Interlude One-

Look ye upon the dawning of Creation, Called Universe. When out of the chaos, order is brought. You will see the birth of sky, flowers, land, And last—Man, the Red Man,

Episode One-

The Coming of the Indian:
The Indian Camp with Its Primitive Occupations.
The Green Corn Festival.

"The Coming of the Indian"

When this land was first explored, it was inhabited by the Red Man. Where this race came from, how many years it had dwelt here, and what peoples it displaced, has been a question of much dispute. There are historians who believe that the Indians were preceded by another race who built beautiful palaces and large cities, which long ago have crumpled into dust. Others suppose that mounds and various evidences of an early occupation, were the works of ancestors of these Indians. Therefore, with no direct knowledge or evidences at hand for the ancestry of the Indians, their coming is merely symbolical.

"Indian Camp and Primitive Occupations"

This is a typical Indian Camp. The Indians were found living in small villages and scattered in roving bands. Everywhere the early settlers came in contact with these people. Extremely improvident, they cultivated the soil very little and depended almost entirely upon the chase. Hunting and dancing constituted their chief recreation.]

Interlude Two-

Prophecy of Time:

"Witness here ye Days of Olde, See their Wealth of life unfold, How Moses Cleaveland and comrades true Came to conquer lands so new. Glad of heart the records read Of high courage, their faithful deeds As men wrought for church and state Giving all, so they be great, Years of growth and power ye see Sign and seal of years to be."

Episode Two-

The Coming of Moses Cleaveland and the Pioneers—The Treaty of Peace:

(Historical Facts Regarding the Origin of Western Reserve.—In the treaty of peace of 1783, England ceded to the United States land which she had taken from the French twenty years previous. This land included what is now the State of Ohio. In 1795, several million acres of this tract were sold to the Connecticut Land Company for \$1,200,000—this made the purchasing price approximately forty cents an acre.

Cleaveland's Treaty with the Indians.—On the 12th of May, 1796, Moses Cleaveland was commissioned "to go no to the said land as Superintendent over agents and men, sent to survey and make locations on said land, and to make and enter into friendly negotiations with the natives, who are on said lands," With a party of prospective settlers, including two women, he started on his perilous journey, reaching what is now the City of Buffalo, in June. Here the Indian Chief and Joseph Brant demanded that they halt and sit in council, to consider Indian rights and wrongs. At this council the Indian agreed never under any provocation, to disturb the white settlers living in the Western Reserve. This agreement, sealed by the giving of gifts to the Indians, was never violated.)

Note.—The surveying expedition celebrated Independence Day at what is now Conneaut, Ohio, on July 4, 1796. The future state of New Connecticut was toasted during the celebration in flowery oratory—inspired by many drinks of lemonade and whiskey. Interlude Fire-

The Prophecy of Time:

Away with care! Let every heart with quickened favor glow. While we brush the dust of bygone years and bid the records show The honoured deeds of those who lived-many years ago."

Episode Fire-

The Founding of Cleveland:

Anxiously skirting the shores of Lake Erie, as the open boat made its way westward from what is now Conneaut, Cleaveland watched for the mouth of the Cuy-ahoza, The boat slipped into the mouth of the river on the morning of July 22nd, 1796. A landing was made under the east bluff of the river-a short distance north of the present Superior Viaduct.

He mapped out a town plan, a central square from which streets extended. He put his official approval on the map and the town, following the suggestion of his own men, was called "Cleaveland." Years later the revised spelling "Cleveland"

was accepted.
