Biographical/Historical

Dorothy R. Davis (1921-2019), born on November 22, 1921, was the president of The Shaker Players for their 40th anniversary season in 1959-1960 and then their vice president for the 1960-1961 season. She was a lieutenant in the U.S. Army Air Corp during WWII where she was on network radio stations while stationed in Washington, D.C. She was called back to Cleveland when her father passed to help her brother run their family business Overall Paint, Inc. Davis was the second woman to be The Shaker Players president in the 40 years since its inception. She had been a part of the Shaker Player for six years previously. Her donation to the Shaker Historical Society included handwritten notes on how the community theater was run, as well as playbills and photographs from several productions throughout the history of Shaker Players. She had a background in radio and TV advertisement copywriting and used her skills to promote the Shaker Players to the best of her ability.

The Shaker Players is one of, if not the oldest, community theaters in Ohio. In 1919, Rachel Cochran wanted to put on a play to raise funds for the construction of the new Plymouth

Church in Shaker Heights. The play successfully raised over \$90 to go towards the church. but community members were increasingly interested in participating in more productions. The year following, the Plymouth Players of Shaker Heights was formally organized by Mr. & Mrs. Cochran, Mr. & Mrs. Charles Schneider, Mrs. Carl Palmer, Mr. & Mrs. Walter McCaslin, and the Herbert Hosfords. The purpose of the players was to study the history and technique of drama, the mechanics of the theater, and to stimulate the community's interest in the dramatic arts. The group changed its name throughout its tenure, from The Plymouth Players to The Shaker Village Players, and ultimately settled on The Shaker Players in the 1930s after the group became a non-profit corporation. The Shaker Players held monthly meetings for their dues-paying members, as well as holding playwriting clinics and performing one-act plays written by community members. Some Shaker Players members went on to perform at Playhouse Square and on Broadway. The theater, with the help of patrons and advertisements in their playbill, continued to thrive into the 1960s, before slowly fading out of the limelight after their 45th anniversary in 1964, when they left the Shaker Heights High School stage, following their production of "Anything Goes", and did not have another stage to call their home. However, their legacy lives on at the Shaker Historical Society with the Dorothy R. Davis Collection.

Scope and Content

The Dorothy R. Davis Shaker Players archives measures 0.59 cubic feet (0.42 linear feet) and dates from 1920-1961 with the bulk of the collection dating from 1956-1961. The archives contain newspaper clippings, playbills, promotional materials, stationery, newsletters, membership rosters and information, Northern Ohio Council of Little Theaters lists, press releases, operations notes, and photographs of casts and sets from the Shaker Players performances.
