1829

1829- William G. Butler. Allegan county's first settlers were Wm. G. Butler, his wife and two children, who came to the mouth of the Kalamazoo river and located his homestead in the fall of 1829. His family came on a vessel in the spring of 1830. Pioneer Society vol. 17. 1903
1829 - Lucius A. Barnes, being clerk for Indian trader Campau, in 1829, assisted Butler in building his house. Pioneer Society vol. 17. 1903. William Gay Butler builds a 14'x18' log cabin about 495 feet from the river on what is now Butler St..CR 15 Aug 1968. The exact location being that now occupied by the Roda Building. CR 27 May 1892

1830

History of Allegan and Barry counties, Michigan 1880 1830 - W. G. Butler's post, on the site of Saugatuck village, was established in 1830, but this, though his first business was with the Indians, was intended as the beginning of a permanent settlement.

1830 - First Settler in Allegan County-Butler at the Mouth of the Kalamazoo.

1830 - The first settler in the territory comprising the counties of Allegan and Barry was William G. Butler, of Hartford, Conn., who, with his wife and two children, located on the site of the village of Saugatuck, three miles up from the mouth of the Kalamazoo River, in the spring of 1830. True, his first business was trading with the Indians, and we have not generally classed Indian traders as settlers, because they had no intention of becoming permanent residents at their respective posts; but Mr. Butler. did come with that intention, and selected land for that purpose. He came by the way of the lakes, being landed from a vessel, with his family and a small amount of Indian goods, probably in May of the year mentioned.

He immediately erected a log house on the site of Saugatuck and began trading with the Indians. "For three years he and his family were the only white residents of the western half of Allegan County, except the transient traders mentioned in the preceding chapter. On the advent of other settlers, however, he platted a village, as he had evidently intended from the first, went to trading with the whites, and assumed the usual duties of a citizen.

- 1835 On the 23d of March, 1836, the State legislature divided Allegan county into four towns as follows: Plainfield, Otsego, Allegan and Newark. Newark township comprised ranges fifteen, sixteen and seventeen west, to Lake Michigan, towns one, two, three and four north of the ranges.

Journal of the

1836 - (Saugatuck Village). Kalamazoo Village lost it's right to the name as Bronson Township becomes city of Kalamazoo. Name changed to Newark Village in Newark township.

1836- Allegan county, Board of Supervisors Daniel A. Plummer, Supervisor of the township of Newark 4 Oct 1836. At the meeting held pursuant to adjournment it was ordered "That there be raised by tax upon the county the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars to be expended in repairs on bridges in the county as follows: For the bridge across Gun River, \$30; for the bridge across Pine Creek, \$75; for the bridge across Schrobel Creek, \$75; for bridges between Allegan and Newark, \$75." On application of the supervisors of the several town-ships, it was ordered that the following sums be assessed for township expenses: On the township of Newark, seventy-five dollars.

being now twenty rods north of where it was in 1838. In 1859 the tower began to show signs of decay, and was replaced by a brick structure. The latter wore out in turn, and was succeeded in 1875 by the wooden tower now adorning the extremity of the south pier.

Perhaps no town of its size in the State is so largely engaged in the lake traffic, several bags, propellers and large vessels being owned here. The village contains Congregational. Dutch Reform and Episcopal churches, has good school facilities, a newspaper, the Commercial, a neat Odd Fellows' hall and some manufactories. Peaches, grapes, apples and small fruits are largely grown in the vicinity. A strip of shore about 20 miles long by 2 wide has withstood the extreme cold weather of the past winter, and will have the only peaches in the State this summer. The fruit farms here are uninjured by the cold, and the country will hereafter look to this great fruit region for the bulk of its supplies. Saugatuck is in Saugatuck township. Allegan county,5 miles west of New Richmond, it's station on the C. & W. M. K. R. and 23 miles northwest of Allegan, the county seat. Communication is had by stage twice daily with New Richmond, fare 50 cents, and daily with Hamilton, fare \$1, and with Chicago by Capt. R. C. Brittain's daily line of steamers. Express, American. All but three of the sleeping rooms on this floor have doors opening upon porches, and they are all well lighted with large windows.

The second floor contains the office, parlors, smoking-room, dining room, and five large bed rooms. The dining room is L Shaped, 22x40 feet in the long arm and 22x22 feet in the short one, containing in all 1320 square feet of floor space. The kitchen, serving room, and pantry are just west of the dining room on the same floor. The ladies' toilet and bath rooms are also on this floor.

The third floor is devoted entirely to sleeping rooms, single and ensoute, averaging in size about 10x14 feet. There are eighteen of these rooms on this floor besides the linen room, and a large hall 9x60 feet. A stairway from this floor leads to the roof, and it is Mr. Perryman's intention to build a pavilion on the roof in the spring, for dancing.

A beautiful view of the river is obtained from the porches on the east side of the building. On the ground floor there is one 12x60 feet, and immediately above it, on the second floor is another, 12x114 feet, gained by a large and easy stairway. The principal entrance to the hotel is from the porch. In the rear of the building in another porch 10x30 feet.

As an annex to the hotel Mr. Perryman has two cottages of six rooms each.

Directly east of the hotel is a dock on which a pavilion with a floor space of 30x48 feet has been built, which will be used for dancing, etc. A

steamboat dock a short distance north of this has about 60 feet front.

The most gisasterous fire in the history of Saugatuck occurred last Sunday evening, when the new Hotel Kalamazoo was completely consumed by the flames.

The fire was discovered by Mrs. Leiendecker at about 11:15 p. m., and she immediately gave the alarm and aroused the other occupants of the house. She was then overcome by the shock and her father, Mr. Martel was obliged to carry her out of the building.

There being no plaster on the new building the fire made rapid headway and by the time the engine and hose were in position the whole building was a mass of flames, and the firemen turned their attention toward Saving the neighboring buildings. It was a hard fought battle, and for once the old engine belied its reputation and pumped steadily as long as a stream of water was required. The Douglas fire department arrived on the scene in time to render very effectual service.

The building burned very rapidly and by 1 o'clock the walls were down, and the principal danger of the fire communicating with other buildings was over, although both engines continued to work for some time after.

Hotel Kalamazoo was a fine three story building and thoroughly modern throughout. The office, parlors dining-room, etc., were located on the first floor, with the sleeping apartments on the second and third floors. The ball-room was also located on the third floor. The hotel was to have been opened May 1, and its burning is a loss to Saugatuck which can hardly be estimated.

The loss on building and contents is estimated at \$25,000, nothing whatever, not even clothing being saved. The insurance aggregates

\$15,200 placed in the following companies: Grand R-apids. \$5,00: Connecticut. \$5,500: Home. \$2,000; and Niagara, \$2,700, of which latter \$1,000 was carried by Mr. Martel on house hold goods and personal effects. The adjusters of the different companies are expected here next week.

The origin of the fire is unknown but it is thought it started from salamanders which were used for warming the building for the plasterers.

Then there are a number stopping at different places about town, at places not on our list, and others boarding themselves in the: various old buildings, etc., and a careful estimate places them at about 100. At the park there are thirty tents containing about 125, at the cottages another 125, and at Pokagon Inn 125.

On the lake shore west of Douglas there ure 12 or 14 cottages and a number of tents containing about 150 people, and in Douglas village and vicinity there are probably 75 more that are stopping at places not included on our list of boarding houses. And on Wednesday, Aug. 15, there was at least 500 people at the Sunday School encampment at Forward Movement Park.
