From The Principal

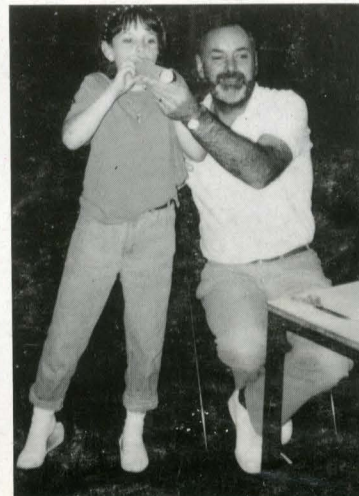
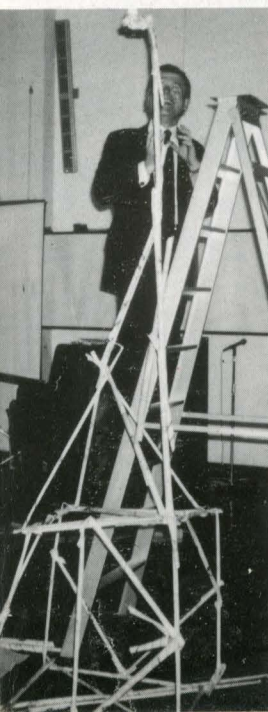

Last year I played with my friends in Argentina. One day, I went to a place where there was folk-dancing. The music was exciting and it was very colourful.

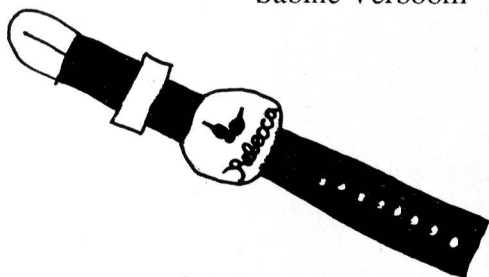
This year

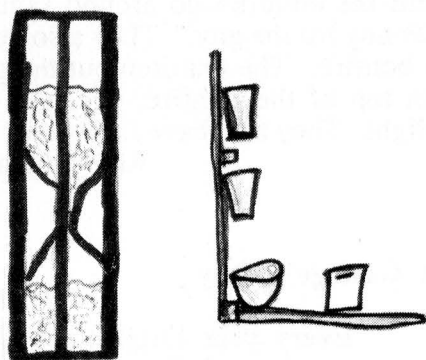
Sand clocks

Sand clocks have been used since the time of the Egyptians to measure how long it took to do certain things. That was about 5,000 years ago. In England, they were still being used regularly until a few hundred years ago.

Sand clocks were made using two pear-shaped glass bulbs, one nearly full of sand, which were placed so that the thinner parts were together. 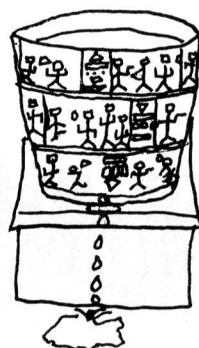
Water clocks

