Boulder City Landmark To Go

The final remaining landmark of the dam building days at Boulder City soon will be another memory.

Long an eye-sore at the west entrance to the community, where they are almost the first structures which greet persons arriving here, the twin 13-year-old Six Companies barracks are doomed.

Plans for their razing and removal will be opened next Friday in the office of the chief clerk of the Bureau of Reclamation. The low bidder will be required to remove the two buildings within 60 days.

The structures stood idle for several years as the beautiful little desert oasis city, which emerged from the old construction camp, grew and flourished. Then with the start of the war and the es-

tablishment of Camp Williston here one wing was taken over as U.S.O. headquarters.

Recreation facilities and a dormitory to house men in uniform overnights were established and have received full use.

Recently an inspection showed that the buildings were unsafe and they were condemned. The roof of the west wing long ago began to disintegrate and fall, becoming worse with every stiff wind.

Ann McLaughlin, director of the U.S.O., assisted by city officials and civic leaders, is searching for a new location for the U. S. O. when the contractors begin to raze the old structure.

"Yes sir, that was old barracks No. 6," Chief Ranger C. F. Peterson recalled yesterday.

"Many was the fight we were called on to stop down the in the dam building days. Those construction stiffs would get hold of some of this Clatsop county moonshine which was plentiful and then before morning we'd be hauling them to the hospital and jail."

"Nobody around here dreamed that Boulder would become the model community it is now with jail empty most of the time people doing their biggest trying over red points and rationing."

"Yes sir, it will look decent with those old barracks gone — they're the last of the dam period. I'm glad they go, however, they were built to last five years they've been there for now."
