



## Honor Roll

The Tablet dedicated to-day is a part of the Armory of Co. K, 10th Infantry, N. G. P. Only the names of the original Company, which left Waynesburg and who made the supreme sacrifice, are inscribed thereon. We, the living of that organization, appreciate the services of the men who came from Company K of the old Third and from all parts of the United States as replacements and helped make the glorious history of our organization possible. The living, we salute; the memory of the dead, we cherish.


We appreciate the co-operation of the Grand Army of the Republic, the churches of Waynesburg and the citizenship of Greene county in these dedicatory services.

The idea of the erection of this Tablet was conceived November 2, 1918, when Colonel Martin, who was leaving the Regiment, was requested to formulate a plan to preserve the original funds of the Company for that purpose. A comfort fund was raised by the citizens of Greene County just before the organization departed for Camp Hancock, Georgia. The first custodians of this fund had all been killed and a little handful of the remaining gathered together and resolved that no further expenditure should be made until the organization returned to the United States and at that time a suitable Tablet would be erected. Corporal John W. Shields was made chairman of the new board.



WILLIAM G. MEIGHEN, Second Lieutenant. Promoted for gallantry in action on Ourcq River July 30, 1918. Sick in hospital August 6, 1918. Returned to duty September 18, 1918. Killed in action near Varennes September 27, 1918.

JAMES B. PATTON, Sergeant. He was recommended for a commission as second lieutenant and received a Division Citation for his services in the valley of the Aire. He was killed south of Chatel Chery October 5, 1918.





WALTER B. RIGGLE, Sergeant. He attended Officers' Training School at Camp Hancock and was commissioned as a second lieutenant. He was in command of a platoon during the fighting on the Ourcq River and was killed July 29, 1918.

JOHN M. PADEN, Sergeant. He was wounded July 28, 1918, north of the Ourcq River and died at the First Aid Station.

BERT BUCHANAN, Private, first class. He was killed north of the Ourcq River July 29, 1918.

HAROLD T. CARY, Private, first class. He was killed July 29, 1918, south of Grimpettes Woods.




JAMES L. FARRELL, Private. Transferred at Camp Hancock to Headquarters Company. Killed at Regimental Headquarters at Fresnes July 28, 1918.

MAX LEMLEY, Private, first class. He was wounded September 7, 1918, north of the Vesle River and died the same day in Evacuation Hospital No. 4.

HALLIE J. CLOSSER, Private, first class. He was killed north of the Ourcq River July 29, 1918.

FLOYD T. HICKMAN, Private. He was killed near Grimpettes Woods July 29, 1918.




FLOYD B. HUFFMAN, Private, first class. He was killed south of the Vesle River August 24, 1918.

JOHN DUVALL, Private, first class. He was wounded July 29, 1918, south of Grimpettes Woods and died in Base Hospital No. 34, August 20, 1918, from the effects of wounds.

CHARLES E. MURPHY, Corporal. He was killed July 29, 1918; north of the Ourcq River.

ALFRED R. McCARTY, Private. He was transferred from Company K at Camp Merritt, New Jersey, and was drowned in France while a member of another organization.




RUSSELL K. YODERS, Private, first class. He was killed in action July 29, 1918, south of Grimpettes Woods.

LAWRENCE L. STAGGERS, Private, first class. He was killed July 29, 1918, in front of Grimpettes Woods.

WILLIAM W. THROCKMORTON, Private, first class. He was wounded by machine gun fire and gassed July 29, 1918. He was ordered to the United States and died September 18, 1918, in Base Hospital No. 101.

NORMAN M. ZAHNISER, Private, first class. He was killed in the wheat field near Grimpettes Woods, July 29, 1918.




GEORGE T. McNEELY, Private. He was killed on Hill No. 212 near Grimpettes Woods July 29, 1918.

JAMES H. SWART, Corporal. He was killed south of Montblaineville, September 28, 1918.

EDWARD McNICHOLAS, Private, first class. He was killed in action south of Varennes, September 26, 1918.

ALLEN K. GABLER, Corporal. He was gassed in action July 29, 1918. Badly gassed in fighting north of the Vesle river and died in hospital September 6, 1918.



FRED W. MARSHALL, Private, first class. He was killed July 29, 1918, near Grimpettes Woods.

FRANCIS B. MOORE, Private, first class. He was killed on Hill No. 212 near Grimpettes Woods July 29, 1918.

HARRY DUNN, Private, first class. He was killed July 29, 1918, between the Ourcq River and Grimpettes Woods.

BEN A. MANNING, Mechanic. He was killed July 29, 1918, near Grimpettes Woods.