My own water clock

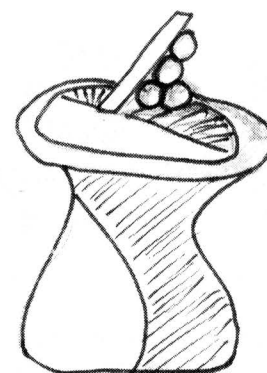

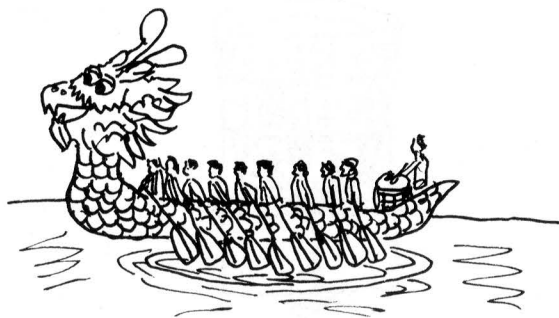


Christmas

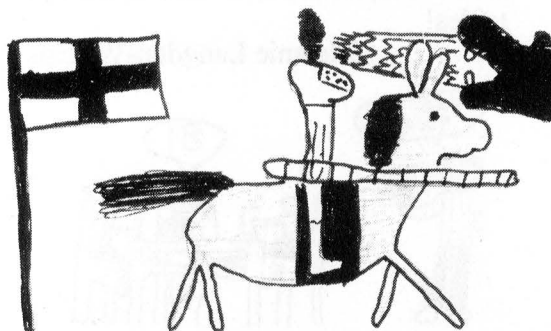
Chinese festivals

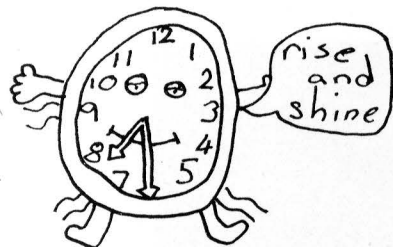
St George's Day

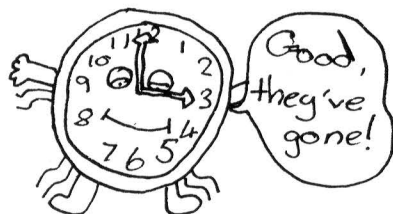


Mr Clock's day

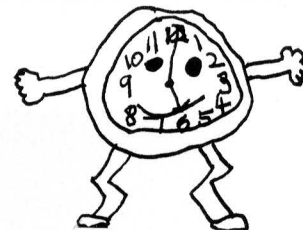
We made mooncakes

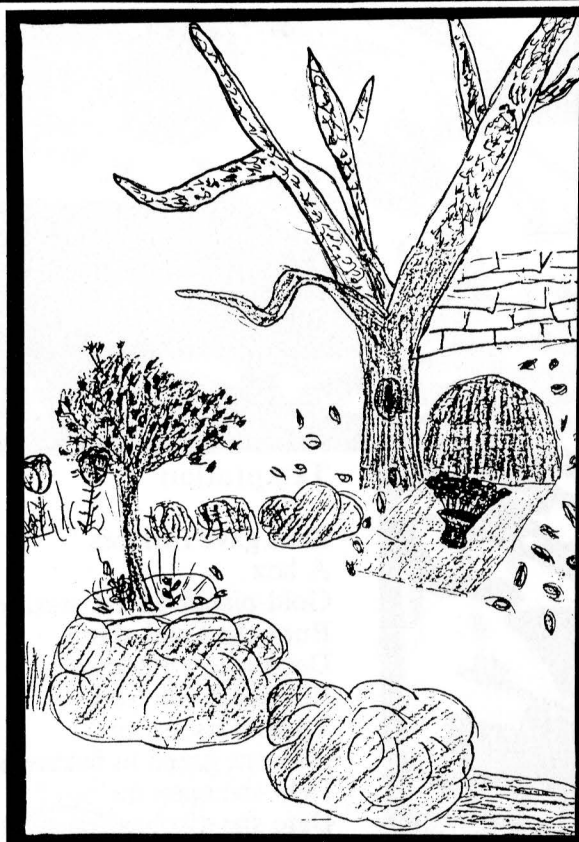
The old box

"Are we there yet?"

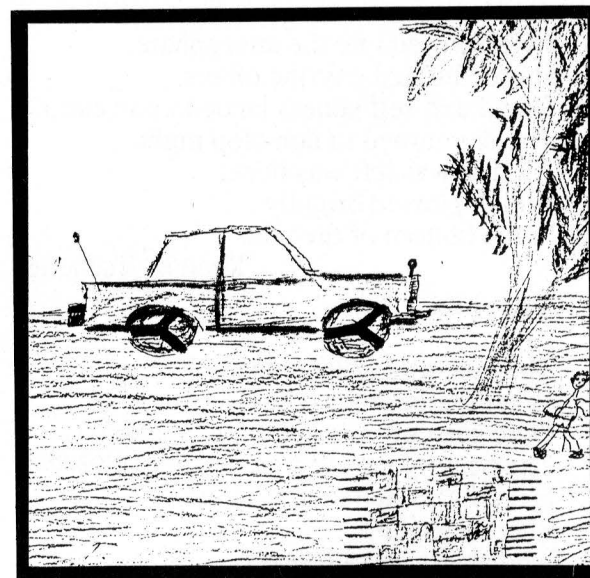
"Yes," said Dad.

