The only other thing I want is a quart of good American whiskey; but I understand that is nt allowed. I can still want it though... Jack Campbell and I are still together. See him every day. Ev Thomas is in our company but in a different section than we are so I have nt seen him for quite a while. Dick (Severens), Fuzz (Fosdick) and Smoky (Miller) are around somewhere, but due to censorship I can't state. Hope to see you soon. And don't try to keep Tara going all by yourself".

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In connection with Tara, we're told that Charlie Koning, its owner and operator, is also swinging a defense job in Holland. Never sleeps at all apparently.

At its weekly meeting on January 8th the Douglas Athletic Club elected the following officers for 1943: Garth Wilson President; Al Hamlin Vice-President; Iner Sather Secretary; Bud Bekken Treasurer; and an Advisory Committee of Joe Wilson, Ward Martin, Father Nugent and Harold Van Syckel. So the Club's all set for a fine year - though the old familiar faces are greatly missed.
