Freak Fall Of Boulder Brought Death to Lehto

All the precautions usually taken during a diversion tunnel blast failed to save the life of Lauri Lehto, who was killed at 10:30 o'clock Thursday morning at the portal of Tunnel 1, on the Arizona side of the river.

All the men left that lower portal, huge gaping cavern more than 50 feet across, while the impending blast was set off. The men, among whom was Lehto, went into another sheltering cavern nearby.

The shot boomed. The men waited awhile, then went out into the open air.

Lehto went down to the river and washed his hands and face in the stream, then returned to enter the diversion tunnel.

It was then that the huge rock fell from above and hit the ill-fated worker on the head.

That rock had been jarred loose, but had failed to fall until actually minutes after the danger from the spot was past!