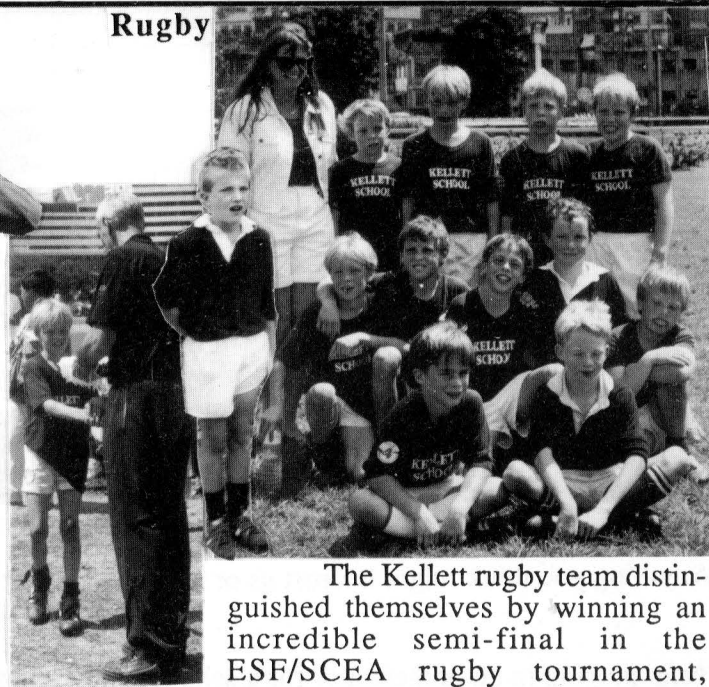


Soccer

Rugby



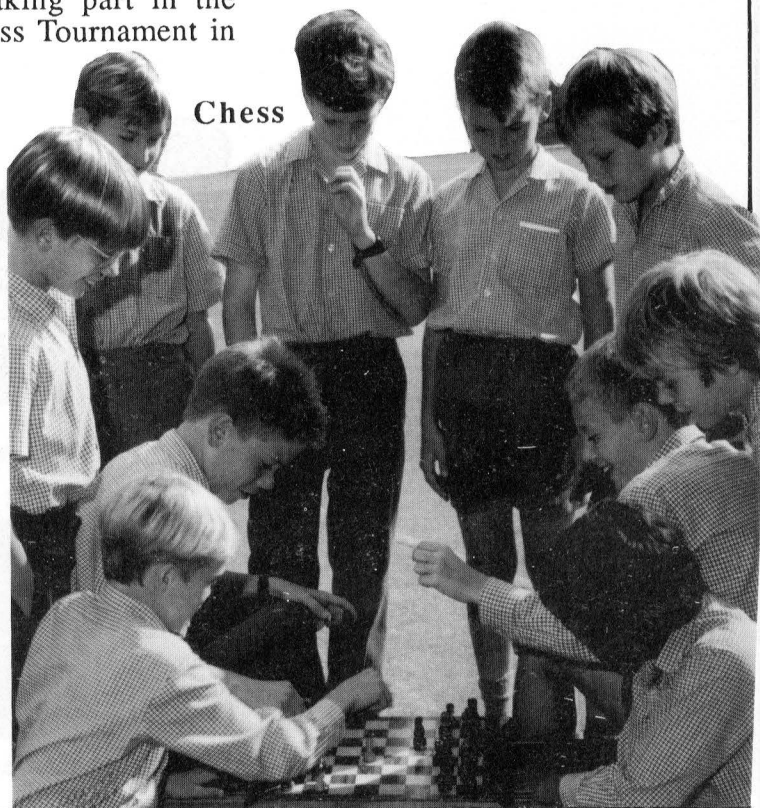
