuant to the sentence, was conveyed to Bartholomew's Hospital, and consigned over to the Surgeons for dissection.
