religion and the history of religions, he attended Union Theological Seminary in 1926. He was a graduate student and assistant in the Department of Philosophy and Psychology of the Harvard University Graduate School for several years and received his Ph.D. degree from Brown University in 1933. His teaching experience includes various posts in southern and eastern preparatory schools, especially at the Ashville School for Boys, Asheville, North Carolina, where he was master of foreign languages for five years. In 1938-39 he served as assistant to the president of Central College, Chicago, Illinois.

From this position Doctor Provine came to Ward-Belmont as Dean of Faculty in

September, 1939, leaving to become professor of Philosophy and acting Registrar and Director of Admissions at Vanderbilt. He returned to Ward-Belmont on June 6.

Mrs. Provine is the former Harriet Josephine Thoms of Kalamazoo, Michigan. She attended the School of Architecture at the University of Michigan. Doctor and Mrs. Provine have five children Harriet Thoms, aged twelve, Christine Kolb, nine, John Calhoun, seven, William Ball, three, and Robert Calhoun, Jr., four months.
