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HOOVER SWEEPS U. S. A.

PITTMAN WINS; HAS BIG MARGIN

Senator Gets 3,000 Margin In Big Sweep

State Pays Tribute to Sterling Work of Senior Senator

Horsey Defeated; Russell Elected; Guild and Sanders Still Close

RENO, Nov. 7.—United States Senator Key Pittman will carry the state in his campaign for reelection by a margin of 3,000 votes over Sam Platt, his Republican opponent. It was indicated early this morning with nearly two-thirds of the anticipated vote of approximately 50,000 already counted.

At the same time, Herbert Hoover piled up a similar majority over Al Smith, in fact of repeated last minute reports that the Democratic leader was scheduled to carry the state.

Sam Arentz will apparently defeat his Democratic opponent, Charles Lee Horsey of Clark county, by several thousand votes, late returns indicated.

On the state ticket, Pittman was the only Democrat elected, George Russell defeating John Kenney for the office of state treasurer, and Thomas A. Lotz winner from Wm. Donovan. Both of the latter Republicans, who are incumbents in office, sprung the big surprise of the election when they came out of the supposedly Democratic stronghold of Clark county with a majority.

The only real contest in the state between the two parties was in Clark county.

MAJORITY WILL EXCEED COOLIDGE'S IS INDICATED

Solid South Broken Asunder for First Time Since Civil War When Virginia and Florida Drift Into Republican Column of Victory

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Herbert Clark Hoover of California has been elected President of the United States.

Running for office for the first time in his life, he defeated Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York, veteran master of politics, in one of the most spectacular victories in the history of American campaigns, according to the nationwide returns collected by the United Press today.

Hoover smashed the Solid South, marking the first time the Republicans have turned the trick in fifty years. Hoover also took Governor Smith's home state of New York with its great block of forty-five electoral votes.

The result, as tabulated by the United Press, gave Hoover 397 electoral votes, which if borne out in the final returns, would eclipse the Coolidge landslide of 1924. The popular vote stood Hoover, 10,879,615; Smith, 8,866,449.

Smith was getting some in Massachusetts and had 412,090 against Hoover's 392,610 with about one-third of the state reported.



This was his only important loss outside of the Solid South where he lost Virginia and Florida to Hoover.