## Chronological History of Company K

- January 15, 1874—Organized as Company K, 10th Infantry, N. G. P.
- April 27, 1898—Called for Spanish-American War.
- May 11, 1898—Mustered into Federal Service as Co. K, 10th Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry.
- July 21, 1898—Landed in the Philippines.
- July 31, 1898—Battle of Malate.
- August 13, 1898—Fall of Manila.
- February 4, 1899—Started in Campaign of Malolos.
- July 1, 1899—Sailed for United States.
- August 1, 1899—Landed at San Francisco.
- August 22, 1899—Mustered out of service.
- August 29, 1899—Returned to Waynesburg, Pennsylvania.
- January 4, 1900—Reorganized as Co. K, 10th Infantry, N. G. P.
- June 22, 1916—Called for service on Mexican Border.
- July 2, 1916—Mustered into Federal service.
- October 27, 1916—Mustered out of Federal service.
- July 15, 1917—Called into service for World War.
- August 5, 1917—Drafted into Federal Service.
- Sept. 7, 1917—Left Waynesburg for Camp Hancock, Augusta, Ga.
- October 17, 1917—Personnel of Co. K, 3rd Pennsylvania assigned to the Company and the new organization named Company K, 110th Infantry.
- April 24, 1918—Left Camp Hancock, Georgia, for Camp Merritt, N. J.
- May 1, 1918—Left Camp Merritt, N. J. for New York. Boarded English owned transport Ausonia, for overseas.
- May 16, 1918—Landed in Liverpool, England.
- May 17, 1918—Arrived in France.
- May 19, 1918—Proceeded by rail to Lumbres near St. Omar.
- June 9, 1918—Left Lottinghem for Meaux sector (French). Three days later arrived in the Hesdin Woods.
- July 4, 1918 Call to arms sounded at 2 A. M. and by forced six mile hike reached the support line trenches west of Conde-en-Brie. Returned to Artonges the same day.
- July 8, 1918—Returned to the support line trenches.
- July 14, 1918—At midnight we experienced our first shelling.
- July 24, 1918—Crossed Marne River passing through Chateau Thierry.
- July 27, 1918—At 3 A. M. we moved forward to relieve the 39th French Division, near Fere-en-Tardenois.
- July 28, 1918—Relieved the French about 2 A. M.; the first time on the firing line. Went over the top at 12 o'clock noon.
- July 29, 1918—Objective was Hill 230, but receiving no artillery support and meeting with heavy M. G. resistance from the Grimpettes Woods we had to retire to our old position.

- July 30, 1918—Waiting for a barrage. Barrage started at 2:10 in the afternoon and we rushed the hill gaining our objective.
- July 30, 1918—At midnight we were relieved by Thirty-Second Division.
- Aug. 18, 1918—Company was sent to front line at Villette.
- Aug. 25, 1918—At 2 A. M. we were ordered over the top. Objective was a railroad and to clean out everything to the Vesle River. Account of heavy M. G. fire we had to retire to our old positions. Two more unsuccessful attacks were made during the night.
- Sept. 2, 1918—Ordered to cross the Vesle River.
- Sept. 5, 1918—Crossed Vesle River and advanced about three kilometers.
- Sept. 6, 1918—Went over the top at one o'clock.
- Sept. 7, 1918—Relieved by the French.
- Sept. 10, 1918—Left for a new sector.
- Sept. 16, 1918—Left Contrisson and hiked all night and bivouaced near Reaubecourt.
- Sept. 17, 1918—Hiked all night and bivouaced in woods near Waly.
- Sept. 18, 1918—Hiked all night and bivouaced in Argonne Forest near Les Islettes.
- Sept. 25, 1918—Moved to front lines.
- Sept. 26, 1918—Went over the top at 5:30 A. M. digging in for the night on the banks of small river north of Varennes.
- Sept. 28, 1918—Took over the front line near Montblainville. Advanced a short distance and dug in.
- Sept. 20, 1918—Passed through Apremont and took over the front line.
- Oct. 1, 1918—"Jerry" made counter attack. He was repulsed.
- Oct. 4, 1918—Returned to front line.
- Oct. 7, 1918—Attacked Chatel Chehery.
- Oct. 9, 1918—Relieved by Eighty-Second Division.
- Oct. 10, 1918—Left for Arainville.
- Oct. 17, 1918—Left Arainville for Mandres.
- Oct. 26, 1918—Left Mandres for Camp Simon.
- Nov. 9, 1918—Moved into support lines getting ready for the attack on Metz.
- Nov. 11, 1918—Moved from support of Bns. of 110th Reg't to support of the 109th Infantry. Our orders were to leap them at 9:30 o'clock. Hostilities ceased at 11 o'clock.
- Jan. 17, 1919—Left Mars-la-Tour for Allain.
- March 18, 1919—Left Le Mans.
- April 29, 1919—Boarded transport Santa Olivia.
- May 12, 1919—Landed in America.
- May 15, 1919—Paraded in Philadelphia.
- May 23, 1919—Discharged.
- May 24, 1919—Arrived in Waynesburg, Pennsylvania.
- Present time —Reorganizing Company K, 10th Infantry, N. G. P.
