

# Boulder Pioneer Leaves After 21 Years in 'Home'

BOULDER CITY, May 21. — One of Boulder City's earliest "pioneers" Mrs. Dave Armstrong is leaving the community in which she has been a continuous resident since this Bureau of Reclamation project headquarters was laid out 21 years ago. In 1931 she and her husband moved into one of the first three government houses to be built here "before the paint was dry."

They resided in the same house at 1350 Denver, until his death several months ago. Mrs. Armstrong continued to live there until today, when she left on an extended trip through the east and middle west during which she will decide where to "settle down."

Several farewell parties have been given for her, including one at the Otto Littler home, 1344 Denver, at which Mrs. Littler and Mrs. Leo Dunbar were hostesses and a supper party in the patio room of the Boulder Dam Hotel with Mrs. John E. Connolly, Mrs. Albert Hamilton, and Mrs. George Rockhill as hostesses. Mrs. Armstrong was presented with gifts at both affairs.

One of the annual social gatherings for "old-timers" for many years was the open house which Mrs. Armstrong gave every year for her mother, Mrs. Martha Waugh Stimson, a pioneer of the old west who came to Boulder City with the Armstrongs. Mrs. Stimson died here a year ago at the age of 91.
