

# Wm. H. Trimble, Former Ranger Chief, Dies

William H. Trimble, 54, who came to Boulder City in 1933 and served as chief ranger for the bureau of reclamation until a few months ago, died at the Las Vegas Hospital at 5:15 o'clock yesterday afternoon after a lingering illness.

He was widely known in southern Nevada for his activities as head of the Boulder City rangers and for his fraternal affiliations.

Last June he suffered a stroke of paralysis, and his condition had grown steadily worse during the past several months. He was reported to be in a 'critical condition a few days ago and his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Lemuel Wylie, and their son, Peter, were called here from Yuma, Arizona. Mrs. Trimble and Mr. and Mrs. Wylie were at his bedside when he died yesterday.

Remains are at the Garrison mortuary in Las Vegas and will be forwarded by Union Pacific train at 5:35 o'clock this afternoon to Fort Collins, Colorado. No services will be held in southern Nevada. Mrs. Trimble will accompany the remains to Fort Collins, where Masonic and Episcopal rites will be conducted Sunday afternoon. Interment will take place in the Fort Collins cemetery.
