
REMEMBERING BUTLER STREET

The photo banner and feature title at the top of the page is a new format starting with this issue of the Local Observer. The panoramic photograph was taken from Mt. Baldhead ca 1874. It is a remarkably clear photograph from a large glass plate. Because there were far fewer trees 130 years ago, it presents a fine view of both Saugatuck and Douglas. A schooner with sails up can be seen at the basket factory site.

During the second half of the 19th century the south end of Butler Street was home to the Morrison family. Samuel A. Morrison was an early pioneer coming from Vermont in 1835. By 1840 Mr. Morrison had started a tannery in the area of Hotel Butler. In the next 50 years he became a successful business owner and a pillar of the community.

The Morrison family home (upper photo) - built in 1850 - was located on the northeast corner of Butler and Culver. The home was later converted to a small hotel known as Leland Lodge. It was destroyed by fire in 1978 and today the Viola Fox building occupies the
