

Justice Riggle, of Boulder, Presides Over 50-Man Special Arizona Precinct

A special justice precinct of less than 50 people on the Arizona side of Black Canyon, is presided over by Eddie Riggle, Arizonan, who makes his headquarters on the Nevada side of the river, in Boulder City.

About 50 miles long and 15 wide, the precinct is inhabited by prospectors almost entirely, with the Hoover dam workers employed here living on the Nevada side of the Colorado river.

Riggle was sent here by the Arizona industrial commission, to represent Arizona's interests in that respect.

On account of the fact that occasional deaths on the project, occurring on the Arizona side, necessitated a trip of the coroner from Kingman, the Mohave county com-

missioner appointed Riggle justice of the peace and coroner for it, on July 6, 1931.

Riggle's territory is bounded as follows:

From the old Stone ferry at the north of Squaw wash (upstream from Black canyon, and 25 miles north from White hills), southward up Squaw (sometimes called Detrital) wash, to the intersection of the north line of township 27 North Range 20 west G. and S. R. M., west to the present Mohave county-Hoover dam road along that road to Placerville (sometimes known as Sandy Harris camp) near the mouth of Jumbo wash, along the Colorado, then north along the center line of the river to the Big bend, and east along the center line of the river to the point of be-
