Soil Conservationist Warren V. Turner, 708 Fifth Street, recently nominated to "American Men in Science," will retire from his position on the Bureau of Reclamation's Region 3 Project Development staff today following more than 33 years of Federal Service, Acting Regional Director A. B. West announced today.

He served his country also during World War II, entering the U. S. Air Force in 1942 and emerging with the rank of Major early in 1946.
