## Campus Mourns Death of Dean Irwin

Dean Alan Irwin, head of the Ward-Belmont Conservatory of Music since 1940, died December 1 in Vanderbilt Hospital following an operation. He had been ill ten days.

He had presented many duo-piano recitals with his wife, the former Florence Steel, who is an alumna of Ward-Belmont of the class of 1923 and a member of the conservatory faculty.

The author of many articles for religious publications and professional music journals, Dean Irwin was recognized as an authority on church music, the teaching of piano, and choir training.

He was a member of the American Guild of Organists, which he was serving as dean at the time of his death; Phi Mu Alpha, national music fraternity; Phi Gamma Delta; and the National Association of Music Teachers.

In paying tribute to Dean Irwin, the Reverend John L. Ferguson, minister of the Belmont Methodist Church, said in part, "Because Alan Irwin came to us and touched our lives, we are a more reverent and worshipful people. Because of his quiet gentleness, his genuine sympathy and his radiant personality, we have been led close to the throne of God and have longed to become better and more useful Christians."

Besides his wife, Dean Irwin is survived by his father, F. W. Irwin of Oakley, Kansas; a brother, O. W. Irwin of California; and three daughters, Donna, Annette, and Alance Irwin, who are students at Ward-Belmont.

In addition to his work as head of the conservatory and instructor of piano, Dean Irwin sponsored the Music Club and directed the annual operetta given by the Ward-Belmont Conservatory and Castle Heights Military Academy.

Since September, 1941, Dean Irwin had held the position of minister of music at the Belmont Methodist Church, where he also served as choirmaster and organist.

Dean Irwin came to Nashville from Wichita, Kansas, where he had been dean of music at Friends University and choirmaster and organist of the First Presbyterian Church.

He was educated at the Bush Conservatory of Music, Chicago, and Northwestern University. Dean Irwin also did graduate work at Juilliard School of Music, New York, and held an M.A. degree from Columbia University.

Dean Irwin received his choral training at the University of Chicago and in the Apollo and Marshall Field Choral Societies. He studied organ at the Chicago Methodist Temple and under Raymond Robinson, organist at King's Chapel in Boston.

## Alumna Joins Missionaries in Pakistan

Last October Nancy Kellogg, '46, left New York for Pakistan where she is one of fifty Methodist college graduates beginning three-year terms as missionaries in Pakistan and India. Her particular position is teaching English and physical education to Moslem college women.

After leaving Ward-Belmont, Nancy attended the University of Cincinnati where she received a B.A. degree in 1948. Until recently she was a visiting caseworker for the County Relief Agency in Cincinnati, Ohio.

While in Pakistan, Nancy is staying at the Kinnaird College for Women in Lahore.
